

National Emblem Only For Govt Functions: CM Omar

ANANTNAG, SEP 6: Jammu and Kashmir Chief Minister Omar Abdullah on Saturday criticised the use of the national emblem on a renovation plaque by the Waqf Board at Srinagar's Hazratbal mosque, asserting that the symbol is meant for government functions and not religious institutions.

Abdullah, who is touring the

flood-affected areas in south Kashmir, said the Jammu and Kashmir Waqf Board should apologise for the "mistake" that has hurt religious sentiments.

His comments follow a major controversy that erupted after the plaque bearing the Ashoka emblem was placed inside the revered Hazratbal shrine and vandalised by unidentified people shortly after prayers on Friday.

Police on Saturday registered a case on charges of breach of peace, rioting and criminal conspiracy against unidentified persons in connection with the incident.

"First, the question arises whether the national emblem should have been used on this stone or not. I have never seen an emblem being used in this way in any religious place," Abdullah told reporters while visiting flood-affected

"Mosques, shrines, temples and gurdwaras are not government institutions. These are religious institutions and government emblems are not used in religious institutions," he said.

The controversy escalated when Waqf Board Chairperson Darakshan Andrabi called for legal action, including booking the "hooligans"

Flood threat eases after 60 hours in Kashmir

Jhelum level falls below flood declaration mark at Pampore MeT predicts no significant weather activity till Sept 12

SRINAGAR, SEP 06: The flood threat in Kashmir eased after 60 hours as the water level in the Jhelum receded below the flood declaration mark on Saturday.

According to the details gathered by the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO), Jhelum level fell below flood declaration mark at Pampore and Ram Munshi Bagh stations this morning.

Independent Weather Forecaster, Faizan Arif Keng informed that the Sangam station witnessed a fall below the flood declaration mark after the gap of 42 hours.

Notably, Kashmir witnessed flood-

like situation after heavy rainfall led to the rise in the water level in river Jhelum and other tributaries till September 4. However, some of the areas including Zoonipora, Shalina, Tailbal, Taigan and adjacent areas got submerged after the river water entered into the residential areas.

Water levels rise in Bandipora, Uri While the situation eased in Srinagar and southern parts of Kashmir, the Jhelum witnessed a rise in frontier town of Uri in North Kashmir's Baramulla district while the Wullar Lake also swelled in Bandipora District.

Dr Jitendra Launches CU 'Campus Tank', Stresses Startup Economy

NEW DELHI, SEP 6: Union Minister of State (Independent Charge) for Science and Technology; Earth Sciences and Minister of State for PMO, Department of Atomic Energy, Department of Space, Personnel, Public Grievances and Pensions, Dr. Jitendra Singh today said India's future growth will increasingly depend on building a "StartUp linked economy" anchored in strong industry partnerships. He was speaking after launching the Chandigarh University "Campus Tank", which he described as the first-of-its-kind initiative in the region, aimed at connecting young entrepreneurs with industry and investors.

The Minister said, the government has created an enabling ecosystem for innovation and entrepreneurship, but sustaining StartUps requires early and substantial

engagement with industry. "This was mainly for industry linkage. The launch of Chandigarh University Campus Tank will give a push to StartUp linked economy through industry linkage. We have prioritised the industry. This is StartUp funding," he noted.

Underscoring the need to move beyond symbolic support, the Minister added: "We need to keep industry ahead to sustain. So we pushed for industry-linked StartUp and a StartUplinked economy. Start-up linked economy is also a good expression." He stressed that while ideas and research emerge from campuses, their long-term success depends on structured partnerships with industry that bring in financial backing, market exposure, and scale.

Pak Drone Spotted Over Samba, **Search Launched**

JAMMU, SEP 6: Security forces in Jammu and Kashmir's Samba district went on high alert after a suspected Pakistani drone was sighted hovering overvital installations late Friday night, officials said on Saturday.

The drone was observed around 9:35 pm at an altitude of over 700 metres, moving from west to east over a military garrison in the Bari Brahmana area, they said.

An immediate alert was sounded and quick reaction teams of the Army were activated. Police were also informed, following which a joint search operation was launched in the area to rule out the possibility of any airdropping of weapons or narcotics.

Officials said searches were continuing on Saturday and security agencies remained on heightened alert in view of the incident.

In recent years, security agencies in Jammu and Kashmir have intercepted multiple Pakistani drones carrying arms, ammunition and contraband across the border, making such

sightings a cause for serious concern. In recent years, Jammu division has witnessed a series of drone-related incidents that have raised serious security concerns, with drones

under the stringent Public Safety Act (PSA), for removing the emblem.

Abdullah condemned Andrabi's response, saying that the board "played with the sentiments of the people" and is now using threats.

"First, at least, they should have apologised for it. They should admit the mistake. It should not have happened," the CM said.

Abdullah also questioned the necessity of the plaque itself, noting that National Conference (NC) founder Sheikh Mohammad Abdullah completed work on the shrine without seeking any credit.

"What was the need for this plaque? Was the work done not enough? Sheikh Mohammad Abdullah gave shape to this shrine... Even today, people remember his work, despite the fact that he did not use a stone in his name. There was no need to use a stone," the chief minister

He said that nowhere in the country is the national emblem used on any religious place. "Google search and you will find that the national emblem is only used in government functions," he said.

During his visit to the flood-affected areas here, Abdullah interacted with the affected families, assuring them that his government stands with them in these testing times and will take all possible measures to help them.

He also held a review meeting in Anantnag to assess the post-flood situation and directed the district administration to expedite relief and rehabilitation, restore essential services, repair damaged infrastructure, strengthen vulnerable embankments and ensure adequate supply of food, medicines and drinking water for the affected population.

Jammu and Kashmir Police on Saturday registered a case against unidentified persons under the provisions of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS) and the Prevention of Insults to the National Honour Act.

"A case under FIR number 76 of 2025 has been registered at Nigeen police station into the incident at Hazratbal on Friday in which the national emblem was damaged," officials

The case has been registered under sections 300 (voluntarily disturbing an assembly lawfully performing religious worship or ceremonies), 352 (addresses intentional insults intended to provoke a breach of the peace or another offence), 191 (2) (rioting), 324 (cause wrongful loss or damage to any person or the public) and 61 (4) (criminal conspiracy) of the BNS.

Friday's incident has drawn widespread criticism from political leaders and the public. Devotee Tanvir Sadiq and NC Srinagar MP Ruhullah Mehdi argued that placing a sculpted figure inside the shrine violates the Islamic principle of monotheism, which forbids idol

The People's Democratic Party (PDP) said it "seems that Muslims are deliberately being provoked" and criticised the call for the use of the PSA as a reflection of a "punitive and com-

Later, the Chief Minister chaired a highlevel review meeting in Anantnag, attended by the Deputy CM, Ministers, Advisor to the CM, concerned MLAs, Deputy Commissioner Anantnag, SP Anantnag, district officers from all line departments, and other officials.

Deputy Commissioner Anantnag presented a detailed account of the damages caused by the floods and measures taken, including rescue operations, setting up shelter homes for evacuees, mobilising resources, deploying sandbags at vulnerable embankments, and

initiating immediate restoration works. He also briefed the CM about waterlogging issues, people affected due to floods and future planning to mitigate similar situations.

Addressing the meeting, Chief Minister Omar Abdullah directed the district administration to prioritise restoration works.

