

CHANDIGARH, SEP 26: As the MiG-21 fighter jet formally retired after nearly six decades of service on Friday, Defence Minister Rajnath Singh said the aircraft had provided critical strength to the Indian Air Force in conflicts ranging from the 1971 war to 'Operation Sindoor'.



Speaking at a decommissioning ceremony here, Singh, according to the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO) said the MiG-21 was not confined to a single battle or event but had shaped India's military operations across several decades. "For a long time, the MiG-21 has been a witness to numerous deeds. Its

Those named in the chargesheet include Vinod Sharma, his wife Mamta Sharma, Ghany Sham (then Naib Tehsildar, JDA, now retired and deceased), and Rishi Kumar (then Patwari, JDA, also retired and deceased).

## **Apple Growers Struggle Amid Cold** Storage Shortage, Low Demand, Mismanagement

PULWAMA, SEP 26: Kashmir's apple industry - often described as the backbone of the valley's economy-continues to reel under crisis this year. While highway blockades and low demand have already dented the season, the shortage of cold storage space has now left small and medium-scale growers in despair, forcing many to sell their produce at throwaway

Speaking with the news agency-Kashmir News Observer

(KNO), small growers from Shopian, Pulwama, and adjoining districts said that while the government often advises them to make use of cold storage facilities during market slowdowns, the ground reality is very different.

"Tell us, what is the benefit of cold storage units when we can't even store our produce in them?" asked Abdul Rashid, an orchardist from Pulwama. "We were waiting for better market rates by storing our apples, but when we approached the units, they said all slots were booked months ago.



This facility only secures the position of big traders, while small and middle-class growers like us are left helpless." Another grower, Ghulam Ahmad from Shopian, urged immediate government action. "In

every crisis, we are told to rely on cold storage. But capacity is far less than demand. Unless new units are established, this problem will haunt growers every year," he said.

Growers also complained about the skyrocketing freight charges and low demand.

Developed by BISAG-N, the portal is a support tool for the Kendra, designed to log each grievance, record action taken, and provide tracking access to both authorities and applicants. While the Kendra remains the institutional platform for soldier welfare facilitation, the portal ensures structured follow-up and transparent monitoring of every case.

Lieutenant Governor's Sainik Sahayta Kendra is a bridge between serving personnel and the civil administration, ensuring that matters submitted are taken up promptly, guided through the right channels, and resolved in a time-bound manner. By coordinating directly with government offices, arranging facilitation where required, and monitoring progress, the Kendra assures soldiers that their families' needs will be looked after while they focus fully on their duty to the nation.

With its offices now functional at the Civil Secretariats in Jammu and Srinagar, the Kendra will serve as a single-window facilitation centre to resolve civil issues of all serving personnel belonging to J&K, as well as those currently deployed in the Union Territory.

outreach, the Chief Secretary instructed the officers to launch a mass awareness campaign across every nook and corner of the UT, educating artisans and craftspeople about the full benefits of the scheme.

He said that Common Service Centres (CSCs) at the block level must be leveraged to organize orientation programmes for those who have received toolkits, ensuring that they are well-informed about the scheme's potential to help them become successful entrepreneurs.

The Chief Secretary underscored that mere distribution of toolkits and training was not enough, and stressed the need for continuous handholding and motivation of

He suggested showcasing local success stories to inspire artisans to establish viable business ventures and generate employment for others.

Presenting the progress under the scheme, Commissioner Secretary, I&C, Vikramjit Singh informed that J&K ranks 1st among Union Territories and 9th overall among all States/UTs, with 1,54,881 successful registrations. He further revealed that the UT secured the 8th rank nationally, with 1,42,175 toolkits selected and 64,936 delivered to beneficiaries, equipping artisans with modern tools to enhance their trades.

With respect to Skill Training the Secretary, L&E, Kumar Rajeev Ranjan divulged that the UT ranks 7th in the country with 1,32,571 completed skill trainings, reflecting a strong skill development ecosystem.

About the credit linkage, the meeting was apprised that J&K ranks 11th nationally in loan sanctions, with 13,787 cases sanctioned and 8,867 cases disbursed, injecting

more than Rs 83 Cr into artisan enterprises. The Chief Secretary lauded these achievements but reiterated the importance of further strengthening credit penetration and ensuring that artisans transition into self-sustaining entrepreneurs.

The PM Vishwakarma Yojana is a flagship Central Sector Scheme designed to provide end-to-end support to artisans and craftspeople working across 18 traditional trades. The scheme offers recognition through a PM Vishwakarma Certificate and ID Card, Skill Upgradation, a Toolkit Incentive of Rs 15,000, and collateral-free credit

support of up to Rs 3 lakh to facilitate enterprise establishment and growth.

stressed upon the need to make the Single Window Portal a completely faceless and seamless mechanism, ensuring that applicants can obtain all permissions and NoCs without physically visiting any government office. He directed the NIC to extend all necessary support to plug existing gaps and set October 31, 2025, as the deadline for achieving this goal. He also underlined that his office will independently verify the system's effectiveness on ground.

Commissioner Secretary, I&C, Vikramjit Singh, informed the meeting that 185 services from 21 departments have already been onboarded onto the portal. He further highlighted that the platform has been integrated with Digilocker, e-Abgari, Auto-Appeal, e-Unnat, and UMANG, NGDRS to enhance transparency, accountability, and user convenience.

Secretary IT, Dr. Piyush Singla, apprised the Chief Secretary that the portal has successfully migrated to the State Data Centre (SDC) and will be made fully functional and live shortly as the mandatory security audit has been completed. He also shared a roadmap for transitioning the portal into a total faceless system, including the development of revised workflows with departments to enable desk-wise monitoring of applica-

It was informed that these measures will significantly strengthen the ease of doing business framework in J&K by establishing an efficient, corruption-free, and technology-driven mechanism for service delivery across departments.

contribution has not been limited to a single war," he said.

He noted the aircraft's role in the 1971 conflict, recalling the strike on the Governor's House in Dhaka which, according to him, influenced the outcome of the war. He also referred to its use in the Kargil conflict, the Balakot airstrike, and in Operation Sindoor. "There has not been a moment when the MiG-21 did not provide strength to our armed forces," Singh said.

The Defence Minister described the farewell as marking not just the end of a fleet but also the closing of a chapter in India's military history. He said the aircraft had repeatedly enhanced the honour of the national flag during historic missions, and its record represented a story of courage, sacrifice and professionalism.

Tracing its history, Singh said the MiG-21 was inducted in 1962 and went on to become India's first supersonic fighter. For over sixty years, it shaped operational confidence and strategy, he said, and contributed to India's standing on the global stage. "For all of us, this is not just a fighter jet but something we have had a deep association with," Singh said.

Responding to criticism of its age, Singh said the aircraft flown in recent years were not from the 1960s but were at most four decades old. He said such a lifespan was common in fighter fleets around the world. "The MiG-21 aircraft that came in the 1960s and 1970s were retired long ago. The ones in use now were not older than 40 years," he said.

On its operational life, Singh said the aircraft had been modernised repeatedly, with radars and avionics upgraded to meet new requirements. He credited Hindustan Aeronautics Limited for carrying out these updates, noting that the MiG-21 had flown under names such as Trishul, Vikram, Badal and Bison during different phases of service.

The retirement formally closes the MiG-21's chapter in the Air Force. Known for its speed and agility, it served as the backbone of the fleet for decades. The IAF is now looking to replace it with modern indigenous aircraft, including the Light Combat Aircraft Tejas—(KNO)

## ACB chargesheets..... Plot No. 42 in Sector-1A of Trikuta

Nagar, Jammu. Investigators found that Mamta Sharma, wife of the then Vice Chairman, was also in illegal possession of an additional 4,300 square feet of adjoining land.

The probe revealed that the accused persons, in connivance with certain JDA officials, abused their official positions to facilitate the illegal allotment and encroachment. "Evidence collected during investigation established the role of the accused in criminal conspiracy and misuse of office," an ACB officer said.

The Court has taken cognizance of the chargesheet and fixed December 15, 2025, as the next date of hearing in the matter.

The ACB has reiterated its commitment to pursue corruption cases to their logical conclusion, ensuring accountability of public officials found misusing their positions.

and China that produce and manufacture homegrown telecom equip-

This is a new era for the telecom sector, Communications Minister Jyotiraditya Scindia announced on Friday. Scindia said that over 97,500 mobile 4G towers will be commissioned by the PM at Jharsuguda, Odisha, on Septem-

ber 27. Over 92,600 mobile sites installed by Bharat Sanchar Nigam Ltd (BSNL) are of indigenised 4G technology, which is 5G upgradable. This is a fullyindigenous '4G tech stack' featuring a Radio Access Network (RAN) developed by Tejas Network, a core network by C-DOT and integrated by Tata Consultancy Services.

Further, more than 4,700 mobile 4G towers have been installed by both Reliance Jio Infocomm and Bharti Airtel and 14,180 mobile 4G towers under the 'saturation project' have been funded by Digital Bharat Nidhi, according to a release.

These towers cover 26,700 unconnected villages in remote, border, and left-wing extremism-affected areas and will be a strategic enabler for digital India, serving over two million new subscribers and powering a range of egovernance services, digital payments, online education, telemedicine and citizen-centric applications.

The India-made network is cloudbased, future-ready and can upgrade seamlessly to 5G, Scindia said. The minister will be in Guwahati for the

"This is a new era for the telecom sector, an era where India has entered into the domain of top countries, which produce and manufacture telecom equipment, including Denmark, Sweden, South Korea, China...India is now the fifth country. This big change in attitude, change in goals was pushed, pioneered and catalysed by the PM," according to Scindia.

