

J&K Has Gained It's Rightful Place on **National Sporting Landscape: LG Manoj Sinha**



Hunt For Terrorists In Kulgam In Final Stages: Kashmir IGP

SRINAGAR, AUG 13: The hunt for terrorists hiding in the forest area of Kulgam district of Jammu and Kashmir has entered its final stages, a top police officer said on Wednesday, the 13th day of the operation.

Two Army soldiers have been killed and nine injured since the operation began

on August 1 in the Akhal forest area. Two terrorists have also been killed in the encounter. The identities and group

affiliation of the slain terrorists have not been revealed so far.

"The Akhal operation has entered the final stages," Inspector General of Police, Kashmir, V K Birdi, told reporters on the sidelines of the full dress rehearsal for the Independence Day celebrations at the Bakshi Stadium here.

He said the details of the operation will be shared in due course of time.

Smart Fence, Robotic Mules & ATVs Boost LoC Security in J&K

SUNDERBANI, AUG 13: Keeping pace with the changing security scenario driven by rapid advancement in AI-powered technology, the Army has gone high-tech with the introduction of state-of-the-art equipment like smart fence system, robotic mules and all-terrain vehi-

cles to fortify security along the Line of Control (LoC) in Jammu and Kashmir's Rajouri district, officials

The newly-introduced equipment, including quadcopters, advanced surveillance tools, bulletproof vehicles, modern weapons and night-vision sights, were all successfully tested during Operation Sindoor between May 7 and May 10, when Indian armed forces carried out missile strikes on terror infrastructure in Pakistan and Pakistan-occupied Kashmir (PoK) in the wake of the April 22 Pahalgam attack and successfully countered the enemy retaliation.

Providing a rare opportunity to visiting mediapersons to witness the Indian Army's unwavering courage and dedication along the LoC in the remote regions of Sunderbani ahead of Independence Day, the Army has activated a three-layered security system and intensified patrolling and vigil all along the border to ensure peace-

ful celebrations of the event. The induction of advanced military vehicles like the Armado and all-terrain vehicles have given the Army's quick-reaction teams an advantage to act swiftly in the most challenging and rugged terrain with dense foliage to neutralise any threat, especially from infiltrating terrorists, the officials said.

He said that a few places of Kashmir division may also

receive moderate showers with brief intense showers and gusty winds during the next two days, adding that generally hot and humid weather with possibility of brief showers is expected at few places on August 16.

September 23-29, with Brazil as the traditional first speaker of the session, followed by the US.

US President Donald Trump will address world leaders from the iconic UNGA podium on September 23, his first address to the UN session in his second term in the White House.

According to the provisional list of speakers for the high-level debate of the 80th session of the General Assembly. India's "Head of Government (HG)" will address the session on the morning of September 26.

The Heads of Government of Israel, China, Pakistan, and Bangladesh are also scheduled to address the UNGA general debate on the same day.

Modi had travelled to the US in February this year for a bilateral meeting with Trump in the White House in Washington, DC. In a joint statement issued after their meeting, Modi and Trump had announced plans to negotiate the first tranche of a mutually beneficial, multi-sector Bilateral Trade Agreement (BTA) by the fall of 2025.

Even as trade negotiations were ongoing, Trump imposed tariffs totalling 50 per cent on India, including 25 per cent for New Delhi's purchases of Russian oil that will come into effect from August 27.

Responding to the tariffs, India's Ministry of External Affairs has said that the targeting of the country is unjustified and unreasonable

"Like any major economy, India will take all necessary measures to safeguard its national interests and economic security," it said.

Last week's announcement of Trump's executive order imposing the additional 25 per cent tariff came at a time when a team from the US is scheduled to visit India from August 25 for the sixth round of negotiations for the proposed bilateral trade agreement.

The two countries are aiming to conclude the first phase of the pact by fall (October-November) this year.

The UNGA list of speakers for the General Debate is provisional, and there is a possibility of changes in schedules and speakers over the next few weeks. The list will continue to be updated accordingly.

Considered the "busiest diplomatic season" of the year at the United Nations Headquarters, the high-level session opens in September annually.

The session this year comes amid the continued Israel-Hamas war as well as the

Ukraine conflict. Trump has said that in the six months of his second presidential term, he has solved several wars, including a peace agreement between Armenia and Azerbaijan, Cambodia and Thailand, Israel and Iran, Rwanda and the Democratic Republic of the Congo.

Accordingly, there can be no manner of doubt that it is the Lieutenant Governor who has to exercise this statutory duty in his discretion, as a statutory functionary and not as an extension of the government, thus, without aid and advice," reads the affidavit filed by MHA through Vishal Sharma, Deputy Solicitor General of India.

While Section 15 of the Reorganisation Act empowers the Lieutenant Governor to nominate two women to the Assembly if he feels that they are not adequately represented, Sections 15A and 15B confer upon him the authority to nominate two Kashmiri migrants and one Pakistan-occupied Jammu & Kashmir (PoJK) refugee, respectively—(KNO)

The Mahindra Armoured Light Specialist Vehicle (ALSV) or Armado is a lightweight and air-transportable armoured vehicle designed for the Army and special

The indigenously-developed "Robotic Mule" is emerging as a game-changer on the battlefield, the officials said, adding that the MULE (Multi-Utility Legged Equipment), designed by AeroArc under the "Make in India" initiative, is a quadrupedal robot capable of navigating snow, deserts, water and other challenging terrains to complete the assigned job.