He called for undertaking permanent restoration of Public Health Engineering (Jal Shakti) infrastructure, given its direct impact on public health. He gave directions for coordinating water tanker services and other relief measures with MLAs to prioritise the most affected areas and strengthening coordination among departments such as PHE, PDD, and R&B to ensure seamless restoration of utility ser-

The Chief Minister also called for the constitution of special teams to assess damages so that detailed proposals can be taken up with the Government of India for compensation to the affected people. He instructed officials to assess damages to agricultural land, horticultural crops, and stranded fruit-laden trucks stuck on highways, and to submit their reports

in this regard. Highlighting the importance of long-term planning, Omar Abdullah emphasized the need to explore the viability of a flood channel, dredging of rivers & streams, setting up dewatering pumps, and strengthening of river embankments.

localities.

He assured the people that his Government would take every possible step to provide timely relief and assistance.

The Chief Minister directed the district administration to accelerate restoration works on war footing while ensuring uninterrupted supply of essential services in affected areas.

Later, at a meeting convened at the Mini Secretariat Kulgam, the Deputy Commissioner briefed the Chief Minister about the early evacuation undertaken to safeguard lives and presented details of damage to roads, bridges, and public utilities.

He also outlined the steps initiated for fasttrack restoration of services.

The Chief Minister lauded the proactive efforts of the district administration in carrying out timely evacuations.

He instructed departments including PDD, Jal Shakti, and Irrigation & Flood Control to work in a mission mode for the restoration of essential services.

Emphasizing the importance of safeguarding the livelihoods of farmers, Omar Abdullah directed immediate assessment of crop and horticulture losses, including damages caused during transportation and due to road blockages, so that compensation can be considered by the Government.

Expressing concern over illegal mining in the district, the Chief Minister ordered strict enforcement to ensure a complete ban on the

per hour, during the recent hours. However, as the water level of the Jhelum at Asham has fallen by a couple of feet, it suggests that levels may stabilize soon," he said.

Furthermore, the authorities in Uri issued an urgent public advisory after a significant rise in the water level of the Jhelum river, urging people to remain cautious.

The Jhelum, officials said was flowing at around 630 Cumecs and was expected to swell further in the coming hours, posing a threat to low-lying areas in the villages near Line of Control in Uri sector.

In an advisory, authorities strictly prohibited any movement near the Jhelum and other water bodies in Uri.

Residents living in vulnerable and low-lying areas were asked to remain on high alert and adopt precautionary measures. Besides, citizens were advised to stay indoors, remain attentive to official warnings and in case of emergencies, dial 112 immediately.

"All concerned departments have been directed to remain on maximum alert and ensure full readiness to deal with any emergent situation," the advisory reads.

Meanwhile, the SDM Uri directed the Tehsildar Uri/Boniyar to restrict public movement near the river, while NHPC-I and II were asked to make announcements in flood-prone areas to alert the public.

NO SIGNIFICANT WEATHER ACTIVITY **EXPECTED TILL 12TH SEPTEMBER**

Moreover, Director Meteorological department (MeT), Dr Mukhtar Ahmad told KNO that no significant weather conditions are expected till 12th September.

He said that a brief spell of light rain is expected to occur at scattered places in the next six days.

In its advisory, the MeT said that there is a possibility of landslides and shooting stones at few vulnerable places, advising people to stay away from water bodies, nallas, river embank-

ments and loose structures. The farmers have been advised to resume farm operations forthwith & harvesting of paddy from 9th onwards.

Jmu-Sgr Highway.....

Observer (KNO) said, "Road restoration in the district is progressing fast! Out of 400 damaged roads, over 50% have already been restored, and many more will reopen soon.'

He said, "Restoration work of the National Highway is going on despite constant rain and adverse weather conditions. It is expected to be operational soon—maybe in one or two days-depending on how favorable the weather remains to ensure speedy work."

The Jammu-Srinagar Highway in Udhampur has remained shut for more than ten days after it was badly damaged in the district.

According to the officials an early morning downpour on Saturday derailed the National Highways Authority of India's (NHAI) efforts to restore traffic on the Jammu-Srinagar National Highway today. "Efforts are on at a war footing to clear the 250-metre stretch of the highway at Thard in Udhampur district which was buried under a hill," said an official, adding, "What we had gained during the day on Friday was washed away by intense half-an-hour rainfall this morning. We have mobilised the men and machinery and started the work afresh to ensure early reopening of the arterial road

as soon as possible.' Jatinder Singh, Deputy Superintendent (DvSP)-Traffic Udhampur-Reasi Range, said men and machinery are at work to restore the highway and blasting is being carried out on the stretch. "The work to restore the highway

is underway. NHAI is doing their job so that people will not struggle to cross the highway on foot, and single-way traffic for small vehicles will be restored soon," he said.

It may be recalled that the highway was closed for traffic amid heavy rain across the Jammu division early this week, following multiple landslides, mudslides and shooting stones from the hillocks overlooking the road besides washing away of road patches at different places between Udhampur and Banihal.

The closure of the highway left hundreds of vehicles, mostly trucks, stranded on both sides,

Meanwhile, the Mughal Road - an alternatelink connecting Poonch and Rajouri districts with south Kashmir's Shopian district — is open for light motor vehicles.

The Kishtwar-Sinthan-Anantnag road, another alternate link, remained closed for the fourth day despite a massive road clearance operation.

Water Supply.....

This temporary measure was aimed at ensuring equitable distribution, price regulation and uninterrupted access to safe drinking water for all residents during the crisis.

With the dedicated and coordinated efforts of the Jal Shakti Department, supported by district authorities and ground staff, normal water supply has now been restored in approximately 80% of the affected areas.

In the remaining localities, alternative arrangements like deployment of water tankers, bore-well supplies and temporary water stations are functioning efficiently to meet

As private operators resume their services, they are expected to operate in accordance with applicable guidelines, safety protocols and quality standards.

The Government will continue to closely monitor the water supply scenario to ensure there is no disruption or exploitation of ser-

Jal Shakti Department reaffirms its commitment to providing safe, reliable and adequate drinking water to every resident and expresses gratitude to the public for their support, patience and cooperation throughout the period of difficulty.

IAF Rescues.....

"In a continuous 17-hour operation, four helicopters and 35 crew members evacuated stranded residents and delivered supplies, including food, medicines, and tarpaulin sheets. to remote locations such as Sainj Valley and Bharmor," officials said.

"The operations in J&K focused on regions affected by landslides and cloudbursts, including areas along the Jammu-Rajouri-Poonch and Kishtwar-Sinthan-Anantnag routes," they

Notably, multiple highways, including the Jammu-Srinagar National Highway, remained closed due to damage caused by landslides and restoration work getting hit due to incessant rainfall.

Officials said that in Udhampur, IAF helicopters carried out supply airdrops to families cut off by landslides. "Ongoing rescue and rehabilitation efforts are being coordinated with the Jammu & Kashmir administration to ensure timely assistance to affected people," hey added.

Pertinently, over 170 people have lost their lives in the past three weeks due to weatherrelated incidents, including landslides, cloudbursts, and floods.

The officials said that the IAF continues to maintain assets in the region for follow-up rescue missions and to deliver additional supplies as required.