The Minister said, having perfected 4G, "we will be moving towards converting that to 5G as well".

"Our 4G towers and BTSs are already serving 22 million customers across the length and breadth of our country," he added.

The PM will also unveil India's 100 per cent 4G saturation network through digital Bharat Nidhi, where 29,000-30,000 villages have been connected in a mission-mode project.

"Today is an important day heralding, in 24 hours, the emergence of India on the global telecom footprint, not only as a service provider to 1.2 billion customers...with the cheapest call rates and the cheapest data rate at 11 cents/GB in the world, but also tomorrow will be the day when the world will awake to India having arrived not only as a service provider, but as a manufacturer and an equipment provider of full 4G stack," Scindia said. (Agencies)

### Apple Growers.....

Bashir Ahmad, a dealer at Jabli Pora Mandi, highlighted their dilemma: "Imagine the plight of a grower; he can neither send produce outside due to high freight costs and low demand nor store them in cold storage due to advance bookings. What option is left except to sell apples at a loss?"

"Without immediate intervention, lakhs of families dependent on the apple trade will continue to suffer," he said.

Adding to the discontent, former MLA Zainapora and current DDC member Aijaz Ahmad Mir accused certain cold storage units of mismanagement. "There are growing complaints regarding the functioning of units in Aglar Shopian and Lassipora. I urge the management to address these concerns with fairness. Do not exploit orchardists or cancel agreements that have already been finalised. Our farmers deserve dignity and justice for their toil," he said.

Mir further pointed to chaotic scenes outside units: "Long queues of Tata mobiles loaded with apples can be seen waiting at Lassipora. The mismanagement has created traffic jams and inconvenience for the public. To make matters worse, some units shut down for three days a week. This is unacceptable, and authorities must intervene immediately."

Meanwhile, cold storage owners said the existing infrastructure is far below the valley's actual requirement. "Kashmir produces 22-25 lakh metric tonnes of apples annually. But all 70 cold storage units in Shopian and Pulwama combined have a capacity of only 3 lakh tonnes. People expect us to accommodate everything, which is simply impossible," they said.

They added that an unusual rush this year has worsened the problem. "Normally, produce arrives gradually over two months, but this time bulk quantities came all at once due to highway closures and poor demand outside. Over 50% capacity was filled within just a few days. We are trying our best to accommodate more growers, but we too have limitations," a cold store manager said.

Owners said that while cold storage units are meant for 'A-grade' apples, many growers are now bringing 'B-grade' produce due to weak markets, further adding pressure. "We appeal to growers to cooperate. Every possible effort is being made to maximise capacity use, but unrealistic expectations will only deepen the crisis."

As Kashmir's apple season progresses, growers and traders remain caught between poor market demand, high freight costs, and insufficient storage facilities. Unless immediate measures are taken, experts warn, the valley's fruit economy could face long-term damage—(KNO)

Despite repeated complaints to the Public Health Engineering (PHE) Department and the concerned Water Works authorities, the regular water supply has not been restored for the last one month.

In the interim, residents of Buchwara, Near Masjid Sharief, adjacent to Goodwill Public High School, Dalgate, Srinagar are forced to rely on bore wells at local mosques and a temporary rubber pipeline from a tube well to meet their basic water needs. Community leaders warn that these temporary arrangements are unsafe and cannot continue indefinitely, particularly for children, the elderly, and patients with medical conditions.

This prolonged disruption has caused immense inconvenience, raising serious questions about the timely provision of essential services. Water is a basic necessity, and the delay in restoring supply has left the community frustrated and distressed.

The residents are now appealing directly to the Lieutenant Governor and Chief Minister of Jammu and Kashmir to intervene urgently, direct the concerned department to restore proper water supply on a warfooting basis, and provide a clear timeline for permanent resolution.

### Reopening of tourist places rekindles hopes for revival of tourism

In a significant development Lieutenant Governor Manoj Sinha on Friday announced the reopening of 12 tourist destinations across Jammu and Kashmir, which had been closed as a precautionary measure after the Baisaran-Pahalgam terror attack. The decision was taken after a detailed security review meeting chaired by the Lieutenant Governor. The people as a whole, especially those involved with the tourism trade have welcomed the move.

The reopening of the tourist spots will take effect from Monday, September 29. Among the locations in Kashmir Division set to reopen are Aru Valley, Rafting Point Yanner, Akkad Park, Padshahi Park, and Kaman Post. In the Jammu Division, tourist sites including Dagan Top, Ramban, Dhaggar in Kathua, Shiv Cave in Salal and Reasi will resume operations from the same date. It would be in place to mention here that around 50 tourist destinations across the union territory were closed following the Baisaran-Pahalgam terrorist attack.

While some were reopened some time back 12 more tourist destinations are going to reopen from coming Monday. The LG office has emphasized that the decision to reopen these sites is part of ongoing efforts to balance security considerations with the revival of tourism in the union territory. The authorities have urged the people intending to visit the tourist destinations to adhere to standard safety protocols during their visit. The move is expected to provide a boost to the local tourism sector, which has faced temporary disruptions due to security measures.

The tourist season was badly hit following the terror attack that took place on April 22 this year. The reopening of the tourist destinations is expected to give a fillip to the tourism sector and one can hope that tourists in good numbers would come and visit the tourist destinations that are open for the people now. As the autumn season is set to start in Kashmir one can hope and pray that the situation remains normal and there are no more setbacks for the tourism sector.

Once the arrival of tourists picks up in the autumn season it can be expected that the upcoming winter season would be a hit as far as the tourism sector is concerned. 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# The Wounds we don't see

In every home, children watch, listen, and absorb far more than we often realize. Their eyes follow the subtle tensions, their ears pick up the raised voices, and their hearts register the silence that follows. When parents fall into continuous conflict, the home – which should be a sanctuary – becomes a battlefield. The arguments, the blame, the long stretches of cold distance: all of these leave behind scars that are rarely visible but deeply felt. This is what psychologists today call generational trauma. But even without academic terms, every society knows this truth: when parents remain in conflict, it is the children who silently pay the price.

I have often met young people who carry these invisible burdens. They tell stories not of physical abuse or neglect, but of the atmosphere of unrest that shaped their childhoods. One young man once shared that he still feels anxious whenever he hears the sound of doors shutting hard, because it remindshim of nights when his parents' arguments ended in slammed doors. Another admitted she had trouble trusting relationships, because she had grown up seeing love turn into hostility inside her own home. Their words reflect what research has long confirmed — children raised in high-conflict families absorb stress as if it were their own, and carry it into adulthood.

Conflict between parents is not unusual. Disagreements are natural in any relationship, and children can even learn resilience when they see their parents disagree respectfully. The problem arises when conflict becomes chronic, unresolved, and hostile. A home filled with bitterness becomes a place of constant tension. For children, this tension seeps into their developing sense of self. They may grow anxious, constantly waiting for the "next fight." They may blame themselves, believing that somehow their existence is the reason their parents are unhappy. In extreme cases, they may even begin to replicate the same patterns later in their own adult lives — repeating the cycle of conflict that once wounded them.

The effects show up in different ways. Some children become quiet and withdrawn, living as shadows in their own homes. Others react with anger and rebellion, trying to push back against the chaos they cannot control. School teachers often notice such signs — a child who cannot focus, another who picks fights with classmates, another who is always restless and tired. These are not "bad children." They are children whose inner world has been disturbed by the instability of their environment.

It is easy to dismiss these experiences as "part of growing up," but research from around the world, as well as voices within our own society, remind us that the damage is profound. Continuous paren-

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tal conflict elevates stress hormones in children, weakens their emotional regulation, and increases the risk of anxiety, depression, and even physical health problems later in life. We are talking about wounds that last long beyond childhood — wounds that shape how a person loves, trusts, and relates to others in adulthood.

But beyond research, there is a moral and human responsibility. Parents may not always realize that their unresolved conflicts are silently scripting their children's future. A child who grows up in hostility often struggles to believe in peace. A child who sees love broken may struggle to build love themselves. This is how trauma passes from one generation to the next — not through blood, but through behavior, silence, and unresolved pain.

Does this mean parents must never argue? Certainly not. Conflict is part of human life. What matters is how parents argue, and more importantly, how they resolve. Children who witness disagreements handled with respect - where voices are calm, compromises are made, and apologies are offered — actually learn valuable lessons about relationships. The harm begins when argu-

ments become cruel, repetitive, and unresolved, creating a constant climate of fear.

I often think about how little we, as a society, talk about this. We speak at length about education, careers, and opportunities for youth, but we rarely pause to ask: what kind of homes are they growing up in? Are these homes nourishing their spirit, or quietly wounding it? Our silence on this matter allows the cycle to continue unchecked.

Breaking this cycle requires courage. It means parents must recognize that unresolved conflict is not a private matter; it spills over into the lives of their children. Seeking help — whether through counseling, spiritual guidance, or simply honest conversation — is not a weakness but a strength. It is a commitment to ending a legacy of pain. And for those who have already grown up in such environments, healing is possible. Awareness is the first step; seeking healthy relationships, therapy, and supportive communities can slowly untangle the knots left by childhood experiences.

Society too has a role to play. Schools can create safe spaces where children from difficult homes feel seen and supported. Communities can encourage open conversations about family well-being, breaking the stigma around counseling. Religious and cultural leaders, who hold deep influence in our society, can remind parents that nurturing peace at home is as important as any public duty.