During Operation Sindoor, these robotic mules played a crucial role in surveillance and logistics, an Army official said.

Equipped with advanced sensors, he said the MULE can transport supplies, detect explosives and conduct reconnaissance. Its modular design allows for customisation across various battlefield roles and it can even operate in swarms, creating a "mini robot army" that enhances operational efficiency while reducing risks to soldiers.

The official said the Army is increasingly integrating drones into military operations for surveillance, reconnaissance and potential strike missions.

Among them, the Mini Unmanned Aerial Vehicles (UAVs) and Surveillance Drones have emerged as a key asset for monitoring sensitive areas, he said.

In addition to the Mini UAV, the Army also employs other advanced surveillance drones capable of not just monitoring but also engaging targets.

Equipped with precision-dropping mechanisms, these drones can hit enemy targets with grenades and improvised explosive devices (IEDs) without exposing the soldiers, the official said.

The Indian Army's Battle Obstacle Course (BOC) is a gruelling test of endurance, strength and combat readiness. It simulates real battlefield conditions, including terrain challenges, jungle operations and bunker-busting exercises.

As part of the drill, an infantry unit demonstrated how enemy bunkers are captured moving through rugged terrain, breaching defences and neutralising threats.

The BOC not only hones soldiers' physical capabilities but also sharpens coordination, speed and tactical skills, which are very essential in combat, the official said.

He said the Army has intensified patrolling and set up a three-layered security system along the LoC to thwart any attempt by terrorists to disrupt Independence-Day celebrations on August 15.

Besides the regular patrolling to keep a close watch on enemy activities, the Army is using drones to monitor every movement of the enemy, while dog squads and detectors are being deployed for additional security.

The official said this is the first Independence Day post Operation Sindoor during which the Army destroyed a number of terrorist camps across the LoC.

A defence spokesperson said the soldiers guarding the border face formidable challenges and steadfastly defend the country with determination and selflessness.

"It became clear that beyond their uniforms, each soldier harbours a deep sense of duty and pride in safeguarding the homeland," he said.

Amidst the breathtaking yet unforgiving landscapes, he said the soldiers display an indomitable spirit as they tackle adversities with an unwavering commitment and assuring smile.

"Despite extreme weather conditions, isolation and the constant demand for vigilance, these soldiers embody remarkable resilience. In addition to their duties, the soldiers maintain rigorous training standards, underscoring the necessity of being prepared for any challenge," he said.

He asked the Deputy Commissioners to circulate success stories from the existing centres to inspire replication by others.

Reviewing the status of KKGs established under Phases I and II, he sought updates from each Deputy Commissioner on their operational readiness, including availability of IT infrastructure such as desktops, printers and broadband, as well as licenses for sale of seeds, fertilisers and pesticides by eligible KUs.

Principal Secretary, APD, Shailendra Kumar, directed the Deputy Commissioners to set strict timelines for operationalising newly established centres, noting that KUs had already been engaged. He asked for provisioning of essential IT equipment, adoption of Point of Sale (PoS) machines for fertiliser sales and proactive public outreach to boost farmer registrations and service uptake.

MD, HADP, Sandeep Kumar, informed the meeting that under Phase I, 500 KKGs have been made operational across J&K, supported by a dedicated mobile application. Nearly, 5 lakh farmers have registered on the KKG platform, with 1.25 lakh app downloads, 96% on Android devices. Rajouri district leads in farmer registrations with over 84,000 users.

The KKG app now offers advanced features, including a decision-support system for cherry and apple growers, grievance ticket management and push notifications for advisories. A gamification-based registration system is also in place, with 23% of registered farmers achieving Level 2 registration.

Under Phase II, 297 new centres are ready for launch in Jammu Division and 287 in Kashmir Division, significantly expanding the programme's outreach and impact.

The Chief Secretary underlined that the success of the KKG initiative reflects the collaborative efforts of the administration and the farming community, aiming to strengthen the agricultural sector through technology-driven, farmer-centric solutions. By offering integrated services, knowledge dissemination and business opportunities, KKGs are poised to play a transformative role in improving farmer livelihoods across Jammu & Kashmir.

Medicine, GMC Srinagar; and senior faculty members from medical colleges across the UT.

Reviewing the current scenario, the Chief Secretary called for intensified screening drives, particularly targeting vulnerable sections of the population, to curb the spread of TB.

He directed for vigorous contact tracing and mandated that each doctor should adopt at least two TB patients to provide personalised guidance and ensure adherence to treatment protocols. He stressed the importance of home visits by ASHA workers to extend 'at-home' support to patients and enhance

recovery rates. The Chief Secretary also interacted with all Deputy Commissioners to review the availability and utilisation of diagnostic equipment, screening mechanisms, and treatment facilities in their respective districts. He urged them to optimise resources to deliver timely

and quality treatment. He further reviewed the action taken on directives issued earlier by the Lieutenant Governor, emphasising their strict

implementation in letter and spirit. Providing departmental updates, Secretary H&ME, Dr. Syed Abid Rashid Shah, informed that CBNAT machines would be deployed to high-need areas for advanced screening. He divulged that the central government has allocated 16 handheld X-ray machines for the UT under the Abhiyan, while additional machines are being procured under Capex to strengthen diagnostic

infrastructure. He assured that all District TB Centres (DTCs) are adequately equipped to meet screening targets, and necessary steps are being taken to ensure patient adoption by doctors and regular ASHA worker visits.

