### Finalization of JKAS departmental examination syllabus in final stages: CM Omar Abdullah

JAMMU, MARCH 13: Chief Minister Omar Abdullah today informed the J&K Legislative Assembly that the finalization of the syllabus for the 2018-24 batches of J&K Administrative Services is in its final stages, and the examinations will be conducted soon thereafter. Responding to a supplementary question from Member Aijaz Ahmad Jan, the Chief Minister acknowledged the delays but assured that the process is now nearing completion. "The government has gradually streamlined these processes, which had been

delayed for some time. However, the complexity of the revision caused an unavoidable delay. This is the first syllabus revision since 2000—after nearly 25 years—which required significant changes," he said.

He further explained that the administration conducted a comparative analysis of J&K's syllabus with those of other States and Union Territories to ensure alignment with national standards.

"Necessary modifications have been incorporated, and relevant departments, including Revenue, Law and Information Technology, have contributed to the process," he

Finance, Omar Abdullah disclosed that the financial liabilities of Rs 2504. 46 crore are to be transferred to Ladakh.

"As regards apportionment of public debt, the apportionment of assets & liabilities is to be carried out as per the notification SO-329 of GAD dated 30/10/2020," he said, as per news agency—. He said that most of the recommendations

### Agricultural land shrinking in J&K, data reveals

Net sown area stagnates, fallow land rises; experts warn of food import dependence as erratic weather, urban expansion threaten farmland

Srinagar, Mar 13: Jammu and Kashmir has long been an agrarian society, with farming sustaining millions of people for generations. However, recent government data reveals a troubling trendagricultural land is shrinking, while more land is being abandoned or turning barren.

Data from the Financial Commissioner (Revenue), J&K, accessed



by the news agency—reveals that the net sown area has stagnated at around 30-31% of the total land over the last four years. In 2020-21,

it was 736,000 hectares, dropping slightly to 733,000 hectares in 2022-23, before rising marginally to 738,000 hectares in 2023-24.

Meanwhile, fallow land-land left uncultivated-has increased from 120,000 hectares in 2020-21 to 135,000 hectares in 2023-24.

The rise in barren and uncultivable land, from 295,000 hectares to 302,000 hectares, further signals that farming is under strain.

"These youths were subjected to online interviews and either provided with travel tickets or asked to arrange their own journey. However, upon arrival, they realized they had been trapped in a cyber scam and taken to Myanmar instead," SSP Ashraf stated.

Upon receiving intelligence about their situation, authorities swiftly intervened to facilitate their safe return. "Immediate action was taken, and all 13 individuals were successfully rescued. They have been brought back under full security and are currently undergoing counseling and debriefing," he added.

The Chief Minister also mentioned that senior IAS officers were consulted in drafting the final syllabus.

"The final draft is now ready, and I assure this House that we will complete the process within a month," he said.

 $Addressing the query regarding the 2018 \, and \,$ 2019 batches of Junior JKAS officers, the Chief Minister clarified that existing operative rules do not provide for the declaration of Junior Scale JKAS officers as quasi-permanent.

Instead, the confirmation of their probation is contingent upon passing the Departmental Examination, as mandated by the following service rules:

1. Rule 22(1)(a) of the Jammu and Kashmir Civil Services (Classification, Control and Appeal)

 $2. Rule 4 of the Jammu \, and \, Kashmir \, Combined$ Competitive Service (Probation & Examination) Rules, 2000

3. Rule 16(1) of the Jammu and Kashmir Administrative Service Rules, 2008

As per Rule 16 of SRO 386, probationers must pass the Departmental Examination within two years of their appointment to be confirmed in service.

However, the Chief Minister highlighted that the examination could not be conducted due to major administrative changes brought about by the Jammu and Kashmir Re-organization Act, 2019, which restructured the erstwhile state into two Union Territories.

This reorganization necessitated a comprehensive revision of laws, statutes, and regulations, including those governing the Departmental Examination.

"As a result, the syllabus had to be thoroughly revised to align with the new administrative framework and updated legal provisions introduced by the Re-organization Act," he said. He further informed the House that Government Order No. 1514-JK(GAD) of 2023, dated 30.11.2023, had constituted a committee to finalize the syllabus for the JKAS Probationers' Departmental Examination.

