

# **Youth Must End Colonial** Legacy for India's Progress: LG


LG Delivers Keynote at National Seminar on Indian Languages at NIT Srinagar

**SRINAGAR, SEP 19:** With the peace and stability, with the spirit of unity and common goals, and fostering a strong collective identity, India will achieve robust development, the Lieutenant Governor, Shri Manoj Sinha said on Friday. He was speaking at a national Seminar on Integration in Indian languages organised by National Institute of Technology, Srinagar and Bharatiya Bhasha Samiti.

The Lieutenant Governor said India's rich linguistic landscape is a source of strength. He said hundreds of languages and dialects have helped in building a cohesive society, which is driving transformation and development.

'Despite diverse background, languages, dialects and ideas, a common national identity and shared consciousness unite us all. We must harness the power of unity in diversity for nation-building. Our effort should be to ensure that Hindi continues to serve as an essential bridge, connecting



people from different linguistic backgrounds, motivate people to learn other languages, enhancing mutual cooperation and economic integration," the Lieutenant Governor said.

He said that all the sections of the society must also strive to preserve, and promote the rich cultural heritage inherent in all Indian languages.

The Lieutenant Governor called upon youth to transcend linguistic differences and unite the nation to transform India into Viksit Bharat.

### **Industrial Growth Should Create** Jobs for Youth, Artisans: CM

**SRINAGAR, SEP 19:** Chief Minister Omar Abdullah today directed the Industries & Commerce Department to adopt a proactive and inclusive approach in strengthening Jammu and Kashmir's industrial ecosystem, with a special focus on employment generation, sustainability and competitiveness.

Chief Minister emphasized the need for handholding of MSME units which are in distress but still revivable with minimal government intervention. He asked officials to identify such units at an early stage so these do not become defunct. "Such units can generate significant employment if supported in time," he said.

Chief Minister expressed concern on slow progress under capital expenditure during current fiscal particularly under PMEGP & REGP schemes asking the department to at least match the last year's progress.

Chief Minister also reviewed the New Central Sector Scheme aimed at encouraging new investments and incentives provided under the scheme. CM assessed the claim wise progress achieved under the scheme and called for completion of targets fixed under the NCSS.

He also asked Industries Department to prioritize setting up of industries for which either raw material is readily available or the market is locally available for finished products.

SRINAGAR, SEP 19: Chief Secretary, Atal Dulloo today chaired a meeting to comprehensively review the quality and standards of nursing education across the Union Territory, emphasizing that nursing forms the backbone of the healthcare delivery system.

The meeting was attended by Secretary, Health & Medical Education; Principals of GMC Jammu and Srinagar; Chairperson, J&K Allied & Healthcare Council (A&HCC); Registrar, J&K Nursing Council; Principals of Nursing Colleges, and other senior officers.

During the review, the Chief Secretary took stock of the functioning of newly established Nursing Colleges across districts, including the range of courses offered and the enrolment of students. He directed that diploma-level courses should

be progressively upgraded to degree and postgraduate programmes in order to build advanced capacities in the nursing

## PDD Launches Massive Parallel Training Sessions Across J&K

780 Linemen Receive Hands-On Training on Electrical Safety

**JAMMU, SEP 19:** With a view to foster safety-first culture in the power sector, and in line with the Government's emphasis on conducting employee training in a structured and regular manner, the Electrical Inspectorate of the Power Development Department (PDD) has launched massive parallel training sessions across all dis-

tricts of J&K. The training programs are carefully structured so that each district is covered, ensuring that all linemen and contract workers engaged on the electrical system are trained with the basic safety practices, during this first phase.

This initiative marks a significant step toward institutionalized capacity building, aimed at improving operational efficiency and prioritizing safety, aligning with the department's future plan of establishing dedicated Power Training Institute for all power



employees across J&K.

The said training sessions, which commenced last month, are currently in progress and so far, 780 linemen have been trained through a combination of theoretical sessions and hands-on demonstrations, with a special focus on use of safety gears and other essential workplace precautions. These sessions have so far been conducted in the districts of Budgam, Srinagar, Pulwama, Shopian, Bandipora, Jammu, Kathua,

while the remaining districts are scheduled for the coming weeks.

Considering human safety a top priority, line staff have also been instructed to raise awareness among the general public regarding electrical hazards—particularly those arising from weather vagaries such as snapped wires or infrastructure damage caused by flash floods. A general safety advisory, along with detailed Do's and Don'ts, has been clearly

He also encouraged the young students to learn new languages, broaden perspectives and drive innovation.

The Lieutenant Governor commended the NIT Srinagar for establishing the Official Language Cell and organising numerous activities for promotion of Hindi language.

On the occasion, the Lieutenant Governor felicitated writers, scholars, and researchers for their important contribution to the promotion of diverse languag-

### Industrial Growth.....

Calling for a review of the land policy in industrial estates, Omar Abdullah stressed on ensuring early allotment of land to Units which have deposited premium but their proposals for land transfer remain in limbo. CM gave directions for early completion of 46 new Industrial Estates and to take up development of existing industrial estates to ensure judicious and productive use of industrial land.

On improving the business climate, the Chief Minister urged the department to explore what J&K can itself do to enhance the Ease of Doing Business, beyond national benchmarks. He further instructed officials to design policies that attract new industries in the wake of new GST rate slabs announced by Central Government, with a clear differentiation of how J&K can uniquely position itself compared to neighboring states.

To ensure stronger policy implementation, Omar Abdullah asked the department to seek structured feedback from new industries that have applied under Single Window Clearance or begun operations under the SWC system, so that operational gaps can be identified and addressed.

With regard to GI certification of crafts, the Chief Minister called for augmenting GI certification testing facilities so that dealers do not suffer due to limited capacity of Handicrafts department, cautioning that without adequate systems in place, the very purpose of GI tagging would be undermined.

"Industrial development in J&K must not only attract investment but also ensure it translates into jobs, livelihoods, and sustainable growth for our youth and artisans," Omar Abdullah said.

Earlier, Commissioner Secretary Industries & Commerce Vikramjit Singh made a detailed presentation highlighting the department's progress.

He informed that investment realization in J&K during FY 2024-25 has reached ₹4145 crore, nearly 10 times higher than the pre-2021 average, while the current fiscal (up to August 2025) has already seen ₹4001 crore worth of projects grounded, generating 5,111 jobs in the formal industrial sector. For the first time, multiple units with investment exceeding ₹500 crore have been set up across sectors such as metals, plastics, pharmaceuticals, textiles, and food processing.

The presentation further revealed that MSMEs contribute 8% to J&K's GDP and employ over 10.88 lakh people, including 15% women. Initiatives such as the MSME Health Clinic, Udyam registration drives across 4914 blocks, and capacity-building programmes under the RAMP scheme have been launched to support this backbone of the economy.

On the startup ecosystem, Singh informed that registrations have surged from just 69 in 2020 to 1,127 in 2025, with a marked shift towards technology and service-based ventures. The meeting was informed that J&K is also set to host a Startup Summit in collaboration with Startup India, MEITY, and SIDBI in October this year in Srinagar.

The meeting was also informed that 4.39 lakh artisans are registered across J&K, with exports more than doubling to ₹1163 crore in 2023-24. Srinagar has been designated as a World Crafts City by the World Crafts Council and recognized by UNESCO under its Creative Cities Network. A QR-based certification mechanism for craft products, the first of its kind globally, has also been introduced.

The review meeting was attended by Deputy Chief Minister Surinder Kumar Choudhary, who is also Minister Incharge Industries & Commerce, Advisor to the CM Nasir Aslam Wani, Chief Secretary Atal Dulloo, Additional Chief Secretary to the CM Dheeraj Gupta, Heads of the Departments of Industries & Commerce and other senior officers.

EVM ballot papers under Rule 49B of the Conduct of Elections Rules, 1961.

The upgraded ballot papers will debut in the upcoming Bihar elections and will feature colour photographs of candidates for the first time. According to the new format, each candidate's face will occupy three-fourths of the allotted photo space to ensure better visibility for voters.

The ECI has also decided to make serial numbers more prominent. They will now be displayed in bold, size 30 font, using the international form of Indian numerals. Names of all candidates, including the NOTA option, will be printed in the same font style and size for uniformity.

The ballot papers will be printed on 70 GSM paper. For Assembly elections, they will use a pink shade of specified RGB values for easy distinction.

This initiative is part of 28 measures introduced by the Commission in the past six months to simplify processes and enhance voter convenience.

"The changes will significantly improve the clarity and readability of ballot papers, ensuring that every voter can make an informed and confident choice," an ECI official said. (KINS)

the 2019 Lok Sabha elections, the 2024 Lok Sabha elections, or the 2024 Assembly polls-the three electoral exercises conducted by the Election Commission since 2019 in J&K.

The parties identified by the Commission include: Backward Classes Democratic Party, Duggar Pradesh Party, Front of Revolutionised Creative Efforts, Jammu & Kashmir Peoples Party (Secular), Kashmir Development Front, Jammu & Kashmir National Democratic Front, Nature Mankind Friendly Global Party, Jammu & Kashmir Save Party, Secular Party of India, Jammu State Morcha (Progressive), Social Movement Party, and Secular Party of

Although many of the delisted parties were relatively obscure, three were either founded by prominent political figures or rooted in significant causes.

Jammu State Morcha was formed on the eve of 2002 Assembly elections to advocate for a separate state for Jammu.

The Jammu & Kashmir National Democratic Front was headed by Abdur Rashid Kabuli, who won on a Janata Party ticket in 1977 from the Eidgah segment of Srinagar. Kabuli was supported by the Awami Action Committee, which was declared an unlawful association by the Central Government in 2025.

The Nature Mankind Friendly Global Party is led by Babu Singh, a former minister in the PDP-Congress government. He was arrested in a Hawla case in 2022-

also stressed on the need to phase out obsolete courses that do not contribute meaningfully to patient care, and to introduce new courses aligned with emerging healthcare needs.

Highlighting the crucial role of quality teaching, he underscored that only well-qualified faculty should be engaged in these institutions. He called for framing Recruitment Rules for Nursing Colleges, filling up vacancies through recruitment agencies, and creating posts wherever required to ensure that standards of teaching and training remain uncompromised.