At the heart of it all is a simple truth: children deserve safe and loving homes. They should not have to walk on eggshells, waiting for the next explosion of anger. They should not have to grow up faster than their years, playing the role of mediator or caretaker when their parents fail to resolve their issues. Childhood is meant to be a time of growth, learning, and security. When we deny that, we are not just harming individuals; we are weakening the very fabric of our society.

Generational trauma is not destiny. It is a cycle, yes, but cycles can be broken. The first step is awareness, the next is responsibility, and the final is action. Every parent has the power to choose: to pass down either the weight of unresolved conflict or the gift of peace and stability.

As I reflect on the stories I have heard, I am reminded of a line often shared in our culture: "Children are not only our future, they are also the mirrors of our present." What we give them today, they will carry into tomorrow. If we want a generation that is compassionate, resilient, and at peace, then we must first ensure that their earliest world the home — is a place of compassion, resilience,

The arguments between parents may fade from memory, but their echoes remain in the hearts of children for a lifetime. Let us not allow those echoes to become shackles. Let us instead teach our children, through our actions, that even in disagreement, love and respect can survive. Only then can we hope to raise a generation that heals rather than hurts, that builds rather than breaks.

## Mathematics Needs Patience of the Learner



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# White light weaving a shroud on the road

## The Untold Story of Road Accidents - The Truth About White Headlights

Bright white headlights at night dazzle not only the eyes but also life itself. Every year, thousands of people die in accidents due to this. Many developed countries around the world have already recognized this problem. Europe, Japan, the United States, and Australia have strict regulations on the brightness and color of headlights. Yellow headlights are preferred there. This is not only safer for the eyes, but also makes the road clearer in rain and fog. In India, regulations exist, but enforcement is lax. Vehicle manufacturers install bright headlights on vehicles, and the public is often unaware of this

The factors contributing to the problem in India are rampant after-market

fittings, meaning people blindly install LED headlights; lack of enforcement of laws and disregard for road safety; and lack of awareness, where most people are unaware that their white headlights can be a danger to others.

The solution to this problem is not difficult. The government, vehicle manufacturers, and the public need to work together. The government must set clear standards for headlight brightness and color temperature. White headlights with color temperatures higher than 4300K should be banned. The Road Transport Department must conduct regular inspections and take strict action. Vehicle manufacturers should install safe, yellow headlights by default, prioritizing safety over brightness.

Additionally, awareness campaigns are crucial. Campaigns like Janjan Gupta's should be expanded nationally. Messages like "Use Yellow Headlights - Save Lives" should be widely shared on TV,

radio, and social media. People should take the initiative, make their vehicle headlights safer, and raise awareness among their family and friends.


## Green Gold in Balanced Development is Bamboo

Bamboo cultivation is veryuseful. This does not only cause the treatment of waste water, but also the air is pure and soil erosion is also less. Bamboo is a fast growing plant. It helps in absorbing carbon die oxides from the atmosphere. It can be called higher yielding grass at low cost. It can be grown in dry areas along with forests. Its cultivation is proving effective in Maharashtra and Madhya Pradesh with the growing use of bamboo in making the same of other furnaces, including toys, agricultural implements and paper making. Country-Bamboo abroad is also started to be used to prepare organic fuels. Charcoal manufactured from bamboo is being used in water and air purification machines, medicines and cosmetics. Incentives are being given on behalf of the government to promote bamboo products under the National Bamboo Mission. The Maharashtra government has initiated a grant of up to seven lakh rupees per hectare to farmers to encourage bamboo cultivation under MGNREGA. Bamboo with a view to environmental protection with sustainable development can prove green gold for India

in the future. Right now, bamboo cultivation takes place at a large level in the areas of Maharashtra, Madhya Pradesh and South.

For the spread of its cultivation in the country, the central government in the year 2017 amended the Indian Forest Act 1927 and classified bamboo into the category of grass by removing it from the category of trees. There are about 136 species of bamboo that can grow even under odd conditions, but its commercial use is limited in India now due to its not being aware of its multi varieties. Despite growing on large land area, we are not getting the benefit of its export. While bamboo is such a plant, every single part of which can be used separately for different functions. In this regard with training it can play a palpable role in income growth of farmers from Jagru type. In comparison,

bamboo plant scientific research suggests that thirtythree percent of other plants absorb more carbon dioxide and provide thirty-five percent more oxygen. Year in China He gained momentum in the efforts of bamboo cultivation in the year 1980s and has been from it today. There are fifty lakh hectares of land taking the most economic advantage of bamboo cultivation on the Lagad hectare area, while the absence of awareness by taking its diversity and utility despite the cultivation of one crore bamboo in India and due to difficulties in marketing, we are not getting its reasonably economic advantage. It's a great pleasure to have you. While effective efforts have taken place in Maharashtra over bamboo yields since the government has notified bamboo as hay. This leads to a large number of farmers' trend towards bamboo cultivation. There have also been efforts towards beautification of hotel industry and other industries from bamboo. Similar efforts if there are in other states too, then in future its positive results can come out. Heat and humid climate are suitable for bamboo cultivation. The production of several varieties of bamboo under the National Bamboo Mission with incentives across the country if bamboo production training under the spread education of Indian Council of Agricultural Research and Agricultural Universities held at a macro level, bamboo can also contribute significantly to the economic empowerment of farmers. There has been a lot of work on planting bamboo on the pasture land and variety in bamboo production in Piplantri village in Rajsamand district of Rajasthan. This is a village in Rajasthan where many varieties of bamboo are grown together. There have also been innovative experiments in bamboo farming. Instead of plastic bamboo eco friendly products if it is promoted to grow on barren and pasture land, its very good results can be found in future. 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A common vitamin supplement could play an even bigger role in skin cancer prevention than we once thought.

A new study published on September 17 in JAMA DermatologyTrusted Source examined more than 33,000 U.S. veterans and found that people who took nicotinamide (a derivative of vitamin B3) had fewer cases of non-melanoma skin cancers than those who didn't.

The researchers reported a 14% overall reduction in future skin cancers, including basal cell carcinoma and squamous cell carcinoma. Meanwhile, the biggest benefit was seen in people who started taking nicotinamide after their first skin cancer diagnosis. Their risk of developing another dropped by more than half.

While the protective effect wasn't as strong in people who began taking nicotinamide after multiple cancers, the findings add weight to growing evidence that this low-cost and widely available supplement may be a helpful tool in skin cancer prevention.

A clinical studyTrusted Source published in 2015 with 386 participants showed that those who took the vitamin B3 derivative developed fewer new occurrences.

This larger study validates those earlier findings by examining real-world data from tens of thousands of patients, offer-

Hannah Kopelman, MD, dermatologist at Kopelman Aesthetic Surgery, told Healthline this research is "confirmatory evidence" that nicotinamide can reduce future keratinocyte skin cancers, especially squamous cell carcinoma, when started soon after a first cancer.

"This study builds on earlier randomized trials and makes me more comfortable recommending it to the right patients in my own practice," she said.

Kopelman explained why nicotinamide appears to have a protective mechanism

when it comes to skin cancer. "Nicotinamide replenishes energy stores in the skin cells so they can repair DNA damage from UV exposure more efficiently," she said.

"It also helps preserve local immune surveillance in the skin, which UV light can suppress," she added.

"Together, these effects mean fewer UV-damaged cells are able to survive, accumulate mutations, and progress into skin cancers."

Anna Andrienko, a dermatologist and aesthetic doctor at Dr. Ducu Clinics, said nicotinamide is a precursor to NAD+, a cellular cofactor that's involved in DNA

repair and cellular energy metabolism. "UV radiation causes DNA damage and depletes cellular NAD+ and ATP re-

ciency of DNA repair processes in UVdamaged skin cells," she explained.

It also has anti-inflammatory effects, which can reduce the pro-tumour environment created by chronic UV injury."

Together, Andrienko said these actions make nicotinamide "biologically plausible as a chemopreventive agent for UV-related skin cancers.'

While the new study's findings show promise for the protective effects of nicotinamide against certain types of skin cancer, there are a few important caveats. "This was a retrospective study, Kopelman noted. "This means there are confounding factors we can't completely control, like sun habits, adherence, and the intensity of dermatology follow-up."

The population was also older and mostly male, which limits how widely we can apply the findings. And in certain groups, like solid-organ transplant patients, the benefit was not as clear," she added.

Andrienko said the exposure measurement in this study relied on prescriptions and records rather than direct adherence monitoring, and the timing of when nicotinamide was started relative to UV exposure varies. "These limitations mean the results should be interpreted as strong, suggestive evidence rather than definitive proof," she explained.

adjunct, not a replacement, for sunscreen and sun-protective behavior, Andrienko said. "Sunscreen, protective clothing, and regular skin checks address the root exposure to UV and early detection, and they remain the cornerstone of prevention," she explained.

"Nicotinamide may add an internal layer of protection by improving DNA repair and reducing inflammation, which is valuable especially for people at higher risk or with prior skin cancers." Andrenko advised thinking of nicotinamide as a complementary tool to use alongside, not instead of, the established measures.

As for nicotinamide's effectiveness, Kopelman said it depends on the patient's individual risk factors and health status.

"In people who are immunocompetent and high risk, particularly those who have already had a skin cancer, I do think nicotinamide can make a real difference if taken consistently at the studied dose of 500 milligrams twice daily," she said.

"The key is that patients need to actually take it regularly and continue all the other preventive strategies.

