SRINAGAR, MAY 21: There is no letup in the heat wave conditions in Jammu and Kashmir as multiple areas, including Jammu, the winter capital of the region, recorded the season's hottest day on Wednesday.

According to the details available with the news agency-, amidst the forecast of hot and dry weather conditions, Srinagar, the summer capital of Jammu and Kashmir, recorded a maximum temperature of 32.0 degrees Celsius.

Jammu city has recorded the hottest day of the season at 41.4 degrees Celsius, while Qazigund, a gateway of Kashmir, has also recorded the season's highest day temperature at 33.2 degrees Celsius.

Several other areas also witnessed scorching heat with Pahalgam recording a day temperature of 25.8 degrees Celsius, Kupwara at 30.0 degrees Celsius, Kokernag at 31.5 degrees Celsius and Gulmarg, a famous ski resort, at 23.2 degrees Celsius. However, in Jammu division, Banihal station recorded a day temperature

NEW DELHI. MAY 21: India has initiated a major diplomatic outreach named Operation Sindoor Diplomacy to convey its position on cross-border terrorism as two parliamentary delegations departed on Wednesday for Japan and the United Arab Emirates (UAE), marking the beginning of a multi-nation campaign to highlight India's concerns, particularly related to Pakistan's role in terrorism.

Pakistan To Extend Closure Of Its Airspace For Indian Flights By Another Month: Report

ISLAMABAD, MAY 21: Pakistan has decided to extend the closure of its airspace for Indian flights by another month, a media report said on Wednesday.

Pakistan banned its airspace for India last month after steps taken by New Delhi in the wake of the Pahalgam terrorist attack on April 22.

The ban was imposed for a month until May 23, as under International Civil Aviation Organisation (ICAO) rules that airspace restrictions cannot be imposed for more than one month at a time.

Quoting sources, Geo News

reported that the decision to extend the ban is expected to be announced on Wednesday or Thursday, and a Notice to Airmen (Notam) will be issued.

The development comes amid heightened tensions between the two neighbours following India's precision strikes under 'Operation Sindoor' on terror infrastructure in Pakistan and Pakistan-occupied Kashmir on May 7 in response to the April 22 Pahalgam terror attack that killed 26 people.Jammu and Kashmir tourism

Sindoor is a living example of India's military and strategic might.

Highlighting India's rising global stature, LG Sinha said, "We have already emerged as the world's 5th largest economy and are on our way to becoming the 4th. Every Indian aspires for a Viksit Bharat, while our neighbour, deep in debt and struggling to feed its people, continues to support terrorism.

Sending a stern warning to Pakistan, the Lieutenant Governor said, "This time, the enemy (Pakistan) has been taught a lesson. If it dares again, its next seven generations will remember the consequences."

LG Sinha said that the "Operation Sindoor" has drawn a new red line. "In just 23 minutes, India brought the masters of Pakistani terrorists to their knees and the next time if they raise their eyes towards Mother India, not a single area of theirs would remain untouched by punishment," the Lieutenant Governor added.

Referring to the April 22 Pahalgam terror attack, which left 26 civilians, mostly tourists dead, LG Sinha said, "After the attack, Prime Minister Narendra Modi made it clear that the perpetrators would be taught a lesson. The Indian response was swift, strategic, and precise."

He said that during the intervening night of May 6 and 7, 'Operation Sindoor' was launched with a clear mandate: destroy terror infrastructure without causing harm to civilians or military installations. "More than 100 terrorists were eliminated and nine terror camps were wiped out," he said.

LG Sinha revealed that Pakistan was informed in advance that only terror camps would be targeted. However, Pakistan responded with unprovoked firing and shelling in the Poonch region. "Our forces not only repelled the attack but inflicted heavy losses on the enemy," he said, saluting the bravery of the Indian soldiers.

He also paid tributes to the civilians and soldiers who laid down their lives during the confrontation.

"In just three days, the enemy was brought to its knees. Pakistan was left pleading before the international community to intervene," he added.

LG Sinha emphasized that the objective of "Operation Sindoor" was not war but to dismantle the terror machinery. "Today, Pakistan and the world know that every inch of its territory hosting terror camps is within the reach of the Indian Army."

"Dharma has won and Adharma has surrendered before your weapons and might. I am proud that in just a few days our brave soldiers broke the back of the enemy and today 140 crore citizens are remembering your valour, courage and sacrifice," the Lieutenant Governor said-

temple and mosque. By firing and heavy shelling on our sacred sites, terror state Pakistan had tried to damage our social fabric.