Mission Director, NHM, Baseer-Ul-Haq Chaudhary, informed that around 5.25 lakh individuals were screened for TB in 2024, while 2.59 lakh have been screened so far in 2025. He shared that the presumptive testing ratio stands at 3,692 per lakh population in Jammu division and 3,890 per lakh in Kashmir division.

The meeting was apprised that Rs2.29 Cr has been disbursed to TB patients under the NikshayPoshanYojana, and 7,891 patients are currently undergoing treatment. Of these, 6,618 have been linked to NikshayMitras for additional support, with the total number of such Mitras in J&K reaching 6,728.

Reiterating the UT administration's commitment to eradicating TB, the Chief Secretary urged coordinated action, community engagement, and optimal utilisation of resources to achieve the objectives of the TB Mukt Bharat Abhiyan.

The training, organised by the Directorate of Extension from August 8 to 13, aimed at strengthening technical and extension skills of agriculture and horticulture officers and field staff across the

It will be staffed with veterinary doctors and food safety officials who will inspect and certify the meat before it is distributed to the market, ensuring consumer safety.

DC Athar Aamir Shafi Khan highlighted that the facility will not only ensure clean and hygienic meat supply but will also promote proper certification processes and effective disposal of offal and other animal waste, contributing to better sanitation and public health standards in the district. He directed the concerned officers to expedite finishing touches and ensure the abattoir is fully

Shanipora Khan Sahib High School **Building Incomplete for** Over a Decade

BUDGAM, AUG 13: A high school building in Shanipora Khan Sahib area of central Kashmir's Budgam district, sanctioned under the Rashtriya Madhyamik Shiksha Abhiyan (RMSA) in 2014, remains incomplete even after more than ten years, leaving students and residents

Local residents told news agency JKNS that despite repeated appeals to authorities over the past decade, no steps have been taken to finish the project. The existing school building is in a dilapidated condition, posing safety risks for children and severely affecting the learning environment.

Residents also alleged that the half-built structure has turned into a hub for illegal activities, including drug abuse, attracting youths from other areas. They warned that the situation is becoming a threat to both the community and schoolchildren.

"The authorities say there are no funds to complete it, but at least they should dismantle this unsafe ruin. We don't need an abandoned structure that invites trouble," said a local resident.

According to locals, the project was initiated by the R&B Department but came to a halt due to funding issues. Despite taking up the matter with elected representatives, the Governor's administration, and the Deputy Commissioner of Budgam, no progress has been achieved.

Residents have now demanded immediate intervention to either complete the building or demolish the unsafe structure to prevent further harm.

Balwant Thakur Explores UK Theatre Collaborations

LONDON, AUG 13: In a landmark move to foster cross-cultural collaborations and expand the reach of Indian theatre on the global stage, Padma Shri awardee and eminent theatre director Balwant Thakur, founder of the internationally acclaimed theatre group Natrang, has embarked on a strategic tour of the United Kingdom. The visit aims to $explore \, partnerships, study \, advanced$ theatrical practices, and identify opportunities for presenting Natrang's signature productions to British audiences.

During his UK tour, Thakur held high-level meetings with some of the most influential figures in the British theatre scene, including artistic directors, theatre managers, and representatives of major cultural institutions. The highlight of his engagements was an in-depth discussion with Chris Sudworth, Creative Director of the historic Hippodrome Theatre Complex—a 120-year-old cultural powerhouse supported by the Arts Council, UK. With venues in London, Birmingham, and other major cities, the Hippodrome is a hub for world-class touring productions, experimental theatre, and innovative artistic collaborations.



Thakur's visit provided him with the opportunity to observe the operational and technical frameworks of the Hippodrome, including stage management systems, lighting design innovations, and audience engagement strategies that have helped the institution remain a beacon of theatre excellence. Discussions also touched upon the feasibility of bringing Natrang's most celebrated productions—known for their originality, cultural depth, and strong narrative structure—to mainstream UK theatre circuits.

As part of his itinerary, Thakur also travelled to Stratford-upon-Avon, the birthplace of William Shakespeare, where he toured the

Royal Shakespeare Theatre and met with resident actors, dramaturgs, and cultural facilitators. In these exchanges, ideas for joint productions, actor exchange programmes, and script development workshops were actively explored.

Speaking about the experience, Thakur noted that while Natrang's productions often offer more innovative and culturally rooted storytelling than many Western shows, the UK theatre sector is decades ahead in stage technology, production budgets, and audience infrastructure.

"To present our work in England, we must master the latest stagecraft techniques and adapt our productions to meet international technical standards. Here, a single theatre production's budget often exceeds that of a Bollywood blockbuster, and box office revenue for one night can cross one crore rupees. With such resources in India, we could achieve unimaginable heights in the performing arts," Thakur said.

Despite the disparity in resources, Thakur believes Natrang's simplicity, authenticity, and thoughtprovoking narratives are its greatest strengths-qualities that can resonate deeply with global audiences. He emphasised that storytelling rooted in truth and culture often surpasses high-budget spectacles in emotional impact.

Encouraged by the warm reception from UK theatre leaders and the keen interest in Indo-UK collaborations, Thakur is optimistic about initiating a series of cultural exchanges, touring productions, and collaborative projects in the near future.

This visit is expected to lay the groundwork for a new chapter in Indo-British theatre relations, potentially giving Indian theatre a more prominent place on the global cultural map while exposing UK audiences to the richness and diversity of Indian stagecraft.