"In immunosuppressed patients, like transplant recipients, the evidence is more mixed, and I'm more cautious in how I present its potential benefits," she added. sunscreen, protective clothing, and reg-

Nicotinamide is a promising adjunctive preventive option, but following

key. "My first-line recommendations are always daily broad-spectrum sunscreen, protective clothing like hats and UPFrated shirts, and avoiding peak sun hours," said Kopelman.

Andrienko agreed. "Use SPF 30 or higher daily, apply it generously, and reapply it every two hours when outdoors," she advised. "During peak hours, make sure you're wearing sun-protective clothing, like wide-brimmed hats and UVblocking sunglasses. You'll also want to avoid intentional tanning and limit your time in direct sunlight," she added.

Checking for signs of skin damage is one of the most proactive skin cancer prevention habits you can complete.

Andrienko recommends performing regular self-checks of your skin and seeing a dermatologist promptly if you notice any new, changing, or symptomatic spots. "Early detection matters," she said.

For those with a history of skin cancer, Andrienko recommended talking with your doctor to go over any current risks, medications, and individual factors. A healthcare professional can help determine whether 500 mg of nicotinamide twice daily is right for you.

While nicotinamide shows promise, ular skin checks remain the best strategies for preventing skin cancer.

KULGAM, SEP 26: In a major success in the fight against drug trafficking, Kulgam Police arrested a drug peddler and recovered a large quantity of contraband from his possession during a routine checkpoint operation. The arrest is part of the ongoing anti-drug drive launched by District Police Kulgam to curb the rising menace of narcotics in the region. According to police sources, a checkpoint (naka) was laid at New Bypass Furrah Crossing by a team led by In-Charge Police Post Mirbazar. During the operation, a suspicious vehicle — a Swift Dzire bearing registration number JK03D-9184 — was



intercepted. Upon thorough search, the police recovered 55.5 kilograms of poppy straw, concealed in four bags inside the vehicle. The driver, identified as Muzaffar Ahmad Bhat, son of Ghulam Nabi Bhat, resident of Doonipora Bijbehara, Sangam, Anantnag, was immediately arrested, and the vehicle used in the transportation of the contraband was seized. Subsequently, a case under FIR No. 191/2025 has been registered at Police Station Qazigund under Section 8/15 of the NDPS Act. An investigation is underway to trace the source and destination of the contraband, and to expose the broader network involved in the illegal trade.

Reaffirming its commitment to a zero-tolerance policy against drug trafficking, District Police Kulgam has urged the public to stay vigilant and report any suspicious activities to the nearest police station.

## ED arrests key agent in Multi-State AI forex trading scam

**NEW DELHI, SEP 26:** The Enforcement Directorate (ED), Chandigarh Zonal Office, today announced the arrest of Uttar Pradesh-based agent Navab Hassan for his pivotal role in misleading innocent people and mobilizing public deposits to launder proceeds of crime through the QFX/YFX/BotBro/BotAlpha/Crossalpha/Minecrypto scam.

He was produced before a Special PMLA Court, which remanded him to nine days of ED custody. The ED initiated its investigation based on multiple

FIRs registered across Himachal Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh, Haryana, Uttar Pradesh, and Assam under various sections of the IPC, 1860, indicating the widespread nature of this pyramid scheme.

The accused allegedly promised monthly returns of 5-6 percentthrough robot/AI-bot-based forex trading, using payment aggregators and virtual currencies like USDT to collect funds.

After investments were made, investor IDs were deleted, payouts were stopped after a few months, and the proceeds of crime were diverted to the UAE for property purchases in the names of close associates of the main accused and for luxury spending. The investigation revealed that Navab operated as a senior field leader with the rank of "Blue Diamond Executive" and had built a base of more than 10,000 investors.

He collected cash and funneled investments first through payment aggregators and later via USDT, while coordinating with Dubai-based masterminds Lavish Chaudhary (alias Nawab) and his associates.

Navab admitted that no real forex trading ever occurred on the platform, and investor dash-



boards displayed notional balances while new collections were used to service pending payouts.

He was a frequent traveler to the UAE to meet the absconding mastermind, Lavish Chaudhary,

and was planning another trip to Dubai. He also participated in Zoom calls with Chaudhary to instill confidence in new investors. A previous search at his residence in Shamli led to the recovery of Rs. 94.23 lakh in proceeds of crime generated by defrauding investors. The ED's action follows a series of crackdownsonoperatorsinvolved in the QFX scam.

Top agent Harinder Pal Singh, arrested on September 17, 2025, and currently in custody, identified Navab as a leading agent in western Uttar Pradesh. A provisional attachment order dated August 26, 2025, attached 45 immovable properties valued at Rs. 9.49 crore acquired by the accused, his family members, and associates. Searches conducted on February 11 and July 4, 2025, resulted in the seizure and freezing of 185 bank accounts holding Rs. 391 crore in proceeds of crime across various shell entities.

This arrest under Section 19(1) of the PMLA, 2002, strengthens the ongoing crackdown to trace the complete trail of the proceeds of crime, identify remaining beneficiaries and fronts operating domestically and from Dubai, prevent further layering, and secure the illicit funds. UNI

### EAM Jaishankar joins G4 counterparts to push for expansion of UNSC membership

UNITED NATIONS/NEW DELHI, SEP 26: The G4 countries of India, Japan, Germany and Brazil, underscored that the expansion of membership of the UN Security Council in both permanent and non-permanent categories is essential to the world body's reform, and that this position is supported by a majority of the UN Member States.

This was affirmed during the meeting of the Foreign Ministers of the G4 countries, External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar, Mauro Vieira, Foreign Minister of Brazil, Johann Wadephul, Foreign Minister of Germany, and Iwaya Takeshi, Foreign Minister of Japan, on the margins of the 80th Session of the United Nations (UN) General Assembly on

They met to discuss prospects for reform of the UN Security Council. The G4 Ministers emphasized that, amid increasing instability in the international order and with the UN-the center of multilateralism, increasingly incapable of fulfilling its role—it is crucial to reform the Security Council at the earliest to truly reflect the contemporary geopolitical realities, thereby enhancing its represen-



tativeness, legitimacy, effectiveness, and efficiency, a joint statement said.

Stressing on the need for expansion of the UN Security Council in both permanent and non-permanent membership, the G4 Ministers concurred on the need to enhance the role and participation of developing countries, and those significantly contributing to international peace and security, in the Security Council, in both membership categories.

They reiterated the importance of improving the representation of the underrepresented and unrepresented regions and groups, such as Africa, Asia-Pacific, and Latin America and the Caribbean, in both membership categories.

The G4 Ministers reaffirmed their strong support for the Common African Position (CAP) as enshrined in the Ezulwini Consensus and the Sirte Declaration. A comprehensive reform of the Security Council is in the best interest of all, they said and reiterated their mutual support for each other's candidacies as new permanent members of a reformed Security Council.

Reviewing the work of the 79th session of the UN General Assembly, the G4 Ministers reiterated their strong concern over the continued absence of concrete progress on UNSC reform in the Intergovernmental Negotiations (IGN) format.

Against the backdrop of the 80th anniversary of the foundation of the United Nations, the G4 Ministers expressed their intention to cooperate closely among themselves and in partnership with other groups, taking into account the urgent need for reform, with a view to developing a consolidated model, leading to text-based negotiations.

The G4 Ministers reiterated that discussions on Security Council reform need not be confined to the IGN and expressed their willingness to engage with the wider UN membership on this issue in other forums, including the UN General Assembly.

EAM Jaishankar said in a post on X: "Glad to join the #G4 Foreign Ministers Meeting along with colleagues Takeshi Iwaya, Johann Wadephul and Mauro Vieira in New York today.

"G4 reiterated its commitment to reforming the United Nations including the UN Security Council. It also assessed the current state of the Inter-Governmental Negotiation #IGN process." UNI

## AICTE had warned institute led by fugitive Swami against illegally using 'Indian' in its name

NEW DELHI, SEP 26: In the case involving Swami Chaitanyananda Saraswati, alias Parth Sarthi, it has now emerged that the All India Council for Technical Education (AICTE) had issued a warning letter to the Sri Sharada Institute of Indian Management Research over the alleged misuse of the words 'India', 'Indian', 'All India', and 'National'.

The trust was headed by Swami, who had allegedly sexually harassed more than two dozen female students.

The AICTE stated in its letter that it had found the Swami's institute was violating Rule No.

3 of the Emblems and Names (Prevention of Improper Use)

The letter issued by AICTE read, "The Applicants cannot use the name of the technical institution in such a way that the abbreviated form becomes the name of technical bodies. The applicant shall also not use the word(s) 'Government of India', 'Indian', 'National', 'All India', 'All India Council', 'Commission' in the name of the technical institution, giving the impression that it is a government institute while being a fully private institute, and other names as prohibited under the Emblems and Names (prevention of improper use) Act."



"Provided that the restrictions mentioned above shall not be applicable if the technical institution is established by the government of India or its name is had not changed the name of the

approved by the government of India."

The AICTE also noted that for more than four years, the Swami

institute or removed the word 'Indian' from its title.

The council further stated that while a number of other institutions had complied and changed their names after the warning, Swami had not heeded their directives despite repeated

"The prohibited word ('Indian') is still found to be used in the name of your institute even after specific directions from the Council. You have violated section 3 of the Act," AICTE had said in its letter.