They said the operations are ongoing, and all available resources remain ready to support disaster-affected areas in Himachal Pradesh, Jammu & Kashmir, and Punjab.

The IAF, in coordination with local authorities, continues to monitor the situation and provide assistance where required, they said—

states made their view on the proposal to rejig tax rates but ultimately agreed that it was for the benefit of the common man, an argument that helped reach a unanimous decision at the GST Council meeting earlier this week.

The overhaul, which will from September 22 see rates of a wide swath of products - from butter to chocolates and shampoos to tractors and air conditioners — come down, was agreed at a meeting of the GST Council on September 3.

The panel is headed by Sitharaman and includes representatives of all states and Union Territories.

'Yesterday, I have written a letter to each finance minister thanking them, saying, you can have any number of intense discussion and argument, but finally, the Council rose to the occasion and gave relief to the people of India, to all people of India.And, I am grateful for that gesture. So, I wrote that letter," she said.

She said the work at the Council was

truly "remarkable". Despite apprehensions over loss of revenue from classifying most products into categories: 5 per cent for common use goods and 18 per cent for everything else, and doing away with 12 and 28 per cent slabs, the GST Council took a unanimous decision for the GST rejig.

The panel was to meet for two days starting September 3 to discuss the proposal made by the Centre but ended up approving it on the very first day after a

marathon daylong meeting. "So the sense of the house was, this is a proposal which is going to undoubtedly benefit the common man. There is no point in standing against it... Ultimately everybody came together for a good cause, and

I'm truly very grateful," Sitharaman said. The minister said states were always in favour of rate reduction and their only concern was with regard to their revenue implications post-tax cuts.

"I even appealed to them, saying, for the sake of the people of India, Please. It's not just the states. It's even the Centre that is going to get affected by the reduction. But we'll make up for it because once the rates come down, people are going to come out to buy, and that will take care of it (revenue impact). That's how consensus was arrived at," she said.

Sitharaman, speaking at a press conference following the GST Council meeting, had expressed her gratitude to the states for their cooperation and collaborative efforts in implementing one of India's most significant tax reforms.

On Saturday, she noted that the Council had given a patient hearing to every comment and suggestion put forward by its members.

"All points were thoroughly deliberated before arriving at a consensus," she said.

She also highlighted the inclusive nature of the discussions, adding that several ministers who wished to speak again after their initial points had already been debated were given the opportunity to do so.

"Their additional inputs were heard and taken into account," the Finance Minister emphasised. She also credited states for their constructive participation in the GST Council and their commitment to driving tax reform. (Agencies)

The first major incident as per the news agency Kashmir News Trust occurred in June 2021, when two drones dropped explosives at the Indian Air Force station in Jammu, injuring two personnel.

In July 2022, security forces intercept $ed\,a\,drone\,in\,Kathua\,district\,and\,recovered$ arms and ammunition airdropped from across the border.

By March 2023, the threat had diversified, with police in Samba recovering a consignment of narcotics suspected to have been delivered by a drone near the international border.

In October 2023, the Border Security Force (BSF) shot down a Pakistani drone in the Arnia sector, seizing rifles and grenades that were attached to it.

In February 2024, a drone was sighted over military installations in Akhnoor, prompting a search operation, though no payload was found.

The most recent case came on September 5, 2025, when a drone was spotted hovering at an altitude of 700 metres over a military garrison in the Bari Brahmana area of Samba district. An alert was sounded immediately, and quick reaction teams of the Army, along with police, launched a joint search operation to ensure there was no airdropping of weapons or narcot-

Officials said the incidents underlines the continuing threat drones pose in the Jammu region, particularly along border districts. Security agencies remain on heightened alert as drones emerge as a new dimension in cross-border militancy and smuggling. (KNT)

He highlighted that nearly 60 percent of India's registered start-ups are women-led, reflecting a shift where women are not just participants but leaders of major projects. Citing examples, he said women scientists are steering national missions such as Aditya L1 and Chandrayaan-3, underscoring the inclusive character of India's scientific and start-up ecosystem. The Minister further underlined that India's progress is also visible in patent filings, where the majority of recent patents are being filed by resident Indian innovators, reversing ear-

lier trends. The Campus Tank has sought to create a platform where industry, investors, and young founders can collaborate to transform ideas into sustainable businesses. Dr. Jitendra Singh said such efforts would contribute directly to building a start-up linked economy — one in which innovation, enterprise, and industry move in step to drive India's progress towards the vision of a developed nation by 2047.

KATHUA, SEP 06: Divisional Commissioner Jammu, Ramesh Kumar, today conducted an extensive inspection of the ongoing protection works along the Ravi River embankment near Lakhanpur, which has suffered severe damages amidst the recent spell of torrential rains.

He was accompanied by Deputy Commissioner Kathua, SSP Kathua, Project Director NHAI, senior officers of Punjab Irrigation Department and representatives of the Indian

During the visit, the Divisional Commissioner held threadbare discussions with all stakeholders including Kathua District Administration, Punjab Irrigation Department, NHAI and Army authorities to devise a multi-pronged strategy aimed at diverting the water flow, protecting critical assets and minimizing risk to life and property.

DC Kathua briefed the Divisional Commissioner about the



emerging situation and the measures being undertaken to safeguard vital installations including the Office of the DDC Chairman, Animal Husbandry Check Post and adjoining government buildings. He informed that men and machinery have been mobilised and are working round the clock to raise crates and carry out strengthening works on vulnerable stretches of the embankment

The Divisional Commissioner directed the concerned departments to maintain con-

stant coordination and ensure timely completion of protective works. Stressing on the urgency, the Div Com called for deployment of adequate resources, regular monitoring of the situation and immediate plugging of weak points along the embankment.

The Div Comfurther emphasized upon exploring long-term measures to provide permanent protection against any threats caused by changes in river course. He urged close liaison between I&K and Punjab authorities to evolve a joint mechanism for flood management in the Ravi River basin.

Meanwhile, the Divisional Commissioner also reviewed the relief and restorations measures ongoing in the affected areas of the District. He asked the district administration to expedite the restoration works of road connectivity that were severely affected during the heavy rains. He directed for complete restoration of Power and water supply, wherever pending in the affected areas, if any.

Emphasising timely action, the Deputy Commissioner said that measures are being taken to provide prompt relief to affected

The DC also reviewed ongoing restoration works across all subdivisions and directed officials to utilise the clear weather to fasttrack repair and restoration ac-

She further directed all Executive Engineers of PWD and PMGSY to ensure adequate machinery is available for road clearance and restoration, and that work continues round-the-clock. The DC instructed SDM Dharmari to coordinate with the GREF department for immediate restoration of roads under their jurisdiction.

The Executive Engineer PMGSY Mahore was directed to prioritise the clearance of vital roads. Both PWD and PMGSY departments were asked to submit detailed reports on the current status of all roads in their areas.

The Deputy Commissioner directed the ADC to obtain a report from Executive Engineer PWD Mahore by this evening on the number of roads made trafficable, while SDM Mahore was tasked with verifying the ground status. PMGSY Mahore was instructed to restore all roads by tomorrow, except those that are technically difficult to clear, while partially open roads must be made fully operational before schools

On reviewing power restoration efforts, the DC took an update from JPDCL officials regarding areas where electricity has been restored and where it is still pending. She stressed timely repair of feeder lines and transformers to ensure uninterrupted power supply.

