

In 2000, there was no concept of startups, systems, or ecosystems in India."

Sinha that the Union Territory's legislature hold its next sitting in Srinagar between October 13 and 20.

After deliberations, Ministers agreed that the week-long schedule would be the most suitable window to ensure compliance with constitutional requirements and allow lawmakers to debate issues of governance.

"This schedule fits within the legal requirement that no more than six months should elapse between two sessions of the legislature. The Cabinet felt October 13 to 20 was the most suitable window," sources privy to the meeting

The recommendation now goes to the Lieutenant Governor, who under the Jammu and Kashmir Reorganisation Act, 2019, holds the authority to summon the legislature. If approved, this will mark the third full legislative session of the Omar Abdullah-led government since it assumed office last year.

The first session took place in November 2024, just weeks after the swearing-in of the Council of Ministers. That four-day sitting was largely introductory, with members welcoming the return of an elected government and laying out early priorities. The second session was held in Jammu during the winter, concluding on April 29 this year. In addition, a special one-day sitting of the legislature was convened in July in Srinagar, where lawmakers unanimously condemned the attack on tourists in Pahalgam.

The Reorganisation Act stipulates that "six months shall not intervene between its last sitting in one session and the date appointed for its first sitting in the next session," a clause designed to ensure continuity of legislative business. By recommending mid-October for the next session, the Cabinet has sought to avoid any breach of this legal provision while giving itself an opportunity to highlight achievements and respond to public concerns before the winter session in Jammu.

Officials said the upcoming session is expected to feature discussions on key developmental and financial issues. Ministers are also preparing to table reports on housing, infrastructure, and ongoing flood relief works, which were among the administrative matters finalised during Tuesday's Cabinet meeting. "The Cabinet cleared a series of decisions related to housing and development. These measures are designed to address immediate needs while sustaining longer-term growth," an official source con-

The timing of the session carries political weight for the National Conference-led government. For Chief Minister Omar Abdullah, who returned to power last year after a prolonged period of central rule in Jammu and Kashmir, the October sitting will be an opportunity to consolidate his administration's position before

Lawmakers from different parties have already begun preparing agenda items for the sitting. Opposition leaders are expected to raise questions over flood management, unemployment, and road connectivity, while treasury benches plan to highlight measures taken to strengthen welfare schemes and revive horticulture and tourism. He said that in 2015, India's ranking in the Global Innovation Index was 91st, and today it has reached 38th. The Home Minister expressed confidence that within the next three years, India will rank among the top ten countries in the Global Innovation Index and, in the coming years, will lead global innovation.

NEW EDUCATION POLICY OPENED TREA-SURE TROVE FOR INDIA'S YOUTH

Shah said that Prime Minister Modi, through the New Education Policy, has created a vertical for research and study on the Indian Knowledge System, opening this treasure trove for India's youth. By leveraging this knowledge, young Indians can conduct world-class research.

The Union Home Minister said that in the 11 years of the PM Modi led government, significant transformations have been witnessed in the country, with efforts made in every sector to expand the startup ecosystem.

The credit for this expansion goes to the ecosystem created by Prime Minister Modi, as well as to students and youth. He highlighted that the number of startups has grown from 500 in 2014 to 1.92 lakh today, a 380-fold increase. Similarly, the number of unicorn startups has risen from just 4 in 2014 to over 120 today, with a total valuation exceeding \$350 billion. Shri Shah emphasized that this demonstrates how, by leveraging the ecosystem created by Prime Minister Modi, talent can be harnessed to create unicorn startups. He urged industry stakeholders to collaborate with start-

ups to expand in every dimension. STARTUPECOSYSTEM HAS PROVIDED SUS-TAINABLE EMPLOYMENT TO 17.9 LAKH PEOPLE

Amit Shah said that India currently has 21,000 startups in the IT sector and 17,000 in healthcare. Moreover, there are 11,000 startups each in agriculture, the service sector, and education. He added that startups have expanded their reach to 770 districts in India, showcasing the strength of India's startup ecosystem. Furthermore, 48% of startups are founded by women, and 900 startups in the Northeast are led by women. Shah stated that the startup ecosystem has provided sustainable employment to 17.9 lakh people so far.

Union Home Minister and Minister of Cooperation said that since 2014, Prime Minister Narendra Modi has created a supporting environment for startups and provided financial, policy, infrastructure, banking, and industry support for their growth. He said that a Fund of Funds of 10,000 crore has been established, a Startup India Seed Fund with a corpus of 945 crore has been launched, the maximum loan limit has been increased from 10 crore to 20 crore, support of up to 20 lakh has been approved for Proof of Concept, and funding of up to 50 lakh has been approved for prototype development. He further said that Prime Minister Modi launched Make in India, introduced PLI schemes in 14 key sectors, removed over 40,000 compliances, and removed more than

3400 laws from the category of criminal laws. APART FROM PM MODINO ONE ELSE COULD HAVE SIMPLIFIED, REFORMED GST

Amit Shah said that apart from Prime Minister Narendra Modi, no one else could have simplified and reformed GST. After a long time, the country has seen a leader like Prime Minister Modi in whom both taxpayers and the public can place their trust.

He noted that Prime Minister Modi, with great courage and by taking all states along, successfully implemented GST.

GST collections began at 80,000 crore and today have crossed over 2 lakh crore.

Shah added that under GST reforms, Prime Minister Modi reduced the prices of many items by half, by one-third, and even to zero in some cases. Through GST reforms, Prime Minister Modi has shown the public that the government's purpose is to raise revenue to run the country, not to exploit the people.

Union Home Minister and Minister of Cooperation said that since India's independence, the public is witnessing such a massive tax reduction for the first time. He stated that GST reform is a bridge of trust between taxpayers and the government.

Shah recalled that when the Modi government came to power, income up to 2.5 lakh was tax-exempt, but today income up to 12 lakh is taxed at zero.

These two examples, he said, demonstrate that the government levies taxes not for exploitation, but for the people, for the country's development, and for self-reliance. Shri Shah said that his move will serve as a bridge of trust between taxpayers and the Government of India for decades to come.

STARTUP CONCLAVE 2025 WILL DELIBERATE ON PM MODI'S MISSION TO ESTABLISH INDIA'S DENTITY IN STARTUP WORLD

Referring to the objective of the Startup Conclave 2025, Shah said, "It will deliberate on all aspects of Prime Minister Modi's mission to establish India's identity in the startup world and find solutions to challenges."

Pertinently the conclave has been organized on the theme of three mantras: innovate, elevate,

Shah said that over two days, discussions will be held in seven sessions on various topics, providing a significant platform to connect emerging startups with investors and realize Prime Minister Modi's mantra of "mind to

He highlighted that the compilation of the Indian Knowledge System was also launched during the event. "This system encompasses the finest knowledge from around the world in fields such as Ayurveda, classical arts, architecture, mathematics, philosophy, science, space, and the environment."—(KNO)

He said India's proposed air defence system, Sudarshan Chakra, would integrate multiple protective layers, starting with counter-drone systems and extending to counter-UAV and counter-hypersonic systems. "Some elements cannot not be discussed publicly for security reasons but I assure you that it's one of the best systems in the world," he added.

The Army Chief said the system would combine sensors, missiles, surveillance apparatus, and artificial intelligence tools to provide both defence and offensive capabilities.