Meanwhile, Swami is still on the run. Delhi's Patiala House court on Friday reserved its order on his bail plea. UNI

## **Good interest** in moving cargo via Northern Sea Route

MOSCOW, SEP 26: There is great interest in shipping international cargo using the Northern Sea Route (NSR) and containerised cargo shipments are happening now, said Vladimir Panov, Special Representative of Rosatom Arctic Development.

He was speaking at "The Northern Sea Route in 500 Years" session at the international forum "World Atomic Week" (WAW - 2025) dedicated to the 80th anniversary of the Russian nuclear industry.

"We are seeing enormous interest in international transit via the Northern Sea Route (NSR). They have started shipping containerised cargo along the route. During the summer-autumn navigation season (which is not yet over), 14 voyages have already been made through the NSR, transporting 276,000 tons," Panov said.

This is 56 percent more than all shipments last year – 176,000 tons. And now there are three more voyages in the NSR waters. We are open to contact and interaction. We believe that there is great potential in creating new international formats for equal and pragmatic dialogue with all interested states with the aim of developing the economic potential of the Arctic and the NSR, where no countries will be left behind, he said. Participants also said the NSR should be looked at through the prism of trade and commerce and not geopolitics. UNI

## Russia to launch world's first nuclear power system with closed fuel cycle

MOSCOW, SEP 26: Russian President Vladimir Putin today said the country will launch in the Tomsk Region, the world's first nuclearpowersystemwithaclosed fuel cycle wherein 95 percent of the spent fuel will be reused in the reactors more than once.

Speaking at the Global Atomic Forum here yesterday evening Putinsaid, "As per OECD estimates, all uranium resources under an optimistic scenario will be fully depleted by 2090, which is about eight million tons. In practice the depletion may even happen as early as the 2060s.

The forum is being held as part of World Atomic Week, which marks the 80th anniversary of Russia's nuclear industry and is themed "From a New Technological Paradigm to a New Worldview."

"Giventhat a quarter of uranium reserves are found in deposits where uranium is a by-product, by 2030 – here I come to what I believe

Russia can truly be proud of – we plan to launch in the Tomsk Region the world's first nuclear power system with a closed fuel cycle," Putin said. Terming it as a revolutionary development made possible by Russian scientists and engineers, Putin said by closing the nuclear fuel cycle, almost the entire volume, that is, 95 percent of spent fuel will be reused in reactors more than once.

"This mechanism will, in the long term, make it possible to virtually eliminate the problem of radioactive waste accumulation and, which is also extremely important, essentially remove the issue of uranium supply," Putin added.

According to him, the full range of advanced materials for the closed fuel cycle will be tested at the International Research Centre now being established in the Ulyanovsk Region. "We invite scientists from different countries to cooperate in developing technologies that, without exaggeration, open a new era in nuclear energy," Putin said.



On the funding of new nuclear power plants, he said, "There is a need to develop modern financing models and involve international financial institutions and development banks."

Putin said, "Earlier this year, the New Development Bank established by the BRICS countries confirmed its readiness to finance nuclear projects, while at the end of last year, on Russia's initiative, a BRICS coordination mechanism - the Nuclear Energy Platform -

was established."

He said Russia's principled approach ensures its leadership in

"First, we strictly honour our contractual obligations. I want to emphasise this. We fulfill all our obligations entirely regardless of political circumstances," he said.

"Second, we reject "technological colonialism" and do not make our partners dependent on Russian technical solutions. On the contrary, we help them establish

their own sovereign national nuclear industries, including personnel training and the creation of competence centres. We enlist local companies, assist in the operation of power units, and ensure the supply of nuclear fuel and waste management," Putin said.

Continuing further Putin said, Russia shares its experience and knowledge in building other advanced industries of the 21st century, such as nuclear medicine, digital systems, electric transport and innovative materials.

"As a result, we help our partners make a genuine development leap, bring their economies to a whole new level of efficiency, and ultimately improve quality of life," Putin said.

Russia views peaceful nuclear technologies as the foundation for extensive international cooperation and for fostering closer ties among nations. Russia is keen on establishing stable, long-term conditions for projects within the nuclear sphere, Putin said. UNI

## Padikkal, Jagadeesan In 15-Man Squad

**Jadeja Vice-Captain For West Indies Tests**

AHMEDABAD: Ravindra Jadeja has been named the vice-captain of the India Test squad for the two West Indies matches next month - it's his first time in the position, though he has been vicecaptain in ODIs and T20Is in the past.

Shubman Gill will lead in his second Test series after debuting in the position in England earlier this year, but the injured Rishabh Pant, who was the vicecaptain on the tour of England, hasn't recovered sufficiently to make the squad. Pant, who had fractured his foot while batting in the fourth Test in England, is currently recovering at the BCCI's Centre of Excellence (CoE) in Bengaluru. Dhruv Jurel and N Jagadeesan are the two specialist wicketkeepers in the squad, with Jurel expected to be the first choice to stand behind the stumps.

Jasprit Bumrah is also part of the squad, although there is only a day's gap between the Asia Cup final, on September 28 in Dubai, and the start of the first Test against West Indies from October 2 in Ahmedabad.

From the expanded squad that toured England, Abhimanyu Easwaran, Karun Nair, Akash Deep, Anshul Kamboj, Arshdeep Singh and Shardul Thakur have missed out, along with Pant. Abhimanyu, Akash Deep and Kamboj have been included in the Rest of India squad for the Irani Cup, which will be played against Vidarbha from October 1 in Nagpur. Of them, Akash Deep had reported to the CoE recently to recover from a niggle he had picked up in England, which kept him out of the Duleep Trophy and recent India A matches.

Coming in are Axar Patel, Devdutt Padikkal and Jagadeesan, who had been flown in for the final Test after Pant picked up his injury.

On the exclusion of Nair, who had scored 205 runs in eight innings in England with a best of 57, chairman of selec $tors\,Ajit\,Agarkar\,said\,at\,a\,press\,conference$ in Dubai while announcing the squad: "We expected more from Karun. Padikkal offers a little bit more at this point. Wish we could give everyone 15-20 Tests, unfortunately it doesn't work that way. Padikkal was in the Test squad in Australia, played against England in Dharamsala, got a fifty there. He's shown some decent form. Frankly, we expected a bit more from Karun."

Meanwhile, one of Nair's likely replacements, Sarfaraz Khan, is currently recovering from an injury.

The rest of the squad wears a familiar look, and with spin expected to play a bigger part at home than pace, India have named Jadeja, Washington Sundar and Axar as the three spin-bowling allrounders, as well as Kuldeep Yadav. Nitish Kumar Reddy is the fast-bowling all rounder, with Bumrah, Mohammed Siraj and Prasidh Krishnathe frontline quicks. On Bumrah's availability-it had been confirmed before the five-Test tour of England that he would play only three Tests to manage his workload - Agarkar said. "This team has been picked for both the Tests, so he's available for both Tests. We've had a fair break after England. He didn't play the fifth Test [at The Oval] either.

## **Ashwin Signs With Sydney Thunder In Major BBL Coup**

**SYDNEY:** R Ashwin has signed with Sydney Thunder for the upcoming BBL season in a landmark move that will make him the first capped India player to play in the competition. The WBBL has had a raft of India women take part, but BCCI rules have precluded India men from participating in global leagues. Former India Under-19 captain Unmukt Chand and former India domestic player Nikhil Chaudhary have both played in the BBL in recent years, but Chand is a USA national, while Chaudhary now qualifies as a local in Australia and made his List A debut for Tasmania this month. Ashwin's retirement from the IPL earlier this year has made it possible for him to play in overseas leagues. He has already signed up for next week's ILT20 auction as the player with the highest base price. His commitment to the ILT20, which will be played between December 2 and January 4, means he will be unavailable for the first three weeks of the BBL given the tournament starts on December 14. The home-and-away part of the season runs until January 18. The finals will be held between January 20 and 25.

But that did not deter the BBL and four of its clubs from talking to Ashwin about coming to Australia. He initially held talks with Cricket Australia CEO Todd Greenberg and then had discussions with League executives before Thunder, Hobart Hurricanes, Sydney Sixers and Adelaide Strikers all made pitches for him to join them. Ashwin eventually landed with Sydney Thunder, with former Australia Test bowler Trent Copeland overseeing the deal as Thunder's general manager. Thunder are coached by former England World Cup-winning coach Trevor Bayliss and are captained by David Warner, who led them to the final last year where they lost to Hurricanes. "Thunder were crystal clear about how they'd use me and brave enough to back it," Ashwin said. "My conversations with the leadership were excellent, and we're fully aligned on my role. I love how Dave Warner plays the game, and it's always better when your leader shares your mindset."

## **Grief and Hope** The Poetic Landscape of Saifi Sopori





#### The poet

Born as Peer Saifuddin Masoodi at Sopore (North Kashmir) in 1922, Saifi Sopori (he used 'Saifi' as a nom de plume) had an illustrious career as an educationist. He completed his Matriculation, B.A., and Honors in Persian from Punjab University, Lahore, before earning his B.Ed. from the University of Kashmir. He joined the Education Department as a teacher in 1944 and rose to the rank of Deputy Director, Non-Formal Education. He retired from service in 1977 and passed away in 2017. Saifi was equally proficient in Urdu, Arabic, Persian and English. Although he was actively engaged in writing and translating, most of his work remains unpublished to date. However, six years before his death, his Urdu poetic collection sahra sahra (Boundless Wilderness) saw the light of day in 2011.