Reviewing the functioning of the recently established J&K State Allied & Healthcare Council (SA&HC), the Chief Secretary directed that it be further strengthened with adequate manpower and robust monitoring mechanisms, in line with the National Commission for Allied & Healthcare Professions (NCAHP) guidelines and checklists for institutional

readiness. The Secretary, H&ME, Dr. Syed Abid Rashid Shah, while presenting an overview, informed that significant progress has been achieved in nursing education. Over the past year, 360 new B.Sc Nursing seats, 80 Post Basic B.Sc Nursing seats, and 25 M.Sc Nursing seats have been added across colleges in the UT. From the next academic session, Nursing College Jammu will also offer 60 additional Post Basic B.Sc Nursing seats, he added.

It was further revealed that J&K presently has around 50 Nursing Colleges with a total intake capacity of 3,040 seats. In addition, 8 institutions are offering 233 M.Sc Nursing seats, 14 institutions 805 Post Basic B.Sc Nursing seats, while dozens of institutes collectively cater to more than 5,600 GNM, 5,200 FMPHW, and 2,300 MMPHW students across the UT.

Registrar, J&K Nursing Council, Dr. Sandeep Singh, apprised that examinations for 14,738 candidates in paramedical courses had been successfully conducted. He also reported recognition of 28 new Pharmacy institutions with an intake of 1,800 seats in Diploma in Pharmacy, which is now a mandatory qualification for obtaining drug licenses.

Chairperson, J&K A&HCC, Dr.Sabhiya Majid, elaborated on the mandate of the NCAHP Act, 2021, which came into force as per the Hon'ble Supreme Court's directions. She explained that the NCAHP and State Councils are responsible for regulation and maintenance of standards in allied and healthcare education and services, assessment of institutions, maintaining central and state registers of professionals, and fostering research and adoption of latest scientific advancements.

She further elucidated that presently, 10 recognized categories spanning 57 professions fall under its ambit, with the scope set to expand in order to uphold the quality, dignity, and recognition of allied healthcare professionals nationwide.

Reiterating the government's commitment, the Chief Secretary emphasized that strengthening nursing education and allied healthcare systems is pivotal for enhancing patient care, meeting the growing healthcare demands, and creating a skilled workforce to serve the people of J&K.

welfare of the people. "There is no dual government, but there are two brothers - one elder and one younger," Raina told reporters during his visit to Asia's second-largest fruit mandi in

"The LG wishes for the betterment of the people of Jammu and Kashmir, and so does the elected government led by Omar Abdullah. Both the brothers are working together and when they do, the betterment efforts become stronger," he said.

On Chief Minister Omar Abdullah's remarks that he has "nothing in his hand," be it road or security, Raina said, "Omar sahib might have made this statement out of anger. The concerned minister and NHAI are ensuring restoration on a war footing. Yes, steps taken a few days ago should have been initiated 20 days earlier."

The BJP leader said that in the last 24 hours alone, over 10,000 fruit-laden trucks had crossed Jammu and the pace would increase further in the coming days. "Hopefully, within the next 10 days, packed apples will be transported to different parts of the country," he assured.

Raina admitted that apple growers and traders suffered huge losses due to prolonged highway blockages caused by heavy rains and landslides. "The mandi leadership has put forth their demands, including priority for the national highway. I have witnessed lakhs of apple boxes ready for transportation. These issues will be taken up with the government, including the LG and if required, I will take up them with Home Minister Amit Shah."

Reiterating the central government's resolve, Raina said both Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Home Minister Amit Shah have consistently assured that the people of Jammu and Kashmir will not be allowed to face hardships. "A special cargo train was mobilised earlier and if required, more such measures will be taken. Whatever possible efforts the Centre has to undertake, they will, to ensure smooth transportation and ease the pain of people," he said.

Raina said that both essential supplies and apple transportation were moving smoothly again. "The last few days were tough, but now the weather is favourable, transportation is moving and the efforts will continue. Whatever the issues are, we will ensure their early redressal," he added. (KNO)

crucial for J&K, not for the government, but for the people whose livelihoods and opportunities have been affected.

'Today, outsiders are getting jobs, while locals are pushed aside," he said, vowing to continue the fight against those responsible for the removal of Article 370 and the downgrading of the state into a Union Territory.

About the National Highway closure and subsequent losses to the fruit growers, the Dy CM said the growers never faced losses when J&K was a state, but today the highway remained closed for a longer period, causing extensive losses to the growers. "Unfortunately, the Lieutenant Governor didn't utter even a single word on it," he said.

Choudhary said those responsible for the state's downgrading have met the LG, but not the elected Chief Minister Omar Abdullah, who was elected by the people.

"The PDP leader (Iltija Mufti) needs to clarify why she met the LG instead of the elected government. The LG's tenure has already ended, and she did so despite claiming that nothing is in his hands," he said.

He said the biggest issue at present was the restoration of the identity snatched from the J&K people. "If anyone is responsible for this, it is PDP," he said.

The Deputy Chief Minister said the elected government in Jammu and Kashmir has done whatever was under its domain, following the recent floods triggered by heavy rainfall.

"The Chief Minister visited almost every area affected by the floods, and the government has extended every possible support under its domain. J&K doesn't want any healing, but wants compensation for those affected by the floods," Choudhary said. "It is the Centre that has to provide compensation."—(KNO)

to survey the flood affected areas. The state administration is compiling its assessment reports, which will be sent to the Centre for final evaluation and decision-making.'

After his visit to Badyal Brahmana, the Minister returned to Jammu city and chaired a review meeting with the J&K government.

Later, he addressed the media and announced a slew of relief measures. Chouhan announced that one instalment under PM-Kisan would be released immediately to the farmers affected by the floods in the Union Territory. "In flood-hit areas, workers will get an additional 50 man-days under MGNREGA," he said, raising the total from 100 to 150 man-days," he said.

The Union Minister also announced compensation for farmers who lost domestic animals due to the flood. As per the Jammu and Kashmir administration's preliminary data, approximately 5,000 houses have been damaged. "We will provide Rs 1,30,000 under the Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana for rebuilding each house. Each will include a separate toilet," he said.

Addressing losses faced by local Self Help Groups, Chouhan said Rs 76,000 crore will be released to support them.

He said that the sand deposited in fields by floodwaters should be retained by the farmers for personal use, and suggested that the Jammu and Kashmir Mining Department relax regulations to allow this.

"The Jammu and Kashmir Government currently has Rs 2,499 crore available under the disaster management fund. These funds will be used for immediate relief and rehabilitation. He added that if the need arises, the Centre will provide additional support," he said, adding, "Damaged irrigation canals and embankments will also be repaired in coordination with the Centre."-(KNO)

'Operation Sindoor'." Pertinently, the operation was launched to avenge the Pahalgam terror attack that left 26 civilians dead. Indian armed forces destroyed the headquarters of terror outfits deep inside Pakistan and Pakistan occupied Kashmir (PoK). The skirmishes between the two countries continued till May 10. Indian forces hit 13 military and airbase targets and eliminated over 100 terrorists at nine separate locations. The hostilities ended after Pakistan Director **General of Military Operations** (DGMO) called his Indian counterpart and requested for a ceasefire.

Singh said, "The Pahalgam terror attack pushed the entire nation into mourning but did not weaken the country's will to act. The leadership decided that those responsible must face consequences that would be remembered by one and all."

Singh said, "Operation Sindoor reflects a broader shift in the country's approach towards national security. India's growing focus is on modernising its defence infrastructure, improving training, and equipping the forces to deal with any challenge. This preparedness is intended to prevent resource constraints during future operations."

He said the response to the Pahalgam terror attack demonstrated that India decides its own course through action and preparation. "The retaliation proved that the country's armed forces operate with a sense of duty that places national sovereignty above all else," Singh added.

The Defence Minister recalled the 1965 conflict with Pakistan. "India at the time was facing uncertainty but managed to withstand the pressure. The leadership under then Prime Minister Lal Bahadur Shastri provided clarity and direction during a difficult phase and kept national morale

He said, "Wars are not won only through armed confrontation, but through unified national effort. The events of 1965 exhibited how collective decisions and unity among citizens contributed to the country's ability to overcome military threats." The Defence Minister said that the government continues to pay attention towards the needs of serving soldiers, ex-servicemen, and the families of those who lost their lives

communicated during the training to ensure electrical safety not only for humans but also for animals across the UT.

The entire schedule has been prepared under the guidance of Principal Secretary, PDD, H. Rajesh Prasad, who reiterated that human safety must always remain a top priority. He firmly underscored the importance of adhering strictly to SOPs, with no tolerance for shortcuts during work execution. He further stated that regular monthly reviews on safety compliance will be conducted by each corporations and detailed reports in this regard will be submitted to the department for monitoring purpose.

Highlighting the challenges faced by linemen in J&K, he mentioned that these linemen operate in challenging environments, including harsh weather conditions, snow-bound areas, and tough mountainous terrains often during emergencies and time-constrained situations. The recent restoration of power in record time during the incessant rains in Jammu stands as a testament to their commitment and resilience. Such a dedicated workforce must be provided with specialized trainings and adequate facilities to enable expeditious restoration of the system in difficult terrains while ensuring that their safety remains uncompromised.

The training sessions were organized and conducted by officers of the Electrical Inspectorate. The master trainers for the training sessions were Er. Anil Abrol in Jammu, and Er. Manzoor Ahmad& Er. Every effort is being made to make the training programs interactive, ensuring that feedback from departmental personnel is incorporated into future sessions.

To motivate consistent adherence to safety standards, it was announced that the best linemen who diligently follow safety practices in the field would be formally recognized and felicitated, thereby promoting a culture of safety consciousness across the region.

The main topics covered in the sessions were general safety practices in electrical works, existing Standard Operating Procedures, accident prevention measures, guarding and clearances, safe handling of electric supply lines and apparatus, earthing methods, CPR procedures during electrical emergencies, and the use of workman safety devices and appliances.



# CS reviews inter-departmental action plan to strengthen food safety in J&K

Flying Squads to conduct surprise checks on high-risk products

SRINAGAR, SEP 19: In a significant step aimed at safeguarding public health and ensuring the availability of safe and quality food products, Chief Secretary, Atal Dulloo today chaired an interdepartmental coordination meeting to review the comprehensive action plan on food safety across the Union Territory.