According to him, the concept was in the ideation phase but would be comprehensive in scope. He cautioned that adversaries were also improving their capabilities, pointing to the drones encountered during Operation Sindoor, which had shown advanced features including the use of artificial intelligence and visual nav-

igation even after GPS jamming. He said India's counter-drone and GPS-jamming systems had performed effectively during the operation, minimising damage. However, he added that similar results could not be assumed in the future because adversaries would adapt once they understood India's current capabilities.

He cited examples from the Azerbaijan-Armenia conflict and the Russia-Ukraine war, where relatively inexpensive drones had caused significant damage to costly military assets. He said this reflected the cycle of innovation and adaptation in warfare, where the side adapting faster gained an advantage.

He said self-reliance provided not only independence but also the ability to surprise an adversary. Such surprises, he added, could only be used once before the other side learned, requiring continuous innovation.

He said the economic dimension of war also needed to be considered. Drones were now both military and commercial assets, and their wider use would affect security as well as the

economy

General Dwivedi said Mission Sudarshan Chakra would aim to integrate multiple defence layers and advanced systems, keeping India ahead of adversaries while remaining economically viable.

restoration scheme. "These include Mughalera gardens such as Nishat and Shalimar. Detailed project reports and estimates have already been sent to the government and we are hopeful that work will begin on these projects soon," he said.

According to officials, crores of rupees are being invested in these initiatives, which cover mosques, khanqahs, temples, imambara's and historical gardens across Srinagar district.

Beyond heritage conservation, Labroo said that the administration has taken up nearly 500 developmental works in Srinagar this year under Capex and CDF funds. These include construction of bunds, additional classrooms and smart classes in schools.

"Seventy to seventy-five works have already been allotted and execution has started. Agencies have been asked to speed up construction before the onset of winter," Labroo said.

On concerns over delays and stalled projects, Akshay Labroo admitted that hurdles such as contract disputes, legal issues, non-implementation of financial guidelines and shortage of funds had slowed down some works. "Our focus is to resolve issues wherever possible and revive pending projects at the earliest so that people benefit without further delay," he assured.

Highlighting government initiatives for youth, Labroo said about 'Mission Youth', a program designed to encourage young entrepreneurs. "Through Mission Youth, educated youth can avail loans at minimal interest rates. The administration even helps prepare paperwork and DPRs. So far, 3,000 enterprises in Srinagar have been approved by the DLIC, while 800 have already received bank disbursements," he said

The Deputy Commissioner also underlined steps being taken to curb drug abuse in the district. "Our drug de-addiction centre is being strengthened further. If the need arises, more centres can be established with full compliance of norms. The administration is committed to providing every possible support to ensure Srinagar becomes drug-free," he said. providing 25 lakh deposit-free connections at the rate of Rs 2,050 per connection, Rs 160 crore for targeted subsidy of Rs 300 per 14.2 kg domestic LPG cylinder (for up to nine refills per year, proportionately pro-rated for 5 kg cylinders), and Rs 3.5 crore towards project management and other expenses.

Under PMUY, beneficiaries receive a deposit-free LPG connection that covers the security deposit of cylinder, pressure regulator, 'suraksha' hose, domestic gas consumer card (DGCC) booklet, and installation charges.

In addition, the first refill and stove are also provided free of cost. Beneficiaries are not required to make any payment for the LPG connection, the first refill, or the stove, as these costs are borne by the Government of India and the Oil Marketing Companies (OMCs).

Beneficiaries have the flexibility to choose from a 14.2 kg single bottle connection, a 5 kg single bottle connection, or a 5 kg double bottle

connection. To further enhance transparency and ease of access, the process for obtaining an LPG connection under PMUY has been made fully streamlined and technology-enabled. Eligible adult women from poor households who do not have an existing LPG connection in their family can apply by submitting a simplified KYC application form and Deprivation Declaration, either online or at any LPG distributor of the public sector OMCs.

Applications undergo system-driven deduplication checks, followed by physical verification by OMC officials, before issuance of a subscription voucher and installation of the LPG connection at the applicant's residence.

"Existing applicants with pending applications are required to undergo a revised eKYC process and submit details as per the updated proforma," the statement said.

Launched in May 2016, PMUY initially targeted 8 crore deposit-free LPG connections, which was achieved in September 2019. To cover the remaining poor households, Ujjwala 2.0 was launched in August 2021 with a target of 1 crore additional connections, achieved by January 2022. Subsequently, the government approved 60 lakh additional connections under Ujjwala 2.0, achieved in December 2022, and another 75 lakh connections, achieved by July 2024. As of July 2025, over 10.33 crore PMUY connections have been released across the country, making it one of the largest clean energy initiatives globally.

Announcing the decision, Union Minister of Petroleum and Natural Gas Hardeep Singh Puri said, "With the onset of Navratri, the decision to provide 25 lakh deposit-free LPG connections under Ujjwala is yet another testimony of Prime Minister Narendra Modi's commitment to treat women with the same respect accorded to Goddess Durga. This strengthens our resolve for the dignity and empowerment of mothers and sisters. Ujjwala has emerged as one of the

most impactful social welfare schemes in India - transforming kitchens, safeguarding health, and brightening the future of families across the country.

campaign involving law enforcement, excise and agriculture departments, and locals in a collective attempt to curb the menace that has emerged as one of the most serious social challenges in the region.

According to official figures, more than ctrade have been registered since 2023, with 4,536 individuals arrested. The trend has continued into 2025, with regular seizures, arrests, and crop destruction reported from both Jammu and Kashmir

In Sopore, police arrested four drug peddlers earlier this year as part of a targeted drive to break local supply chains. In Budgam, the Anti-Narcotics Task Force (ANTF) seized a large cache of poppy straw in an operation described by officials as one of the most significant hauls of recent months. In Handwara, police detained a notorious habitual peddler, Farooq Ahmad Dar alias "Jungli," under the PIT NDPS Act, citing his repeated involvement in drug-

Simultaneously, authorities intensified their drive against cannabis cultivation, locally known as "bhung." In districts such as Anantnag, Ganderbal and Baramulla, teams of police, excise, revenue and agriculture officials have destroyed wild cannabis patches and crops cultivated on private lands. "The message is clear: there will be no tolerance for narcotics cultivation or trade. Our teams are working in close coordination to ensure no such activity goes unchecked," a senior police officer in Srinagar said.

Officials said the campaign is not limited to policing alone but also involves cooperation from locals. In many cases, information from villagers has led to successful operations. In Rajouri's Wagoora area, for example, police arrested a man after he was found cultivating cannabis in the yard of his house. The crop was destroyed on the spot and a case registered under the NDPS Act.

Seizures have also been made in urban areas. In June, Jammu police arrested two individuals and recovered 350 grams of opium from their possession. In Srinagar and adjoining districts, police have stepped up naka checks to intercept drug consignments being moved along highways and feeder roads.

The spread of narcotic abuse, particularly among youth, has been described by police as a grave social threat. Senior officers have repeatedly stressed that while law enforcement is working to choke supply lines, efforts must also focus on reducing demand through awareness campaigns and rehabilitation. "The fight against drugs cannot be won by arrests alone. It requires a combination of strict enforcement, community participation, and treatment for addicts. Every family must play a role," said an officer associated with the anti-narcotics campaign.

