

Voting and counting for 4 seats on October 24; 3 elections to be held for 4 Seats

SRINAGAR, SEP 24: The Election Commission of India (ECI) on Wednesday announced the schedule for elections to four Rajya Sabha seats from the Union Territory of Jammu & Kashmir.

According to a notification issued by the poll-body, a copy of which is in possession of news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO), the Commission will issue the notification for these seats on October 6.

As per the schedule, the last date for filing nominations is October 13, while scrutiny of nomina-



tions will take place on October 14. The last date for withdrawal of candidatures is October 16.

5 Months After Pahalgam Attack, Tourism in Kashmir Still in Crisis

SRINAGAR, SEP 24: Five months after the deadly terror attack in Pahalgam on April 22, Kashmir's tourism sector, a key pillar of its economy, continues to reel from its worst crisis in decades.

The attack that killed 25 tourists and a local resident not only shook the valley's sense of security but also triggered a cascading economic fallout, the effects of which are still being felt across hotels, transport, handicrafts and thousands of livelihoods tied to the industry.

As per the details obtained by the news agency-Kashmir News Observer (KNO), the timeline from tragedy to struggle is as follows.

April 22, 2025 – The attack A terror strike in the Baisaran meadows of Pahalgam claimed 26 lives, sending shockwaves through Kashmir's tourism industry at the onset of the spring season. Within hours, tourists fled in panic, mass cancellations followed, and businesses faced immediate losses.



During the interaction, the Lieutenant Governor said that under the leadership of Hon'ble Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi, Operation Sindoor, marked one of India's boldest military responses in recent history and the balanced strategic restraint

with assertive action has drawn a new red line against terrorism.

"If there is a terrorist attack on India in the future, it will be seen as an act of war and a fitting reply will be given. India has also made it clear that it will not tolerate any nuclear blackmail and it will strike precisely and decisively at the terrorist hideouts," the Lieutenant Governor said.



CS takes stock of critical care health projects under PM-ABHIM and ECRP

SRINAGAR, SEP 24: Chief Secretary, Atal Dulloo today chaired a meeting to take a comprehensive project-wise review of the ongoing critical care projects being established across different districts under the Pradhan Mantri-Ayushman Bharat Health Infrastructure Mission (PM-ABHIM) and Emergency COVID Response Package-II (ECRP-II).

The meeting was attended by Secretary, Health & Medical Education Department(H&ME); Mission Director, NHM; Principals of Government Medical Colleges; Managing Director, HSCC; and other senior officers of the depart-



Underscoring the importance of these critical care facilities in strengthening the healthcare infrastructure across J&K, the Chief Secretary directed the executing agencies to enhance the pace of work to ensure timely completion of all projects.

He stressed that the creation of such facilities would go a long way in augmenting tertiary and secondary healthcare capacities, particularly in district hospitals and new medical colleges.

During the meeting, the Chief Secretary took a detailed appraisal of the physical and financial progress of each project, the availability of manpower

the notification states. Counting of votes will take place on the same day at 5:00 PM.

The four Rajya Sabha seats-previously held by Mir Muhammad Fayaz, Shamsher Singh, Ghulam Nabi Azad, and Nazir Ahmed Laway-have remained vacant since their retirement in February 2021.

The poll body attributed the delay in holding elections to the non-availability of the required electorate at the time the vacancies

Elected MLAs constitute the electorate for these elections. Nominated MLAs are not eligible to participate in Rajya Sabha polls.

The Commission stated that these seats will be filled through three separate electionsone each for two seats and a combined election for the two seats that became vacant simultaneously.

As per the notification, the tenure of the newly elected members will be subject to the outcome of a pending Supreme Court case-SLP (C) No. 17123/2015 (Election Commission of India vs. Devesh Chandra Thakur & Others)-

Conference-Congress alliance, which is expected to secure three of the four available seats. The Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP), meanwhile, is comfortably positioned to claim one seat.

According to a notification issued by the poll body on Wednesday, as per news agency-Kashmir News Observer (KNO), three separate elections will be held to fill the four vacant seats-one election each for the first two seats, and a combined election for the remaining two.

The Jammu & Kashmir Assembly comprises 90 seats, of which two-Budgam and Nagrota-are currently vacant. This brings the effective strength of the House to 88, including the seat held by Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) MLA Mehraj Malik, who is currently under detention under the Public Safety Act (PSA).