The DC also directed Executive Engineer Jal Shakti to ensure repair of all damaged pipelines and restoration of safe drinking water supply to the public.

She reiterated that all departments must work in close coordination to ensure speedy restoration, uninterrupted supply of essential commodities, and effective relief distribution in affected

The Deputy Commissioner also reviewed the status of houses damaged in Mahore due to land sinking. She directed SDM Mahore to ensure safe and prompt evacuation of affected families to safer locations or relief camps. She further directed that additional relief materials-including tents, mattresses and food supplies be dispatched immedi-

DDC Vice-Chairperson reviews relief, Rehabilitation efforts at landslide hit Sundla village, otr parts of Majalta

UDHAMPUR, SEP 06: In the wake of incessant rains, flash floods and landslides having unleashed devastation across Udhampur district, Vice Chairperson District Development Council (DDC) Udhampur, Juhi Manhas Pathania today carried out an extensive tour of severely affected areas including Sundla, Nakki, Khoon, Thati, Palnoo among others.

To take stock of the situation that arose after a devastating landslide reportedly affected residential houses in Sundla village- Majalta Tehsil, the Vice Chairperson visited the area and conducted a thorough review of the relief and rehabilitation efforts.

During her visit, Pathania observed that 20 houses have been reduced to rubble, while 50 others were vacated by the administration and local residents as a precautionary measure. Despite the challenges, the relief efforts were found to be satisfactory. A community kitchen, catering to the needs of around 200 people at a time, was running smoothly. Tents had been set up to provide temporary shelter, and fresh water facilities and bio-toilets were available. Medical care and sanitation facilities were also being provided, with the administration and local community working together to distribute essential items, including beds and sanitation kits.

Mrs. Pathania emphasized the need for a comprehensive geological survey of the affected area and surrounding regions to assess the extent of the landslide's impact and potential future risks. This survey would help identify areas prone to landslides and facilitate the development of strategies to mitigate such disasters in the future.

The Vice Chairperson stressed the importance of restoring essential services, including electricity, drinking water, road connectivity, and healthcare facilities, to restore normalcy in the affected area. She directed the concerned departments to work towards ensuring equitable and transparent distribution of relief materials among all affected families.

Mrs. Pathania assured the local residents that the administration is committed to adopting long-term mitigation measures to minimize the impact of future disasters. These measures include strengthening infrastructure, slope stabilization, flood control works, and early warning mechanisms.

The visit aimed at taking stock of the ground situation, assessing damages, and reviewing the pace of ongoing relief measures.

The Vice Chairperson directed all line departments to remain fully geared up for relief and rehabilitation efforts, ensuring that damage assessments are carried out on priority, vulnerable and risk-prone areas are mapped, and precautionary steps are taken in areas where landslides and flash floods continue to pose recurring threats. She stressed upon adopting long-term mitigation and disaster-preparedness $strategies\,including\,strengthening\,of\,infrastructure,$ slope stabilization, flood control works, and early warning mechanisms to minimize the impact of such calamities in the future.

JMC issues comprehensive health advisory amid postflood challenges

JAMMU, SEP 06: Commissioner Municipal Corporation Jammu Dr Devansh Yadav has made an urgent appeal to the people of Jammu to remain cautious and adopt preventive measures as several areas of Jammu Municipal Corporation and district Jammu continue to recover from the aftermath of recent floods. He emphasized that flood-hit regions are highly vulnerable to outbreaks of waterborne and vector-borne diseases, and immediate action is necessary to protect public health.

Speaking on the current situation, Dr. Yadav stated that contamination of drinking water is a major concern during such times and can lead to illnesses such as stomach infections, headaches, fever and diarrhea. Alongside this, the ongoing season poses an increased risk of mosquito-borne diseases including dengue and chikungunya, which are more likely to spread in areas with accumulated stagnant water.

Issuing instructions to all residents to ensure the safety of their drinking water, Dr. Yadav advised the citizens to boil water for a minimum of 10 minutes before consumption to eliminate harmful microorganisms. "Chlorine tablets should be used wherever possible, and water should be allowed to settle for at least half an hour after adding the tablets before it is used for drinking or cooking purposes. Residents are also urged to maintain their surroundings by removing stagnant water from rooftops, courtyards and nearby drains as such areas provide ideal breeding grounds for mosquitoes" he advised.

To facilitate public health services and immediate assistance, the Health Department has activated the 104 helpline number. This helpline will provide guidance and address any health-related queries from residents. In addition, the Jammu Municipal Corporation has intensified its efforts to conduct fogging and spraying activities across all wards of JMC to control mosquito breeding and minimize the risk of vector-borne diseases.

Appealing to the public, Dr. Yadav said if fogging and spraying activities have not yet reached their locality, they should promptly register their area and ward number on the JMC helpline. This will help the authorities prioritize the areas that require immediate attention and ensure that every ward receives timely preventive measures, he added.

The health and well-being of our citizens is our top priority," said Dr. Devansh Yadav, adding that JMC is making every possible effort through coordinated actions involving our sanitation teams, health workers, and support staff. The success of these measures greatly depends on the active cooperation of the public, he said and added that together, we can prevent the spread of diseases and ensure a healthy environment for everyone. JMC is in continuous monitoring and proactive steps are being taken to safeguard the health of the people during this critical period of recovery, he maintained.

IAF, Udhampur Admin conduct emergency airlift of two critical patients from Latti-Marothi area

DC Reasi withholds salary of Naib Tehsildar for unauthorized absence

REASI, SEP 06: Deputy Commissioner Reasi Nidhi Malik has taken strong note of negligence and dereliction of duty on the part of Naib Tehsildar JR Chakalhawalan, Tehsil Thakrakote.

"It has come to the notice of this office that, despite widespread heavy rains, thunderstorms, landslides and flash floods causing extensive damage to public and private infrastructure in the district, the said officer was not present at his station and failed to promptly report the damage in his jurisdiction. The duty of the officer was to actively carry out damage assessment for facilitating relief disbursement, but his absence led to delays in the process," the DC noted.

Taking a serious view of the lapse, the officer has been served a show-cause notice directing him to explain why disciplinary action should not be initiated against him. He has been given two days' time to respond, failing which action as warranted under rules shall be taken. Meanwhile, his salary has been withheld until further orders.

The Deputy Commissioner emphasized that during adverse weather conditions such as heavy rains, landslides, and thunderstorms, the physical presence of field officers and immediate reporting are mandatory to ensure timely response and relief measures. She reiterated that dereliction of duty in times of crisis will not be tolerated and that officers must remain vigilant and responsive to safeguard the interests of the public.



No end to water woes of huge chunk of population

The flood scare may be over in Kashmir but there is no end to miseries and problems of a huge chunk of population living in Srinagar city and its outskirts. Population consisting of thousands of souls are up against a basic need that is connected with their daily lives. The problem relates to non-availability of safe and drinking water even though the authorities have issued clarification in this regard.

Ever since the Kashmir valley has been hit by incessant rains people living in multiple areas of Srinagar and Budgam districts are facing the problem. The incessant rains brought a lot of dirt, mud and silt and this led to the blockage of some of the filtration plants located in the two districts of Central Kashmir. Due to the blockage of these filtration plants the water supply has been stopped to many areas of the two districts.