My acquaintance with Saifi was coincidental. He would visit the Department of English and meet my senior colleagues who had known him for ages. I was introduced to him, and we started conversing in English. I was stunned to see his fluency in the language. We became very good friends and would meet whenever he visited Kashmir University. After his poetic collection was released the University held a 'Meet the Eminent' programme where Saifi was the guest, and I had the privilege to conduct the proceedings and ask Saifi about life and work. The recording of the programme must be with the University and his nephew. Mr Showkat Shafi, I found Saifi a treasure of knowledge, kind demeanour and humility. Although I was younger than him by many years, he would shower his blessings whenever we met.

sahra sahra (Boundless Wilderness) consists of one hundred and eighty-three poems-hymns, encomiums and ghazals. I have chosen two ghazals from this collection to talk about the poetic landscape of Saifi Sopori. Saifi seems to have been greatly influenced by Allama Iqbal, which is why one finds in his ghazal philosophical undertones akin to Iqbal's poetry. I would like to dedicate this essay to Saifi Sopori (May be find the best place in Paradise!). The two poems are originally in Urdu. I am repro-



ducing them in transliteration. Let's read and analyse the poems one by one so that we understand how vast and deep Saifi's poetic landscape was.

aaine ke parde mein agar hum nahin hote

#### Summary

The narrator tells the listener that if they hadn't been living under illusions, his/her days

wouldn't seem so happy. The listener, too, has walked the same path. Therefore, he/she can't blame the narrator alone. He draws his/her attention to the lake whose waters are clear, but it is inexplicable to someone who cannot even face his own reflection in it. He says that a sad heart must be as strong as steel because life's bridges are weak like ice and could break easily. The narrator remembers the beauty of Chinar trees as they turn fiery red in autumn. Grief also casts its everlasting shadows, but we need to be resilient like steel. The fire (of inspiration, emotions) neither rages wildly nor does it extinguish completely; it keeps glowing from within.

**Interpretation**Couplet 1: "[T]he mirror's veil" suggests appearance or illusions that create false joy. The narrator says that without these illusions, joy may not exist.

Couplet 2: Both the narrator and the listener have walked the same path or taken the journey together. So, the responsibility for sorrow or failure must be shared by both. The listener can't blame the other person alone. They are equally respon-

Couplet 3: The 'lake' is used here as a symbol for clarity or truth. Those who can't face their own reflection won't accept real-

Couplet 4: Here, the narrator has become didactic. He says that a weak heart must be strong like steel and realise that life's supports ("bridges") are fragile and could fall at any moment.

Couplet 5: The poet has used a vivid image of the chinar trees in Kashmir whose leaves turn red in autumn Like these trees memories are both beautiful and sorrowful.

Couplet 6: Some forms of grief never fade like shadows; they remain constant.

Couplet 7: The fire in the mind is eternal; it never dies out, but burns steadily, making it impossible to extinguish.

### **Critical Appreciation**

The ghazal is about self-introspection, a meditation on identity, memory, and the burden of inner conflict. Using rich metaphors-mirror, footprints, transparent lake, ice bridges, valleys, Chinar—the poet reflects on the fragility of human life, the persistence of grief, and the fortitude of one's consciousness. Saifi situates his personal suffering within a symbolic landscape that is both intimate and universal.

Let's read the second poem

#### Summary

The poem reflects on the fragility of existence, the unpredictability of life's journeys (seasons), and the inner strife of the human heart and mind. Broken mirrors, ice bridges, drowning caravans, deserts, whirlpools, and scars foreground the impermanence and fragility of life. However, despite this, the poet looks for meaning in the hidden treasures of the heart. There is hope amidst disillusionment (candles burning until dawn. treasures in the desert). There is a conflict between resilience and existential threat throughout the poem.

#### Interpretation

Couplet 1: This is a skeptical statement, an invitation to test the harshness of life's changing times. The non-discriminatory tempests of life ("blind wind") have shattered many self-images ("mirrors").

Couplet 2: Life is unstable and fragile ("the ice bridge). It appears solid but can collapse anytime under natural change (the sunshine). This shows the impermanence of human existence. Destiny (symbolised

country whose President, Prime Minister, and majority of the cabinet ministers are between the age bracket of 60 to 70 and 70 plus, the 58 to 62 years allotted for retirement of govt semi-govt officials is unjustified, if only age has been taken into consideration for that policy. When Heads of countries and people at the helm of affairs can be achievers and successfully sail through at the so - called Vanprasth age why cannot the others? The 45th and now the 47th, 79year old U.S President is the oldest person in American history to be elected as President for a second time. Even his predecessors were dynamic septuagenarian! But ofcourse their country has not determined any fixed retirement age for the general masses who like their State heads can continue to work as long as they wish to and till health permits them. The sexagenarians and septuagenarians in general are at their active best as they are by then relieved of their parental responsibilities and familial duties .That is the time when they can focus most on their profession and careers. With their maturity, experience and expertise they can prove to be assets in their workplace and for their employers .Personally for them too this is the time when they start loving and enjoying their work afresh for their creativity and avidity are at the highest level. At a time when they are most enthused and energetic and when their potential can be tapped as they are at their flowering best, their dynamism comes to an abrupt halt. It is true that in an over populated and still developing nation like ours the elders after that age need to step down gracefully and make place for the younger generation.



After all our employment crisis does justify the retirement age! Retirement for some brings immediate relief as after a tenure of 30 to 40 years of active service, the break comes as a welcome change .It also provides them the free time to pursue their passions and interests. The spirited and enthusiastic are able to fructify such aspirations that paucity of time did not allow them to till they were employed. For many who have nothing much to look forward to, the post retirement period is just a countdown to the inevitable end . However, for most , the cessation of a steady monthly income is a cause of concern and anxiety .Not all are fortunate to have got over their family commitments and are the sole earning members thereby being in dire need of their jobs. Some schemes should be implemented that can provide employment to those retired per-

sonnel who are eager and willing to work thereby their services can be utilised. The pension scheme, no doubt affords a lifetime of financial security but since it is taxable, the relief is not very heartening. Pensioners are not entitled to any allowances, even the routine hike of dearness allowance is termed as dearness relief for them . But this word relief is misleading as the taxes imposed on pensioners hardly make it a proposition of relief. It is ironical that people who are being given 'relief are being levied with taxes of the same slab as the salaried are !! Where is the RELIEF then? Considering the longevity of lives the extended life spans due to advanced medical aid and general wellbeing, retirement should be extended till the time an individual can work or till one wishes to and till one's health permits .That will be in the national and personal interest! The recent declaration coming from the PM 's office regarding the extension of retirement age is a positive, pragmatic and productive initiative, provided it is enforced and does not remain

one of the many tall claims!

However, there is a heartening side to this saga now. There are portals that do provide and rather welcome retired seniors . One such portal The Wisdom Circle in a survey found that 70% adults between the age group of 50 to 75 plus are either working or exploring opportunities and new job prospects for themselves. Such groups comprise of 15% retired / seniors who are working , 17% are on part-time basis and 36% are looking for and exploring job possibilities. Ageing is now being considered as an opportunity rather than a time to just sit back and decline mentally and physically .

What is indeed a positive change is that considering the experience, expertise and enthusiasm of these ready post retired workers, employers are finding them more constructive and sincere in their jobs. Belonging to the yester years when AI was in it's nascent stage these seniors do not depend on ChatGpt or even calculators as they are habituated to work independently using their own mental abilities. through "the river") has swallowed many human caravans and continues to render the journeys futile.

Couplet 3: Here, the poet is in a reflective mood, urging the inner vision to peep into its own self rather than outward appearances. One could find wisdom or value even in barren places (deserts of suffering or thought). It is a paradox of richness in emptiness.

Couplet 4: The thought process could be quite frustrating and destabilizing. Even a single idea ("Every drop") can disorient you ("whirlpool"). There are many outdated methods ("old sails") for us to navigate the uncertain waters of life ("sailing ship").

Couplet 5: The poet wishes for freedom from endless intellectual journeys and a barren mental landscape. The heart continues to find "many excuses" for its being weak and distracted.

Couplet 6: Here, the poet manifests optimism. The image of the candle denotes resilience in facing suffering. It is waiting for renewal or enlightenment "until dawn". The poet has to show many emotional wounds, which is possible only when he keeps his hope alive.

### Critical Appreciation

The poem shows a beautiful interplay of natural imag-

ery (seasons, wind, sun, ice, river, deserts, whirlpools) and the psychological state of the poet's mind (thought, heart, memory, scars). He is at once sceptical and hopeful. What appears as solid is threatened by natural forces, as, for instance, the ice bridge would collapse once the sun appears, or many caravans would continue to be consumed by the river. Humans are vulnerable and live in self-delusion. The broken mirrors and ice bridges suggest how deceptive hearts could fail on confronting the reality of existence. However, there is hope that would sustain the poet, despite past scars that are yet to be shown. The image of the candle burning until dawn suggests resilience and perseverance that the poet is holding tight onto himself so that he comes out of the morass of scepticism.