Officials acknowledge that the profitability of narcotics trade continues to draw cultivators and peddlers. The use of wild cannabis and smuggling of poppy derivatives persist in certain pockets, while crossborder trafficking routes also pose risks. "The trade is lucrative, and unless there is constant vigilance, new networks keep emerging. That is why sustained action is essential," said a police official in north

Legal experts point out that stringent provisions of the NDPS Act are being increasingly invoked to ensure deterrence. Convictions under the law can lead to long prison terms and heavy fines, depending on the quantity and intent. However, they caution that alongside punitive measures, rehabilitation opportunities must be expanded for those caught in the cycle of addiction. (KNT)

of 150 people lost their lives while 178 persons were injured" data reveals, adding, "Over 13600 houses were damaged fully, severely or partially across the region during the recent natural calamities."

According to the figures 864 houses were damaged in Kashmir of which 16 were fully damaged, 57 severely and 791 partially.

An official told the KNO that the relief has already been disbursed in all these cases. On agricultural losses, more than 12,500 hectares of land got affected and nearly 315 hectares were hit in Horticulture sector, primarily in Anantnag, Kulgam and Pulwama districts with estimated losses of about Rs 59 lakh.

In Jammu, 12,800 houses were damaged. Of them, 4,200 houses were fully damaged and over 8,600 partially damaged. The data revealed that the worst-hit districts are Udhampur and Jammu.

Besides, 758 were declared unsafe after the government conducted safety audit of 8,800 schools in Jammu division.

It may be recalled that soon after the

Mirza said it was an Indian Rock Python rescued in the village, measuring approximately 7–8 feet in length.

The warden said the python had hunted and swallowed a jackal. "The python was rescued and later released back into a protected forest area," he added—(KNO)

## 'Giran' apples rot in orchards due to highway closures, say growers

**PULWAMA, SEP 23:** In Kashmir's apple heartland, orchards are strewn with fallen fruit this year, but instead of offering relief to struggling farmers, the "Giran" apples have turned into a fresh source of worry.

Locally known as "Giran", these are apples that fall prematurely from trees before harvest.

Growers, who spoke to the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO), said that due to unusual weather and heavy fruit fall this season, nearly 30–40 per cent of the crop is "Giran". Yet, unlike past years, there are no takers for the produce.

Traditionally, small makeshift roadside mandis would spring up across Pulwama, Shopian, and other apple belts where "Giran" apples found ready buyers for juice factories and low-grade processing. However, repeated closures of the Srinagar–Jammu National Highway have disrupted supplies so severely that these mandis were forced to shut down.

"Earlier, Giran apples at least helped us recover some costs. Even if sold at Rs 100–150 per crate, it was a relief compared to nothing," said Nazir Ahmad, a grower from Pulwama. "But this year, after highway issues, traders closed their mandis. The fruit we had procured rotted in front of us because it could not be transported outside. Now, no one wants to buy it."

The situation has left hundreds of youth, who earned seasonal income by trading in "Giran", without work. "The Giran business relies on quick movement. If the fruit doesn't reach outside mandis within two days, it spoils. Buyers know this risk, so they simply stopped coming," explained a trader at Jabli Pora Fruit Mandi.

For many farmers, "Giran" apples once acted as a lifeline—bringing in modest earnings that supported their expenses on pesticides, labour, and packaging. Now, growers say they are forced to watch helplessly as the fruit rots in their orchards.

"This is not just about a low-grade apple; it is about livelihoods," said Abdul Hameed, another grower from Shopian. "Thousands of families, from pickers to packers to transporters, are tied to this trade. If the government doesn't take immediate steps, this part of our economy will collapse completely." (KNO)

## Wake-Up Call for Horticulture Industry: Mukhtar Ahmad Khan Sounds Alarm Over Postharvest Crisis

KULGAM, SEP 23: Mukhtar Ahmad Khan, former Area Marketing Officer (AMO) of the Horticulture Planning and Marketing Department, J&K Government, has issued a strong statement highlighting the alarming crisis facing the apple industry in South Kashmir. Hetermed the recent transport blockade on NH-44 as a stark reminder of the region's fragile horticulture infrastructure and repeated his long-standing call for robust postharvest management systems.

"In the first week of September 2025, our worst fears were realized. The closure of National Highway 44 for over three weeks severely disrupted the movement of apple-laden trucks. As of 3 PM on September 22, the highway remains in a messy condition, resulting in huge postharvest losses," Khan said.

Khan has consistently advocated for modern postharvest infrastructure, including cold storage, controlled atmosphere (CA) facilities, processing units, and an all-weather transport network. He criticized the systemic failure of institutional bodies, including the horticulture departments and government agencies, to implement such vital facilities. "Where is the infrastructure for processing C-grade apples? Where are the CA storage facilities for 10 lakh metric tonnes of A-grade fruit? Where is the all-weather transport system?" Khan asked.

He also pointed out that the introduction of High-Density (HD) apple plantations—while increasing yield—has intensified the crisis due to early harvesting timelines and the urgent need to dispatch produce quickly. "We lack the CA storage cushion to handle this surge, which makes the system vulnerable to collapse in case of transport delays," he added.

Apple Industry—Lifeline of South

Apple farming is more than just a profession in South Kashmir—it is the



backbone of rural life. The districts of Kulgam, Shopian, Pulwama, and Anantnag are heavily dependent on the apple economy. From pruning in winter to harvesting in autumn, the fruit governs the rural calendar and livelihoods.

The horticulture sector contributes nearly 9% to the Gross Domestic Product(GDP) of Jammu and Kashmir, with apples forming the lion's share. Apple sales generate approximately ₹11,000 crore annually, making it a key driver of the Union Territory's economy. A fluctuation in market prices or production volumes has a direct impact on the financial health of the region.

#### Employment and Economic Stability at Risk

Khan emphasized that the apple sector is the largest employer in South Kashmir. "From orchardists and laborers to packers, transporters, traders, and commission agents—entire communities rely on this industry," he noted. "Without apples, rural unemployment would skyrocket, and local economies would crumble."

Yet, despite its centrality, the sector remains extremely vulnerable. Regular closures of the Srinagar-Jammu highway due to landslides, rains, or snowstorms routinely lead to delayed shipments and rotting produce—causing losses worth crores of rupees.

Another serious challenge is the lack of modern infrastructure. Cold

storage units, CA facilities, and pack houses are scarce. "Farmers are forced to sell their crop immediately, often at rock-bottom prices due to market glut," Khan said.

#### Urgent Gaps in Risk Mitigation

and Policy
Natural calamities like hailstorms
pose yet another threat to apple
orchards. "In countries like China and
Italy, anti-hail nets are standard. In
Kashmir, they're rare or unaffordable,"
Khan said. "Despite years of farmer
demands, the government has failed
to provide subsidized nets or protec-

tive measures at scale."

He further criticized the absence of an effective export policy, lack of Minimum Support Price (MSP) or price-support schemes, and unregulated sale of substandard pesticides, which he claims expose farmers to financial and ecological risks.

#### A Call to Action

Mukhtar Ahmad Khan urged the government to treat the situation as a wake-up call and proposed a set of concrete reforms:

Improve and maintain road connectivity, especially during harvest season.