The review comes in the backdrop of recent seizures of substandard meat and dairy products in different parts of the UT, raising serious concerns over food adulteration and public safety.

The meeting was attended by Commissioner Secretary, FCS&CA; Commissioner Secretary, H&UDD; Secretary, H&ME; Divisional Commissioner, Jammu/Kashmir; Secretary, Law; Commissioner, FSD; Director, FCS&CA, Jammu/Kashmir; DG, Budget; DirectorHealth, Jammu/Kashmir besides other senior officers.

During the deliberations, the Chief Secretary directed the Food and Civil Supplies Department to take stringent action against unlabelled and non-standard packaged food items, particularly imported products that fail to specify ingre-



dients and product details, terming such practices as blatant violations

He took a detailed appraisal of the action plan prepared by the Food Safety Wing in collaboration with key departments, including Housing & Urban Development, Agriculture, Animal Husbandry, and District Administration. The plan lays out both immediate and long-term measures to eradicate the entry of substandard food items into J&K and ensure strict compliance with food safety norms.

Key Features of the Action Plan, as laid out by the Commissioner, DFCO constitutes formation of joint inspection teams and flying squads for surprise checks, particularly targeting high-risk sectors such as meat, milk, and bakery products. It also envisages accomplishing district-wise mapping of food businesses, including primary producers, processors, and vendors, to enable targeted inspections.

One more feature of this robust action plan is the strengthening of infrastructure & surveillance. It involves establishment of checkpoints and cold-chain facilities at toll plazas, entry points, and major transport routes for high-risk food consignments. Besides strict monitoring of consignments from outside states to prevent import of substandard products.

Random scanning of courier services was also deliberated upon, and it was decided that special nakas shall be established at all entry points of the district to prevent transport of drugs through courier services.

The meeting also reviewed the functioning of the Drug De-addiction Centre, and the Chief Medical Officer briefed the chair about its status.

Furthermore, DC took stock of the ongoing wild cannabis destruction drives, status of Nasha Mukt Panchayats, implementation of computerized billing systems by chemists, and installation of CCTV cameras in medical shops.

A team comprising officers from the Food Safety Department, Legal Metrology, FCS&CA, Animal Husbandry, Sheep Husbandry, Municipality and Sales Tax Department inspected around 20 meat shops, dhabas selling cooked meat and other allied estab $lish ments. \, The \, purpose \, of \, the \, in spection \, was \, to \, check$ the quality, hygiene standards and compliance with the legal provisions of different departments. Encouragingly, no rotten meat or unsafe food items were found during the inspection.

However, to further strengthen food safety practices, 12 improvement notices were served to meat sellers for compliance with hygiene and regulatory parameters.

The Legal Metrology Department imposed a penalty of 5,000 for violation of LMD norms, while the FCS&CA Department levied a fine of 800 against those using domestic LPG cylinders for commercial



The District Administration has reiterated its commitment to ensuring safe, hygienic and quality food for the public. Regular inspections will continue in the coming days and strict action will be taken against violators to protect the health and rights of consumers in Doda.

In today's world, success is often measured in salaries, titles, and possessions. Yet, in the rush to put a price tag on every contribution, we have quietly devalued one of humanity's most essential roles — the nurturing heart of a woman. Once regarded as the foundation of families and societies, it is now often dismissed simply because it does not appear on an income statement.

Many now see nurturing as a secondary or lesser role, assuming that real power lies only outside the home. One of the most damaging misconceptions is the belief that nurturing – especially within the home — is somehow inferior, outdated, or limiting to a woman's potential. This misunderstanding has been fueled by cultural shifts, economic pressures, Westernisation, and distorted definitions of success.

Modern society tends to measure a person's worth almost exclusively in economic terms — how much they earn, what professional title they hold, or how publicly visible their work is. While this may seem reasonable in some contexts, it overlooks the value of a woman's nurturing responsibilities, which rarely generate direct income or public recognition.

This perspective ignores a deeper truth: the emotional, moral, and spiritual shaping of future generations — much of which takes place in the home – often has far greater long-term impact than many celebrated public achievements. While the rise of workplace opportunities for women is a welcome development, it has also brought unintended consequences: the assumption that choosing to focus on the home is a waste of talent or education.

A woman who chooses to be a full-time mother or homemaker is often met with pity or judgement, as though she has "settled" for less. In reality, such a decision can be intentional, rooted in faith, purpose, and a clear understanding of true value. Historically, the home was recognised as the central institution of civilisation, and the one who managed it held dignity and influence. Today, media and pop culture often portray domestic life as unambitious or even oppressive, eroding the younger generation's



respect for homemaking and parenting.

#### The Consequences of Neglecting Nurturing 1. Emotional Disconnection Within the Family

Children thrive on emotional availability. When a mother's presence is reduced to short conversations, hurried meals, and brief routines, children may feel unseen and undervalued. Over time, this can lead to withdrawal, behavioural problems, and vulnerability to negative influences.

Nurturing requires more than physical presence — it calls for active engagement, listening, noticing moods, and guiding children through moral challenges. Emotional intimacy in marriage also needs time and care; when professional demands consume a woman's energy, her spouse may feel emotionally abandoned, creating distance and tension.

A mother is often the first and most consistent moral teacher in a child's life. In her absence, children may turn to peers, media, or online influencers for guidance. Such influences are rarely aligned with the family's values, leading to beliefs and behaviours that clash with their upbringing.

#### 2. Increased Dependence on Outsiders for **Parenting**

As both parents in modern families immerse themselves in careers, traditional nurturing roles are increasingly outsourced to daycare centres, nannies, boarding schools, or relatives. While

sometimes necessary, this arrangement can carry long-term consequences for a child's emotional, psychological, and moral growth.

No matter how capable, external caregivers cannot fully replace a parent's influence. Over time, children may bond more closely with caregivers than with their own parents, weakening natural family connections.

When the home becomes just a place to sleep instead of a centre of love and moral grounding, children may form stronger attachments to outsiders. As this pattern continues, parents may feel less responsible for active involvement, further widening the emotional gap.

#### MESSAGE:

When a woman negates her nurturing role whether intentionally or unintentionally, the loss is not just personal, it is generational. Professional achievements may earn salaries and organisation, but the shaping of hearts within the home is an eternal investment. Careers will eventually end, but the influence and mother has on our family will echo through generations...

# Black Pottery is a Treasured Heritage in Ukhrul Manipur

In Indian myth, "Nagarjuna" refers to two distinct figures: the hero Nagarjuna, the son of the Pandava Arjuna and Naga princess Ulupi, a character featured in the Oriya tradition of the Mahabharata who is honored with a special festival at the Puri Jagannath temple. The other Nagarjuna is the famous Buddhist philosopher and Acharya, a medieval figure who developed the Madhyamaka school of Buddhism and was known for his profound understanding of 'emptiness' (sunyata)! The man from Ukhrul:

Machihan Sasa is a renowned master craftsman from Longpi Kajui, Ukhrul, Manipur, recognized for his mastery of the ancient art of Longpi pottery. Awarded the prestigious Padma Shri in 2024 for his contributions to art and culture, he is credited with preserving and reviving this unique handmoulded black pottery, which uses serpentine stone and brown clay without a wheel and is known to enhance food flavor.

Sasa has trained hundreds of villagers in this tradition, creating a sustainable livelihood and ensuring the art form's transmission to future generations.

Artistic Legacy: He has dedicated over five decades to Longpi pottery, an ancient craft rooted in the Neolithic period.

Padma Shri Award: He received the Padma Shri in 2024 for his exceptional dedication to preserving and promoting the Longpi pottery tradition.

Unique Craft: Longpi pottery is a rare, black clay pottery made without a potter's wheel, using a special combination of black serpentine stone and brown clay.

Cultural Preservation: Sasa has been instrumental in training over 300 individuals, ensuring the survival of this unique cultural heritage and creating a sustainable income source for the villagers.

Village Origin: He hails from the village of Longpi Kajui in the Ukhrul district of Manipur.

The alchemists: The Hero Nagarjuna (Mahabharata Folklore)

He is the son of the Pandava hero Arjuna and the Naga princess Ulupi. Oriya Mahabharata, his story appears in the Oriya version of the Mahabharata by Sarala Dasa, where he is a mighty warrior. The deity Jagannath is sometimes depicted as this heroic Nagarjuna, a tradition known as the Nagarjuna Besha, which features a warrior's cos-

The story continues further: India's "Eastern Alchemist," a title referring to the most prominent figure in ancient Indian alchemy, is Nagarjuna (also spelled Nagarjunacharya). He was a scholar and monk known for his extensive laboratory experiments in alchemy and metallurgy, documented in texts like the Rasaratnakara. Nagarjuna is credited with developing methods for transmuting base metals into gold and creating gold-like alloys, a process whose technology is still used for imitation jewelry today.

Key contributions of Nagarjuna: Transmutation of Metals:

He developed methods to convert base metals into gold, though the "gold" was a substance that looked and shone like gold.

Metallurgy: He conducted extensive experiments in metallurgy, laying the groundwork for creating alloys and purifying metals. "Gold-Shine Mechanism": His techniques for

creating a golden luster are still used in the jewelry industry to make imitation gold. Documentation: He wrote important texts on

alchemy and metallurgy, such as the Rasaratnakara, providing detailed instructions for various processes.

Scientific Legacy: 10th-11th century historian Al Beruni recognized Nagarjuna as a "famous representative" of Indian Alchemy.

**Black Pottery:** 

While the Longpi black pottery tradition of the Tangkhul Naga community in Manipuris centuries old and has no single documented founder, the modern revival and promotion of the craft can be largely attributed to Machihan Sasa. Sasa, a recipient of national and state awards and the Padma Shri, dedicated his life to preserving the art, training villagers, and popularizing Longpi pottery through national and international plat-

Ancient Craft: The origins of Longpi black pottery are ancient, tied to the Tangkhul Naga community and with no single founder.