The Lieutenant Governor also reiterated the resolve of Government of India, J&K Administration and Armed Forces for exemplary action against terrorism and those trying to divide the people on religious and sectarian lines.

Later, the Lieutenant Governor visited the Dungus area affected due to shelling, and also took stock of the situation during a meeting with senior administrative and district officials at Poonch.

The Lieutenant Governor directed for necessary measures to ensure restoration of all essential services and supplies and submit an Action Taken Report (ATR) to the Divisional Commissioner's Office and the Chief Secretary's Office.

He further instructed for taking comprehensive assessment for requirements and construction of bunkers, upgradation of medical services at District hospital and strengthening Civil Defence system.

The Lieutenant Governor also appreciated the local administration and security forces for their prompt and responsive measures for the safety and rehabilitation of affected families.

VISITS RAJOURI, NOWHSERA

The Lieutenant Governor also visited Rajouri and met the families affected due to unprovoked heavy firing by Pakistan.

The Lieutenant Governor paid a visit to the Government Medical College Rajouri and enquired about the well-being of those injured in Pakistan's shelling.

Reviewing the relief and rehabilitation measures, the Lieutenant Governor was briefed by Abhishek Sharma, Deputy Commissioner Rajouri, on the present situation in the district, and other important matters pertaining to disbursement of relief, availability of essential commodities, medical & emergency services, damage to property and livestock, and requirement of new bunkers in the district.

The meeting also paid homage to Additional District Development Commissioner, Rajouri, Dr. Raj Kumar Thapa, who lost his life due to shelling by the enemy in the civilian area.

Later, the Lieutenant Governor visited Nowshera and took assessment of residential houses damaged by Pakistan's shelling.

He interacted with the local residents and took stock of their issues and grievances. He reaffirmed that the Government of India is committed to people's safety and rehabilitation.

The Lieutenant Governor was accompanied by Chief Secretary, Atal Dulloo; IG Jammu, Bhim Sen Tuti; Divisional Commissioner, Ramesh Kumar; Deputy Commissioner Poonch, Vikas Kundal and other senior officials-

BSF retaliated with heavy mortar fire, neutralizing enemy positions and forcing the infiltrators to retreat."

"We had prior intelligence that a large group was attempting infiltration. Our alert troops identified them early, and within 1.5 hours of engagement, the group was repelled with heavy losses. Our forces responded with precision and intensity, degrading their bunkers and suppressing their firepower," DIG Mand said, according to KNO.

He said that in a decisive and calibrated military operation, the BSF destroyed multiple terrorist hideouts in Pakistan's Sialkot sector along the India-Pakistan International Border during Operation Sindoor, launched in response to the April 22 Pahalgam terror attack, which left 26 civilians, mostly tourists dead.

"Even two weeks after the operation, Pakistani Rangers have reportedly abandoned their posts along the international border, signaling the extent of damage and demoralization inflicted by Indian forces," he added.

DIG Mand praised the high morale and preparedness of BSF troops, emphasizing the leadership of officers on the frontline. He also highlighted the commendable performance of women soldiers, who operated shoulder to shoulder with their male counterparts during the high-stakes confrontation. "We are truly proud of our women troops," he said.

Following the setbacks during "Operation Sindoor," Pakistan resorted to drone warfare, attempting to target civilian and military installations in Jammu. However, India's air defense systems and BSF's anti-drone units successfully intercepted these drone incursions. On May 9, Pakistan initiated unprovoked firing along the IB and launched drones aimed at BSF camps and border villages, but all such attempts were neutralized-

Responding swiftly, the Indian Army helped restore the mosque by repairing the roof, reinstating the solar energy system, and replacing the prayer matting, allowing the place of worship to resume its religious and community functions. The aid was part of the Army's continued humanitarian outreach in border areas affected by conflict.

He added that several homes were also damaged during the shelling and appealed for the construction of more bunkers in the area to protect civilians from future incidents-

ANNOUNCES GOVT JOB FOR NOKS OF PAK SHELLING VICTIMS

The Lieutenant Governor announced Government job to the closest kin of Pakistan shelling victims. He said, ex-gratia and other reliefs have been provided and Government of India is committed for further necessary assistance.

"The proper rehabilitation of affected families is my top priority. The J&K administration, under the leadership of PM Modi and Union Home Minister Amit Shah, is committed to ensuring proper rehabilitation, enhanced border infrastructure, and security for the residents of border areas.

We are significantly expanding our efforts to construct individual and community bunkers across Jammu Kashmir, under the Security Related Expenditure (SRE)," the Lieutenant Governor said.