Expand cold storage and pack house facilities in all fruit-producing districts.

Provide subsidized anti-hail nets to safeguard crops from weather-

related disasters.
Formulate a strong export policy to access international markets.

Introduce MSP or price-support mechanisms to shield farmers from volatile pricing.

Set up a Pesticide Regulatory Authority to monitor quality and pricing of agricultural chemicals. "The apple industry is the heartbeat of South Kashmir. If we do not act now, we are not only risking our economy but the livelihood of lakhs of families," Khan warned.

With the right reforms, he believes that Kashmiri apples can shine not just across India, but also globally—as a symbol of quality, resilience, and the cultural identity of the Valley.

#### Pahari Scientist Dr. Mir Waqas Alam from LOC-Karnah Ranked Among World's Top 2% by Stanford University

He later pursued a Ph.D. in Nano and Functional Material Science from Toyama University, Japan, and carried out research at Western Kentucky University, USA, and Japan's National Institute of Material Science (NIMS).

A family member, Ubaid Ayoub, expressed pride in his achievement. "Coming from Karnah, where access to opportunities is limited, Dr. Waqas's journey is an inspiration for young people in the region. His success shows that students from remote areas can also make their mark globally if given the right guidance and dedication."



### Kashmir Fruit Trucks Halted on Highway, Jammu Traffic **Given Preference**

KULGAM, SEP 23: The Jammu and Kashmir Apple Farmers Federation has strongly condemned what it called discriminatory treatment towards Kashmir's fruit growers, alleging that trucks loaded with apples, pears, and other perishable produce are being unfairly halted along the Srinagar-Jammu National Highway, while vehicles from Jammu are being given unhindered

In a statement issued on Tuesday, Federation President Zahoor Ahmad Rather said that hundreds of fruit-laden trucks from South Kashmir and other regions have been stranded for days, despite this being the peak harvest season. The delays, he warned, are leading to massive spoilage of produce and losses amounting to crores of rupees. "This situation is directly threatening the livelihoods of lakhs of families who depend on the timely delivery of their fruit to outside markets," Rather said.

He added that the Federation has been receiving distress calls from growers and transporters across South Kashmir, who are helplessly watching their year's hard work go to waste.

The Federation has demanded:

Immediate end to what it termed as discriminatory traffic practices.

Priority passage for trucks carrying perishable fruit. Compensation for growers whose produce has been damaged.

Clear guidelines to prevent such disruptions in the future."Lakhs of hardworking growers are losing their year's produce due to official indifference and systemic discrimination," Rather said, urging urgent intervention from both the UT administration and the central govern-

He emphasized that the horticulture sector—particularly apple cultivation—is the backbone of Kashmir's rural economy and contributes significantly to the Union Territory's GDP. "Failing to ensure smooth transport at this critical time is nothing short of economic sabotage," he remarked.

Meanwhile, attempts to seek official comment from traffic authorities remained unsuccessful at the time of filing this report.

## Come up with solution to Achan stinking problem

A huge chunk of population living in the Srinagar city and its outskirts is facing a severe civic problem and astonishingly the people at helm have failed to address the same. Successive erstwhile state governments and the present union territory dispensation have merely resorted to lip service in this regard and hardly any action has been taken up to this moment of time.

At the end of the day it is the common man who suffers with the rich and affluent able to manage the things. The problem being referred to here is the dumping of garbage in the Achan area of Srinagar city. Most of the garbage being collected from the households of the summer capital of Jammu & Kashmir is dumped in the Achan area. The stink that emanates from the garbage makes the life of people living in the area miserable.

The foul smell can be felt kilometres away with the people moving in the vicinity of the same forced to cover their mouth and nose. With the super speciality Sher-I-Kashmir Institute of Medical Sciences (SKIMS) Soura located just a stone's throw away from the garbage dump one can easily feel the pain and agony of the patients as well as the attendants. These people are at the receiving end and despite this glaring problem the successive governments have done nothing to ease the situation.

Some years back the Housing & Urban **Development Department had claimed that** the garbage dumped at Achan would be converted into electrical energy and electricity would be produced at this place. The plan failed to take place and as such no power plant or project came up at the dumping site much to the dismay of the locals and also those who are living in the adjacent areas. Had the power plant come up at this place people would have heaved a sigh of relief and their power problems may have been eased.

Since huge tracts of land are available for the government to dump the garbage these options need to be explored so that the people of Achan and adjoining areas are absolved of daily tension. Once the new site or sites are identified it must be ensured that there is no human habitation in the vicinity of the proposed site or sites. This would mean that the human beings are not put to unnecessary trouble while the garbage is collected from different households of the city and dumped at the new garbage dumping site or sites.

## The First Day at Ramzaan College of Nursing: Lessons in Courage, Responsibility, and Hope

The first day of college is a memory that stays with you forever. It is not merely the start of education but the beginning of a journey filled with self-discovery, responsibility, and hope. When I left home for Ramzaan College of Nursing, my heart carried two opposing emotions—excitement for the opportunities ahead and nervousness for the unknown world of new faces, teachers, and experiences that would shape my future.

As I passed through the gates of the college, pride walked with uncertainty. Walls looked unfamiliar, passages were a blur of voices never known before, and every face that went by looked as keen to recognize me as I did to recognize them. In silence, I entered a class and sat with people who were to slowly become friends, struggling to quiet down the tempest of emotions within me.

Our initial meeting was with Professor Ajaz Sir, our class coordinator. He established the tone for our journey with his words. He reminded us that being a nurse is not a mere career but a service to mankind, a science, a discipline, a responsibility. He explained to us that we were not mere students but future caretakers/healers and researchers. His words made a lasting impact, revealing to us the sacred objective of the course we had embarked upon.

Next arrived Mudassir Sir, our lecturer for Anatomy and Physiology. He spoke about more than just the human body. He spoke about courage, faith, and commitment, explaining that to be a nurse one should be completely committed. When he saw our worried faces, he urged us to adopt confidence even in the face of uncertainty. What he spoke about ingrained in me the idea that learning how to learn is as important as learning itself.

Abid Sir, our lecturer for Nursing Foundation, once taught an excellent lesson about trust-trust in Allah as well as in what is meant for us. He also told us that good role models are neither stars nor celebrities but our lecturers who create our character, value systems, and discipline. He told us that something as fundamental as good manners, being on time, and neat appearance reflects dignity and

Zahid Sir then addressed the congregation emphasizing the religious aspect of nursing. He



termed it as worship itself where serving others grants one much more than one can earn with money. He explained with a most inspiring account regarding Hazrat Rufaidah bint Sa'd (RA), who is credited with being the first Islamic nurse. He  $demonstrated \ how \ prestigious \ and \ honored \ a \ career$ 

Mahek Maam also opined, emphasizing industriousness and efficient time management. "Work hard," she counseled. "Time is valuable, and a minute is a minute." It seemed to me that such admonitions were a reminder that responsible scholarship is the key to a successful varsity career.