Machihan Sasa's Role: He is recognized as a pivotal figure in the modern era for his efforts in reviving and sustaining the craft, teaching it to his villagers, and gaining national recognition.

A Family Tradition: Machihan Sasa learned the art from his father, Kuishim Sasa, and passed it on to his son, Mathew Sasa, ensuring its continuity.

Community-Based:Traditionally, it was a communal activity among the Tangkhul Naga people, and Sasa's work brought it back to the forefront of the village's economy.

Nungbi Kajui: Machihan Sasa hails from the Nungbi Kajui village in Ukhrul district, which is one of the villages where the craft originates.

Black pottery is a durable, dark-hued ceramic made from clay mixed with iron-rich materials or black serpentine stone, then shaped, dried, and fired at high temperatures, often using a unique reduction firing process that results in its distinctive color and dense, non-porous substance. It is a traditional craft found in various cultures, such as in Manipur, India, where Longpi black pottery is a treasured heritage, and in Nizamabad, India, known for its own distinct style.

Key Characteristics: Dark Color: The deep black color is achieved through specific clay compositions and firing techniques, including reduction firing in which the absence of oxygen in the kiln creates a black, non-porous surface.

Material Composition: It is made from finegrained clay mixed with ingredients like iron-rich materials or serpentine stone, giving the finished product a rich iron content.

Durability: The high-temperature firing and dense, non-porous nature of the pottery make it strong, durable, and often suitable for cooking and servina

Handmade Craft: Many forms of black pottery, such as those from Manipur, are entirely handmade without the use of a potter's wheel, highlighting the artisanal skill involved.

Manipur's black pottery, specifically the Long-

pi black pottery, is a traditional handicraft from the Tangkhul Naga community in the Longpi villages near the Ukhrul district. It is handmade from a mixture of black serpentinite stone and brown clay, then shaped, polished with a local tree leaf, and finally fired in a bonfire. This durable and ecofriendly pottery is valued for its unique natural finish, rich iron content, and ability to keep food warm and cook faster than conventional vessels.

And this is what Assam Rifles are doing in Ukhrul:

Black pottery, locally known as Longpi Hampai, is one of the most distinctive crafts of Ukhrul district in Manipur. Rooted in the Tangkhul Naga tradition, this art form dates back to the Neolithic era, around 10,000 BC. The pottery is crafted without a wheel, using a unique blend of black serpentine stone and special brown clay found only in Longpi and neighbouring villages such as Longpi Kajui, Longpi Khullen, and Nungbi. Each piece is hand-shaped and fired in open flames, making it both ecofriendly and durable.

Apart from its striking aesthetic, black pottery is valued for its culinary benefits-it retains heat, enhances flavor, and has natural non-stick qualities. Traditionally, it held ritual and social importance, being used in weddings, festivals, and as household heirlooms. Today, it has gained recognition in interior décor, luxury dining, and global handicraft markets, with rising demand in India and abroad.

The Government of India has taken steps to support this craft by promoting it under One District One Product (ODOP) and launching projects to improve artisan training, marketing, and e-commerce reach.

For the Assam Rifles and defence families, supporting black pottery is more than cultural appreciation -it is nation-building. By preserving this heritage, they strengthen local livelihoods, foster pride, and safeguard an art form that is both ancient and timeless.

# Pancreatic Cancer: Cigarette Smoke May Fuel Tumor Growth and Spread

A new study has shed light on how cigarette smoking can worsen pancreatic cancer. It has long been understood that there was a link between smoking and pancreatic cancer, but the exact mechanism was unclear.

Now, a group of scientists has discovered that certain chemicals in cigarette smoke actually reprogram the immune system in a way that helps tumors grow and spread. This could point to new treatment strategies for pancreatic cancer, which currently has very few options.

According to the authors, their findings are significant because pancreatic cancer is one of the deadliest types of cancer, with only a five-year survival rate of 13%. The full results of the study were published on September 4 in Cancer Discovery. The Hirshberg Foundation for Pancreatic Cancer Research adds further context, noting that it is the third leading cause of cancer-related death in the United States. In 2025 alone, it is estimated that more than 67,000 Americans will be diagnosed with pancreatic cancer, and nearly 52,000 will die from it.

Effects of smoking on pancreatic

The research, carried out by a team at the University of Michigan, combined lab experiments, mouse models, and human tissue samples.

They focused on a group of chemicals in cigarette smoke called aryl hydrocarbon receptor ligands (AhRLs).

These include well-known carcinogens such as dioxins. To mimic smoking, mice were treated with cigarette smoke extract or with 2,3,7,8-tetrachlorodibenzo-pdioxin (TCDD), a powerful AhR ligand.

The researchers then implanted pancreatic cancer cells directly into the animals' pancreases to track tumor growth.

They also used genetically engineered mice to tease apart how different immune cells responded to these smoke-related chemicals. Finally, they compared the mouse findings to human pancreas tissue from organ donors and cancer patients.

The results were striking. Both cigarette smoke and TCDD accelerated pancreatic tumor growth in mice — but only if their immune system was intact. That means the chemicals weren't damaging tumor cells directly. Instead, they were altering the immune response.

The key player was a receptor called AhR on CD4+ T cells. Once activated, these cells began producing more of a molecule called IL-22 and also boosted the number of regulatory T cells (Tregs).

Normally, Tregs keep the immune system in check. But in this case, they prevented CD8+ T cells — the ones that

usually attack cancer — from doing their job. In other words, smoking tipped the balance of the immune system away from fighting tumors and toward letting them grow. The team also saw that exposure to TCDD promoted early precancerous changes in the pancreas, suggesting that chemicals in cigarette smoke may play a role not just in cancer progression but also in its initiation.

Human tissue samples told a similar story. Smokers had more activation of the AhR pathway, and pancreatic tumors from smoking patients contained more Tregs. The number of these suppressive cells also tracked with how much the patient had smoked over their lifetime.

Y Future treatments for pancreatic cancer

According to the authors, what they have learned could potentially lead to new treatments that block AhR activation or reduce the suppressive effect of Tregs.

This could help the immune system mount a stronger anti-cancer response,

They additionally note that, since AhR ligands are also found in pollutants and industrial chemicals, the findings may carry wider public health significance. However, Asfar Azmi, PhD, director of the Pancreatic Cancer Research Initiative at the Barbara Ann Karmanos Cancer Institute, who was not involved in the study, urges caution in interpreting what the findings mean.

"Although this research represents an important step forward, it's still early," Azmi said, adding that much of the evidence comes from labs, animal studies, and findings from human tissues.

"That means the results show a mechanism linking smoking and pancreatic cancer, but they don't prove that every smoker will develop this cancer, or that blocking this pathway will automatically prevent it," he told Healthline. Azmi noted that more clinical research is necessary before these findings will actually change doctors' practices regarding the treatment of pancreatic cancer.

Quitting smoking lowers

pancreatic cancer risk Najeeb al Hallak, MD, MS, a medical oncologist with the Barbara Ann Karmanos Cancer Institute, said that "the message is clear that quitting smoking is one of the most important steps people can take to lower their risk of pancreatic can-

cer." al Hallak wasn't involved in the study. He further pointed out that smoking cessation may help reduce people's risk of many other cancers, as well as heart and lung diseases.

"Even reducing exposure helps," al Hallak told Healthline, "but the greatest benefit comes from complete cessation."

If you are a heavy smoker, al Hallak recommended speaking with your doctor about pancreatic cancer risk and whether you qualify for specialized monitoring or risk-reduction programs.

He also acknowledged the difficulties of smoking cessation, offering smokers some encouraging words. "Quitting is hard, but it is absolutely possible, and thousands succeed every day," he said.

The first step in quitting? Speak with your personal physician. "They can guide you to nicotine replacement (patches, gum, or lozenges) or medications that reduce cravings," al Hallak said.

Finally, al Hallak added that seeking support is essential. "Counseling, support groups, and quit lines (e.g., 1-800-QUIT-NOW) double your chances of success," he said. Additionally, al Hallak suggests planning for your triggers. For example, if you are accustomed to smoking after meals or with coffee, create a healthier alternative that you can do instead.

Finally, he urged that you don't give up after slips. "Many people need several tries before quitting for good," al Hallak said. "Each attempt builds skills for the next."

The CPO presented a detailed overview of progress under the District Capex Budget 2025-26 through a PowerPoint presentation.



The meeting reviewed the number of works sanctioned, tendered, allotted, and taken up for execution. # India ignores EU criticism of its participation in Zapad exercise with Russia

**NEW DELHI. SEP 19:** Amid the EU's criticism of India's participation in the Zapad exercise with Russia, the MEA said today that several other countries, including NATO members such as the US, Turkiye and Hungary have also participated in the exercises as observers.

The Ministry of External Affairs spokesperson Randhir Jaiswal said at a briefing today: "As regards the objectives and details of our participation in the ZAPAD exercise in Russia, I would refer you Ministry of Defence

press release dated 09 September 2025. I would also like to point out that several other countries, including NATO members, such as US, Turkiye and Hungary, are also participating in the exercise as observers.'

On September 17, EU Foreign Policy chief Kaja Kallas said that Brussels is using a "carrot and stick" approach with India and expects New Delhi to make certain choices that align with the EU's vision of a rules-based international order.

Kallas expressed particular concern over India's participa-

### **ED** intensifies probe into Andhra Pradesh liquor scam, seizes incriminating evidence

NEW DELHI, SEP 19: The Enforcement Directorate (ED) announced on Friday that its Hyderabad Zonal Office recently conducted search operations at twenty locations across Hyderabad, Bengaluru, Chennai, Thanjavur, Surat, Raipur, Delhi NCR, and Andhra Pradesh. These searches are part of an ongoing money laundering case (PMLA) related to the Andhra Pradesh liquor scam.

The operations targeted the premises of entities and individuals alleged to have facilitated kickback payments through bogus and inflated transactions. The searches resulted in the recovery and seizure of incriminating material that provides evidence of these fake transactions, which were used to generate and move Proceeds of Crime (POC).

Items seized included bogus invoices and transport challans containing details of non-existent vehicles, parallel invoices showing differential and inflated prices, and chat messages evidencing the involvement of certain accused individuals who are absconding and believed to be in Dubai.