The higher-ups of Jal Shakti department have issued a clarification in this regard and have asked the people to use the water judiciously. The department officials have said that they have been forced to shut down the filtration plants as the deposition of mud, silt and dirt can cause damage to the same. They have said that the restoration work is going on the filtration plants and it will take some more time for the things to be normalized.

Even though the rains have stopped some four days back what is the reason that there has been delay in restoration of filtration plants. Unfortunately the concerned minister seems to be least bothered about the same and he seems to be unaware about the problems being faced by the common masses. Directions from the minister or his secretariat would have kept the officials of the Jal Shakti department on toes and they would have taken extra steps in restoring the filtration plants.

People are suffering like anything and they are looking for a solution to their problems at the earliest. At the same time the tanker service provided by the Jal Shakti department has also failed to meet the expectations of the people. There are hardly few tankers that are making rounds of the affected areas and as such people are craving for even a single drop of clean and potable drinking water. The inapt tanker service has compounded the problems of the masses and as on date they are at the receiving end.

Necessity of an Electric Revolution

The demand for electric vehicles in India is no longer just an option but has become a necessity of the time. Fossil fuels like petrol and diesel are limited resources, and India is heavily dependent on other countries for their supply. This dependence results in the import of crude oil worth approximately \$200 billion every year, leading to economic imbalance and trade deficit. However, by promoting electric vehicles, India can strengthen its energy security and take significant steps towards a cleaner environment and self-reliance. Additionally, if the share of electric vehicles increases, India can save around \$40 billion in foreign exchange, which would be highly beneficial for economic growth. The development of battery manufacturing and charging infrastructure will also create new employment opportunities, providing jobs to the youth and strengthening the economy.

Air pollution in major cities has become a serious issue, with emissions from conventional petrol and diesel vehicles being a significant contributor, particularly in metropolitan cities like Delhi, Mumbai, and Kolkata. According to the World Health Organization, 14 out of the 20 most polluted cities in the world are in India. In 2022, Delhi's average Air Quality Index (AQI) remained above 300, indicating a severe pollution level. The smoke from conventional vehicles, containing harmful elements such as nitrogen oxides, particulate matter, and $carbon\,monoxide, plays\,a\,major\,role\,in\,air\,pollution.$ However, the use of electric vehicles can significantly reduce these harmful emissions, promoting clean air and better public health. Since electric vehicles produce zero carbon emissions, and if they are charged using renewable energy sources like solar and wind energy, it will further enhance energy cleanliness and self-reliance.

In recent years, there has been a remarkable increase in the sales of electric vehicles in India, indicating that people are gradually shifting towards electric mobility. For instance, in 2020, around 1.5 lakh (150,000) electric vehicles were sold in the country, while in 2023, this number exceeded 1 million, reflecting increasing consumer awareness and environmental sensitivity. The government is also taking active measures in this direction, such as providing subsidies, tax exemptions, and promoting the development of charging infrastructure. However, several challenges remain in this sector, such as the lack of charging infrastructure, high battery costs, limited range, and long charging time. If the government and private companies work



together to solve these issues, India can emerge as a leader in the electric vehicle revolution.

The number of charging stations in the country is still very limited, making long-distance travel difficult. Currently, India has around 10,000 public charging stations, whereas at least 50,000 stations are required. While some charging points are available in urban areas, there is a severe shortage in rural areas and highway networks, causing inconvenience to consumers and slowing the adoption of electric vehicles. Additionally, the time required $to \, charge \, batteries \, is \, a \, significant \, is sue. \, A \, standard \,$ electric vehicle takes about 4-8 hours to charge, while fast charging still takes 30-60 minutes, which is longer compared to conventional vehicles. To resolve this problem, the government needs to increase the number of fast-charging stations on highways and in cities and develop a long-term plan to expand charging infrastructure in rural areas.

The cost of electric vehicles is still higher than traditional petrol and diesel vehicles, primarily due to the high cost of batteries, which account for 40-50% of the total vehicle cost. Moreover, electric $ity \, rates \, for \, charging \, and \, the \, cost \, of \, setting \, up \, home$ charging stations are also concerns for consumers. To reduce battery costs, it is essential to promote local battery manufacturing. If the government and private companies work together to reduce production costs and provide concessions on electricity rates, electric vehicles can become more affordable, increasing their popularity.

India's road infrastructure and traffic management also pose challenges for electric vehicles. Poor road conditions lead to faster battery drainage, reducing vehicle efficiency. While highways are in decent condition, rural roads are often inadequate, making them unsuitable for electric vehicles. Poor roads can lead to faster battery depletion, which is a major concern for consumers. To address this issue, the government should prioritize road construction and maintenance, as better roads will not only improve the efficiency of electric vehicles but also help expand their use to rural areas.

For widespread adoption of electric vehicles, the government, industry, and consumers must work together. Key steps in this direction include expanding charging infrastructure, reducing battery costs, providing subsidies and tax exemptions, improving road conditions, and promoting electric vehicles in public transportation. Encouraging local battery manufacturing and electric vehicle production will also reduce import dependence and strengthen India's position in the global market.

Electric vehicles can serve as a powerful means to lead India towards a cleaner, greener, and selfreliant future. This transition is essential not only for environmental conservation but also for economic and energy security. Although challenges such as insufficient charging infrastructure, high battery costs, and poor roads remain obstacles, if the government and private sector collaborate to resolve these issues, the popularity of electric vehicles can grow rapidly. With better policies, technological innovation, and public awareness, India can lead the electric vehicle revolution, emerging as an energy-rich, economically strong, and environmentally responsible nation. This change will not only reduce air pollution in cities but also promote clean energy use in rural areas. Moreover, adopting technologies like battery recycling can further minimize environmental impact. Including electric buses and auto-rickshaws in public transport will help reduce fuel consumption, enabling India to meet its energy needs locally and establish itself as a responsible nation on the global stage.

Red Stain on White Snow-Clad Kashmir

Blood is life but when terrorists enter Kashmir blood assumes a horrible name-Death. Pahalgam massacre is the most recent such horrible occurrence. The heinous plan was aimed at staking communal fire not only in Kashmir but all over India. Kashmir unitedly foiled such audacious attempts by the terrorists. The red stain on Kashmir's snow is more $than\,a\,trage dy-it\,is\,a\,metaphor.\,Red$ is blood, sacrifice, resilience, but also resistance. White is peace, purity, and the hope of a new dawn. When the two clash, it produces a haunting image: the beauty of nature corrupted by the cruelty of man. Yet, even snow that turns red eventually melts. The Valley will see spring again—chinar leaves will glow crimson in autumn, tulips will bloom in Srinagar, and children will once again laugh on sledges in Gulmarg. Terrorists cannot stop seasons. They cannot stop life.

The Valley, known as the Paradise on Earth, has often been drenched in blood. The beautiful snows of Gulmarg, the meadows of Pahalgam, and the serene waters of Dal Lake carry echoes of peace and poetry; yet beneath this idyllic façade lies a painful story of violence and loss. The Pahalgam tragedy, where innocent lives were cut short, once again revealed how terrorism seeks to exploit Kashmir's vulnerability. Kashmir has always been a paradox. On one hand, its cultural history cele-

brates the shared legacy of Kashmiri Pandits, Muslims, and Sikhs living harmoniously for centuries. On the other hand, geopolitics, militancy, and foreign-sponsored terrorism have torn through this social fabric. Snow, the purest image of nature's peace, is desecrated by the red of bloodshed. The contrast is not just visual-it is symbolic of the larger tragedy.