 $Beyond \ the \ lectures, I \ explored \ the \ campus. \ I \ saw$ lively classrooms, well-equipped laboratories where  $science \, comes \, a live, the \, principal 's \, of fice \, symbolizing$ leadership, faculty rooms full of knowledge, and the library, where rows of books quietly awaited eager minds. Watching students deeply absorbed in study made me realize that learning doesn't come only from lectures but also from curiosity, self-study, and reflection. Knowledge grows when we are patient, persis-

One of the toughest moments of the day was to introduce myself to the entire class on stage. My voice never favored me for public speaking, but as I spoke, my nervous gradually turned into confidence. I learned from this episode that being a part of a college is not only about learning but also about

overcoming one's fears and transforming one's weaknesses into strengths. When they called my name as a Class Representative, pride and responsibility mingled together in my heart. It was a moment to serve, to lead, to grow.

That first day instilled me with lessons much deeper than nursing. Efforts lead to confidence, professors teach us how to live, nervousness is only natural, and growth is realized through challenges. College is about tests and grades but also about developing character, finding one's own identity, learning about responsibility, and learning to serve society with honesty. That anxious home-bound student who departed early morning returned home a changed person with lessons to be learned about courage, humility, responsibility, and hope. What is unique about the first day is not perfection but the imperfect but unforgettable beginning of learning—learning not only from books but from life. As I walked out of the college gate after evening class, I knew that the journey ahead would be tough but worthwhile, and every step would be worth having taken.

## Teachers Uphold Reforms in Letter and Spirit, but Seek Dignity for Experience

Our education landscape today rests on three defining pillars: the Right to Education Act(RTE), the National Education Policy 2020 (NEP 2020), and the Teachers Eligibility Test (TET). Each of these frameworks has reshaped the way we view classrooms, teachers, and learning itself. Yet, the debate continues: are these policies aligned in purpose, or do they sometimes stand in tension with one another? More importantly, what do they mean for the integrity of teachers who have already served long and per-

formed with commitment? The RTE Act of 2009 was a milestone, enshrining the promise of free and compulsory education for children aged 6-14 years. Its goal was clear; education is not a privilege but a fundamental right. Through this law, schools became more inclusive, and millions of children, who might otherwise have been left behind, found a place in classrooms.

A decade later, the NEP 2020 arrived as a transformative vision. It shifted the focus from rote learning to competency-based education, from examdriven systems to holistic develop-



ment. It promised an education aligned with the needs of the 21st century; multidisciplinary, skill-oriented, digitally integrated, and globally competitive while rooted in Indian ethos. For teachers, NEP 2020 emphasized continuous professional development, better training, and a renewed role as facilitators of knowledge rather than mere transmitters.

The Teachers Eligibility Test, however, has been both appreciated and criticized. Introduced as a mechanism to ensure that only competent, qualified individuals enter the profession, it upholds minimum standards of teaching quality. But for those who have dedicated decades to service ,often under challenging circumstances; the requirement to repeatedly

prove eligibility through written examinations can feel less like reform and more like a questioning of their lifelong dedication.

For new entrants, RTE, NEP 2020, and TET may seem like stepping stones; access, vision, and quality rolled together. For veteran teachers, however, these frameworks sometimes create an impression that experience counts for little. 

To teach children how to think, rather than what to think, is to free them from the prisons of dogma, prejudice, and unexamined assumptions that often shape societies. Creative and critical thinking serve as the twin lights by which the young discern possibility and responsibility, invention and evaluation, imagination and truth. They are at once cognitive disciplines and moral orientations, rooted in the recognition that human flourishing depends not only on intellectual dexterity but also on ethical judgment and social imagination. Education that emphasizes these capacities does not simply aim at producing efficient workers or informed citizens; it aspires to nurture whole persons capable of reimagining the world they inherit, questioning power and inequality, fostering empathy and compassion, and seeking harmony with their environment. At its most profound level, such an education becomes a training in freedom, where thinking itself is an act of resistance against mediocrity, conformity, and domination.

The innovations shaping the future-ranging from artificial intelligence, nanote chnology, quantumscience, psychology, and advanced communications to medical breakthroughs, precision agriculture, environmental science and climate studies, data analytics, robotics, and engineering to economics, social systems, public health, cognitive science, arts and design, defense

technologies, and transformative applications in science and technology- and ethics, philosophy etc., the future of innovation depends on the integration of diverse disciplines that emerge from guided and disciplined interplay of creative and critical thinking strengthened by interdisciplinary and integrated inquiry. True innovation requires not only technical mastery but the ability to question assumptions, synthesize diverse ideas, and envision possibilities beyond conventional limits, whether in coding, biotechnology, or space exploration. Even as quantum science challenges our understanding of reality, and nanotechnology reshapes matter itself, the integration of mystical and spiritual wisdom reminds us that ethical reflection, humility, and a sense of interconnectedness must guide inquiry. Education that cultivates imagination alongside rigorous critique thus prepares learners not merely for future professions but for the conscious stewardship of civilization, where technological and societal transformation is harmonized with human values, ecological care, and profound ethical

All the greatest voices of learning remind us of this charge, for as John Dewey reminded us, "Education is not preparation for life; education is life itself", Ivan Illich in de-schooling work emphasis "Most learning is not the result of instruction. It is rather the result of unhampered participation in a meaningful setting."and Paulo Freire insisted, "To exist, humanly, is to name the world, to change it". Edward de Bono's insight that "creativity involves breaking out of established patterns in order to look at things in a different way" resonates with Michel Foucault's recognition that all thought is entangled with power, while Jürgen Habermas showed that reasoning itself is sustained by the ethical fabric of communication. Martha Nussbaum warned that "without the humanities, democracy will not survive", and Albert Einstein foresaw that "we shall require a substantially new manner of thinking if mankind is to survive". both of which underscore the urgency of reimagining education as the nurturing of wisdom, conscience, and imagination. At its heart, this vision is tempered by the gentle guidance of Rumi, who counseled, "Raise your words, not voice. Iqbal's call to transformative self-discovery, Tagore's dream of a fearless mind, and Vivekananda's insistence that education manifests the perfection within It is rain that grows flowers, not thunder", reminding us that true thinking is inseparable from compassion, justice, and care for the world we inhabit.

Across the globe, exemplary education systems—from Deweyinspired project schools in the United States to Finland's equitable. student-centered classrooms, Germany's tradition of Bildung, and Japan's collaborative moral pedagogy—demonstrate that creative and critical thinking flourishes when intellectual rigor is coupled with ethical reflection and social responsibility. Where learners are trusted, given autonomy, and guided to reflect on both ideas and consequences, thinking becomes not merely a skill but a moral and civic act. These cultures reveal a universal truth: fostering imagination, discernment, and compassion in tandem equips students not just to solve problems, but to engage meaningfully with the world they inherit.

A practical pedagogy needs four interlocking commitments: explicit instruction in skills and routines; cultivation of dispositions and metacognition; structuring of tasks to promote transfer; and classroom ecologies that distribute voice and responsibility equitably. Cognitive

science and education research make a consistent point: skills taught in isolation often fail to travel. Instruction that pairs ideageneration (divergent thinking) with disciplined selection, testing and revision (convergent practice) — and that makes the hidden structure of problems explicit to learners increases the probability of transcontextual transfer. This four-part orientation is not abstract theory; it is an empirically informed framework for lesson design that raises the odds that a student who can construct a sound argument in history can also apply the same evaluative routines to a scientific claim or a civic problem.