The chats also detailed the transfer of POC to them. Unaccounted cash amounting to Rs. 38 lakh was seized from one location, along with ledgers indicating the remittance of POC worth several

The ED initiated its investigation based on an FIR registered by the Andhra Pradesh CID under various sections of the IPC, concerning an estimated loss to the government exchequer of Rs. 4,000 crore. On February 5, 2025, the A.P. Government constituted  $a \, Special \, Investigation \, Team \, (SIT) \, to \, investigate \, the$ 

The FIR alleged that under the 'new liquor policy' in effect from October 2019 to March 2024, the accused engaged in 'brand killing and new brand promotion.'This involved sidelining popular liquor brands (such as McDowell's, Royal Stag, and Imperial Blue) that refused to pay kickbacks, while promoting new or spurious brands in exchange for substantial payments from distilleries and suppliers. The shift from an automated procurement system to a manual one created opportunities for manipulation in the Orders for Supply (OFS)

The SIT has filed a chargesheet and supplementary chargesheets alleging: The replacement of the automated system with

manual approvals to manipulate brand-wise indenting and supply volumes.

Favoring a select group of distilleries and market-

Coercing suppliers into paying 15–20% of their invoice value as kickbacks, under threat of having their brands suppressed or delisted.

Creating shell distilleries to channel funds and secure inflated OFS volumes.

Appointing key officials who facilitated brand approvals, manipulated eligibility norms, and suppressed dissenting suppliers.

The chargesheets further allege that kickbacks, generated through procurement manipulation and fake vendor payments via shell companies, were used for election purposes, personal benefit, and transferring funds abroad.

The ED's investigation revealed that certain accused persons deliberately discouraged orders for established brands, withheld legitimate payments from distilleries, and pressured distilleries to make illicit payments in exchange for OFS. A money trail investigation uncovered that portions of payments from the Andhra Pradesh State Beverages Corporation Limited (APSBCL) to suppliers were funneled to various entities under the guise of supplying goods or services. These transactions were found to be bogus, with the recipients being either non-existent shell entities or unrelated persons. In cases where entities were legitimate, the transactions were inflated. Funds were also transferred by suppliers to jewellers to acquire gold or cash, which was then handed over to the accused as kickbacks. Thus, bogus and inflated transactions were used to siphon off funds under the cover of business, facilitating the generation

and movement of illicit kickbacks. Further investigation is ongoing. UNI

# Delhi Police bust inter-state module of radicalised people who incited youth through WhatsApp groups

NEW DELHI, SEP 19: Delhi Police Special Cell has busted an interstate module of radicalized individuals who were allegedly attempting to wage war against India by spreading through WhatsApp groups radical ideology and inciting youths to carry out jihad, targeted killings and violence against other communities.

Some arrested individuals, accused of plotting anti-India activities on the instructions of a Pakistan-based handler, were promoting videos of Islamic preachers through WhatsApp groups to incite youths in India, sources in the Special Cell of the Delhi Police told UNI.

The sources confirmed that Ashhar Danish and Kamran Qureshi were active on a WhatsApp group where videos of extremist preachers were being shared to radicalize young people.

During interrogation, police learned that Ashhar Danish had hidden potassium nitrate for making bullets in Ranchi. He had also experimented with chemicals to create a highly explosive substance, which he later destroyed. Police have now recovered one kilogram of potassium nitrate at his behest.

The Special Cell arrested Aaftab Nasir Qureshi (25), a resident of Kalyan (Mumbai); Sufiyan Abubakar Khan (20), a resident of Thane (Maharashtra); and Mohd. Huzaif Yaman alias Suleman alias Gouz (20), a resident of Nizamabad (Telangana), along with others. According to the Special Cell, all were part of an interstate module of radicalized individuals allegedly attempting to wage war against India by spreading radical ideology.

The first arrest in the case was made after the Special Cell received a tip-off that one or more



members of suspected radicalized social media groups, led by Ranchi resident Ashhar Danish, were attempting to buy weapons from Mewati gangs. Upon investigating this information, the

police learned that members of this module were active in several states.

The police identified that Aaftab Nasir Qureshi and Sufiyan Abubakar Khan were in Delhi. They were apprehended in front of 'Waste of Wonder Theme Park' near Sarai Kale Khan bus stand. Weapons, cartridges and two cell phones were recovered from

On September 10, the Special Cell conducted simultaneous raids in Ranchi, Bengaluru, Nizamabad, and Rajgarh, Madhya Pradesh. Ashhar Danish was arrested in Ranchi. He was reportedly receiving instructions from a Pakistan-based handler. Subsequently, the Special Cellarrested Kamran Qureshifrom Raigarh, MP. A highly placed source said Kamran and Danish  $met \, on \, a \, Whats App \, group \, where \,$ members shared videos of clerics  $to \, radicalize \, youths \, and \, promote$ extremist ideology.

Meanwhile, the Special Cell also arrested Mohammed Huzaif Yaman from Nizamabad, Telangana, on September 10. He was making weapons on the instructions of Ashhar Danish. UNI

### Japan's credit rating agency praises GST reforms, defies 50pc U.S. Tariffs and Trump's 'Dead Economy' Jibe

NEW DELHI, SEP 19: Japan's Rating and Investment Information Inc. (R&I) today applauded India's economic strength even as the country is currently facing a steep trade barrier of 50pc tariff imposed by the US.

The R&I raised India's long-term sovereign credit rating to 'BBB Positive' from 'BBB' with a 'Stable' economic outlook.

The upgrade comes weeks after the United States imposed 50 percent tariff on Indian goods and amid claims by some U.S. commentators that India is a "dead economy."

Earlier this year, in August, Donald Trump had called India "Dead Economy," expressing disappointment with India over buying cheap oil from Russia. Moreover. RBI Governor Sanjay Malhotra, countering the jibe by the US President said "Indian economy is doing very well and contributing more to global growth than US."

R&I said the U.S. move could have unsettled a smaller or export-dependent economy, but India's growth is powered largely by domestic demand and therefore insulated from the full impact.

Real GDP expanded 6.5 percent in FY2024, and the economy surged 7.8 percentyear-on-year in the April-June 2025 quarter, convincing analysts that the headline tariff risk will have only a "limited effect" on the outlook.

'Real GDP' is the Gross Domestic



providing a more accurate measure of economy's actual production and growth over time.

The agency also appraised decision to simplify the Goods and Services Tax (GST) as a key reform underpinning the upgrade. Beginning this month, the government will introduce a two-tier GST structure with lower rates, a change designed to boost private consumption.

Earlier in September, the 56th GST Council put key reforms on the table related to simplified tax structure, sector-wise GST rate cuts wherein majority of goods and services will attract tax of 5pc and 18pc, and administrative and compliance reforms.

Strong public finances and a stable external position added weight to the move. The central government's fiscal deficit narrowed to 4.8 percent of GDP in FY2024, with a target of 4.4

tral-state debt has fallen to around 80 percent of GDP, most of it held domestically, while the currentaccount deficit remains modest and foreign-exchange reserves are ample.

R&I credited the Modi administration's policies to attract foreign manufacturers, expand infrastructure, and reduce reliance on energy imports, noting that these steps, together with India's young population and rising incomes, should keep growth in the mid-6 percent range for years to come.

Welcoming the upgrade, the Finance Ministry said it reflected "global confidence in India's reform agenda and the resilience of its domestic economy, even amid heightened U.S. tariffs." The decision follows ear $lier upgrades \, by \, S\&P \, and \, Morning star$ DBRS, reinforcing the view that India is emerging as one of the world's most robust large economies despite a Product (GDP) adjusted for inflation, percent for FY2025. ### France-Israel Rift Over **Palestine Recognition**

PARIS/JERUSALEM, SEP 19: France is bracing for a diplomatic and political fallout with Israel after President Emmanuel Macron's decision to formally recognise Palestinian statehood at the United Nations General Assembly on Monday — a move that has placed Paris at the forefront of a deeply divisive issue and drawn warnings of severe retaliation from Jerusalem.

According to European officials and individuals familiar with the Israeli government's internal discussions, Israel is preparing a range of countermeasures, reports

Options reportedly under consideration include accelerating settlement expansion and annexations in the West Bank, shutting down France's historic consulate in Jerusalem, and encroaching on French-owned religious sites, such as the Sanctuary of the Eleona on the Mount

Israeli police entered the monastery complex last year, sparking a sharp diplomatic dispute with Paris.

Deputy Foreign Minister Sharren Haskel has previously cautioned that closing the French outpost — which predates the state of Israel's establishment in 1948 — "was on the table of the prime minister."

French officials have commented that the key question is not whether Israel will retaliate, but rather how forcefully it will enact said retaliation, as PM Netanyahu's government has made its intentions clear over the twostate solution, and declared its refusal to succumb to international pressure on Palestinian statehood.

"Israel won't stop at anything in terms of retaliation," said Karim Amellal, a former French diplomat. Another European envoy warned relations between Paris and Jerusalem were set to "deteriorate enormously," citing Macron's central role in the recognition campaign.

The French leader stunned allies and adversaries alike when he declared over the summer that France would become the most prominent Western democracy to recognise Palestinian statehood. UNI

### 3 dead after Australian telecommunications failure disrupts emergency calls

**SYDNEY, SEP 19:** Australia's second-largest telecommunications company has apologised after three customers died during a network outage that impacted hundreds of calls to emergency services on Thursday.

Optus, a wholly owned subsidiary of Singaporean conglomerate Singtel, on Friday confirmed that a network update on Thursday resulted in the failure of calls to Australia's national emergency telephone number, Triple Zero.

**Optus Chief Executive** 

Officer Stephen Rue said at a press conference in Sydney that approximately 600 customers in the states of Western Australia (WA), South Australia (SA), and the Northern Territory (NT) were affected.

"During the process of conducting welfare checks, three of the Triple Zero calls

involved households where a person tragically passed away,"

Rue said. Two of the deaths were in SA and one was in WA.

He said that the technical failure has been rectified and that Optus would cooperate fully and transparently with all relevant government agencies

and regulatory bodies.