For decades, Kashmir has been a chessboard for larger power games. Militants, often supported and trained from across the border, infiltrate the Valley with the aim of destabilizing India. Their objective is not merely violence but communal polarisation. The Pahalgam incident was designed to strike at the heart of India's secular ethos. By targeting Hindu pilgrims and tourists, terrorists hoped to ignite communal flames that could engulf the whole country.

Pahalgam, the serene base camp for the annual Amarnath Yatra, turned into a site of horror when terrorists unleashed indiscriminate violence. Pilgrims, who had come with faith and hope, found themselves in the grip of death. The attackers fired upon unarmed men, women, and children, attempting to paint the snow with human blood.The symbolism was deliberate. Terrorists wanted to break the backbone of Kashmiri tourism, destroy inter-community trust, and project Kashmir as unsafe. But the Valley's resilience spoke otherwise. Ordinary Kashmiris-Muslims and Hindus alike—rushed to rescue the injured, donated blood, and stood shoulder to shoulder against terror is m.The massacre, intended to divide, actu $ally united {\it Kashmir against terror.} The$ Pahalgamincident is not isolated. Kashmir has witnessed countless tragedies-Kupwara, Pulwama, Uri, Soporeeach leaving scars on the Valley's conscience. Terrorist groups, trained

across the border, have consistently targeted not only security personnel but also civilians, because it is easier to spread fear through the blood of innocents. But the story of Kashmir is not only about victimhood; it is also about resilience. After every attack, Kashmiris return to life. The markets reopen, children go back to school, farmers till the land, and tourists once again come to admire the snow-clad mountains. Terrorists may kill people, but they cannot kill the will of a community that refuses to surrender its humanity. The massacre was a test of India's communal harmony. The terrorists had one aimignite Hindu-Muslim hatred. But ordinary Kashmiris rose above the divide. Muslim villagers carried injured Hindu pilgrims to safety. Mosques announced blood donation drives for the victims. This was Kashmir's answer to terrorism: humanity over hatred.

This unity recalls the age-old Kashmiri ethos of Kashmiriyat—a spirit of mutual respect, tolerance, and cultural syncretism. The Valley has given the world Sufi saints like Lal Ded and poets like Habba Khatoon, whose verses celebrate harmony. Terrorists want to erase this tradition, but Kashmiris have proved time and again that the shared cultural heritage is stronger than imported violence.

Yet, tourism revives after every tragedy. The resilience of Kashmiris is astounding. A shikarawala once told me: "Sir, we cannot stop rowing the shikara because someone wants to stop the Dal Lake's beauty. Life has to go on." That sentence captures the Valley's courage.

While Kashmiris rebuild their lives after every attack, one cannot overlook the immense sacrifices of Indian security forces. Soldiers patrol the freezing mountains, braving avalanches and bullets alike, to protect the Valley. Many have laid down their lives to ensure that pilgrims and tourists remain safe. Terrorists thrive on creating fear. But when the media highlights stories of Kashmiri Muslims donating blood for Hindu pilgrims, the terrorists' narrative of division collapses. It is vital that such stories reach the wider audience so the world understands that Kashmir is not about terrorism—it is about humanity under siege. The red stains on white snow are not easy to wash away. Families of victims carry scars forever. A mother who lost her child $in Pahalgam\,will\, always\, see\, the\, snow$ as a graveyard of dreams. 

The proverb Early to bed and Early to rise makes a person healthy, wealthy and wise has been considered as confirmed piece of wisdom for centuries. Even the ultra modern science has confirmed and validated this age-old belief by exploring the various biological, psychological and social benefits of going to bed early and rising up with the sun. Conversely, the habit of staying up late in the night added with waking late in the morning is although common and integral part in today's fastpaced world but the habit has been linked to serious health consequences, including increased risk of dementia, psychological disorders, cardiovascular diseases, metabolic disorders and shortened lifespan.

Pros of Going Early to Bed and Early to Rise

1. Improved Cognitive Health:

Adequate sleep helps in the maintainance of the brain's glymphatic system which is essential for clearance of toxins such as beta-amyloid plaques associated with Alzheimer's disease and dementia.

helps to strengthen the immunity.

Cons of Early Sleeping and Rising

1. Social Limitations:

In modern society, where many social and professional events extend late into the evening early sleepers may experience reduced participation in night functions and social events.

2. Rigid Lifestyle:

Maintaining an early bedtime habit can be difficult for the shift workers, students or professionals with demanding schedules.

Pros of Staying Up Late and Waking

1. Creativity and Flexibility:

The psychological researches suggests that people who works till late nights and prefers waking up late in the morning demonstrate higher creative skills and improved performances during latenight hours.

2. Adaptation to Modern Demands:

In the modern materialistic world late risers often find better alignment with entertainment, technology-driven industries and global communication needs.

Cons of Late Sleeping and Late Rising 1. Risk of Dementia:

 $Many neurology reports \, have \, established \,$ that people who consistently went to bed late and experienced poor sleep quality were more likely to develop dementia due to insufficient clearance of neurotoxic waste.

2. Cardiovascular Risks: Researches across the globe has revealed

that the people working during late night hours are more prone to hypertension, irregular heartbeats and heart attacks. 3. Diabetes Risks:

Late sleepers have higher risks of obesity, type-2 diabetes and insulin resistance due to disruption of circadian regulation of hormones.

4. Shorter Lifespan:

A large-scale study of different people from different parts of the world has predicted that night workers have higher risk of early death compared to the early risers.

5. Psychological Strain: Late sleepers experience higher rates

of anxiety, depression and burnout because of social jet lag, the mismatch between biological rhythms and social obligations.

Scientific Insights into Dementia and

Related Risks

The Scientists throughout the world has emphasized the role of circadian rhythm misalignment as a central mechanism connecting late sleep patterns with dementia and other chronic illnesses. Poor sleep quality could reduce the slow-wave sleep which is crucial for memory consolidation and clearance of toxins from the brain. The accumulation of beta-amyloid $and \, tau \, proteins \, is \, strongly \, associated \, with \,$ Alzheimer's disease. Additionally, late risers often exhibit higher cortisol levels (the stress hormone), which accelerates neuronal damage, increases vascular inflammation and predisposes individuals to dementia, heart attacks and strokes.

Studies across the globe have indicated that different people prefer different sleeping cycles but the scientific evidences strongly favors the health benefits of going to bed early and rising up early in the morning. Though night owls may experience bursts of creativity and adaptability but the long-term risks that includes dementia, cardiovascular disease, metabolic syndrome and shorter lifespan make the habit medically and socially unwise. Public health campaigns and workplace adjustments should encourage healthier sleep schedules even if they are included in office curriculum. This strategy can play a pivotal role in reducing the dementia and chronic illness burdens worldwide.

Fruits, Spices, Sleep: Wellness Coach's Guide To Staying Healthy

NEW DELHI: Wellness expert Luke Coutinho has warned that changing weather can reduce immunity and increase the risk of infections. "Building strong immunity is a lifestyle, not a quick fix," he said in a post on Instagram. To boost defences, Coutinho has recommended consuming Vitamin C-rich fruits such as papaya, amla, and guava, along with immunity-supporting spices like turmeric, ginger, and cinnamon (dal cheeni). He also emphasised that sleep plays a key role in immunity, as the body produces cytokines during rest to fight infections and inflammation. Poor sleep, he said, can weaken these natural defences.