"Education that nurtures creativity and critique is not merely about producing efficient workers—it is about cultivating whole persons capable of questioning power, fostering empathy, and reimagining

the world they inherit.' Assessment and feedback must be reoriented from one-off correct $ness\,to\,formative, process-sensitive$ practices that accelerate learning. A large, sustained body of evidence  $shows formative \, assessment-clear \,$ criteria, low-stakes iterative tasks, teacher feedback that targets strategy, and opportunities for student self-monitoring - produces measurable gains in achievement and in students' capacity to regulate their thinking. For creative and critical habits this means assessing not only final products but the quality of inquiry moves: how hypotheses were generated and tested, how alternatives were compared, and how reasoning was revised in light of new information. These evidence-based assessment practices create the learning loop that turns isolated activities into durable competencies.

Yet learning is socially mediated: classroom norms and institutional incentives shape what counts as legitimate thinking. Who speaks, who is listened to, how group roles are assigned, the visibility of success criteria, and the distribution of

rewards all bias which ideas are tested and which criticisms survive. Equity is therefore not a sidebar but a central design constraint: outcome-centered practice must simultaneously redesign participation structures (think rotating facilitation roles, anonymized idea generation, and inclusive rubrics) so marginalized students can contribute and so the best ideas — not merely the most authoritative voices – guide refinement. International guidance emphasizes that cultural forms of knowledge and local epistemologies should be woven into tasks so that thinking is both rigorous and culturally meaningful.

The ethical and political dimension is unavoidable. Teaching critique - encouraging students to question assumptions, institutions and narratives — is intrinsically value-laden. Critical pedagogy locates teaching thinking in a broader ethical project: education can cultivate emancipatory consciousness, enabling learners to interrogate power and act to change unjust conditions; but it must be practiced with intellectual rigor, transparency about aims, and safeguards against indoctrination. In practical terms this requires scaffolding in moral reasoning, history, media literacy and standpoint awareness so that critique is informed, evidence-sensitive and connected to constructive pathways for change rather than mere negation. Educators must design spaces where students learn both to challenge and to deliberate about implications responsibly.

In addition, insistence on compassion, integrity, environmental consciousness, and other key values must be recognized as integral to creative and critical thinking rather than peripheral virtues. Without compassion, critical thinking risks becoming an exercise in demolition rather than a catalyst for constructive transformation, and without ecological awareness, creativity can veer into innovations that are technically brilliant but environmentally destructive. Embedding compassion and sustainability in the curriculum ensures that learners are not only skilled analysts and problem-solvers but also responsible stewards of social and ecological systems. This requires that schools design inquiry projects that foreground empathy (such as problem-solving for marginalized communities), sustainability challenges (such as local energy, food, or water issues), and interdependence between human and non-human life. By doing so, schools cultivate a vision of thinking that is both inventive and ethically grounded, a thinking that prepares learners not just for competitive economies but for the shared work of sustaining life on a fragile planet.

"Without compassion, critical thinking can become destructive; without creativity, education risks becoming conformity. Schools must weave together imagination, ethics, and responsibility to shape learners

who can both dream and act." Institutional alignment is the hinge between good design and sustained classroom practice. Teachers will rationally allocate scarce instructional time toward activities that the curriculum, inspections and examinations reward. Consequently, policy levers matter: curriculum frameworks that name thinking outcomes, formative and performance-based assessment systems, teacher appraisal processes that recognize facilitation of inquiry, and investments in long-term professional learning are all essential. Short, one-off workshops rarely change classroom practice; effective professional development is sustained, content-focused, collegial, and coherent with teachers' daily work - features shown repeatedly to increase the likelihood that PD translates into changed instruction and improved student learning.

## The Tuberculosis

A Persistent Global Health Challenge and the Road Ahead

The Tuberculosis (TB) is one of the oldest and infectious disease affecting the humanity. Despite the advent of antibiotics and improved diagnostic technologies, TB continues to be a significant cause of morbidity and mortality worldwide. According to the various health surveys and researches more than 10 million new TB cases are reported annually, and nearly 1.5 million lives are lost to the disease. The persistence of TB is high particularly in low- and middleincome countries, underscores the urgent need to understand its causes, risk factors, prevention strategies and modern treatment modalities while also exploring future scientific endeavours for eradication.

#### **CAUSES AND PATHOPHYSIOLOGY**

TB is caused by Mycobacterium tuberculosis, an aerobic, acid-fast bacillus that primarily affects the lungs but it can easily spread to other organs, including bones, kidneys and the brain. TB is transmitted via airborne droplets which are expelled when an infected individual coughs, sneezes or speaks. Once the bacteria is inhaled it can remain dormant in the host for years, a state known as latent TB infection (LTBI). In cases where host immunity is compromised, latent infection can progress to active disease. The unique waxy cell wall of M. tuberculosis, rich in mycolic acids, grants it resistance to many common disinfectants and contributes to its pathogenic persistence.

#### **RISK FACTORS**

Several biological and socio-economic factors increase susceptibility to TB. 1. Immunocompromised states:

The HIV/AIDS is the strongest known risk factor for TB reactivation.

#### 2. Malnutrition:

Undernourishment can weaken the immune responses which can increase the risk of infection.

#### 3. Poverty and overcrowding:

The dense living conditions also promotes the airborne transmission.

#### 4. Lifestyle factors:

Smoking, alcohol abuse and diabetes mellitus increases the TB risk.

#### 5. Occupational hazards:

Healthcare workers and miners are more exposed to TB pathogens.

#### **PREVENTION STRATEGIES**

TB prevention requires a multi-layered approach, combining medical, social and public health interventions. Vaccination:

The Bacille Calmette-Guérin (BCG) vaccine remains the only licensed TB vaccine. While it can provides moderate protection against severe childhood TB, its efficacy against adult pulmonary TB is variable.

#### Infection control:

Adequate ventilation, respiratory masks in healthcare settings and isolation of infectious patients are key preventive measures for controlling TB.

#### Chemoprophylaxis:

Preventive treatment with isoniazid or rifapentine is recommended for individuals with latent TB, particularly those at high risk.

#### Social interventions:

Addressing poverty, malnutrition and poor housing conditions is crucial for long-term TB control.

#### **CURRENT TREATMENTS**

TB therapy is complex and lengthy, often spanning over a long period of time.

#### 1. First-line drugs:

Standard treatment involves a fourdrug regimen-isoniazid, rifampicin, pyrazinamide and ethambutol for the initial two months, followed by isoniazid and rifampicin for four months.

#### 2. Multidrug-resistant TB (MDR-TB):

Resistance to isoniazid and rifampicin poses a major challenge. MDR-TB requires longer treatment (18-24 months) with second-line drugs such as fluoroquinolones and aminoglycosides, which are often less effective and more toxic.

#### 3. New therapeutics:

Recently approved drugs like bedaquiline and delamanid represent significant advances in combating resistant

#### 4. Supportive care:

Nutritional supplementation and management of comorbidities, such as HIV, enhance treatment outcomes.

#### **FUTURE ENDEAVOURS**

The fight against TB demands innovation at multiple fronts.

#### Vaccine research:

Several candidate vaccines, such as M72/AS01E, have shown promising results in clinical trials, offering hope for stronger protection against pulmonary

#### Rapid diagnostics:

Molecular tests like GeneXpert MTB/ RIF are already revolutionizing early detection, but further improvements is essential.