PAYS OBEISANCE AT GURUDWARA NAN-**GALI SAHIB**

During his visit, the Lieutenant Governor paid obeisance at Gurudwara Dera Santpura Nangali Sahib and interacted with the citizens.

He lauded the residents of Poonch, civil society members and all the communities for their display of courage and social harmony. "Pakistan had shown its cowardice by targeting sacred Gurudwara Dera Santpura Nangali Sahib. In its despicable act, the terrorist country Pakistan had also targeted degrees Celsius, Katra at 36.8 degrees Celsius and Bhaderwah at 31.3 degrees Celsius.

Director Meteorological department (MeT), Dr Mukhtar Ahmad said the rise in maximum temperature by 1 to 2 degrees Celsius is expected with the possibility of a heatwave at scattered places of Kashmir division till May 23.

He said that generally hot & dry weather is expected with the possibility of a brief spell of light rain at isolated places mainly towards late afternoon till May 26.

Ahmad said that from May 27 to 31, the weather would remain generally hot & dry with the possibility of a brief spell of light rain and thundershower at scattered places.

Meanwhile, the MeT in its advisory said that a rise in maximum temperature by 1-2 degrees Celsius is expected with possibility of a heatwave at scattered places of Kashmir division till May 23 and fall by 2 to 3 degrees Celsius thereafter.

Also, it reads that a rise in maximum temperature is expected by 2-3 degrees Celsius with the possibility of a heatwave over Jammu division till 26th May.

On May 13 night, an official in the Pakistani High Commission in New Delhi was declared "persona non grata by India after being found involved in spying activities.

The official was ordered to leave India within 24 hours.

A little later, Pakistan, in a tit-for-tat move, did the same with regard to an official of the Indian High Commission in Islam-

NC spokesperson, Imran Nabi Dar, when contacted, said that the dual-power system was discussed threadbare. The participants have expressed resentment in this regard and pitched for the restoration of statehood.

He added that the dual-power system is not in favour of the people and thus the statehood must be restored at the earliest.

Meanwhile, the meeting passed seven resolutions, including condemnation of violence and tribute to martyrs, reaffirmation of commitment to special status, demand for immediate restoration of statehood, appeal for sustained peace and dialogue, commitment to manifesto promises and condemnation of targeted harassment across the country.

The resolutions include:

Condemnation of violence and tribute to martvrs

The Working Committee strongly condemned the horrific Baisaran attack that claimed the lives of 26 innocent individuals. including a young Kashmiri, Syed Adil Hussain Shah. It also denounced the continued cross-border shelling that took the lives of 23 innocent civilians

The Committee expressed deep sorrow and solidarity with the bereaved families. It also paid heartfelt tributes to the Working Committee members and party activists who have passed away since the last meeting, acknowledging their invaluable contributions and unwavering dedication.

Reaffirmation of commitment to special status

The Working Committee unanimously reaffirmed its unwavering commitment to the restoration of Jammu and Kashmir's special status. The Committee reiterated that this is central to the aspirations and dignity of the people and must be addressed without further delay, and we will continue to fight for its restoration.

Demand for immediate restoration of statehood

The Working Committee also urged the Government of India to restore full statehood to Jammu and Kashmir immediately, as promised on the floor of Parliament and repeatedly echoed in the public domain and also as committed by the constitution bench of the Supreme Court.

Appeal for sustained peace and dialogue

The second delegation, under Shiv Sena MP Shrikant Shinde, began its outreach in the UAE on May 21. The group will also visit African countries, including the Democratic Republic of Congo (May 24), Sierra Leone (May 28), and Liberia (May 31). This delegation includes members from the BJP, BJD, IUML, and other parties, as well as former diplomats.

Before the teams departed, Foreign Secretary Vikram Misri briefed all members on India's approach, with reference to the April 22 incident in Pahalgam, where 26 civilians were killed.

The brief was about India's recent retaliatory operations across the Line of Control and Pakistan-occupied Kashmir on May 7, followed by missile and drone attacks from the Pakistani side.

A ceasefire understanding was reached between the Director Generals of Military Operations (DGMOs) on May 10.

The delegations, comprising members from various political parties, are tasked with presenting India's case to international stakeholders. Their engagements will include discussions with foreign ministers, lawmakers, policy analysts, and representatives from multilateral institutions.

Officials involved in the outreach have stated that the delegations will seek to present credible evidence regarding Pakistan's involvement in cross-border terrorism and push for coordinated international action. The broader aim is to diplomatically isolate Pakistan while bolstering global support for India's counterterrorism efforts.