BADC Seeks Immediate Restoration of Border Roads Damaged by Monsoon Rains

JAMMU, AUG 13: The Jammu and Kashmir Border Area Development Conference (JKBADC), a prominent organisation advocating for the rights and welfare of border residents and tribal communities, has called upon the J&K Government and the Border Roads Organisation (BRO) to launch urgent repair operations on critical border roads severely damaged during the ongoing monsoon season.

Chairman of JKBADC, Dr. Shazad Ahmed Malik, said that incessant and heavy rainfall over the past several weeks has unleashed widespread devastation in hilly districts including Poonch, Rajouri, and several other border belts. Massive landslides, flash floods, and continuous soil erosion have damaged or destroyed vital stretches of road, leaving many villages completely cut off from the outside world.

"In numerous locations, the main link roads are either washed away or buried under tonnes of mud, boulders, and debris. People are unable to reach hospitals, schools, government offices, or even meet their relatives in nearby towns," Dr. Shazad explained. "The crisis has disrupted daily life

in every possible way." He highlighted that elderly patients in need of regular treatment, pregnant women requiring antenatal care, and students appearing for examinations are facing severe hardships. In some areas, residents are walking several kilometres on foot through slushy, unsafe tracks to reach the nearest motorable point. Public transport is operating sporadically, goods carriers are stuck for hours, and in several pockets, people are compelled to take long and dangerous detours through forested terrain, increasing the risk of accidents and exposure to wild animals.

The disruption has also impacted the supply of ration, medicines, LPG cylinders, construction materials, and other essentials, leading to shortages in several remote villages. Dr. Shazad stressed that the delay in restoring road connectivity could deepen the humanitarian crisis.

Appealing to the BRO, Public Works Department (PWD), and local administrations, Dr. Shazad urged immediate deployment of machinery, manpower, and technical teams to clear landslide debris and commence full-fledged repair work. "This should not be a stopgap patchwork, but a robust, long-term solution," he emphasised.

He proposed the construction of scientifically designed drainage channels, concrete slope protection walls, and the use of weather-proof materials to withstand $repeated\,monsoon\,on slaughts. The\,JKBADC$ chairman also pressed the Soil Conservation Department to prioritise anti-erosion measures such as building small dangas, retaining walls, and vegetation-based slope stabilisation to prevent recurrence of such damage in future.

Water crisis assume alarming proportions in Srinagar, Budgam areas

For the past 10 days or so a huge population living in the twin districts of Srinagar and Budgam in Central Kashmir is facing acute water crisis. People living in the different areas of both these districts are up against many odds on account of clean and potable drinking water. The water supply to these areas has been limited to a great extent and as such thousands of souls are suffering like anything.

The water being supplied from the filtration plant at Kralpora is dirty and no step whatsoever has been taken to improve the situation. Some of the reports said that the chemicals needed to make the water clean are missing from the filtration plant and as such people are being supplied dirty water full of dirt and impurities. The Kralpora filtration plant receives water from the Doodh Ganga stream and the same water is supplied to scores of areas located in the Srinagar and Budgam districts.

It would be in place to mention here that day in and day out that there are complaints about the quality of water being supplied from Doodh Ganga stream. People opine that the water being supplied from the stream is not up to the mark and it lacks the basic parameters of clean and potable drinking water. Most of the people believe that the water being supplied from Doodh Ganga is the dirtiest when it comes to the water sources present in the Kashmir valley.

Interestingly no official statement has come from the Jal Shakti department and the officers of the department are keeping mum over the same. Their silence on the issue is no less than a crime since it pertains to the health of thousands of people. In many areas people have been collecting water in bottles and have been making it public that the water being supplied is full of dirt and other impurities. This should act as an eye opener for the people at helm since they are turning a blind eye to the issue.

It is important that the concerned department makes adequate stock of alum and other chemicals at the different filtration plants so that the health of the people is not compromised. Kashmir is probably the only place in the country where the stock of alum and other chemicals gets exhausted and it takes weeks together for the department to get the fresh stock of the necessary chemicals.

Controlling stray dogs: Human life first

Supreme Court's strict order- along with compassion, security is also necessary

The Supreme Court has directed that stray dogs be removed from every area and kept in safe places. Strict action will be taken against organizations $or individuals\,who\,obstruct\,the\,process. This\,order$ has been given keeping in mind the safety of children, women and the elderly. The increasing cases of dog attacks and fatal diseases like rabies have raised concerns. The court suggested a balanced solution—dogs will not be killed, but they will be kept in safe shelters. This is a concrete step towards ensuring the safety of both humans and animals.

The recent Supreme Court decision directing the removal of stray dogs from every locality and shifting them to safer places is a significant and long-awaited move. The court clearly stated in its order—"human life and safety first"—which marks a decisive stand in the ongoing debate on this issue. This decision is not only legally significant, but also a reminder to society that the time has come to move beyond emotional debates and adopt practi-

Estimates of the number of stray dogs in India vary from state to state, but some reports suggest that there are about 15 to 20 million stray dogs in the country. This number is not just a statistical fact, but an alarming one—because their presence is directly impacting public safety, hygiene, and health. Stray dog attacks have been on the rise over the past decade. Data from the Union Health Ministry shows that about 17 to 20 lakh people are bitten by dogs every year. A large number of these are children, as their height and vulnerability make them easy targets for dogs. What is serious is that the consequences of these attacks are not just limited to injuries; there is always the risk of fatal diseases like rabies, which claim thousands of lives

Animal rights organisations argue that killing stray dogs is inhumane and they too have a right to live. This view is correct, but it can be recognised only as long as it does not endanger human life. The court has also struck a balance and said that dogs should not be killed indiscriminately, but rather they should be shifted to safer places or shelters. The question here is—are our municipal bodies and panchayats ready for this challenge? Because just giving orders is not enough; its implementation on the ground will require adequate resources, trained staff and a planned strategy.