#### Conclusion

Saifi was a great thinker and poet of eminence who has left an indelible mark on the literary world. Unfortunately, such a great writer was unable to publish his work during his lifetime. I don't know the reasons behind this, but had he brought out his translations and works in Persian and Arabic to light, they would have added to the treasure of literary legacy. One of the greatest Urdu writers of the 20th century, Shamsur Rehman Farooqui,

who Saifi had sent some of his poems for review, was stunned to see such poetry from a nonagenarian poet. In his letter to Saifi, Farooqui remarked: "Jinab Saifi Sopori ki ghazlein dekhkar fauri asar ho qayim huwa hai ki yeh kisi pukhtakar, sanjeedah, lekin jawan-al-umr shayir ka kalam hai. Jab yeh maaloom huwa ki in ka khaliq umr ki naw dahayain puri krny wala hai to hairat hoti hai ki jab takhliqi wafuri ka as waqt yeh aalam hai to khuda jane ayame jawani main kya rang raha hoga" (The immediate impression that emerges from reading the ghazals of Mr. Saifi Sopuri is that they are the words of a mature, serious, yet young poet. When it is known that their creator is about to complete ninety years of age, one wonders how colourful he must have been in his youth when he is now so full of imagination.) Farooqui finds that Saifi was influenced by Iqbal, which is evident from his ghazals. Saifi will be remembered as a saintly person, despite living a simple life, has left a rich literary legacy behind. About himself, Saifi has said:

dhoondta hoon jis ko saifi hai woh pehlu ka chiraagh, raat hai aur jaa rahoon dil ke sehra ki taraf The one I seek, O Saifi, is the lamp by my side. It is night, and I set out toward the desert of my heart.



Wishing you good health. Always indebted to you and your teachings." Basically, the said colleague, Ejaz Ayoub, is more than a colleague to me. In fact, he is a dear friend. He has been working in the BFSI industry in the field of Financial Risk Management, Strategy and Foreign Exchange.

Today, he wittingly timed his message on Teachers Day (September 5). Even as we exchange our thoughts through available social media platforms, the context of today's message was a bit surprising. However, it reflected the magnanimity of the person by remembering my small tips which I used to give him in the beginning of his professional life. He was alway responsive to my suggestions. Over a period of time, this man has established himself as a trustworthy expert in the field of his expertise.

In fact, today Ejaz's lines gave me a perfect start to this 'Straight Talk' column, which is appreciated for reminding that teachers exist outside classrooms also.

Even as World Teachers Day is celebrated on October 5, India observes its own Teachers Day every year on September 5. As all of us know this national Teachers Day marks the birthday of the former President, Dr S. Radhakrishnan, who was born on this day in 1888.

Meanwhile, on this day, innumerable posts in honour of the teachers' community flooded the social media platforms and many first-person stories hit newspaper columns where authors shared their tales of student-teacher rela-



tionship. Most of the anecdotes described classroom business and were, of course, a delight to read. In fact, reproducing a small incident in the classroom during your school or college days that happened some three decades back is always nostalgic and at the same time delights a reader.

In all circumstances, teachers are to be respected for the kind of services they are rendering to society for a better and prosperous tomorrow. However, teachers don't exist in classrooms only. In fact, there may also be someone outside the classroom who may be imparting you important lessons of living a good life for the overall benefit of humanity.

Let me share an extraordinary lesson imparted to me by a great teacher during a brief conversation with him outside the four walls of the classroom. In fact, Teacher's Day always reminds me of my brief half-an-hour meeting with this great teacher, which happened in 1988. That was my first and the last meeting with this

personality – Prof Mushir-ul-Haq, the then vice chancellor of the University of Kashmir. I received a telegram from the University of Kashmir inviting me over a cup of tea with Prof. Mushir-ul-Haq on a particular day. It was the time when Greater Kashmir was a few months old newspaper with weekly periodicity. The reason for inviting me was a report in which I had highlighted the weaknesses and strengths of the Kashmir University.

While discussing the report, Prof. Mushir-ul-Haq didn't contest the facts mentioned in the content of the report. But he told me something exceptional which has a great human value. He didn't deny my report, but said, "Look, this institution (Kashmir University) is like your mother, it has nourished and made you capable of joining a noble profession of journalism. Allah has given us eyelids. One of the justified uses of these eyelids is to shut them when you see something is going wrong on part of the mother. If you highlight the wrongs in public, it will bring disrepute to the honour of the mother. Things should be set right within the four walls of the house and not by highlighting the wrongs in public."

This was a huge message which he conveyed in his own way of unmatched humble nature despite being a towering personality of his time. His message is relevant for all of us and is valid for all times to come.

The point of mentioning the incident is to understand that teachers in one's life are not confined to classrooms only. There are teachers who are coaching us in our day to day life to live a better tomorrow with peace and prosperity.

Meanwhile, let's have a look at the teaching scenario in our education system. Competition is of course a buzzword today. Be it an unemployed or employed youth, a student or an entrepreneur, a working lady or a housewife, everybody is engaged in competition. In this competitive environment we see a lot of people taking unnecessary risks and get themselves woven in a do or die situation. Among the breed, the fiercest competition has been triggered in the school going children.

We have a unique modernised education system, which breeds stress and frustration more than infusing physical, mental and spiritual confidence among our toddlers. The drivers of this system are parents whose pressure or what we call expectations and academic performance are the major factors contributing to the high level of stress that is plaguing the minds of our young students. They want their wards to be more or less as plaques through academic and extracurricular achievements. causing huge stress in children. Toddlers as young as 6 years of age are put into a variety of competitions where failure isn't an option.

Let me have a take on our examination system. It breeds fear among students. We have a teaching community instilling the fear of examination even from primary grades. They have evolved a culture of continuous testing which engulfs the primary school curriculum. The whole chain of private schools operating in our state use the stick of punitive measures to ensure that teachers concentrate on pushing students to improve their scores. Does it induce competitiveness? Of course it does, but at a massive cost of burning out the natural desire to learn in children. Precisely we can say that the present state of affairs in our education sector has made even some of our best teachers to act like coaches and drill masters.

Here in our system, the message is clear: "Focus on the examinations." This attitude has led the children to believe that marks, and marks alone, matter. Even our colleges and universities do not

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## Degrees Without Skills: Why India's Youth Stay Unemployed



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India is a young country. Everywhere you look, you see students in schools, young graduates in colleges, and coaching centres packed with aspirants. More than half of our population is under 35, which should normally be a huge advantage. But the irony is hard to ignore: instead of becoming a strength, our youth are increasingly stuck in unemployment. Each year lakhs of students graduate, but only a few manage to find decent work.

This makes us ask a tough question why are so many young Indians educated on paper but unemployable in reality?

One of the biggest reasons lies in how we understand education. For most parents, teachers, and society in general, "education" has become equal to degrees and certificates. Marks, grades, ranks these are celebrated as if they automatically guarantee a good career. But in truth, a degree is only a piece of paper if it doesn't come with skills. Sadly, our schools and colleges rarely equip students with what the real world actually demands.

#### The Indian Degree Obsession

Almost every Indian family has the same story: "Beta, study hard, get good marks, then get a stable job." A job usually means either a government post or something in engineering, medicine, or law. Parents proudly frame report cards and degree certificates, but very few stop to ask: What can my child actually do? What

skills does he or she have?

Because of this obsession, countless young people spend 15–20 years in classrooms chasing marks. Many of them may actually be gifted artists, athletes, entrepreneurs, or even brilliant problem-solvers, but their talents go unnoticed. By the time they realise their true calling, they have lost years trying to fit into society's rigid idea of "success." That's why we see engineers who cannot code, MBAs who cannot communicate properly, and graduates who cannot solve basic real-world problems.

#### Parents and Teachers: Where We Go Wrong

It's not just the students' fault. Parents and teachers both share responsibility. Parents, often out of love, push children into careers they consider "secure," but this pressure kills individuality. Teachers, instead of being mentors, often limit themselves to textbooks and exams. A student

is judged only by marks, not by creativity or problem-solving. As a result, we end up with graduates who can memorise, but cannot innovate.

#### **How Other Countries Do It**

If you look at countries like Germany or Japan, the difference is striking. Germany has a strong vocational training system where students can learn skills through apprenticeships. Japan focuses not only on academics but also on teamwork, discipline, and life skills. Even China, which is often compared to us, identifies children's strengths early and invests heavily in skill development.

In contrast, India keeps most of its youth trapped in traditional schooling and college, with little exposure to practical work. We talk about innovation, but our education system still produces job seekers, not job creators.

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## The Brazen Sky

(A Migrant's Tale)

he sky over Rajarhat was a brazen sheet of copper on Mahalaya morning, glowing with the promise of divine descent. But for Mahima, the old widow sitting on her broken verandah, it was a sky of silence. Her son Vikram had not called in over a month. No message. No letter. No trace. The wind carried the scent of incense and distant conch shells, but none of it reached her heart. She had waited for this day. Vikram had promised to return from Haryana before Durga Puja. He had spoken of gifts, of Hilsa fish from Bangladesh, of new clothes for her. His voice had been full of hope, like a boy dreaming of a better world. But now, seven days before the festival, Mahima sat alone, clutching the edge of her faded sari, her eyes scanning the road that led nowhere. Her neighbor's son, Raju, had returned from the same construction site in Haryana. He brought news that shattered her last hope. Vikram, he said, might be in a detention camp. The police had suspected him of being Bangladeshi. He had no Aadhar card. The voter ID he carried was fake bought with borrowed money from a local tout who vanished the day after the deal. Mahima's heart clenched. She had seen the news on television—men behind fences, their eyes hollow, their voices unheard. She imagined Vikram among them, his hands calloused from labor, now gripping rusted bars. But what of his wife, Rina, and their son, little Babu? Were they detained too? Or worse, deported? She had no answers. Only questions that echoed in the silence of her home. Mahima's life had always been a quiet struggle. Her husband, Chironjit, had died in the brick kilns of Murshidabad, coughing blood and dreams. Vikram had inherited his father's strength and his fate. In West Bengal, the daily wage was a pit-