#### Shorter treatment regimens:

The ongoing research in the field of science and technology aims to reduce treatment duration without compromising efficacy, improving patient adherence.

#### Host-directed therapies:

Approaches that enhance the host immune system to fight TB are under exploration, including immunomodulators and therapeutic vaccines.

Directs completion of pending works for early commissioning of Plant

**JAMMU, SEPTEMBER 23:** To ensure timely delivery of urban infrastructure and foster the sewage management system in the city, Commissioner Jammu Municipal Corporation (JMC) Dr. Devansh Yadav today visited the 27 MLD Capacity Sewage Treatment Plant (STP) developed on Activated Sludge Process (ASP) technology at Bhagwati Nagar, Jammu. The Project, constructed by NBCC (India) Limited in 2016 to improve sewage treatment capacity, has started partial functioning since last month.

During the inspection, the Commissioner took a detailed

review of the functioning of the plant and enquired about the status of facilities created under the project. While appreciating the progress made so far, Dr. Yadav noted that certain crucial works are still pending which are necessary to make the plant fully operational and beneficial for the public.

Directing the NBCC officials to complete all pending works within 15 days, particularly making the in-house laboratory functional and activating the gaseous chlorine system for effective disinfection, Dr. Yadav also stressed the importance of securing operational consent from the Jammu and Kashmir Pollution Control Committee



(IKPCC), which is a statutory requirement to ensure compliance with environmental stan-

The Commissioner highlighted that once these steps are completed, the plant will be formally handed over to the Department of Housing and Urban Development, Government of Jammu & Kashmir. This will pave the way for its full-scale operation and provide much-needed sewage treatment facilities to stake-holders.

"Completion and commissioning of this plant is a critical step towards ensuring cleaner water bodies, reducing environmental hazards and improving public health in Jammu," Dr. Yadav said while interacting with officials.

The Commissioner further emphasized that the JMC is committed to providing modern urban infrastructure for better sanitation and environmental protection. He urged upon the executing agency to adhere to the timeline and assured full cooperation from the Corporation for expediting clearances and facilitating inter-departmental coordination.

 $Among\,others, senior\,officers$ of JMC, engineers from the executing agency, and representatives of the Housing and Urban Development Department accompanied the commissioner during the visit.

### **DC** Kishtwar inspects restoration work at Naigad **Water Supply Scheme**

KISHTWAR, SEPTEMBER 23: Deputy Commissioner (DC) Pankaj Kumar Sharma today conducted an extensive inspection of the Naigad Gravity Water Supply Scheme, where restoration work on the rain-affected pipeline is underway to reinstate drinking water supply to Kishtwar town and adjoining areas.

During the visit, the DC inspected two critical damaged spots-one at Bajri Point Wagam Nallah and another along the same Nallah—where water supply lines had been severely hit by recent heavy rains. While the first site had already been rectified, restoration work at the second location is

The DC was informed that the existing track damaged due to sinking has been realigned to facilitate interconnection with the gravity line. This step will help make the system functional in the shortest possible time and minimize inconvenience to the affected population.

The DC held detailed deliberations with the Executive Engineer, AEE, AE, and field staff of the Jal Shakti Department, reviewing both technical challenges and safety concerns associated with the restoration process. He directed the engineers to accelerate the pace of work and ensure that the supply is resumed at the earliest, keeping in view the hardships being faced by residents due to shortage of po-

He further assured that the District Administration will provide full logistical support, machinery, and timely arrangements required to facilitate smooth completion of the restoration work.

The DC emphasized that priority must be given to quality execution, safety of workers, and long-term durability of the restored infra-

The DC also stressed the importance of preparing a comprehensive mitigation plan for the scheme to prevent such damages in the future, particularly in landslide and flood-prone stretches of the pipeline. He called for regular monitoring, early warning systems, and preventive maintenance measures to ensure uninterrupted water supply even during adverse weather conditions.

The Deputy Commissioner was accompanied by Executive Engineer Jal Shakti Kishtwar, Er. Sanjeev Kumar Gupta, AEE Jal Shakti Kishtwar Rahul Kotwal, and other concerned officials.

## TRUMP MAY ACT FURTHER ON INDIA'S RUSSIAN OIL PURCHASES: MARCO RUBIO

**NEW DELHI/NEW YORK, SEP 23:** US President Donald

Trump has the ability to do more about the measures he has taken against India for buying Russian oil and is "considering doing more" because of the direction the entire matter has taken, Secretary of State Marco Rubio said today.

He, however, said the US hopes that the measures taken so far against India can be fixed.

"We've already seen the measures we've taken with regards to India, although that's something we hope we can fix. But – and the President has the ability to do more, and he's con-

sidering doing more because of the direction this has taken,' the State Department said. The State Department released Marco Rubio's conversation with NBC on the sidelines of the UN General Assembly (UNGA).

Marco Rubio again harped on the argument that President Trump had brough an end to the India-Pakistan war post Pahalgam terror attack. "And look what the President's done and the wars he's brought about to an end – Thailand and Cambodia, India and Pakistan. Time and again, the President has been the only leader in the world that can get involved," he added.

Secretary Rubio said United States is the only country that can talk to Ukraine and Russia. He, however, said that at some point that role might end. And at some point he (President Trump) may have to decide to impose new sanctions.

He, however, said the minute US goes heavy on the sanctions and everything else, its ability to act as a broker to bring about peace is diminished, and this war then goes on for another two years and hundreds of thousands of more people will die. "So we're trying to avoid that. We hope to avoid that."

He said right now there are countries in Europe that are still buying massive amounts of oil and natural gas from Russia, "which is absurd." He called



upon European countries too to impose sanctions.

They (European countries)

are asking for the US to impose more sanctions but there are countries in Europe that are not

"I think it's important for Europe to impose sanctions, too. Right now there are countries in Europe that are still buying massive amounts of oil and natural gas from Russia, which is absurd. I mean, they're asking for the U.S. to impose more sanctions, but there are countries in Europe that are not doing enough. So I think they

need to do more," Rubio said. The comments by Rubio come even as he said in a meeting with External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar yesterday that India is a relationship of "critical importance" for the United States. He expressed appreciation for the Indian government's

continued engagement on a number of issues including trade, Defence, energy, pharmaceuticals, critical minerals, and other items related to the bilateral relationship.

A statement issued by the State Department said the two also agreed that both countries will continue working together to promote a free and open Indo-Pacific region, including through the QUAD. It was their first in-person meeting after the Trump administration last month slapped 50 percent tariffs on India. The meeting also comes amid the Trump administration's decision to hike H-1B visa fees to 100,000 US Dollars for new applicants. UNI

### **ED** arrests alleged mastermind in major Goa land grabbing Scam

NEW DELHI SEP 23: The Enforcement Directorate (ED) said today that its Panaji office has arrested Mohammed Suhail, also known as Michael, in a Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA) case related to large-scale land grabbing.

Suhail, the alleged mastermind of a large-scale illegal land-grabbing syndicate in Goa, was arrested from the Colvale Correctional Home, where he was already in judicial custody for another scheduled offence. He was produced before a Special Court (PMLA) in Merces, which remanded him to four days of ED custody.