This decision of the Supreme Court also presents a legal framework. The court has clearly stated that if any organization or person obstructs this process, strict action will be taken against them. This means that now the court has set a clear priority in the debate of "human life vs animal rights". Also, the court has given the responsibility to the municipal corporations and panchayats to not only remove stray dogs, but also make proper arrangements for their care. This order is also a test of the capability and honesty of the administrative system.

Rabies is a major health problem in India. According to the World Health Organization (WHO), around59,000 people die of rabies every year worldwide, a $large \, proportion \, of which \, come \, from \, India. \, The \, disease$ is transmitted by dog bites in 99% of cases and once symptoms appear, it is not possible to cure it. Therefore, preventing dog bite cases is the most effective measure. In addition, packs of stray dogs often search for food in garbage dumps, spreading many types of infections and filth. This also affects efforts such as urban sanitation and Swachh Bharat Abhiyan.

This problem is not just administrative; society also has a big role to play in it. People often feed stray dogs outside their homes out of religious or compassionate feelings. While this sentiment is commendable, it sometimes leads to dog packs and aggressive behaviour. If this food is thrown out in the open, it attracts more dogs and increases the danger to the local population. Society needs to understand that compassion and responsibility must go hand in hand. If we really want the wellbeing of these animals, it is important to take them to shelters in an organised manner and run a sterilisation programme.

To control the number of stray dogs, a large scale

sterilization campaign will have to be conducted. Adequate number of dog shelters should be built in every town and panchayat, where they get food, water and medical facilities. It is important to teach people how to maintain a safe distance from dogs and not to feed them in the open. Garbage lying in the open is the main attraction for stray dogs, which needs to be controlled. Monitoring committees can be formed at the mohalla level which keep an eye on the activities of the dogs and inform the administration.

Many countries have adopted successful models to tackle this problem. For example, in Thailand, the government and NGOs worked together to run sterilisation and vaccination programmes, which drastically reduced the number of stray dogs and attacks. Turkey, under its "Street Dogs Project", kept dogs in safe places and implanted microchips in them to track them. India can learn from these models and develop solutions for its local context.

The problem of stray dogs is not just a matter of law and court, but it is a social issue related to human safety, health and morality. The Supreme Court's stance of "human life and safety first" gives the right direction to this debate. Now it is the responsibility of municipal bodies, panchayats and citizens to find a solution to this problem together. Compassion does not mean that we ignore the danger, and safety does not mean that we become inhuman. A balanced, humane and practical approach is the way through which both humans and animals can

His full name was Najm al-Din Ahmad ibn 'Umar ibn Muhammad ibn 'Abdullah al-Khwarazmi and his renowned epithet was "Shaykh Wali Tarash" (The Maker of Saints) — because countless disciples attained sainthood in his blessed company.







Committee on Subordinate Legislation Meets in Srinagar, Stresses Transparency in Land Compensation & Rehabilitation

SRINAGAR, AUG 12: The Committee on Subordinate Legislation convened an important meeting at the Assembly Complex in Srinagar to examine and review the rules and regulations framed by the Revenue Department, with a particular focus on ensuring fair land compensation, proper rehabilitation, and efficient handling of mutations.

The meeting, chaired by Committee Chairman Hasnain Masoodi, was attended by members Reyaz Ahmad Khan, Shabir Ahmad Kullay, Hilal Akbar Lone, Satish Kumar Sharma, and Rajeev Kumar. Senior officials from the Revenue Department were also present to provide technical inputs and respond to members' queries.

During the session, the Committee undertook a comprehensive scrutiny of existing rules, sub-rules, regulations, and bye-laws, assessing their practical implementation on the ground. Special emphasis was placed on identifying procedural gaps that often delay compensation to landowners, prolong reha $bilitation\, of\, displaced\, families, and\, create\, bottlenecks$ in mutation processing.

 $Members\ voiced\ concerns\ that\ protracted\ delays$ in land acquisition settlements and mutation approvals cause undue hardship to citizens, particularly in rural and border areas where land is the primary source of livelihood. They stressed the need for simplifying procedures, introducing time-bound mechanisms, and leveraging digital platforms for record-keeping and public access to land documents to curb corruption and disputes.

Chairman Hasnain Masoodi underlined that transparent and just land laws are fundamental to safeguarding citizens' rights, especially in the context of infrastructure projects, disaster rehabilitation, and developmental initiatives. "Our objective is not only to review the legal text but also to ensure its fair application for every individual, regardless of their socio-economic background," he remarked.

The Committee also discussed the importance of adequate and timely rehabilitation measures for those displaced by public projects, including provision of alternate land, housing assistance, and livelihood restoration. Several members suggested that rehabilitation packages should be needs-based rather than uniform, taking into account the specific losses suffered by each affected family.

At the conclusion of the meeting, the Committee resolved to forward its observations and recommendations to the Revenue Department, urging immediate policy interventions to streamline compensation, accelerate rehabilitation, and modernise the mutation process. Follow-up meetings will be scheduled to review progress and monitor compliance with the suggested reforms.