This outreach is notable for its bipartisan nature. Leaders from both the ruling party and the opposition are participating in a unified diplomatic initiative, reflecting a shared national stance on terrorism.

Locals have accused the Land Mafia' of looting the mineral-rich soil while the authorities turn a blind eye. Locals have taken to social media to express their anger, tagging the District Mineral Officer Budgam and questioning the administration's silence on the matter. They allege that despite repeated appeals, no concrete action has been taken to stop the illegal activity."This is not just land theft, it's an environmental disaster in the making. These Karewas are a natural heritage and crucial for horticulture and agriculture. Their destruction will have long-term consequences," said a concerned resident of Khansahib.Environmentalists have also raised alarm, saying that the unregulated digging has already caused irreversible damage to soil fertility and the local ecosystem. Locals allege that heavy machinery is being used to dig out earth from the Karewas, which is then sold for construction and landfilling purposes, violating multiple sections of the J&K Land Revenue Act and environmental protection laws. Despite visible destruction and public outcry, the district administration, particularly the Geology and Mining Department, is yet to act decisively. Calls are growing louder for immediate intervention and strict legal action against those involved."If the authorities continue to remain inactive, the day is not far when these fertile plateaus will vanish, leaving behind only dust and devastation," a local activist warned.Concerned locals from Budgam have demanded a halt to the illegal mining and strict enforcement of existing laws to safeguard the fragile Karewa ecosystem. Ahmad said the family was preparing for the wedding of his daughter, who works as a private school teacher. "We had planned her marriage for August. All the preparations, clothes, jewellery, and household items we bought for her wedding have been

The screen person speaks the truth Influencers, wake up! Responsibility should also go viral

n today's digital age, social media has become an integral part of our lives. It is not only a powerful medium of communication, but has also become an important platform for public opinion formation, social awareness and political debate. The influence of influencers on platforms like Twitter, Instagram, YouTube and Facebook is no longer limited to entertainment, but they have also started guiding public thinking on social and political matters. In such a situation, it is natural to ask whether these influencers should have any moral or legal accountability? Should of these influencers. Now this influence is not only economic, but it has also penetrated deeply into the social and political sphere.

In the 2024 Lok Sabha elections and the assembly elections in many states, it was clearly seen how social media influencers are playing the role of campaigners for political parties. They directly share posts, make videos or conduct live debates in support or opposition of a particular party. Most of these posts contain promotional material, but it is not clear whether it is 'paid' or not. There is a guideline of the Election Commission to monitor paid news in traditional media, but this new world of social media does not have this control.

The Supreme Court and various High Courts have also expressed concern from time to time about the monitoring of misinformation, hate speech and election campaigns on social media. Technology may have given people freedom of expression, but when this freedom is exercised without any responsibility, it starts weakening democracy. There is a code of conduct for journalists, there is a Press Council, there is accountability of news organizations. But no such mechanism exists for social media influencers.

Two things are important here one, the freedom of influencers and second, their responsibility. Freedom does not mean that they spread any kind of information or idea without checking the facts. If they are propagating a political ideology or influencing public opinion in favor of a particular party, then it is important that they do it in a transparent manner and it is clear that they are working under an agenda.

Apart from this, considering the posts or videos of influencers as paid promotion, the Election Commission should also make clear rules for this. Just as the fee for advertisements in TV and newspapers is fixed and its declaration is mandatory, in the same way promotional posts on social media should also be monitored.

After all, the strength of democracy lies in its transparency and fairness. If any medium - be it traditional media or social media - behaves in a biased manner, it affects public opinion and weakens the roots of democracy. any idea. This argument is correct to some extent, but when a person or group is influencing the opinion of millions of people through their ideas, then they also have a social and moral responsibility.

Influencers must understand that their words are not limited to entertainment or promotion of beauty products, but they can also influence social concerns and democratic processes. With this influence, they must also accept accountability.

It is time that the government, Election Commission, and society take concrete steps in this direction. Social media platforms should also monitor the activities of their users and make technical arrangements to identify paid advertising. Also, a framework should be created that brings influencers under the ambit of code of conduct and also binds them to transparency and fairness.

The need of the hour is that we should not only talk about freedom of expression but also give equal importance to its responsibility and accountability. For the success of democracy, it is essential that every platform, every medium and every voice is fair, responsible and truthful - be it a newspaper editorial, a TV debate or an Instagram post.