"We are making every effort to expedite the finalization process. Once the syllabus is approved, steps will be taken immediately to conduct the examination. The confirmation of

probation for these officers, which depends on successfully passing the examination, will be processed without delay in accordance with the relevant service rules," the Chief Minister

The Chief Minister emphasized that tourism is a key pillar of J&K's economy, significantly contributing to the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) and employment generation.

wider range of visitors to Jammu & Kashmir," he added. As Minister in charge of the Tourism Department, the Chief Minister highlighted that the government is actively promoting J&K's top

paigns on national and international platforms. Additionally, the Tourism Department is focusing on the development of off-beat destinations to expand tourism beyond traditional

tourist destinations through advertising cam-

"We are working on developing lesserexplored destinations like Gurez, Keran, Bungus, Tosamaidan, Aharbal, Doodhpathri, Machail, Bhaderwah, Sukrala Mata, and Pancheri to attract more tourists," he said.

The Chief Minister stated that tourist arrivals in I&K have seen a significant increase in the last two years. In 2023, J&K recorded 2,11,80,011 tourist visits and in 2024, the number increased to 2,35,90,081, he informed.

The Chief Minister also provided an update on infrastructure-related projects undertaken by the Tourism Department over the last three years: In 2022-23, 984 projects were initiated, with 549 completed; In 2023-24, 1,191 projects were taken up, and 516 were completed and in 2024-25 (till date), 1,914 projects have been started, out of which 1,057 have been completed.

"Our focus remains on strengthening tourism infrastructure, enhancing visitor experience, and ensuring sustained growth in the sector," the Chief Minister concluded.

from Padder Nagseni Constituency have been provided capacity building under the Hausla Programme in the current financial year. Besides, 2137 applications have been received under the Vishwakarma scheme.

He informed that 329 artisans and 125 weavers have been registered in Padder-Nagseni Constituency who can avail benefit of the schemes being implemented by the department under Artisan cards.

The Deputy Chief Minister said that various schemes are being implemented by the department to support the local handicrafts, particularly Pashmina weaving and other traditional crafts in the Constituency.

He said that the facilities included 10 sanctioned training centres in Kishtwar district which provide training in various crafts viz; Crewel, Staple, Sozni, Carpet weaving, wheat Straw Craft and Handloom Weaving, of which, 01 training centre of Wheat Straw Craft is functional in the Padder-Nagseni Constituency. He added that besides training programmes, the department facilitates handholding of the weavers and the artisans through Credit Card Scheme 2020, Weaver Mudra Scheme, Karkhandar Scheme 2021, registration of cooperatives under Financial Support scheme and other

The Deputy Chief Minister said that 27 cases have been sponsored to various banks from Padder- Nagseni Constituency, of which, 15 cases have been sanctioned till date. He added that 03 cases have been sponsored to various banks under the Weavers MUDRA Scheme 2015 during the past three years.

He said that about 14 Cooperatives have been registered from the Padder sub division covering 154 artisans/weavers under the Financial Support Scheme for Cooperatives of Handicrafts and Handloom Department during the past three years. These artisans/weavers were practicing various traditional crafts viz; mix embroidery, stone jewellery, crewel embroidery, wheat straw crafts and weaving. An amount of Rs. 7.00 lakh has been disbursed among these cooperatives till date as first installment, he added.

He said that the department has also facilitated the participation of 04 Industrial Handicrafts Cooperatives from Padder Nagseni in National Level Exhibitions and 02 Industrial Handicrafts Cooperative Societies in Bhaderwah Fest, while 02 crafts viz; Kishtwari Loi and Wheat Straw Products are under submission

He added that a patch of land measuring 8 kanal has been identified at Matti, Padder for promotion of the Hotel Industry.

at an annual rate of 2.14 percent during the same period," the official said as per news agency-Kashmir News Observer (KNO).

It also said that as of November 2024, the number of electricity connections and consumers in various categories in Jammu and Kashmir has risen to 23.65 lakh, compared to 23.45 lakh in March 2024 that indicates a steady increase in the number of people and businesses receiving power supply.