The combined strength of the NC, Congress, CPI (M), and independent MLAs supporting the alliance stands at 53-down from 54 following Mehraj Malik's withdrawal of support to the Omar Abdullah-led government. The alliance includes 41 MLAs from NC, six from Congress, five independents, and one from CPI (M).

The BJP holds 28 seats. In addition, six MLAs from smaller Kashmir-based parties and independents form a non-BJP opposition bloc in the House. These members maintain a neutral stance, distancing themselves from both the treasury benches and the BJP. This group includes three MLAs from the PDP, one from the PC, and two independents-Shabir Kullay (MLA Shopian) and Sheikh Khursheed(MLA Langate), who is considered independent as his party is not registered with the Election Commission of India. With Mehraj Malik added to this bloc, the total rises to seven.

Based on current numbers, the NC-led alliance is expected to win the first two seats-each to be decided through separate elections-given its 53-member strength compared to BIP's 28. These two seats could go uncontested if the BJP decides not to field candidates.

For the third and fourth seats, which will be decided through a combined election, voting will take place only if the NC-led alliance chooses to contest the fourth seat.

The NC-led alliance is projected to secure 29 first-preference votes for the third seat, leaving it with 24 second-preference votes for the fourth seat. The BJP, with 28 votes, is favoured to win the fourth seat.

The six MLAs from PDP, PC, and independents are expected to play a minimal role in the elections. They have been vocal critics of both NC and BJP.

There are also chances of cross-voting, considering that seven independent MLAsfive from the ruling alliance and two from the opposition-are not required to show their marked ballot papers to any authorized agent.

Mehraj Malik, who is in detention under the Public Safety Act (PSA), is eligible to vote in the Rajya Sabha elections. Section 62(5) of the Representation of the People Act, 1951, does not bar a person from voting if they are under preventive detention. It only prohibits voting by individuals confined in prison or in lawful police custody-whether serving a sentence or otherwise.

Who are frontrunners for party tickets? Sources in National Conference indicate that Dr. Farooq Abdullah and Sajad Kichloo are the frontrunners for the party ticket.

The Congress is also likely to seek one seat out of the three that the alliance is poised to win. The grand old party could field a candidate from mainland Jammu or a sitting MLA from South Kashmir, if the NC concedes a seat to it.

If the NC decides to contest the fourth seat, it may field a young face from South Kashmir to maintain its grip in the region, where it won 10 out of 16 seats in the last election.

The BJP is expected to keep its cards close to its chest until the last moment. It could field either a former MLA or a new face, given its reputation for springing surprises.

Sunil Kumar Sharma, the BJP's tactician who played a crucial role in the party's victories during the last Assembly elections across the entire Chenab Valley, is expected to play a key role in finalizing the party's strategy for the polls—(KNO)

Vice-Chancellor of the Islamic University of Science and Technology (IUST). Prof. Gupta, in his detailed presentation, underlined the urgent need to develop earthquake-resilient infrastructure in Kashmir, which lies within the vulnerable Himalayan earthquake belt.

Drawing from the example of a successful medium-term earthquake forecast in the northeast Himalayan region, Prof. Gupta stressed the importance of conducting similar studies in Kashmir.

He suggested multiple measures including observing an "Earthquake Safety Day", training school students on earthquake safety, creating scenarios of past major quakes to plan preparedness, conducting mega-mock drills, ensuring strict compliance with earthquakesafe construction practices, and deploying Earthquake Early Warning Systems along the Himalayan belt.

The Chief Minister appreciated Prof. Gupta's insights and emphasized that the government is committed to developing earthquake-resilient infrastructure in Jammu and Kashmir. He assured that the suggestions would be considered as part of the J&K's broader strategy on disaster preparedness and public safety.

major tourist sites, and 48 of 87 tourist resorts were shut as a precaution. Hotel occupancy nosedived to 5–10%, bookings were wiped out, and thousands of people dependent on tourism — from pony handlers to taxi drivers — were left without work.

May – Desperate push for revival The government and stakeholders launched campaigns to restore visitor confidence. Security patrols were increased, and political leaders visited key sites. Despite discounts and incentives, footfall remained weak as fears persisted.