In the Shadow of Tragedy: The Bloodstained Days of Poonch

omeone threw themselves into the jaws of death to save their children; another stood frozen, powerless, as their two innocent little ones slipped away before their very eyes. A man who had dedicated his entire life to the cause of peace and brotherhood was silenced forever by the fury of a heartless bomb blast. Some families went to bed with dreams in their hearts, only to be awakened-if at all-by the nightmare of destruction. Somewhere, a woman lost the man who had stood by her through every storm. Elsewhere, a daughter watched her father breathe his last in her trembling arms. A mother was left cradling the lifeless body of her child; a father's cries echoed in the silence as he carried his son to the grave. Entire families were torn apart in moments.

All around, there was nothing but the sound of despair-agonized screams piercing the air, tears flowing endlessly, and a silence so haunting it seemed to echo louder than the explosions themselves. The very soul of Poonch trembled. Amid the smoke and rubble, one question trembled on every lip, one cry rose above all: What was our fault? Why were we made to bear such a crushing loss? And how long must we continue to suffer in silence?

Yes, this is the heartbreaking reality of District Poonch in Jammu and Kashmir, where the serene mornings of the 7th and 8th of May 2025 were shattered by a tragedy so grave it brought the entire region to its knees. In an unprovoked and cowardly act, Pakistan unleashed cross-border shelling, deliberately targeting civilian areas. The victims were not soldiers in uniform, but ordinary people-children playing in courtyards, mothers preparing breakfast, elders returning from prayer.

ing stories is that of 13-yearold Ayan and his sister Aruba-two tender souls full of innocence and promise. They had barely begun to dream, to live, and to hope. But in a single, cruel moment, their young lives were snatched away by the thunder of enemy shells. Now, their parents are left with nothing but their memories, their names engraved not just on tombstones, but on hearts shattered forever.

Among the most devastat-


Their mother's story is one of unfathomable courage. With trembling hands, she buried her own childrenshouldering a pain no mother should ever know. But even in that abyss of sorrow, she did not allow herself to break. While grieving, she also had to fight to keep her husband, Ramiz Khan, alive. Gravely injured in the same attack, he was battling for his life, and she stood by him-her tears buried deep beneath her strength.

To that mother, we offer not just our sympathy, but our salute. Her strength in the face of such profound loss is nothing short of heroic. In the darkest of times, she stood tall–not as a victim, but as a symbol of the indomitable spirit of Poonch.

Let us turn our attention to a soldier-a true son of the soil-who had dedicated his entire life to the service of the nation. Ex-Serviceman Amarjeet Singh, a proud veteran of the Indian Army, had fulfilled his duty with unwavering loyalty and honor. After years of defending the country along the nation's borders, he had finally laid down his arms and returned home to Poonch, seeking the peace he had fought so long to protect.

But peace was cruelly denied to him.

On the morning of 7th May 2025, as the first light touched the valley, Pakistan launched a barbaric cross-border shelling attack, targeting civilian areas without provocation.



One of the shells tore through the home of Sardar Surjan Singh, Amarjeet's uncle-a respected social activist and humanitarian known across Poonch for his efforts to unite communities.

Amarjeet Singh, hearing the blast and witnessing the chaos, did not hesitate for a moment. Driven by instinct and selfless courage, he rushed to protect his family. In the face of flying shrapnel and deadly fire, he shielded his loved ones. In doing so, he made the ultimate sacrifice. He was martyred on his native soil, not on a distant battlefield, but in the very home he thought would be

his safe haven.

His death sent shockwaves through the community. He left behind two young children, whose eyes now search for a father who will never return. They will grow up cherishing the memory of a brave man who laid down his life for others-his legacy etched not only in medals but in the hearts of every Indian who values freedom and family.

And then, there is Sardar Amrik Singh Ji, the revered Granthi of Gurdwara Sahib, Poonch. A man of deep faith and humility, he had just completed his morning prayers and returned home when

a Pakistani shell exploded outside. In an instant, chaos erupted. As he tried to rush his children to safety, deadly fragments pierced his body. He collapsed, a spiritual guide felled by an enemy who respects neither war conventions nor humanity.

Perhaps the most agonizing part of his story is this: in those critical moments, there was no one to take him to the hospital. He died not only as a martyr but as a forgotten casualty of a cowardly attack that targeted peace-loving civilians.

And tragically, these two heroes are not alone.

The black smoke that rose

over Poonch carried with it the names of many others-Mohd Rafi, Vihaan Bhargav, Maryam Khatoon, Shakeela Bi. Balvinder Kour, Ranjeet Singh, Qazi Mohd Iqbal, and Mohd Akram-all innocent souls who lost their lives on the 7th and 8th of May. Some were children, others elders; some were community leaders, others humble farmers. But they all shared one thing in common: they were innocent.