"As power demand increases, it triggers economic growth, drives industrialization, and boosts the development of basic amenities such as healthcare, water supply etc," the official said.

It also said, "This cumulative progress ultimately results in a better quality of life for the people of Jammu and Kashmir, positioning the region for sustainable growth and modernization while making it a key player in the national energy landscape."

Pertinently, KNO in previous week reported that Jammu and Kashmir is facing an excessive gap of more than 15 percent between the power requirement and actual power available for its consumers.

The official documents in this regard reads, "The gap between power requirement and actual power available is quite high at about 14-16 percent approximately in J&K."

The officials said that the issue primarily occurs due to drop in generation of hydel power plants during winters as a result of reduction in flow of water in the snow fed rivers of J&K.

Notably, Jammu and Kashmir till last week of February was relying on more than 85 percent of coal and solar power amid acute deficit of hydro power generation.

Officials of PDD department had claimed that local hydro power generation from the local power plants have reduced by nearly 90 percent.

An official had informed that "At present Jammu and Kashmir is 85-90 percent dependent on coal and solar energy that is being procured from the other states because as of

now we don't have a local power generation." "In winters the local hydro power generation of Jammu and Kashmir power plants has reduced by almost 90 percent and in order to cater the requisite power demand, we need to have a base power availability that we procure from outside states. The energy is coal based energy," the official had said-

Data reveals that fertile agricultural land is increasingly being converted into residential areas, commercial projects, and roads. The land put to non-agricultural use rose from 214,000 hectares in 2020-21 to 215,000 hectares in 2023-24.

Erratic weather patterns, including unpredictable rainfall, droughts and untimely snowfall, have disrupted farming cycles. "Our streams are drying up, and without proper irrigation, crops fail," said farmers in north Kashmir when asked about the trend.

Meanwhile, experts warned that if the trend continues, the UT may become heavily dependent on food imports. "The government must introduce sustainable farming programmes, improve irrigation and create better market access for farmers," said Dr Mir Tariq, an agricultural expert.

He said climate change has significantly altered traditional farming patterns in J&K. "Erratic rainfall and water shortages are making it difficult for farmers to sustain their crops. Without strong climate-resilient strategies, agricultural productivity will continue to decline," he said.

### The Whispers and Muted wails of Tral Apple Growers

n the cradle of the Himalayas, where the air is laced with the perfume of blooming orchards, Kashmir's apple trees stretch like a grand tapestry woven by time. From the first tender blossoms of spring to the crimson glow of ripened fruit in autumn, the orchards stand as a breathtaking testament to nature's artistry.

Amidst the rolling valleys and towering peaks of the Himalayas, Kashmir's apple orchards stand as a mesmerizing spectacle, a living symphony of colors, fragrances, and timeless heritage. These lush expanses, where nature breathes life into every petal and leaf, form a dreamlike panorama that captivates the senses and enchants the soul. With each passing season, the landscape transforms, unfolding an ethereal beauty that whispers the secrets of devotion, resilience, and the unbreakable bond between land and labor.

Initiatives like the Pradhan Mantri MUDRA Yojana (PMMY) and Stand-Up India have been instrumental in fostering this trend.

Labor force participation among women has witnessed a discernible improvement with targeted initiatives like the Palna Scheme and the Working Women's Hostel Scheme. These programs are aimed at addressing two most significant barriers faced by working women: care work and accommodation.

Despite these strides, establishing a holistic, quality care ecosystem in the country is urgently needed. While the government is making commendable progress in bridging gaps in child and elderly care facilities, challenges remain. An integrated approach is essential—one that not only strengthens physical infrastructure but also implements a robust policy framework and quality assurance mechanisms.

For example, government may consider forming a statutory body to certify daycare centers and regularly monitor their quality to ensure standardization. Additionally, a special tax exemption upto a defined limit for working women for expenses incurred on childcare (for children upto the age of 5 years) will further support women's participation in the economy.

Moreover, policies encouraging women's participation in blue collar jobs such as working during night shifts with adequate provision of safety measures need to be more widely emulated by States.