tance. 250 for a day's labor, if lucky. Haryana offered 1000. Vikram had left with hope in his pocket and sweat on his brow. Rina had joined him as a co-laborer. Together, they built homes for strangers, dreaming of a future for their own. Mahima had felt proud. Her son was building a life. This Puja, he had said, would be different. She would wear a new sari. They would eat Hilsa fish. Babu would get a school bag. But dreams, Mahima knew, were fragile things. The nights grew longer. Mahima lay on her cot, staring at the ceiling, whispering Chironjit'sname like a prayer. She remembered the days when he would return from work, his shirt soaked in sweat, his eyes tired but kind. He had once told her, "We are like the bricks I shape—burnt, broken, but still holding up someone else's house."She had not understood then. Now she did. She lit a diya at the foot of her tulsi plant. The flame flickered against the wind, a fragile

rebellion against despair. She whispered to the goddess, not for clothes or fish, but for her son's safety. In the local tea shop, men spoke of politics. Of new laws. Of promises. Some leaders had come to their locality, speaking of citizenship cards for those who had come from Bangladesh. A new law had been passed, they said, to protect minorities. Mahima clung to that hope like a drowning woman to driftwood. If Vikram comes back, she told herself, we will apply. We will belong. But the sky remained brazen—defiant, unyielding. One evening, Mahima walked to the local police station. Her feet ached. Her sari clung to her like a second skin. She asked the officer about her son. He looked at her with tired eyes. "No record," he said. "Try the camp in Murshidabad." She had no money for the journey. No strength. No companion. She returned home, her heart heavier than her steps. In her dreams, Vikram stood at

the door, holding Babu in his arms, Rina beside him. They smiled. They spoke of wages, of food, of laughter. Mahima woke with tears on her cheeks. She wrote a letter to a local NGO. She did not know if they would read it. She wrote of her son, of his work, of his arrest. She wrote of her poverty, her fear, her hope. She ended with a line her husband once said: "We are like bricks-burnt, broken, but still holding up someone else's house."Days passed. Puja approached. The locality buzzed with preparations. Children rehearsed dances. Women stitched new clothes. Mahima sat alone, watching the world move without her. She remembered Vikram's childhood. His laughter. His stubbornness. His love. He had once stolen a mango for her from the neighbor's tree. He had once fought a boy who called her a beggar. He had once promised never to leave her.She did not blame him. She blamed the sky. On the morning of Saptami, a man arrived at her door. He wore a white kurta and carried a file. He was from the NGO. He had read her letter. "We are trying to locate Vikram," he said. "There are many like him. Detained. Forgotten. "Mahima's eyes welled up. She touched his feet. "Just find him," she said. "I don't need clothes. I don't need fish. I just need my son."The man returned two days later. He had news. "Vikram is in the Murshidabad camp," he said. "He is safe. His wife and son are with him." Mahima collapsed to the ground, sobbing. The sky above her turned soft, as if listening."They will be released soon," the man said. "We are working on it." On Dashami, as the goddess was immersed in the river, Mahima stood by the bank, her hands folded. She did not cry. She did not pray. She simply watched. The sky was no longer brazen. It was a canvas of hope. She whispered to the wind, "Come back, my son. Come back."Two weeks later, Vikram returned. Thin. Tired. But alive. Rina held Babu in her arms. Mahima embraced them all, her tears washing away months of pain. They ate rice and lentils. No Hilsa. No gifts. But they laughed. Vikram held his mother's hand and said, "I will never leave again." Mahima smiled. The sky above them was blue.And for the first time in months, it felt like home

consider it necessary to apply their mind to assess the student's potential. They go by the student's marks scored in previous examinations. Parents push children to work for the highest possible aggregate, rather than to pursue individual interest. This kind of push destroys the student's confidence. Our system undermines the student's ability and potential if he/she has not scored well in the examinations.

Over the years, the demand for children's education has witnessed tremendous growth. Everybody from the poorest of the poor to the well off acknowledges the value of education in the overall development of children. The importance of learning is to

enable the individual to put his potential to optimal use. With rights to education, our student should find himself in a situation with all its windows open to the outside world.

This attitude and mindset has killed the basic concept of education as teaching towards clearing examinations has become the only norm.

What should be done to bail out students from the clutches of stress and frustration? I think we need a change in attitude. We need a change in attitude of parents, teachers and our educationists. This cannot be achieved by the mere imparting of factual information and practical skills. It is the cul-

tivation of the ability to analyse, the desire to question and the courage to challenge convention. Development of a good student to a great extent rests on the schools and the type of education and opportunities given to the students. The parents also should come out of the narrow expectations of making their children an engineer or a doctor but allow them to develop their innate skills. They should cooperate with the schools to implement the reforms initiated for the betterment of the children.

Even as we produce brilliant and intelligent students, they are not an outcome of the current educational system. They are what they are despite the system. The focus

of any system, especially at the primary education stage, should be to benefit all and not merely some. One more obsession that the current educational system faces is the burden of information in the curriculum. If emphasis is given on understanding and creativity rather than memorizing information, much of the bloat from the curriculum can be simply removed.

### Rediscovering Kashmir's Anti-Inflammatory Diet

In Kashmir, the kitchen has always been more than a place to cook. It is where warmth fills the home, where firewood crackles and pots simmer with fragrant meals, and where knowledge quietly passes from one generation to the next. Food here has never been just about filling the stomach; it is care, memory, and a gentle form of healing.

Over the years, however, this close relationship with food has begun to fade. Packaged biscuits have replaced walnuts, and white bread and maida-based parathas have taken the place of grains once ground with patience and care. The effects are evident: tired bodies, aching joints, restless nights. When the kitchen loses its wisdom, the body feels it.

But the answers are not far away, they lie in the valley itself. The anti-inflammatory diet celebrated by modern nutritionists has always existed in Kashmiri homes, tucked into spice jars, baskets of seasonal produce, and every carefully prepared meal.

Every Kashmiri dish carries a whisper of spice. Turmeric, golden and grounding, has been a natural healer for generations. A pinch of cumin in hot oil, a bit of ginger, or a sprinkle of black pepper: once considered ordinary seasonings; are now known to fight inflam-



mation. Our grandmothers added them not only for taste but also, unknowingly, for health.

The walnut tree, gnarled and generous, has long stood in Kashmiri courtyards, offering its heart-soothing nuts. Almonds and flax-seeds can also be easily added to daily meals. Choosing brown rice or local millets like ragi instead of polished white rice helps restore the energy and strength that refined grains often take away. These foods are not just nourishment; they are a living memory of health.

The simplest foods are often the most healing. Dals, beans, and

pulses—staples of every Kashmiri household are rich in fibre and protein, grounding the body with every meal. Cooked in mustard oil, sharp and fragrant, they remain true to traditional flavours while quietly supporting better health than refined oils.

Eating this way is also about gentle choices. It does not require giving up everything we love but encourages mindfulness. One more walnut, one fewer packaged biscuit. A glass of turmeric milk at night instead of a heavy dessert. These small choices are not sacrifices; they are acts of remembrance and care

The anti-inflammatory diet of Kashmir is not a new discovery. It is a return, a revival of what was quietly set aside when convenience replaced care. The jars of spices, bottles of mustard oil, handfuls of fresh greens—all have always been there, waiting to be remembered.

Kashmir has always understood that food and healing are inseparable. In every bowl of rice and greens, in every sip of turmeric milk, lies nourishment and comfort. To eat wisely is to care for the body, honour the rhythm of the land, and let the whispers of the kitchen become medicine for everyday life.

### The Skill Gap in Numbers

Reports often show that nearly 80% of Indian engineering graduates are not employable in their own fields. Similar issues exist across other streams too. Communication skills, digital literacy, critical thinking these are missing in a majority of graduates. The government has recognised the problem through the New Education Policy (NEP 2020), which talks about skill-based learning. But real change is slow, and society's mindset about degrees hasn't shifted yet.

#### **Ground Realities: A Look at Kashmir**

The problem is visible in Kashmir as well. In places like Kupwara, some youth realised early that waiting for government jobs was pointless, so they started poultry

and dairy farming units together. They created employment for themselves and others. In Baramulla, many youngsters are reviving traditional handicrafts like wood carving and paper mâché, and selling their work globally using social media. And in Sopore, self-taught coders are now freelancing online for international clients. These examples show that once skills are given importance, degrees stop being the only ticket to success.

### What Happens If We Ignore Skills?

The consequences are serious. Unemployment rises, frustration grows, and mental health issues like stress and depression become common. Talented young people often leave India for better opportunities abroad, leading to brain drain. And worst of

all, we waste the potential of millions of students who could have contributed in unique ways if only their skills were nurtured.

#### The Way Forward

So, what's the solution? First, parents need to realise that success is not just about government jobs or engineering degrees. They should give their children the freedom to follow careers that match their interests. Teachers need better training so they can identify each child's strengths instead of only focusing on exams. Schools and colleges must include internships, vocational courses, and real-life problem-solving in their curriculum. And society needs to change its habit of respecting only doctors, engineers, or civil servants because a skilled entrepreneur or

craftsman is just as valuable.

### Conclusion


India is at a turning point. We have the youngest population in the world, which could make us a global powerhouse. But if we keep equating education with degrees alone, we will continue producing unemployed graduates. What we need is a mindset shift from producing degree holders to producing skilled, confident individuals.

Ultimately, the future of India depends not on how many certificates we collect but on how capable, creative, and skilled our youth become. If we get this balance right, the same youth who are seen as a burden today can become the country's greatest strength tomorrow.

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