They were not caught in a crossfire-they were the targets. Victims of an inhumane assault on humanity itself.

Dozens more were injured, lives forever changed, homes reduced to rubble. These were not militants or soldiers-they were ordinary people, citizens of peaceloving India, punished for no crime but the place of their birth.

Poonch weeps today-not just for its dead, but for the silence that followed. And in that silence, there echoes a call for justice.

It was very horrible to witness and it is more shocking to express about one such family who witnessed an unthinkable horror-their child's head blown into pieces apart. Here, I am rightly talking about 13-year-old Vihaan Bhargav, a tender soul who hadn't even fully experienced life, yet had to endure such a painful and tragic death

As the explosions continued to tear through the heart of Poonch, families were forced to abandon their homes, their lives uprooted in an instant. They became refugees in their own land, fleeing the very soil they had lived on for generations. There was no safety, no shelter-only the frantic rush for survival. In the face of unimaginable terror, no one knew where to turn. Some took refuge in whatever vehicles they could find, while others, without means of transport, were left to walk, barefoot and burdened with fear. The roads,

once a symbol of peace, now became a harrowing exodus of humanity.

It felt as though Poonch, in the year 2025, was being forced to relive the horrors of 1947, a time when families were torn apart, homes reduced to ruins, and the world seemed to collapse in the wake of brutality. The ghosts of partition seemed to return, as the people of Poonch were once again thrust into the role of displaced souls in their own homeland, facing an uncertain future.

Yet, amid the suffering and the chaos, there stood a beacon of strength-the Indian Army. Our soldiers, unwavering in their resolve and indomitable in their spirit, mounted a swift and powerful response to Pakistan's cowardly act of aggression. They did not just defend the borders-they defended the very essence of India's sovereignty and honor. With courage and valor, they ensured that the enemies of peace would not go unchallenged, and that the lives of countless innocent civilians would not be forgotten.

As the dust settles, and history looks back on those dark days, we stand unitedshoulder to shoulder with our nation, our soldiers, and our martyrs. We are reminded that the sacrifices made by our brave forces are not just for today, but for the safety and future of generations to come. We remain steadfast, always ready to lay down our lives for the honor, dignity, and security of our motherland.

The 7th and 8th of May, 2025, will forever be etched in the memory of Poonch as a dark shadow, a chapter of unimaginable grief and terror. But it will also be remembered as a testament to the resilience of the human spirit, the strength of our soldiers, and the undying courage of a community that refused to bow before fear.

he Kashmir Youth Campaign (KYC) emerged as a volunteer group in Kashmir, claiming to assist neglected individuals by providing care and rehabilitation. Their activities included grooming and aiding vulnerable people, often documenting these interventions and sharing them on social media platforms. They would usually shave them, bathe them, and take them to their shelter home and feed them. In return, they were demanding donations from people across Kashmir to feed and run the shelter home, where they would serve as volunteers.

Controversial Practices and Public

Backlash

Recently, a video from the famous social media influencer and fraud exposer exposes a video of Team Kyc where he alleges them of various misconducts. The video uploaded by Dr. Bari on social media added fuel to the fire as Team Kyc was on the radar for their exposés recently, although Team Kyc denied the allegations levelled against them, but the videos and content shown by Dr bari are themselves controversial and need a proper investigation.

While KYC's intentions were presented as humanitarian, their methods raised significant concerns:

•Forced Interventions: Reports indicated that KYC members engaged in forceful grooming of individuals without proper consent, raising ethical and legal questions.

•Social Media Publicity: The group's frequent posting of intervention videos led to accusations of seeking publicity rather than genuinely aiding individuals.

•Fundraising Without Credentials: KYC solicited donations to



build rehabilitation centers, but lacked the necessary authorizations and credentials, leading to skepticism about the legitimacy of their initiatives.

Legal and Ethical Implications

Legal experts and human rights advocates highlighted several issues:

•Violation of Consent: Engaging with vulnerable individuals without informed consent contravenes ethical standards and legal provisions

•Lack of Professional Oversight: KYC operated without affiliations to recognized healthcare or social work institutions, raising concerns about the quality and safety of their interventions.

•Potential for Harm: Untrained handling of individuals with mental health issues can exacerbate their conditions, leading to further harm.

Questionable Practices and Fundraising

Beyond their street-level interventions, KYC has sought donations to build rehabilitation centers. However, there is no evidence to suggest that they are authorized or possess the necessary credentials to undertake such initiatives. This lack of transparency and accountability has further fueled skepticism about the group's intentions and legitimacy.