The ED initiated its PMLA investigation based on



a First Information Report (FIR) and a chargesheet filed by the Special Investigation Team (SIT - Land Grab) of the Goa Police. The police case was registered against Suhail, his wife Anjum Shaikh, and an associate, Nure Faijal Bhatkar, for offences including cheating, forgery of valuable security, and using forged documents as genuine under various sections of the Indian Penal Code (IPC).

The ED investigation revealed that Suhail was the kingpin of a syndicate involved in illegally acquiring numerous properties across Goa. The probe was triggered by a specific complaint in which Suhail and his associates allegedly forged death certificates to create a fictitious legal heir. They then fraudulently executed a succession deed to illegally acquire a property in Anjuna, which was subsequently sold for Rs. 50 lakh, thereby generating proceeds of crime (POC).

Investigation under the PMLA have exposed a deep-rooted conspiracy and a consistent modus operandi. Suhail, in collusion with his associates, would identify vacant properties, forge documents, and manipulate records in government departments to create fake ownership histories. These properties were then illegally transferred to the names of their associates and sold.

In a related case where Suhail is the prime accused, the ED has already attached 52 illegally acquired properties valued at approximately Rs. 232.73 crore and has filed a prosecution complaint against him and 35 others. During that investigation, Suhail himself disclosed his involvement in the illegal acquisition of over 100 properties.

His arrest is a significant development that will enable the ED to interrogate him to uncover the money trail, identify the end-use of the POC, and unearth the involvement of other individuals in this

### **US Secret Service Busts Device Network Threatening UNGA Security**

**NEW DELHI/NEW YORK, SEP 23:** The U.S. Secret Service has dismantled a network of electronic devices located throughout the New York tristate area that were used to conduct multiple telecommunications-related threats directed towards senior U.S. government officials, which represented an imminent threat to the agency's protective operations.

This protective intelligence investigation led to the discovery of more than 300 co-located SIM servers and 100,000 SIM cards across multiple sites, the Secret Service said in a statement.

These devices were concentrated within 35 miles of the global meeting of the United Nations General Assembly now underway in New York City. In addition to carrying out anonymous telephonic threats, these devices could be used to conduct a wide range of telecommunications attacks. This includes disabling cell phone towers, enabling denial of services attacks and facilitating anonymous, encrypted communication between potential threat actors and criminal enterprises.

While forensic examination of these devices is ongoing, early analysis indicates cellular communications between nation-state threat actors and individuals that are known to federal law enforcement.

"The potential for disruption to our country's telecommunications posed by this network of devices cannot be overstated," said U.S. Secret Service Director Sean Curran. "The U.S. Secret Service's protective mission is all about prevention, and this investigation makes it clear to potential bad actors that imminent threats to our protectees will be immediately investigated, tracked down and dismantled." Given the timing, location and potential for significant disruption to New York telecommunications posed by these devices, the agency moved quickly to disrupt this network, the Secret Service said.

The U.S. Secret Service's Advanced Threat Interdiction Unit, a new section of the agency dedicated to disrupting the most significant and imminent threats to our protectees, is conducting this investigation. UNI

## Hezbollah Has 'Zero' Incentive to Disarm Amid Israeli Strikes: US Envoy

**WASHINGTON, SEP 23:** US Ambassador to Turkey and special envoy to Syria Thomas Barracksaid that the Lebanon-based Islamic hardline militant-political group - Hezbollah has "zero" incentive to lay down their arms, as Israel's military campaign in Gaza, and strikes in Syria, Lebanon, Iran, and Qatar have exacerbated security worries in the

Middle East.

In an interview with UAEbased IMI media, he said, "I mean, this is the problem, especially when Israel is attacking everybody," reports Times of Israel.

"Israel is attacking Syria. Israel is attacking Lebanon. Israel is attacking Tunisia. As it goes on, their argument gets better and better as we're here to protect the weapons from Israel," he remarked. Lebanon's govern-

ment, earlier this month, approved a plan by its military to disarm the Iranian-backed terror group. Hezbollah has dismissed the plan and vowed it won't give up its weapons.

Israel has been striking in Syria to prevent the former Assad regime's weapons from getting into the hands of hostile forces, specifically religious hardline elements which have gained even more power in the new Al-Sharra

regime, while also vowing protection of the Syrian Druze.

Likewise, it has been striking Lebanon to prevent the militant group from restoring its offensive capabilities after last year's war.

However, Israel has not confirmed any strike in Tunisia. The organisers of a Gaza-bound aid flotilla accused Israel earlier this month of twice launching a drone strike on one of their boats in Tunisia. Commenting on the issue of the strike in Qatar, the US diplomat called Doha a "great and valuedally"toWashington,praising its leaders. He further proceeded to defend the country from allegations of harbouring and funding terrorists, due to its history of hosting the Afghan Taliban and Hamas, claiming that people get 'confused' on this issue, and thus accuse Qatar of owing its allegiance to Islamic terror

"They did it at our request," hesaid, adding, "If we didn't have some conduit to be able to speak to them, we would never get

The US envoy, remarking on the new regime in Damascus, wasnotshyofmakinghisdistrust known, adding that this distrust extended to all countries in the Middle East, Israel included.

"Quite honestly, in this business, I don't trust any of them. Our interests are not aligned. Ally is a mistaken word."


Regarding the Israel–Hamas

## **Suryakumar Yadav: India vs Pakistan isn't** a rivalry anymore

### India captain lauds Shivam Dube's spell as the turning point of the game

**NEW DELHI:** Suryakumar Yadav has dismissed the notion that an India vs Pakistan clash is a rivalry anymore. He was responding to a question on whether Pakistan raised their standards on Sunday night compared to their opening bout last week - which they lost by seven wickets, with 25 balls to spare. "I would like to say one thing on this question. I feel that you should stop asking this question on the rivalry," he said, before being reminded the question wasn't about rivalry at all.

For the record, India have now beaten Pakistan in seven straight games [in men's internationals alone since their previous loss to them at the Asia Cup in 2022 in

"Standards and rivalry are the same," he continued. "According to me, if two teams play 15-20 matches and if [headto-head] it is 7-7 or 8-7, then that is called a rivalry. But 13-0, 10-1....I don't know what the stats are. But this is not a rivalry anymore. But yeah, I feel we played better cricket than them." Prior to being asked about his take on the "rivalry", Suryakumar highlighted what he felt was the game's decisive phase - the halfway mark of

Pakistan's innings - with Pakistan 91 for 1 in ten overs, by far their highest half-time score in T20Is against India. It's at this point that Suryakumar rallied his team around as the umpires called for a drinks interval. Post that, India managed to put the brakes on Pakistan with the next seven overs producing just 38 - the lowest tally for teams that have batted between overs 10-17 at this tournament.


"According to me, the turning point was in the first drinks in the first innings," Suryakumarsaid."People changed their body language after that. You always see the game changes generally after the powerplay.

"But today, the game changed after ten overs, when the bowlers changed their line and lengths, understood what was needed in that situation, and showed a little more energy. The spinners bowled well. And according to me, Shivam Dube's spell, you can say that it was a turning point."

This was only the third time in 38-match T20I career so far that Dube has bowled his full quota of overs. Dube's spell helped make up for Jasprit Bumrah having an off-day. After conceding 34 off his three overs - his most expensive powerplay spell - Bumrah finished with figures of 4-0-45-0.