The government has also made strides in political and digital empowerment of women as well. Digital initiatives like PMGDISHA are enabling rural women to leverage technology for financial independence. The emergence of AI, blockchain, and fintech is creating new in roads for women in STEM fields, with initiatives like Women in Science and Engineering-KIRAN (WISE-KIRAN) and Gender Advancement for Transforming Institutions (GATI). On the political front, passage of the Women's Reservation Bill has paved the way for greater representation in legislative bodies, ensuring that women's voices are heard at every level of governance.

The transformative impact of these government schemes is evident in the rising number of women leaders, entrepreneurs, and change-makers across the country. Empowered women are not only shaping their destinies but are also driving socioeconomic progress. In fact, women led development has been one of the key priorities for organisations such as FICCI and has been identified as an imperative for Viksit Bharat.

The journey towards women-led development is ongoing, and its success will depend on the collective and continued efforts of both the government, and the private sector.



### The Critical Role of Resource Persons in the Implementation of NEP 2020

resource person is an expert who provides additional support and information to enhance teaching and learning, bringing real-world expertise and practical insight.

Resource persons in school education are key performance indicators in assessing the implementation of the policies envisaged in NEP 2020. Therefore, the approach of NEP 2020 is to strengthen this important performance indicator.

A resource person in the teaching-learning process plays a pivotal role in uplifting education standards for both students and teachers. The key aspects of their

- They assist in developing lesson plans and creating effective educational materials.

- Resource persons, in the form of Cluster Resource Centres (CRCs), often possess specialized techniques and knowledge in their subject areas. They provide guidance to deepen understanding.

- Resource persons facilitate workshops and discussions and encourage critical thinking.

- They help in providing access to various educational resources (books, articles, online materials, etc.), enhancing the learning environment.

- RPs ensure that learning objectives are met by developing evaluation tools.

- RPs promote a more integrated approach to learning as they foster collaboration among educators, students, and the community.

One of the aspects of NEP 2020 is strengthening cluster resource persons. Resource persons are the main unit for training and providing on-the-spot support to schools and teachers.

The government of J&K has started an exhaustive exercise for the implementation of NEP 2020. The functioning of these resource persons should be revamped to align with NEP 2020.

There should be proper filtration of the people deputed as RPs at the zonal, district, and state levels. Some teachers have been resource persons for a decade, regardless of whether their credentials are doubtful or not. Some are satisfied with doing clerical jobs in offices, neglecting the roles assigned to them. An RP who is supposed to be in the classroom helping develop study materials is instead arranging Zoom meetings on behalf of offices for population surveys, etc.

The selection of RPs should be properly handled. The resource person at DIET and SCERT should be a researcher and highly acquainted with new pedagogies of learning, more so than a teacher working at school. But unfortunately, in some cases, it is the other way around.

At zonal and other levels, there should be screening and proper selection of RPs, keeping away the echelons of power, interference by teachers' forums, and undue influence. The selection should be made every two years, as envisaged in government policy, in letter and spirit.

Over the years, national surveys like ASER 2024 have depicted a grim picture of the learning outcomes of students in government schools in J&K Union Territory. For this, resource persons are mainly responsible for failing to overcome the learning gaps of students. The outcomes have shown, and it is widely believed, that most teachers are not well-trained or acquainted with new pedagogies and technolo-

The resource group should be in constant touch with teachers. They should visit schools and monitor academics continuously. In the context of NEP 2020, the Government of India lays stress on resource groups visiting schools to monitor and provide on-site academic support and send reports on a periodic basis. As per the policy, each block and cluster resource coordinator is supposed to be in the school.

# Nearly, 454 artisans registered for artisan card in Constituency

Jammu, March 13: The government has sponsored 93 MICRO Industrial Units besides facilitating 34 units under PMEGP and JKREGP schemes for employment generation in Padder-Nagseni Constituency in the 2024-25 fiscal.

Deputy Chief Minister, Surinder Choudhary, informed this while replying to a question raised by Sunil Kumar Sharma in the Legislative Assembly.