The Committee reaffirmed its commitment to upholding transparency, accountability, and public welfare in subordinate legislation, with the goal of ensuring that land-related governance is both equitable and efficient.

Kundria Urges Citizens to Preserve the Spirit of Freedom Through Mutual Respect

BIJBEHARA, AUG 13: In a continued push to enhance nutrition and early childhood care across Jammu & Kashmir, Commissioner Secretary, Social Welfare Department (SWD), Sarmad Hafeez, today undertook an extensive field visit to Anganwadi Centres (AWCs) under the Poshan Project Bijbehara in Anantnag district.

The visit was aimed at assessing the implementation status of key centrally sponsored schemes—including the Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS), Poshan Abhiyaan, Pradhan Mantri Matru Vandana Yoiana (PMMVY), and the Supplementary Nutrition Programme (SNP)—with a special focus on service delivery, monitoring mechanisms, and beneficiary satisfaction.

Accompanied by the District Programme Officer (DPO) ICDS, Hafeez inspected multiple AWCs, interacting with Anganwadi Workers (AWWs), Helpers, and local beneficiaries-particularly pregnant women, lactating mothers, and children under six years of age. The DPO briefed the Commissioner Secretary on district-level progress, highlighting efforts to improve nutrition supplementation, immunisation linkage, and growth monitoring.

During the visit, the importance of regular health check-ups for Poshan beneficiaries was underlined, with emphasis on the early detection of malnutrition and anaemia. Hafeez observed growth charts, checked the availability of weighing machines, and reviewed the nutritional menu being served to children and women.

proper care and nutrition," Hafeez said while addressing the staff.

The Commissioner Secretary also stressed on reviving and strengthening the Early Childhood Care and Education (ECCE) component in all Anganwadi Centres. He reiterated that AWCs are not just nutrition hubs but also preparatory schools, playing a vital role in cognitive and social development before formal schooling begins.

Special instructions were issued to:

Ensure timely distribution of Take-Home Rations (THR) and

supplementary nutrition. Maintain complete and updated beneficiary records using the Poshan Tracker App for realtime monitoring.

Promote community engagement through Poshan Panchayats, Mother's Committees, and Village Health Sanitation & Nutrition Days (VHSNDs). Integrate services with Health

and Education Departments for a holistic approach to child and maternal care.

Beneficiaries at the AWCs expressed satisfaction over the improved facilities, citing better infrastructure, consistent ration supply, and regular awareness sessions on health, hygiene, and nutrition. Some mothers also shared personal success stories of how nutritional counselling had helped them improve their children's growth indicators.

Concluding his visit, Hafeez assured that the Social Welfare Department will continue to provide all necessary support for upgrading Anganwadi infrastructure, training frontline workers, and strengthening monitoring systems so that no eligible woman or child is left behind.

The garden will be open to the public for viewing from August 16 to September 14, offering visitors a unique blend of natural beauty, artistic landscaping and serene experiences.

This year a key highlight is the introduction of 'Babbling Brook', a naturalistic water feature that replaces the earlier musical fountain. Designed to enhance the sensory appeal of the gardens, this new addition includes meandering water streams with cascades, sculptural spouts, stepping stones and a raised reflecting pool.

Visitors can explore various landscape zones such as Banyan Grove, featuring reflexology paths, Panchatatva trails, and



forest-inspired soundscapes; Herbal and Plumeria Garden, with grass mounds and curated plantations for an immersive sensory experience.

The garden trail will also include Bal Vatika, Herbal Garden, Bonsai Garden, Central Lawn,

Long Garden and Circular Garden.

The Amrit Udyan will open from 10 AM to 6 PM (last entry at 5:15 PM) and will remain closed on all Mondays for maintenance. Special access will be granted to athletes and sports persons on August 29 (National Sports Day) and teachers on September 5 (Teachers' Day).

E3 nations threaten to resume sanctions on Iran

TEHRAN, AUG 13: France, Germany, and the UK, collectively known as the E3, have once again threatened Iran with the reimposition of the snapback UN sanctions, unless the country resumes negotiations, reports Iran International.

In a letter to UN Secretary-General António Guterres and the Security Council, the E3 foreign ministers reiterated their threats of reimposing international sanctions on Iran under the tenets of the 2015 Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action, unless Tehran resumes talks or asks for a deadline exten-

"We have made it clear that if Iran is not willing to reach a diplomatic solution before the end of August 2025, or does not seize the opportunity of an extension, E3 are prepared to trigger the snapback mechanism," the ministers wrote, according to Financial Times' report.

The letter bears the signatures of French Foreign Minister Jean-Noël Barrot, Germany's Johann Wadephul, and Britain's David Lammy, and comes two months post the ceasefire between Israel and Iran, following their 12-day war. The Iranian mission to the UN did not immediately respond to a request for comment.



Iranian Foreign Minister Abbass Araghchi had dismissed the threats, stating that the E3 nations lacked both the capability and the authority, to reimpose said sanctions.

Nonetheless, Iran's Ministry of Intelligence has warned ministries and businesses to be prepared for the looming snapback sanctions which seem more and more likely.

The leaked document by the Ministry cautioned that renewed sanctions would target arms sales, freeze overseas assets, and reimpose restrictions on industries such as oil, petrochemicals, banking, shipping, insurance and sensitive technologies.

As a countering move, a senior Iranian lawmaker warned on Wednesday that the parliament could move to withdraw Iran from the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT) if Western powers were to reimpose the UN sanctions.