He recommended people do moderate workouts, as they improve circulation and immune surveillance, but overtraining or inactivity can harm



the immune system. Coutinho also urged people to eat healthy, reduce stress levels and look tal well-being.

"Stress hormones like cortisol, when chronically high, lower white blood cell activity, making it harder for your body

to fight off pathogens," he wrote. He added, "Your immune system is not just a backup plan

for when you fall sick, it is your first line of defence every single day. Yet most people only think after their emotional and men- of immunity when illness

> He also said that nutrition remains a crucial part, with protein being essential for the production of antibodies. Taking insufficient protein can weaken the defense system. Healthy fats, particularly Omega-3s

from flaxseeds, walnuts, and fatty fish, help regulate inflammation, he mentioned.


Coutinho said that gut health also plays an important role, as 70 per cent of immunity sits inside the gut. Prebiotic foods like onions, garlic, and bananas, as well as probiotics such as curd, sauerkraut, and other fermented foods, help maintain microbial balance.

In addition to this, Vitamin D from sunlight also supports T-cell function, a vital component of immune defence.

He further stated that daily habits such as staying hydrated also immunise the system. He mentioned that if someone is looking to enhance their immune system, they should reduce refined sugar, as it suppresses white blood cell activity for hours after consumption and also limit alcohol and smoking, as they both impair immune cell production.

Coutinho said seasonal foods, naturally aligned with the body's needs, should be prioritised for overall health.

"Immunity isn't built overnight. It is built every single day through small, consistent choices. It's not just about fighting infections; it's about preventing chronic inflammation, slowing aging, and supporting overall vitality," he added. (NDTV)

Kullu HP Landslide: Amid tears, sobs, 3 Kashmiri labourers laid to rest

KANGAN, SEP 06: Grief and mourning engulfed Central Kashmir's Kangan on Saturday as the bodies of three local labourers, who were killed in a devastating landslide in Himachal Pradesh's Kullu district, were airlifted and brought back to their native villages.

Pertinently, at least eight persons including six Kashmiris were killed in a landslide incident at Inner Akhara Bazar in Kullu district of Himachal Pradesh two days ago.

The deceased have been identified as Abdul Rashid Sheikh, son of Mohammad Jamal Sheikh of Kijpora Kangan, Mehraj-ud-Din Lone, son of Mohammad Sabir of Gundari Kangan and Sajjad Ahmad Wani, son of Abdul Ahad Wani of Gundari Kangan.

Emotional scenes were witnessed as the coffins arrived in Kijpora and Ari Guripora Kangan. Thousands of people joined the funeral prayers, with heart-wrenching cries echoing through the villages.

According to the news agency–Kashmir News Observer (KNO), locals carried the coffins through the narrow lanes before the victims were laid to rest.

MLA Gurez Nazir Ahmad Khan Gurezi, MLA Kangan Mian Mehar Ali, SDM Kangan Nazir Ahmad, and Tehsildar Kangan Mubashir Amin expressed solidarity with the families and took part in the last rites.

Shabir, a resident of Ari, told KNO. "We sent them to earn a livelihood, but they returned in coffins. Our hearts are shattered.'

Political leaders across Jammu and Kashmir expressed their condolences.

Chief Minister Omar Abdullah termed the tragedy heart-wrenching, while Lieutenant Governor Manoj Sinha described the incident as "unfortunate and saddening." extending condolences to the bereaved families and praying for the safety of those still missing.

MLA Kangan Mian Mehar Ali said he had spoken to one of the injured labourers and assured the victims' families of all possible support. He also confirmed that MP Central Kashmir Aga Syed Ruhullah Mehdi had been approached to take up the matter for timely assistance.

Officials confirmed that while the bodies of three victims have been handed over to their families, at least three more labourers from Kangan remain trapped under the debris in Kullu. Their bodies are expected to reach their native villages once recovered.

40% of Budgam still without clean drinking water: Residents question efficacy of filtration plants

Water crisis hits district, livelihoods at risk amid official inaction

SRINAGAR, SEP 06: A severe shortage of clean drinking water has plunged central Kashmir's Budgam district into crisis, with nearly 40% of the population as per the official sources still deprived of potable water despite repeated pleas to authorities.

Residents across the district have accused the Jal Shakti department of failing to provide basic water supply, raising concerns over the efficacy of filtration plants and the overall management of the region's water infrastructure.

According to details obtained by the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO), Budgam has been grappling with an acute water crisis following several days of relentless rainfall. The heavy downpour has resulted in streams like Doodh Ganga Nallah and others becoming heavily contaminated with mud, debris, and waste-rendering the water undrinkable and unfit for daily use. Ironically, the Jal Shakti

department continues to draw water from these very streams for its filtration plants, attempting to treat and distribute it to households. However, residents say that the filtration process is failing to meet the community's needs, leaving nearly two-fifths of the district's population without access to safe water. The crisis has been particularly acute in several villages across Sub-Division Beerwah, Khad, and other areas, where both people and livestock are at risk.

"Even our animals are falling sick due to the contaminated water being supplied," one resident told KNO. Locals also report that broken pipes and poorly maintained infrastructure are compounding the problem. "There is no proper filtration system in our area. Pipes are broken in several places and go unrepaired for weeks, which lets dirty water seep in and leads to further wastage. We are forced to drink foul-smelling, contaminated water because we have no alternative," locals told KNO.

Sanjeev Jha accuses BJP ministers of neglect in flood-hit **Jahangirpuri**

NEW DELHI, SEP 6: Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) MLA from Burari, Sanjeev Jha, today visited Jahangirpuri's D, E and EE blocks, where several families are facing severe waterlogging. He alleged that residents have been living in knee-deep water without electricity for the past two days and criticised the BJP-led government for not providing adequate relief.

Jha distributed mosquito nets at relief camps during his visit and claimed that no responsible minister or officer had visited the affected areas. He said that basic medical facilities were missing in the relief camps and that children had been falling sick. He also alleged that repeated requests for a generator at the camps had gone unan-

Jha criticised union Minister Parvesh Verma, saying that instead of addressing the situation,



he was busy on social media denying the existence of floods in Delhi. He said, "If he has even a shred of shame left, he should come and see Jahangir-

 $The AAP legislator also \ raised \ questions \ about$ the handling of desilting and cleaning of the Yamuna and drains. He noted that despite the Yamuna's water level being lower than in 2023, Jahangirpuri had still experienced flooding this year. He attributed the situation to administrative failure, stating that drainage pumps were only installed after he personally intervened with senior officials.

Jha further alleged that people in other areas, including G Block, H Block and Badli, were also struggling with waterlogging, yet BJP representatives had not visited their constituencies. He accused the government of insensitivity and said residents felt abandoned.

The MLA argued that the present situation showed lapses in preparedness and accountability. He claimed thefts were being reported in abandoned houses and that families were forced to move to schools for shelter. UNI

WHO Adds Key Cancer, Diabetes Drugs to Essential List

NEW DELHI. SEP 6: The World Health Organisation (WHO) has unveiled the updated editions of its Model Lists of Essential Medicines (EML) and Essential Medicines for Children (EMLc), incorporating vital new treatments for several cancers and diabetes, particularly addressing associated conditions such as obesity.