Optus was in November 2024 ordered to pay more than 12 million Australian dollars (about 7.93 million U.S. dollars) in penalties for a similar national outage in November 2023, during which 2,145 customers were unable to call Triple Zero.



disciplined manner. The ceremony concluded with an oath-taking session wherein all participating athletes pledged to uphold the true spirit of sportsmanship, fair







# "Warmth Amid Bareness: The Dual Face of Winter in Kashmir": Two Poems of Majrooh Rashid

ajrooh Rashid (full name: Abdul Rashid Malik) is a contemporary Kashmiri poet who writes in three languages: Kashmiri, Urdu, and English. He superannuated as Professor of Kashmiri at the University of Kashmir a few years back As a multilingual poet and writer, Majrooh has made significant contributions to the literature of these languages and established a reputation in the literary circles. Although he has been writing in English for a long time, through social media platforms, he made his presence felt as an English poet with the publication of his debut collection, Snow Flames (2025). Originally hailing from South Kashmir, he now lives in Srinagar, Kashmir, The two poems under investigation are from Snow Flames.

Winter is round the corner, isn't it? No dear it has already encamped by the banks of the Dal. Think not of the fall that befell the planes of Naseem Bagh, early, took away pale yellow clothes of their shadows, while they were engrossed with cherishing. bathing in the lake and sank to the bottom, feeling ashamed of their bareness. Look at those water birds having come from far off lochs, escaping severe cold, by swimming together in the warmth of the lake.

#### Interpretation

The poem begins with a tag question that seeks confirmation of his/her statement that winter is approaching—"Winter is round the corner, isn't it?" However, instead of confirming "Winter is round the corner", the listener corrects the speaker and says that it (winter) has already arrived and "encamped" on Dal Lake like a guest or an intruder — "No dear it has already encamped by the banks of the Dal" ("encamped" is used as a metaphor here).

The next 10 lines (actually a single sentence) shift our attention to Naseem Bagh, a famous Chinar Garden at Hazratabal, Srinagar, where "Fall" (literally autumn, but figuratively, downfall or loss) has forced the trees to shed their leaves—"took away pale yellow clothes". The speaker says, "Think not of the fall that befell the planes of Naseem Bagh," and this has happened "while they [leaves] were engrossed with cherishing, bathing in the lake". The trees are personified here and imagined as carefree and happy over their reflection in the lake, unprepared for the ensuing nakedness. The fallen yellow leaves sink into the Dal, leaving the trees ashamed of the nakedness ("bareness")—"and sank



to the bottom, feeling ashamed of their bareness". This shows how vulnerable winter is. The last sentence (consisting of 6 lines) shifts the scene from loss ("bareness") to 'warmth' that the migratory birds feel; their resilience to withstand coldness. Despite harshness and naked trees, the migratory birds have arrived "from/far off lochs" ('lochs' is a Scottish term for lake) to enjoy the relative warmth of the lake.

#### Assessment

The poet uses vivid imagery of Dal Lake, Naseem Bagh, and migratory birds not only to depict the winter woes but also to highlight the resilience that comes naturally to withstand winter's onslaught. Winter has already arrived, and the Chinars in Naseem Bagh have become bare and feel ashamed of their nakedness. The trees appear to have been caught unawares and unprepared for this onslaught as they "were engrossed" in enjoying their reflection in the lake. This is tragic as they had to leave their yellow attire. This description evokes the image of decay and loss. However, the tone becomes very positive when the speaker talks about the migratory birds travelling from their distant coldest abodes to enjoy the relative warmth of Dal. There is a sharp contrast here between the naked trees and the birds taking shelter on the Dal. This dual picture of winter captures both a time of loss and how one could adapt to the winter season and enjoy it, despite its harshness.

'Winter' seems to be a meditative poem in which the poet is thinking about the seasonal transition— blending personification, vivid imagery, and juxtaposition—in the valley of Kashmir. Instead of mourning the destructive power of winter, the poet portrays its soothing nature through birds enjoying the warmth of the lake. The Chinar leaves sinking into the Dal highlight the poet's empathy with Nature, and the finality and burial of life. However, the desolation caused by winter-naked trees feeling ashamed, Naseem Bagh without "yellow clothes" and their usual merriment ("cherishing")— is put in contrast to "Look at those water birds having come from far off lochs, escaping severe cold, by swimming together in the warmth of the lake." This suggests that in Winter, there is something more than meets the eye—vitality and resilience to withstand its severity. To the migratory birds, Kashmir seems relatively warm. It is a message for us all that 'sailing together' through harsh days would lead to the warmth needed to sustain us in the winter months. Another poem by the same poet, 'Snowfall', portrays a different picture of Kashmir. Let's first read the poem:

#### Snowfall

Yesterday afternoon,
the snow came dancing down from skies
onto the poor earth,
I felt
as if I watched
an incredible circus show
in which all snowflakes turned
into trapeze artists
performed flying acrobatics
and held me spellbound.
In the meantime
you passed by
and ruffled my hair once again.
The ice was melting on my lashes.

#### Interpretation

'Snowfall' is set in a specific moment, yesterday, making it an everyday reality. Snow has come "dancing down from [the] skies". Personifying the snow, the poet sees joy and grace in its gentle descent. This gleeful dancing of the snow is in sharp contrast to the loss the earth is facing at the moment—barrenness, coldness, and harshness, which is why the poet says that the snow is falling "onto the poor earth". The dancing of the snow makes the poet turn inwards, and he speaks about how

"I felt". It was an awesome performance, a circus-like show—lively, dazzling and the atrical—each flake performing like an artist, swinging and floating in the air—"an incredible show in which all snowflakes turned into trapeze artists/ performing flying acrobatics". The speaker got "spellbound". While he was in awe of the scene, his attention shifted from this marvel to a personal moment-"you passed by". This "you" creates a contrast between the cosmic and the human. His/Her presence "ruffled my hair once again". So the scene is no longer 'cold' but warm as the migratory birds found the relative warmth in the waters of Dal Lake in 'Winter'. "The ice was melting on my lashes" suggests that the speaker has become emotional, and tears in the form of ice are lingering on his eyelashes. This makes the poem absolutely personal and a depiction of the poet's personal grief.

Critical Appreciation of 'Snowfall' 'Snowfall' is a beautiful poem that uses vivid images of snow falling and dancing. It presents a spectacular show that one sees at a circus. The poet doesn't see winter as a lifeless, bleak, and harsh season, but one that brings out Nature's wonder for humans to watch—"Yesterday afternoon, / the snow came dancing down from skies / onto the poor earth". The snow becomes a performer —"trapeze artists"—presenting an "incredible circus show". The scene held the poet "spellbound".

In the second half of the poem, the focus

In the second half of the poem, the focus shifts, and the poet is "ruffled once again" as a silent character "passes by". This character could be a beloved or an intimate person for whom the poet is feeling very emotional, and "the ice" (tears) rolls down his eyelashes. This is a beautiful image that puts winter chill and warmth of human touch into sharp contrast with each other.

'Snowfall' is written in free verse with uneven lines denoting the falling of snow in rhythmic dance. To me, the poem seems a beautiful example of William Wordsworth's Poetics: "Poetry is the spontaneous overflow of powerful feelings..." Here, the poet

dding feather after feather to its cap, Sher-i-Kashmir Institute of Medical Sciences (SKIMS), the Valley's premier healthcare centre, has, against all odds, stood out strong and drawn indelible marks on the sands of time.

Equally breathtaking was the allogenic bone marrow transplant for Beta Thalassemia Major. A child shackled to relentless blood transfusions was unchained through science and compassion. For a poor family that could never dream of affording the procedure outside, SKIMS became the ray of light at the end of the tunnel.

amlet, Prince of Denmark, is home from school to mourn the death of his father, King Hamlet, who has died two months earlier. Hamlet is disgusted by the marriage of his newly widowed mother, Queen Gertrude, to his Uncle, King Hamlet's brother, Claudius, who now has the throne.

Shortly thereafter, a ghost has appeared to guards on nightly watch as well as Hamlet's good friend, Horatio, who thinks the spirit has a likeness to the former King Hamlet. When prompted to speak by Horatio, the ghost will not. Horatio asks Hamlet to wait for the ghost and see if it will speak to him. The ghost of his father beckons Hamlet to follow him and reveals that his brother Claudius poisoned him in the ear. Hamlet vows to avenge his father's murder.

Meanwhile, Laertes, son to the King's advisor Polonius is set to return to France. Before he leaves, he tells Ophelia, his sister, to be weary of Hamlet's affections towards her. Polonius gives Laertes advice on how to act abroad and orders Ophelia to stay away from Hamlet.


Hamlet's sanity begins to be questioned by all. Claudius and Gertrude are both concerned; Polonius suggests it is Ophelia's rejection of his advances. Claudius and Polonius decide to spy on Hamlet and Ophelia. Claudius further employs Rosencrantz and Guildenstern, two childhood friends of Hamlet, to spy on him further. Hamlet quickly realizes their intentions.

A troupe of players happens to be in town and Hamlet utilizes the actors to determine the validity of his father's murder. He will have them perform the very act of murder, killing a king through poison in the ear, which the ghost has claimed. He asks Horatio to watch Claudius' reaction throughout the play. While the court is watching, Claudius is enraged and leaves the play convincing Hamlet that he is the murderer.

Hamlet comes upon Claudius in the chapel, kneeling down to pray. He considers killing him then and there, but since Claudius is in mid-prayer, and will therefore go to heaven if he dies, Hamlet decides to wait until Claudius is committing some sin, so that he will go to hell like Hamlet's father before him.

Hamlet meets Gertrude in her room and an argument ensues. When he hears Polonius who is hiding behind the curtain shout for help, he stabs him thinking it is Claudius. The ghost appears to Hamlet to refocus him on the task of killing Claudius.

Fortinbras, Prince of Norway,



whose father's lands were seized by the late King, decides to head to Denmark. Claudius demands that Hamlet, Rosencrantz and Guildenstern head for England. Claudius has sent a letter with them ordering Hamlet's execution during the trip. While at sea, however, Hamlet discovers his planned murder and switches the orders, causing Rosencrantz and Guildenstern to be executed. Hamlet returns to Denmark.