In light of these concerns, authorities-initiated investigations into KYC's activities. The group's operations were scrutinized for potential violations of laws related to unauthorized medical practices, misuse of funds, and infringement of individual rights.

Critics argue that KYC's actions, though possibly well-intentioned, are misdirected and potentially harmful. Operating outside legal and professional frameworks, their interventions may do more harm than good, particularly for individuals with mental health issues.

Legal experts emphasize that such cases should be handled by qualified professionals within existing legal systems to ensure that the rights and well-being of vulnerable individuals are protected. Conclusion

The case of the Kashmir Youth Campaign underscores the importance of ensuring that humanitarian efforts are conducted within legal and ethical frameworks. While community involvement is vital, it must be guided by professionalism, respect for individual rights, and adherence to established protocols to truly benefit those in need. While KYC's stated mission to assist neglected individuals in Kashmir is commendable in theory, their methods raise significant concerns. The lack of legal authority, professional oversight, and adherence to ethical standards suggests that their operations may constitute a form of vigilantism rather than genuine humanitarian aid. It is imperative for authorities to investigate and regulate such groups to ensure that vulnerable populations receive support through appropriate and lawful channels.

JKRERA inspects unauthorised plotted colonies in Udhampur & Katra

JAMMU, MAY 21: The Jammu and Kashmir Real Estate Authority(JKRERA)conducted a comprehensive inspection of unauthorized plotted colonies in Udhampur & Reasi Districts and sought a detailed factual report along with the revenue record from the concerned Tehsildars.During the inspection, the officers from JKRERA along with the Revenue Department visited illegal colonies at Rakh Kotli, Udhampur By-pass Road, Rathian, Khrooni and Fangyal Road, in district Udhampur. Similarly, in Reasi District, illegal colony namely Trikuta Enclave and Project Devika, Katra were also inspected by the team. The Authority has also issued

notices to two promoters of

Udhampur District namely, Shivani Sharma and Aryan Sharma both residents of Karlai Khalki, Udhampur directing them to register their projects with JKRERA within 15 days. The inspection was aimed to verify whether the promoters/ developers of the plotted colonies had registered their projects with JKRERA, as mandated by Section 3 of the Real Estate (Regulation and Development) Act.The team also checked for any unauthorized constructions or deviations from approved plans and directed the developers to register their projects with RERA.

"Numerous colonies are sprouting up haphazardly without the requisite approvals from the competent authorities. Most of these unauthorized colonies lack basic amenities like roads,



atelectricity and water supply posing a significant threat to planned development. Mushroom growth of such colonies will inevitably lead to the creation of slums. In order to prevent this and for development of colonies in a planned manner, registration with JKRERA is mandatory", said Chairperson JKRERA.

"We urge developers and pro-

moters to adhere to the regulatory framework and obtain necessary approvals before commencing projects. JKRERA is committed to ensure planned development and protect the interests of homebuyers", he added.

Pertinent to mention that nonregistration of the project with JKRERA would invite penalty which may extend up to ten percent of the estimated cost of the real estate project and if the promoter or builder continues to violate the provisions of the Act and does not register the project with RERA, he would be punishable with imprisonment for a term which may extend up to three years or with fine which may extend up to a further ten percent of the estimated cost of the real estate project, or with both. Esha Chib, Deputy Secretary JKRERA, Tehsildar Udhampur Jai Singh, Tehsildar Katra Jatinder Singh, Naib Tehsildar, JKRE-RAGias-ud-Din conducted the

inspection. "We urge develop-

Distt Admin B'la issues Heat Wave Advisory; urges public and departments to take precautions

BARAMULLA, MAY 21: In view of the rising temperatures and ongoing heat wave conditions, the office of the Chairman DDMA/ Deputy Commissioner Baramulla has issued a detailed advisory aimed at safeguarding public health and ensuring a coordinated response from government departments. The advisory outlines preventive measures to reduce the risk of heat-related illnesses such as heat stroke, dehydration, and the worsening of pre-existing health conditions. For the general public, the advisory stresses the importance of staying hydrated by drinking sufficient water, wearing light-colored cotton clothing, and using hats, umbrellas, or sunscreen when going outdoors.

"Citizens are advised to remain indoors during peak heat hours (11 AM to 4 PM), keep indoor spaces cool using curtains, fans, or coolers, and check regularly on vulnerable individuals such as the elderly, children, and those with chronic health issues," read the advisory. The public was also cautioned against direct exposure to sunlight during midday, leaving children or pets in parked vehicles, engaging in strenuous physical activity during hot hours, and consuming alcohol, caffeine, or heavy meals.