He informed that the department has registered the pass out trainees as Weavers and Artisans, held six awareness camps, registered 78 Artisans for Artisan Cards and 55 for Pehchan Card for availing benefits under various schemes, helping their on-boarding on e-commerce plat-

The Minister said that the Entrepreneurship Awareness Programmes (EAPs) have been organized and 12 candidates from Padder Nagseni Constituency have been provided capacity building under the Hausla Programme in the current financial year. Besides, 2137 applications have been received under the Vishwakarma scheme.

He informed that 329 artisans and 125 weavers have been registered in Padder-Nagseni Constituency who can avail benefit of the schemes being implemented by the department under Artisan cards.

The Deputy Chief Minister said that various schemes are being implemented by the department to support the local handicrafts, particularly Pashmina weaving and other traditional crafts in the Con-

He said that the facilities included



10 sanctioned training centres in Kishtwar district which provide training in various crafts viz; Crewel, Staple, Sozni, Carpet weaving,

wheat Straw Craft and Handloom Weaving, of which, 01 training centre of Wheat Straw Craft is functional in the Padder-Nagseni Contraining programmes, the department facilitates handholding of the weavers and the artisans through Credit Card Scheme 2020, Weaver Mudra Scheme, Karkhandar Scheme 2021, registration of cooperatives under Financial Support scheme and other initiatives.

The Deputy Chief Minister said that 27 cases have been sponsored to various banks from Padder- Nagseni Constituency, of which, 15 cases have been sanctioned till date. He added that 03 cases have been sponsored to various banks under the Weavers MUDRA Scheme 2015 during the past three years.

He said that about 14 Cooperatives have been registered from the Padder sub division covering 154 artisans/weavers under the Financial Support Scheme for Cooperatives of Handicrafts and Handloom DepartThese artisans/weavers were practicing various traditional crafts viz; mix embroidery, stone jewellery, crewel embroidery, wheat straw crafts and weaving. An amount of Rs. 7.00 lakh has been disbursed among these cooperatives till date as first installment, he added.

He said that the department has also facilitated the participation of 04 Industrial Handicrafts Cooperatives from Padder Nagseni in National Level Exhibitions and 02 Industrial Handicrafts Cooperative Societies in Bhaderwah Fest, while 02 crafts viz; Kishtwari Loi and Wheat Straw Products are under submission to NABARD.



### **Kupwara Administration Imposes 11-Hour Daily Ban on Mining in Nallah Mawar Under Section 163 BNSS**

Kupwara, Mar, 13: In Abid to curb illegal mining activities and safeguard public infrastructure, the District Magistrate of Kupwara, Ayushi Sudan (IAS), has imposed restrictions on the extraction of Nallah material from Nallah Mawar between 7:00 PM to 6:00 AM. The order, issued under Section 163 of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNSS), will remain in effect for three months. The decision follows concerns over unauthorized mining operations, particularly near bridges, water reservoirs, and other public infrastructures, which pose a threat to both public safety and law & order. The administration has noted that illegal extraction during nighttime hours has been increasing, violating environmental



guidelines and potentially leading to damage to key structures.The order mandates the Senior Superintendent of Police (SSP) Handwara to ensure strict implementation of these restrictions. Furthermore, the directive aligns with National Green Tribunal (NGT) guidelines and Supreme Court rulings regarding mining regulations.The move is expected to prevent environmental degradation, protect essential infrastructure, and ensure the safety of local residents. The district administration has urged the public to cooperate with the authorities and report any violations.Copies of the order have been forwarded to relevant officials, including the Divisional Commissioner Kashmir, Director of Geology & Mining, and Additional Deputy Commissioners of Kupwara and Handwara, for necessary action.The District Information Office has been directed to publish the order in leading newspapers and local media platforms to ensure widespread awareness among the public.Section 163 of the Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita (BNSS), 2023, empowers

"Under the Integrated Poultry Development Programme (IPDP), big broiler farms, with capacities ranging from 1,000 to 5,000 birds, have been established. Furthermore, 20 Free Range Units under HADP have been set up to promote local egg production and encourage backyard poultry farming," he informed.