June - Partial reopening

In the month of June, after over three months, authorities reopened 16 of the closed resorts, offering hope to struggling businesses. Occupancy rose slightly but remained far below seasonal norms, forcing hotels and travel operators to offer steep discounts.

July – A fragile summer season The annual Amarnath Yatra was held under heavy security, helping project a semblance of normalcy. Domestic tourists from states like Gujarat and Maharashtra slowly returned, yet foreign arrivals remained negligible, and overall numbers stayed far

below 2024 levels. August – Nature's fury adds to the crisis In mid-August, a cloudburst in Kishtwar's Chositi village triggered flash floods and landslides, causing extensive damage to infrastructure and affecting local travel. Ongoing landslides and road disruptions across the region hindered tourist movement, prompting cancellations and travel delays.

Tourism stakeholders said the combined impact of the natural disaster and the lingering effects of the Pahalgam attack further strained the sector, deepening the

economic crisis. Adding to the crisis, in August, landslides and rockfalls temporarily closed the Jammu-Srinagar National Highway, disrupting tourist travel and forcing cancellations, further straining the region's struggling tourism sector

September - Five months on, shadow

persists The sector continues to struggle. Only around 9,000 tourists, including 400 foreigners, visited in the first half of September - compared to over 1 lakh during the same period last year, as revealed by BIP spokesperson Manzoor Bhat on September 15.

The economic fallout Tourism, which contributes significantly to Jammu and Kashmir's GSDP, has seen a sharp contraction. Hotels, houseboats, transporters, artisans and small vendors remain deeply

affected. The government continues efforts to rebuild confidence with safety assurances, promotional campaigns, and financial incentives.

Speaking with KNO, Mushtaq Ahmad Chaya, Chairman of the Jammu and Kashmir Hotels Club, said hotel occupancy in the Kashmir Valley has dropped severely, with only 10 per cent of hotels currently occupied. "Losses cannot be estimated as hotels all over the valley suffered losses," Chaya said.

He said the Pahalgam attack has cast a shadow over the valley's tourism. "The Chief Minister, Prime Minister and others are pushing hard for revival of tourism, and we hoteliers are also requesting LG Manoj Sinha and the administration to reopen the closed tourist sites and let us show people that normalcy prevails here and that they can come," he said. Recently, KNO also reported that the famous shikaras of Dal Lake — often referred to as the "floating taxis of Kashmir" now lie idle, their vibrant canopies fading under the sun.

With tourists vanishing after the April 22 Pahalgam attack, the men who rowed them for generations are being pushed to desperate

choices Wali Mohammad, President of the Shikara Association Kashmir, told KNO that many owners have been forced to abandon the lake.

"Shikaras have been our identity, our lifeline. Today, the same boats float empty. Many owners are now running small shops, pushing carts, or doing gig work because they too have to feed their families," he said—(KNO)

spokesman said special consideration shall be given to those master artisans who have demonstrated excellence in their craft, recognizing their potential to mentor emerging talents and drive revival efforts. "Selected Karkhandars will receive comprehensive support, including a monthly honorarium of

2,000 per trainee (for up to 10 trainees per Karkhana), a lumpsum of 25,000 per batch for logistical support," he added.

He further stated that trainees under the scheme will also benefit from 2,000 monthly stipends, disbursed in instalments upon successful completion of their probationary training.

Launched in 2021 as a pilot project by the Directorate of Handicrafts and Handloom, the Karkhandar Scheme focuses on identifying and training artisans in various crafts such as walnut wood carving, silver filigree, carpet weaving, Kani shawl weaving, Khatamband, Papier Mache, Sozni embroidery, as well as languishing crafts like glazed pottery, Numdha felting as well as Gabba and Wagguv making.

The Karkhandar Scheme has already transformed lives by sanctioning 80 units, empowering them to preserve our rich heritage while creating economic opportunities. "Eligible awardee artisans, particularly meritorious ex-trainees from department- are encouraged to apply with online applications which shall include completed form, affidavit, self-attested copies of documents such as Aadhaar, qualification proofs, and prior training certificates, and a passport-size photograph.

CBSE announces.....