"If the other side takes steps toward operationalizing the snapback mechanism and uses it, the Iranian parliament will definitely respond," Manouchehr Mottaki, a member of parliament's economic committee, was quoted as saying by

He said lawmakers were "ready to pull the trigger" on an NPT exit, adding that the West had no legal grounds to restore sanctions under the 2015 nuclear deal and was using the threat only as leverage.

"If they make their threat a reality, in line with the guidance of the Supreme Leader, we will also make our threat a reality," Mottaki said. UNI ANV

Hungarian PM declares Russia has won Ukraine war

BUDAPEST, AUG 13: Ahead of the Trump-Putin summit, Hungarian Prime Minister Viktor Orban has said that Russia has already won the war in Ukraine, and it is now up to the Western powers to acknowledge this truth, reports RT.

On Tuesday, the Hungarian premier had slammed EU over its statement on Ukraine, where the bloc pledged full support to Kyiv on all fronts, as well as told the US that President Volodymyr Zelensky's presence at the summit was a must. Orban refused to sign the EU statement and said that Europe was in no position to dictate terms to anyone,

especially as no European leader was invited to the Alaska summit.

Speaking to the 'Patriot' YouTube channel, the Hungarian leader said he partly opposed the statement as it only made the EU look "ridiculous and pathetic." "When two leaders sit down to negotiate with each other, the Americans and the Russians ... and you're not invited there, you don't rush for the phone, you don'trun around, you don't shout in from the outside," Orban stated. "If you are not at the negotiating table, you are on the menu." The Hungarian PM said that Moscow won the war long back, stating that Kyiv's backers simply refused to admit the hard truth despite knowing it.

"We are talking now as if this were an open-ended war situation, but it is not. The Ukrainians have lost the war. Russia has won this war," he stressed. "The only question is when and under what circumstances will the West, who are behind the Ukrainians, admit that this has happened, and what will result from all this." Hungary has been one of the few EU nations to have maintained friendly ties with Russia, and since Orban became PM, has consistently maintained a policy of neutrality, though it has been much more Moscow aligned, refusing the country's entry into the EU and slamming the bloc consistently over its attempts at militarisation. Typhoon Podul makes landfall in eastern **Taiwan**

TAIPEI, AUG 13: Typhoon Podul made landfall in eastern Taiwan's Taitung County at around 1:10 p.m. on Wednesday, bringing severe storms to Hualien and Taitung, according to the local meteorological

The agency continued to issue both sea and land warnings for Podul on Wednesday. At noon, its central pressure was 945 hectopascals, with maximum sustained winds reaching 43 meters per second near the center.

The land warning covers 13 counties and cities, including Hualien, Taitung and Miaoli, while the sea warning applies to the waters off eastern Taiwan, the Bashi Channel, the Taiwan Strait and waters near Dongsha Island.

Rainfall is currently heaviest in eastern Taiwan and mountainous areas, the agency said, noting that as the typhoon moves westward, the rain will also spread from east to west -- with the heaviest rainfall expected in the latter half of Wednesday.

Due to the typhoon, railway services and flights weredisrupted on the island, while many counties and cities suspended work and classes on Wednesday. UNI

SC cancels bail to wrestler Sushil Kumar in Sagar Dhankar murder case

NEW DELHI, AUG 13: The Supreme Court on Wednesday set aside the Delhi High Court's March 4 order granting bail to Olympic medallist wrestler Sushil Kumar, the prime accused in the 2021 murder of junior national champion Sagar Dhankar.

Abench comprising Justices Sanjay Karol and Prashant Kumar Mishra allowed the plea filed by the victim's father, Ashok Dhankad, challenging the High Court's decision, and directed Kumar to surrender within one week.

Senior advocate Siddharth Mridul appeared for the petitioner, while senior advocate Mahesh Jethmalani represented Kumar.

Kumar, along with several others, is accused of brutally assaulting Dhankar and his friends Sonu and Amit Kumar in the parking lot of Delhi's Chhatrasal Stadium on May 4, 2021, allegedly over a property dispute.



Dhankar, 23, died from cerebral injury caused by blunt force trauma, while the others sustained serious injuries. The incident led to a highprofile manhunt for Kumar, who evaded arrest for 18 days before being apprehended by Delhi Police in Mundka on May 23, 2021.

Following his arrest, Kumar was suspended from his Railways job and remained in judicial custody until the High Court granted him bail earlier this year. The Supreme Court, however, found merit in the victim's family's argument that the trial was ongoing

in a serious offence involving murder and set aside the bail.

The High Court had earlier noted that Kumar had spent over three and a half years in custody, granting bail on a bond of ₹50,000 with two sureties of the same amount. Advocates for Kumar had also pointed to the slow pace of the trial, with only 30 out of 186 witnesses examined over three years.

In July 2023, Kumar was granted a week-long interim bail on medical grounds for surgery on a torn ligament near his right knee. Earlier, in October 2022, the Rohini District Court framed charges against Kumar and 17 others under IPC Section 302 (murder) and related offences, including rioting, criminal conspiracy, and attempted murder, in connection with the killing and injuries caused during the Chhatrasal Stadium incident.