Meanwhile back at Elsinore, Ophelia has gone mad with grief. Laertes returns from France and learns it was Hamlet who has killed his father, Polonius. Claudius suggests that Laertes duel with Hamlet and poisons the tip of Laertes foil for a fatal blow. If Laertes loses the duel, Claudius will put poison into a drink for Hamlet. Gertrude enters and announces that Ophelia has drowned.

In the graveyard, Hamlet reminisces on a friend of his whose skull he has found. When the processional arrives with Ophelia's corpse, Laertes and Hamlet argue. A duel is scheduled.

During the fight, Gertrude

accidentally drinks from the poisoned chalice and dies. Hamlet is wounded with the poisoned sword, but in a scuffle, the foils are switched and Laertes is also wounded with the poisoned foil. In dying, Laertes confesses Claudius' plot to kill Hamlet. Hamlet stabs Claudius and Hamlet dies asking Horatio to tell his story. The Norwegian forces arrive at Elsinore, and Prince Fortinbras seizes control of Denmark.

#### HAMLET WILLIAM SHAKE-SPEARE AND HAMLET BACK-GROUND

The most influential writer in all of English literature, William Shakespeare was born in 1564 to a successful middle-class glovemaker in Stratford-upon-Avon,  $England.\ Shake speare\ attended$ grammar school, but his formal education proceeded no further. In 1582 he married an older woman, Anne Hathaway, and had three children with her. Around 1590 he left his family behind and traveled to London to work as an actor and playwright. Public and critical success quickly followed, and Shakespeare eventually became

the most popular playwright in England and part-owner of the Globe Theater His career bridged the reigns of Elizabeth I (ruled 1558-1603) and James I (ruled 1603-1625), and he was a favorite of both monarchs. Indeed, James granted Shakespeare's company the greatest possible compliment by bestowing upon its members the title of King's Men. Wealthy and renowned, Shakespeare retired to Stratford and died in 1616 at the age of fifty-two. At the time of Shakespeare's death, literary luminaries such as Ben Jonson hailed his works as time-

Shakespeare's works were collected and printed in various editions in the century following his death, and by the early eighteenth century his reputation as the greatest poet ever to write in English was well established. The unprecedented admiration garnered by his works led to a fierce curiosity about Shakespeare's life, but the dearth of biographical information has left many details of Shakespeare's personal history shrouded in mystery. Some people have concluded from this fact that

Shakespeare's plays were really written by someone else—Francis Bacon and the Earl of Oxford are the two most popular candidates—but the support for this claim is overwhelmingly circumstantial, and the theory is not taken seriously by many scholars.

In the absence of credible evidence to the contrary, Shake-speare must be viewed as the author of the thirty-seven plays and 154 sonnets that bear his name. The legacy of this body of work is immense. A number of Shakespeare's plays seem to have transcended even the category of brilliance, becoming so influential as to profoundly affect the course of Western literature and culture ever after.

Written during the first part of the seventeenth century (probably in 1600 or 1601), Hamlet was probably first performed in July 1602. It was first published in printed form in 1603 and appeared in an enlarged edition in 1604. As was common practice during the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries. Shakespeare borrowed for his plays ideas and stories from earlier literary works. He could have taken the story of Hamlet from several possible sources, including a twelfth-century Latin history of Denmark compiled by Saxo Grammaticus and a prose work by the French writer François de Belleforest, entitled Histoires

The raw material that Shakespeare appropriated in writing Hamlet is the story of a Danish prince whose uncle murders the prince's father, marries his mother, and claims the throne. The prince pretends to be feebleminded to throw his uncle off guard, then manages to kill his uncle in revenge. Shakespeare changed the emphasis of this story entirely, making his Hamlet a philosophically minded prince who delays taking action because his knowledge of his uncle's crime is so uncertain. Shakespeare went far beyond making uncertainty a personal quirk of Hamlet's, introducing a number of important ambiguities into the play that even the audience cannot resolve with certainty. For instance, whether Hamlet's mother, Gertrude, shares in Claudius's guilt: whether Hamlet continues to love Ophelia even as he spurns her, in Act III; whether Ophelia's death is suicide or accident; whether the ghost offers reliable knowledge, or seeks to deceive and tempt Hamlet; and, perhaps most importantly. whether Hamlet would be morally justified in taking revenge on his uncle. Shakespeare makes it clear that the stakes riding on some of these questions are enormousthe actions of these characters bring disaster upon an entire

# Rabies and how logical thinking can help

ccording to WHO website "Rabies is a vaccinepreventable viral disease which occurs in more than 150 countries and territories. Dogs are the source of the vast majority of human rabies deaths, contributing up to 99% of all rabies transmissions to humans.

Low awareness of the need to seek health care after a dog bite claims the lives of more than 55 000 people each year, mostly in Asia and Africa. India is endemic for rabies, and accounts for 36% of the world's rabies deaths. True burden of rabies in India is not fully known; although as per available information, it causes 18 000-20 000 deaths every year. About 30-60% of reported rabies cases and deaths in India occur in children under the age of 15 years as bites that occur in children often go unrecognized and unreported"

Rabies deaths in India accounts for a substantial portion of global rabies deaths, with India contributing to 36% of the worldwide total. Dog bites are the primary source of rabies transmission in India, accounting for about 96% of cases. Children are particularly vulnerable, with 30–60% of rabies cases and deaths occurring in those under 15 years old. In Kashmir children, old are vulnerable. Women who go for jogging are often attacked by dogs.

Jammu and Kashmir (J&K) recorded five human rabies deaths in 2024, a rise from four deaths in 2023 and none in 2022. The Ministry of Fisheries, Animal Husbandry, and Dairying attributed these fatalities to the increasing menace of stray dogs. Following steps are logical and practical.

# 1.Mass Vaccination & Sterilization Drives — Implement ABC (Animal Birth Control) program statewide with urgency.

Ensure 70% + coverage of antirabies vaccination in stray dog populations to break the rabies transmission cycle. Engage NGOs & local veterinary colleges to scale up efforts.

### 2. STRAY DOG POPULATION MAPPING & CONTROL

Use GIS-based tech and drone mapping to identify high-density stray zones.

Prioritize sterilization and vaccination in urban hotspots and school zones.

Create community feeding



# A Drop of Cosmos by Lily Swarn: Where Memory Slaps You in the Face

ily Swarn is not writing poetry; she is more or less, exhaling it. The poems don't merely lie there, gazing beautiful: they rush, throb, and at times smack you in the gut. Each stanza is almost like there's a big, messy orchestra behind it you're slogging through grief over here, then all of the sudden you're lifted by hope and then, whoa, you're back in the slush of loss yet again. Swarn's that gift for infusing life into every line, squeezing out every ounce of feeling until you're blinking and a little out of breath is worth learning. Her language is soiled with ache and beauty, sewing a wild patchwork of what it means to be human.


But she drags you right into the tangled morass of memory and loss right out the gate — no warning, no sideways intro. Even in her own words, she appears bruised by the sense of what she's lost:

Words formed into repulsive shapes Lopsided squiggles with throttled

Of startling deaths of dear friends

No showing off — each poem is more like a bloodletting. She refers to her lines as "condensed drops of blood sometimes," and, really, yeah. This is not poetry for pleasure or decoration; it's survival. She's burning how she feels on the page with a hot iron — and you can smell the singe.

It's already wild, the scope of Swarn — one minute she's in mourning with the entire world, the next she's hatching down into one tight knot of her own private pain.



It's half ancient mythological, half protective mom, her tone. She's had too much of it — of the burning pyres, the don't-give-adamn world — and she's not cutting any slack for any of it:

For my eyes saw the pyres of the dead blazing ire

Ire on an unfeeling world

Where those who provide food to the world

Perish on the frozen streets Broken hearted and struck with woe

But she doesn't leave you to drown. And suddenly you're curled up in her childhood home, surrounded by the warmth of old love and flooding nostalgia:

Ancestral homes are like warm hugs Visiting them was like a dip in an ocean of love...

Relationships were cozy and tight knitted

Her nostalgia isn't even just a faded photograph — it's a stack of old newspapers,

it's talking to painted camels on the wall. There's magic in her remembering:

The air is heavy with nostalgia It's the weight of memories piled in the heap of old newspapers

The painting on the wall still knows my secrets

I had shared them often with those camels on canvas

Time is the villain and the hero of her universe. It will ruin you, but it will also put you back together — sort of. Swarn understands this paradox; she more or less resides inside it:

Time that ruins, devastates and scars Time that caresses, fondles and heals Time that lets you bounce back again and again!

Her roots? Deep. She reels in the Ganga
death isn't the end, it's a cosmic embrace:
The perfect place for embracing death
Is in your benign waters O Ganga
Floating clay dishes with oil lit wicks

on your surface

Cupping hands full of your water

Offering prayers And then there's her fascination with flesh — yes, the one the other stuff is made of. She regards it like some ancient, storybook, full of secrets and scars:

Flesh has a brilliant memory Elephantine and accurate It never lies. Flesh knows

Instinctively Arjunesque!

Chilling so-worst-it-has-to-be-write moments? One woman carrying her life — her actual life — in a beat-up old swag. It's uncooked, it's humanity, it's heartbreak in one image:

Laboriously she gathered Her possessions in a Tattered cloth bundle Spilling at the seams. Knitted brow mangled with Boulders of life hammering Her aching knees

But you know what's at the heart of all this? Loving. Not the fluffy, Instagram-filtered kind. The type that has risen from ashes raked through hell, and still blooms:

Why is love synonymous with spring? Bahaar ka mausam, the time when lovers unite

After a long winter of discontent

A Drop of Cosmos isn't a book — it's an alive, breathing, messy bundle of feelings. Swarn's writing doesn't merely invite you to empathize; it has you dragged over the coals of your own memories. Her lines contain pain as if it were a family heirloom, yet there's light as well —winking through those cracks. She is fragile, ferocious and not at all afraid to reveal her scars. They insist on an amplifier to our feelings, in a world accustomed to flat reduction of all things to sensation." In the end, Swarn's poems are a call to: if you're truly living, you're feeling — big time. And poetry like this? It's more than art; it's sanctuary, rebellion and resurrection writ large.