The revised list also features medicines for cystic fibrosis, psoriasis, haemophilia, and other blood-related disorders, according to a statement here by the global body.

Among the notable additions is the triple combination therapy elexacaftor/tezacaftor/ivacaftor (ETI), aimed at cystic fibrosis management. The update includes GLP-1 receptor agonists semaglutide, dulaglutide, and liraglutide — alongside tirzepatide, a dual GLP-1/glucose-dependent insulinotropic polypeptide (GIP) receptor agonist, for the treatment of diabetes and obesity. Furthermore, PD-1/PD-L1 immune checkpoint inhibitors, which enhance the immune system's ability to target cancer cells, have been incorporated.

Pembrolizumab has been added as a first-line monotherapy for metastatic cervical, colorectal, and non-small cell lung cancers, with atezolizumab and cemiplimab recognised as therapeutic alternatives for the latter, the WHO noted.

Cancer remains the world's second leading cause of death, responsible for nearly 10 million deaths annually and accounting for almost one-third of premature deaths from non-communicable diseases. For over a decade, cancer medicines have been a key focus of the WHO EML.

The WHO EML and EML c, serving over 150 countries, guide public sector procurement, medicine supply, and health insurance schemes globally. This release marks the 24th edition of the EML and the 10th of the EMLc, said the statement.

Dr Yukiko Nakatani, WHO Assistant Director-General for Health Systems, Access and Data, described the update as a significant advancement in broadening access to medicines with proven clinical efficacy and substantial global public health impact.

The WHO Expert Committee, responsible for the review had examined 59 applications—including 31 proposals for new medicines or classes—leading to the addition of 20 new medicines to the EML and 15 to the EMLc. Seven existing

medicines also received new use indications. The updated lists now encompass 523 essential medicines for adults and 374 for children.

However, the committee highlighted concerns regarding the high cost of certain diabetes drugs, such as semaglutide and tirzepatide, which restrict patient access. It advocated prioritising high-need patients, encouraging generic competition, and extending availability to primary care, especially in underserved regions, to improve health outcomes.

Deusdedit Mubangizi, WHO Director of Policy and Standards for Medicines and Health Products, underscored that medicines constitute a significant portion of out-of-pocket expenses for noncommunicable diseases, even for those classified as essential and ideally affordable for all.

"Equitable access demands

coherent health system responses backed by political commitment, multisectoral cooperation, and people-centred initiatives," he said as per the statement.

The committee also endorsed evidence-based clinical and health system strategies from cancer experts aimed at enhancing access and affordability of cancer treatments. These include dose optimisation protocols to deliver faster benefits, particularly in resource-limited settings, although wider health system reforms require longer-term government action.

The Expert Committee, said the statement, exercised rigorous criteria, approving only those cancer therapies that extend life by at least four to six months, following evaluations of 25 cancer medicines across seven applications. UNI

Thirteen officers injured at rallies in Serbia, 42 protesters detained: Interior Ministry

BELGRADE, SEP 6: Thirteen police officers were injured at protests in Serbia's Novi Sad on Friday night, and 42 demonstrators were detained, Serbian Deputy Prime Minister and Interior Minister Ivica Dacic said on Saturday.

On Friday night, Serbian President Aleksandar Vucic said that 11 police officers were injured at a protest in Novi Sad, and that dozens of rioters would be detained. Over 7,000 people rallied in the protest action that began at the faculty of philosophy of the local university on Friday evening.

"There were 13 injured police officers. Over the past few weeks, since the demonstrations have become

violent, very aggressive towards the police, unprovoked by the police ... more than 150 police officers have been injured," Dacic told Radio Television of Serbia in an interview.

The demonstrators used sticks, rods, paint, pyrotechnics, flares and wore helmets and masks, the minister said.

"Forty-two people have been detained, what the prosecutor's office will do with them is not up to us. Eighteen police cars were damaged. One service pistol was taken from a policeman," he said.

The Serbian authorities' opponents gathered several thousand people in Novi Sad on Friday evening for a rally "Serbia, do you hear us?" at the building of the Faculty of Philosophy, in front of which a police cordon was

Student and opposition protests began in Serbia after the collapse of a canopy at the Novi Sad railway station on November 1, 2024, killing 16 people. The situation in Serbian cities escalated in mid-August. As protesters became more agitated during the late hours, they became more confrontational towards law enforcement officers, barricading and blocking access roads.

In August, Vucic said that he was not considering introducing a state of emergency in Serbia. Vucic has also said that the September 1 protests had gathered 16,000-17,000 people in Serbia and that he was offering dialogue to the protesters. UNI

Man killed in shark attack at northern Sydney beach

SYDNEY, SEP 6: A surfer has died after being attacked by a shark at a beach in northern Sydney on Saturday morning. A police statement said that emergency services were called to reports that a man had been critically injured at Long Reef Beach, 16 km northeast of central Sydney, shortly after 10 a.m. on Saturday. He was retrieved from the water and brought to shore, but died at the scene.

Police said the man was bitten by what is believed to have been a large shark. Two sections of a surfboard were recovered and have been sent for examination. Experts will be consulted to determine the species of the shark involved.

Long Reef Beach and the surrounding beaches have been closed until further notice. UNI



AUSTRALIA SPINNER SOPHIE MOLINEUX EYES WORLD CUP DREAM AT CWC25

SYDNEY: Defending champions Australia have locked in Sophie Molineux for their ICC Cricket World Cup 2025 squad.

The seven-time winners, who have ten members of the squad that featured in the previous edition back in 2022, have added the returning left-arm spinner to bolster the spin attack in sub-continent conditions.

The Australian spin attack will now feature Ashleigh Gardner, leg-spinner Alana King, and Georgia Wareham, alongwith Molineux.

Speaking to cricket.com.au on her road to recovery, Molineux expressed her hope on getting some game time before the Cricket World Cup. But ongoing rehabilitation for a knee injury she sustained last year could keep her away from action, with direct participation in the tournament instead.

'We were aiming to play some games before that World Cup, but the way it's panned out is I'll probably get

into it at the World Cup - no (better) way to rip a Band-Aid off than that," she said.

"Traditionally, I'd bowl and bowl and bowl, and feel really confident and comfortable through bowling a heap of overs each week and playing games at cricket,(but)it's not the case now," Molineux

"So I think I've been able to tap into some different things to prepare for a World Cup and to perform, hopefully, straight away," she said.

Since her debut in 2018, Molineux has played 13 ODIs, taking 23 wickets at an impressive average of 14.39 and

an economy rate of 3.29. Though the journey to recovery has been tough, the spinner is looking forward to her participation in what will be her maiden Cricket World Cup.

"The cherry of a World Cup is definitely something big, I've never been to a one-day World Cup, so the sound of that was always chiming in the back of my head throughout the winter," Molineux said.

"But I think it's (also) just about getting back and feeling good out on the cricket field again, no matter what

colours I am in," she added. Molineux is unlikely to feature in the three-match ODI series against India before the marquee event begins as a precautionary measure with the defending Cricket World Cup champions hoping for her full recovery ahead of the tournament starting September 30.

Australia will take on New Zealand in the first game of the ICC Cricket World Cup 2025 on October 1 at In-