With Wednesday's order, Kumar will have to return to custody while the trial continues. UNI SNG PRS

BJP hits back at Cong for charges against EC, highlights its record of poll irregularities

NEW DELHI, AUG 13: The BJP today strongly rebutted allegations made by leader of Opposition in Lok Sabha Rahul Gandhi against the Election Commission (ECI) and its Special Intensive Revision (SIR) of the voter list in Bihar, calling it a frustrated attempt in the face of his party's consecutive electoral setbacks in

the recent years. Addressing a press conference, BJP MP Anurag Thakur accused Rahul Gandhi and the Congress of repeatedly undermining democratic institutions through baseless claims and said it was the Congress that has a history of electoral manipulations.

The BJP leader sought to cite

historical precedents, stating that "from Sardar Patel to Dr B.R. Ambedkar, history bears testimony to Congress' attempts at election manipulation for political gains dating back to India's first general election in 1952."

Thakur highlighted the defeat of Dr Ambedkar, the architect of the Constitution, in the 1952 elections as a telling example of Congress's electoral malpractices. "In that election, Congress, in alliance with the CPI, ensured that Dr Ambedkar lost by a narrow margin of just 14,561 votes, while over 74,000 votes were rejected. This laid the foundation for electoral corruption in the country," he remarked.

He further recalled instances where Congress indulged in booth



capturing in 1957 and rigging with the National Conference in 1987. "Indira Gandhi once disparaged voters as a "bunch of fools" after suffering electoral defeat, and Rajiv Gandhi famously blamed ballot papers. "Today,

Rahul Gandhi demands the return of those same ballot papers,"

Thakur added. Responding to Rahul Gandhi's recent accusations of 'vote theft' during the Maharashtra elections

and alleged irregularities during

the Bihar SIR process, Thakur dismissed the claims as "misleading and baseless." He emphasized that the Election Commission has conducted the revision process transparently and maintained public engagement throughout, with no credible complaints reported.

"The Congress has lost elections 90 times under Rahul Gandhi's leadership and has resorted to excuses each time. Now, fearing another defeat in Bihar, they are resorting to falsehoods to discredit the Election Commission," he asserted.

Thakur urged the Congress to respect the democratic process and the voters of India instead of spreading misinformation that threatens the credibility of key institutions. UNI AJ PRS

Harmanpreet, Mandhana Eye Maiden **World Cup Glory**

NEW DELHI: India's senior duo of Harmanpreet Kaur and Smriti Mandhana is banking on the team's recent form, collective confidence and their changed methods of preparation to "break the barrier" and lift India's maiden ODI Women's World Cup.

The 2025 tournament, which features eight teams, will kick off on September 30, with India taking on Sri Lanka in the opening game. India failed to make the semi-finals of the last ODI World Cup, in 2022. Their best result at an ODI World Cup so far has been the runnersup place - twice, in 2005 and 2017, both times under Mithali Raj. They will hope to go one step further with home advantage and recent form on their side.

"Playing in front of a home crowd, that is always special, and hopefully, this time we will give our 100% and try to break that barrier which all Indian fans and we are waiting for," Harmanpreet said at an ICC event in Mumbai to start the 50-day countdown for the World Cup.

India have had a good ODI year so far, having won nine of their 11 games. The results include a 3-0 whitewash of Ireland, a tri-series victory in Sri Lanka (also featuring South Africa), and most recently, a 2-1 series win in England, who are ranked second in

What are India's confidence levels like right now heading into the World Cup? "To be honest, very high - because

the amount of cricket we have played in the last couple of years, that has really given us a lot of confidence. And touchwood, the way we are playing [for] the last couple of years, we just want to continue with that. I think it is all about mindset and [the] fearless cricket we have been playing," Harmanpreet said.

The ODI series win against England also followed a 3-2 T20I series win -India's first such win on English soil.

"We were not surprised with the results [in England] because we knew the kind of preparation we have done," Harmanpreet said. "We knew that we can do this easily. I think we have been working very hard for it, but I think at the same time, we kept things very simple, and we knew that we can easily win any series or any tournament. We were only talking about how we can win, how we can improve ourselves. So, for us, it was not like we have done something great. [The result] was because of our routines and we want to keep doing the same things, again and again." Mandhana, the vice-captain in white-ball formats, said the recent team form was a result of their off-field preparations.

"The amount of training we are doing and the efforts we are putting in our training camps, that is finally giving us a result and hopefully this World Cup will be very special for us," she said. "In the last one-and-a-half month in UK, I just felt that a lot of things. Even off the field was very right about the

team, in terms of how everyone came together and we, as a team, are really big on it in terms [of how] we are working hard here each day, day in, day out.

"For all the youngsters to come in... and I remember Kranti [Goud] taking six wickets [in the third ODI], I mean to watch her go was just amazing. So sometimes, the environment kind of really helps all of them."

Mandhana has had a dream run since last year, with a tally of 747 in 2024 (average 57.46) and 628 (average 57.09) this year, with a higher strike rate of 107.53 in 2025 compared to 95.15 in 2024. She has struck 12 sixes this year, the most for her in a calendar year, and she is also the highest scorer in ODIs in 2025.

"I think more than my mindset, the work ethics have changed quite a lot in the last two or three years," Mandhana said. "And because of that, there is a lot of calmness around how I want to go about my cricket. So that's one thing which has changed massively. What happens in the field is a very secondary thing. Our primary job is to do the job. And not only for me-Ithink the whole team is heading into that direction, [where] we know where we actually have to work hard. So, we all are pretty clear with those sort of things.

And that creates a lot of calmness. "I would say that in the last oneand-a-half-odd years, that's been a massive change for me personally, and also, within the team.'