The poet is at his best in making an ordinary natural phenomenon look like a beyondthis- world scene through imagination and his art of writing

Two Poems: A Comparison In English poetry, Winter has often been used as a powerful symbol of death, stillness, and the inevitable passage of time. Even in canonical poetry, its image is used to convey diverse moods— calm meditation, bleakness, and severity as in, for instance, Robert Frost's Stopping by Woods on a Snowy Evening and Emily Dickinson's There's a certain Slant of light. Frost says:

My little horse must think it

ueer

To stop without a farmhouse near

Between the woods and frozen lake

The darkest evening of the year.

To Dickinson, winter:
Heavenly Hurt, it gives us –
We can find no scar,
But internal difference –
Where the Meanings, are –

When it comes, the Landscape listens –

Shadows – hold their breath – When it goes, 'tis like the Disance

#### On the look of Death

To Claude McKay, snow brings moments of contemplation and tidings of ensuing summer (in 'After the Winter'):

Some day, when trees have shed their leaves

And against the morning's white

The shivering birds beneath the eaves

Have sheltered for the night, We'll turn our faces southward, love,

Toward the summer isle Where bamboos spire the shafted grove

And wide-mouthed orchids smile.

Majrooh Rashid grounds 'Winter' in the topography of Dal Lake and Naseem Bagh, the twin tourist attractions that are located opposite to each other. The mighty chinar trees of Naseem Bagh show their reflection in

the waters of the Dal from the eastern banks. Chinars shedding their yellow leaves sinking in the lake and feeling ashamed of their nakedness, and the migratory birds thronging the lake are very familiar sights for the locals and non-locals alike. The season might be harsh and bring desolation on the roads, but the arrival of the alien birds from distant places makes us realise that the season's harshness could be withstood through warmth. Amid barrenness and bareness, it teaches us how to adapt and survive through mutual help –"swimming together" and taking one another's warmth. Therefore, the elegiac tone of the poem, in the first half, changes to the enjoyable warmth of the lake that birds feel after arriving here.

In 'Snowfall', Majrooh is enjoying the snow dancing and dazzling

like a circus: "snowflakes turned into trapeze artists / performed flying acrobatics / and held me spellbound." Unlike 'Winter', it doesn't see winter as deprivation but warmth, personal memory and human connection: "you passed by and ruffled my hair once again. / The ice was melting on my lashes". While 'Winter' foregrounds nakedness, shame and survival, 'Snowfall' brings to light glee, affection, and spectacular playfulness of Nature.

Both poems are written in free verse without any barriers of rhyme. Words flow like the seasons depicted in the poems. My overall assessment of the poems is that winter is here portrayed neither uniformly harsh nor uniformly enchanting. The season is how one perceives it to be.

# The Success Story of My Failure

ailure has never materialized as a ghost to me. It has, rather, pulled down the curtains of arrogance from my windows, where the vast blue never opened its wings. The glass panes, like me, had only a myopic blur, leaving everything either in its shabby form or at times ruining the essence of completion. With every curtain buried on the lifeless floor, a verve in me - maybe an inner call or just an urgency to rectify a wrong turn — would fill me with extraordinary eagerness to feel chirpy.

Unlike others, the fallen curtain never irritated my eyes, never tangled my soles, and never bothered my interiors. I would say, "My backing will follow once you make a move, and offer justification for my support." The deadly bundled curtain never reacted to my ignorance. Like it, my own fall never pierced through my lenses to encourage premonitions. My

failures and the fallen curtain were two half-dead companions nestled in my 10-by-10 room — not as unwelcome guests, but as fallen wings of an angel heading toward an unexplored world.

My grandfather lifted the fallen curtain and, with a deliberate jerk, shut the west-facing window. The little light that once spilled in disappeared, and the room turned dim, almost airless. It no longer felt like a place to live, but like a confining cell. In that dimness, only three things remained: his guttural voice, his authority, and my failures — now confronting me together in the same closed chamber.

Success never kissed my windowpane, for a rainbow needs a screen to lure the human eye. Because of this, the sunset and my failures now shared gelid moments, like a cool breeze after a blazing day.

It was a typical self-exiled state, one held not by force but by choice. Yet the musty smell of curtains and hanging paintings was too harsh, forcing my nostrils to close their own windows. But the crimson at the horizon and my success were inseparable companions like coffee and cockroach. In my 10-by-10 world, failures had occupied much space, leaving

Nothing on the plate, an empty room, echoes of errors, and a broken chair propped on pillows meant for occasional guests the vibrant echo, like my grandfather's guttural voice, was a common vibration that set my books in order. Ignoring an old man is as difficult as bringing the moon down at noon. His presence only multiplied my penitence. The word respect echoed in the room, vibrated through my frozen senses, and moved my eyeballs to celebrate the long-congealed flow. Tears eased my unrest, and I wept with all my might, bringing out the malice of my half-attempts and partially planned policies.

For the first time, he allowed me to cry. Otherwise, my little sob would melt him. But this time he stood like a stone—lifeless, merciless, ignorant. His hands reached for my closed book; he adjusted his glasses on the tip of his big, broad nose. The title wrinkled his forehead more than my wrenched heart. I thought either he had already read it or he had no idea of it. Old men are wise; they hide their nervousness and manipulate surprises well. After all, experience is the eldest son they rely on.

"Siddhartha, a nice choice. Who recommended it?" he asked. I didn't utter even a whisper. These rolling tears had equated me with Siddhartha; his journey in the novel had just ended for me, in the room, with Buddha before Siddhartha in my feeble frame.

The sage pushed at the walls of my 10-by-10 room by encouraging my tears and silent sobs.

The reason was obvious: he would discover how Siddhartha seeks knowledge not only from spiritual teachers but also through direct human experiences. When he meets Kamala, the courtesan, she teaches him about physical love, desire. and sensuality.

Then one night, I found the novel back in the room with a few notes on the back page reading: "My son, sensuality is not shame if it teaches you a lesson of love."

In that moment, I, too, like Siddhartha, understood: wisdom is not the absence of desire or error, but the grace we find within them.

kingdom. At the play's end it is not even clear whether justice has been achieved.

By modifying his source materials in this way, Shakespeare was able to take an unremarkable revenge story and make it resonate with the most fundamental themes and problems of the Renaissance. The Renaissance is a vast cultural phenomenon that began in fifteenth-century Italy with the recovery of classical Greek and Latin texts that had been lost to the Middle Ages. The scholars who enthusiastically rediscovered these classical texts were motivated by an educational and political ideal called (in Latin) humanitas—the idea that all of the capabilities and virtues peculiar to human beings should be studied and developed to their furthest extent. Renaissance humanism, as this movement is now called, generated a new interest in human experience, and also an enormous optimism about the potential scope of human understanding. Hamlet's famous speech in Act II, "What a piece of work is a man! How noble in reason, how infinite in faculty, in form and moving how express and admirable, in action how like an angel, in apprehension how like a god—the beauty of the world, the paragon of animals!" (II.ii.293–297) is directly based upon one of the major texts of the Italian humanists, Pico della Mirandola's Oration on the Dignity of Man. For the humanists, the purpose of cultivating reason was to lead to a better understanding of how to act, and their fondest hope was that the coordination of action and understanding would lead to great benefits for society as a whole.

As the Renaissance spread to other countries in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries, however, a more skeptical strain of humanism developed, stressing the limitations of human understanding. For example, the sixteenth-century French humanist, Michel de Montaigne, was no less interested in studying human experiences than the earlier humanists were, but he maintained that the world of experience was a world of appearances, and that human beings could never hope to see past those appearances into the "realities" that lie behind them. This is the world in which Shakespeare places his characters. Hamlet is faced with the difficult task of correcting an injustice that he can never have sufficient knowledge of-a dilemma that is by no means unique, or even uncommon. And while Hamlet is fond of pointing out questions that cannot be answered because they concern supernatural and metaphysical matters, the play as a whole chiefly demonstrates the difficulty of knowing the truth about other people—their guilt or innocence, their motivations, their feelings, their relative states of sanity or insanity. The world of other people is a world of appearances, and Hamlet is, fundamentally, a play about the difficulty of living in that

### HAMLET WHAT DOES THE ENDING MEAN?

Claudius and Laertes set Hamlet's ending in motion when they plan to kill Hamlet during a fencing match. Both Hamlet and Laertes are fatally poisoned during the match, and before he dies, Hamlet kills Claudius. The ending of Hamlet leaves it unclear whether the events leave Hamlet's struggles with self-doubt unresolved, or whether they in fact

settle his various quandaries.

Hamlet has spent the whole play debating whether to avenge his father's death and/or to commit suicide, and the finale effectively enables him to perform both acts. What's unclear though is the degree to which Hamlet's final acts are intentional. For instance, when Hamlet agrees to the match, he suspects there's a plot against him, but it isn't clear what he expects to get out of the fight. Does he simply hope to die and put an end to his misery? Likewise, it isn't clear whether Hamlet gets any satisfaction from finally killing Claudius. When he strikes the fatal blow Hamlet calls his uncle "incestuous" (V.ii.), which suggests a preoccupation with Claudius's marriage to Gertrude rather than his murder of King Hamlet. These ambiguities leave it unclear what psychological state Hamlet is in when he per-

The play's ending also has important political implications. One of Hamlet's subplots revolves around an ongoing dispute between Denmark and Norway. This dispute has grown more

inflamed ever since King Hamlet killed the Norwegian monarch, King Fortinbras, in battle. Now the slain king's son, Prince Fortinbras, plans to invade Denmark. In Act Two, Claudius learns that Fortinbras's army has been redirected to Poland, and this is the last we hear of Fortinbras for a while.

In the meantime, the turmoil in Elsinore incrementally weakens Denmark's ruling family. The transition from the late King Hamlet to his brother Claudius has already put Denmark in a vulnerable position. And as Hamlet descends into madness, he not only defaults on his former promise as a statesman, but he also puts the family's political lineage in jeopardy. The infighting at Elsinore grows, eventually spiraling into the deadly violence of Act Five.

The conditions are therefore perfect when, in the play's final moments, Prince Fortinbras makes a surprise attack on the castle. With everyone in the Danish royal family dead, Fortinbras achieves an easy victory. In the end, then, the moral corruption of the Danish royal family places Denmark in the hands of a foreign invader.