Government departments have been instructed to ensure uninterrupted water supply in vulnerable areas, maintain a regulated power supply to prevent outages, and keep healthcare facilities prepared for any spike in heat-related illnesses. Departments are also advised to conduct public awareness campaigns, provide hydration facilities in public places, and restrict outdoor labor during high-heat periods.

Furthermore, departments are urged not to delay emergency responses to heat stroke cases, to avoid scheduling outdoor public events during extreme heat, and to ensure $swift\,resolution\,of\,public\,complaints\,related$ to water or electricity supply. Timely dissemination of weather alerts has also been emphasized.

Health Department was instructed to establish heat stroke clinics across the district and to ensure the availability of Oral Rehydration Solutions (ORS), essential medicines, and other emergency healthcare resources.

District Administration has appealed to the public to follow the recommended guidelines and cooperate fully with the authorities.

5 killed, several injured in school bus attack in Pak

ISLAMABAD, MAY 21

Five people, including three students, were killed and several others injured when terrorists attacked a school bus in Pakistan's Khuzdar district of southwestern Balochistan province on Wednesday, an official said.

The Inter-Services Public Relations (ISPR), the media wing of the Pakistani military, condemned the terrorist attack on "the innocent school-going children's bus," vowing to hunt down the "planners, abettors and executors" of the attack and bring them to justice.

Khuzdar Deputy Commissioner Yasir Iqbal Dashti said that at least five people were killed and 40 others injured, including students and staff members, after a suicide bomber detonated his explosive-laden vehicle near the school bus in zero point area of the district, media reported.

Eyewitnesses in the area told local media that the bus was completely destroyed after the powerful explosion.

Following the explosion, rescue teams and law enforcement agencies reached the scene and shifted the injured to nearby hospitals, local media reported.

Pakistani Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif strongly condemned the bombing targeting the school bus.

At least four students were killed and over 40 others injured when a bomb went off near a school bus in Pakistan's southwest Balochistan province on Wednesday, an official said.

The explosion happened when a school bus carrying children and staff members passed by a vehicle loaded with explosives and parked along the roadside near the zero point area of Khuzdar district of the province, the police and government officials said. He said that the condition of several blast victims is critical, adding that a state of emergency has been imposed and all medical staff of hospitals in the district have been called in.

Eyewitnesses in the area told Pakistani media that the bus was completely destroyed after the powerful explosion.

Following the blast, the police cordoned off the area and launched a search operation in the surroundings to arrest the culprits, Dawn reported.

No group has claimed responsibility for the attack yet.

UN chief welcomes global pandemic agreement

UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres on Tuesday welcomed the adoption of the global pandemic agreement at the World Health Organization (WHO).

Guterres believes that the historic pandemic agreement strengthens global preparedness against pandemics, ensures equity and solidarity in response to health threats and upholds health as a fundamental human right, said his spokesman Stephane Dujarric.

The landmark decision by the 78th World Health Assembly (WHA) culminates more than three years of intensive intergovernmental negotiations in response to the devastating impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, said the spokesman. "The secretarygeneral pointed out that COVID-19 was a reminder that no one is safe until everyone is safe.'

There is no other way but through multilateral cooperation to deal with the global health threats that humanity is facing today, said the spokesman.

The WHA, the WHO's highest decision-making body, adopted the global pandemic agreement in Geneva on Tuesday.

A simple oral swab test before IVF likely to boost success rate

Swedish researchers have developed a simple oral swab test, which can help boost the success rate of the in vitro fertilization (IVF) procedure.

IVF treatment involves stimulating the woman's ovaries to mature many eggs, which are then retrieved and fertilised with sperm in the laboratory before being returned to the uterus.

There are two different types of hormone treatments to choose from for egg maturation: biological the therapies sometimes most suitable.

The study identified that women with a particular variant of the FSH receptor (FSHR) gene that mediates the action of the hormone responded best to the biological hormone treatment, while others benefited from receiving the synthetic type of hormone.

To decode the genetic profile, the team turned to the oral swab test, which proved to be significantly efficient. Within an hour, it produced results that can be seen with the naked eye as a pink or yellow colour.


26 new bacterial species in NASA cleanrooms to hold clues to space survival

An international team of scientists from India, Saudi Arabia, and the US has identified 26 novel bacterial species growing inside cleanrooms associated with NASA space missions.

The study, published in the journal Microbiome, highlights the importance of rigorous contamination control to prevent unintentional microbial transfer during space missions.