For the first time, Class 10 board exams will be conducted twice in an academic year. The first set of exams will be held from February 17 to March 6, 2026, while the second set is scheduled between May 15 and June 1, 2026, according to CBSE Examination Controller Sanyam Bhardwaj.

Class 12 board examinations will run from February 17 to April 9, 2026, covering all major subjects. Bhardwaj also outlined a revised evaluation process, stating that assessment of answer scripts will begin around 10 days after each subject's examination and will be completed within 12 days. For example, evaluation for the Class 12 Physics exam scheduled on February 20 will begin on March 3 and conclude by March 15.

Officials said the move aims to reduce stress among students, streamline evaluation timelines, and ensure timely declaration of results. (KINS)

CBK busts.....

after unearthing a multi-crore land compensation scam linked to the 400 KV DC Samba-Amargrah Transmission Line project.

The case was initiated following a complaint that compensation for land acquired in Watrad, Dalabal and Kachwari villages of Tehsil Khansahib, Budgam had been released in favour of non-existent individuals, leaving genuine landowners deprived of their dues.

Investigations revealed that compensation worth crores of rupees was fraudulently siphoned off using fake bank accounts in the names of bogus persons. The fraudulent withdrawals were allegedly made by employees of M/s Unitac Power Transmission Limited in collusion with land brokers and certain bank officials.

The names of Mushtaq Ahmad Lone of Watrad Dalabal, Budgam, Bilal Ahmad Mir of Patushai Watpora, Bandipora, and Unitac employees Ranjit Singh and Samaliya Kumar, among others, have surfaced during the probe.

Officials confirmed that searches at multiple locations are ongoing as part of the investigation. (KNT)

world's top two percent scientists in the field of Clinical Medicine and Cancer. This is the third consecutive year that the cancer researcher working on Breast Cancer Drug Repurposing and Development from Kashmir has received the recognition.

Specialising in triple negative breast cancer, Dr Mir is regarded as one of the valley's leading scientific minds. He completed his Ph.D. in Cancer Immunology at Jawaharlal Nehru University (JNU) through IMTECH-CSIR before topping the J&K Public Service Commission's list for Assistant Professors in 2009. He went on to serve as the first nodal officer of Kashmir University's Kupwara campus in 2011. The following year, he joined the Department of Bioresources, becoming Coordinator in 2019 and Head of Department in 2024.

Over the past decade, Dr Mir has built an impressive academic record. He has authored 22 international books, contributed 85 book chapters, and published more than 85 peer reviewed research papers in leading scientific Journals, with a combined impact factor exceeding 500. His work has earned him an h-index of 33, an i-10 index of 104, and more than 3800 citations in the last five years alone. He has also guided over seven Ph.D. scholars and 50 postgraduate students for their thesis. Besides he has developed four MOOC Courses for SWAYAM Ministry of Education which have more than 10000 enrolments in the last five years. He has successfully completed 5 research projects with

crores of funding from external agencies. Beyond research, Dr Mir has played a vital role in raising awareness about breast cancer and promoting scientific literacy in the region. He has organised numerous workshops, faculty development programmes, seminars and breast cancer awareness camps. Most recently, he held the DST-INSPIRE Science Camp for school and college students across Kashmir. He successfully organised the first IK International Conference on Breast Cancer at the University of Kashmir in october 2024, along with a large-scale breast cancer screening camp by bringing cancer experts from all

across the country. His contributions have been recognised with several awards, including the Teachers Associate Research Excellence Fellowship (TARE) from SERB-DST and the Summer Research Fellowship (2019) from the Indian Academy of Sciences. Significantly, Dr Mir was also screened for the National Teachers Award 2025 by the AICTE, Ministry of Education, Government of India, in recognition of his outstanding contributions to academics research and teaching.

Dr Mir is also a member of some of the world's leading scientific organisations, including the American Association of Cancer Research, American Society of Clinical Oncology, European Society of Medical Oncology, and the Indian Immunology society, Indian Cancer Society and Immuno-oncology Societies.

At the Department, Dr Mir now envisions transforming Bioresources into a multidisciplinary hub for applied life sciences. His focus is on building collaborations with leading national and international institutions to create research that directly benefits society.

For Kashmir, his recognition is not only a personal achievement but also a reminder of the valley's growing contribution to global science. Recognition from Stanford for third year in a row with improved overall global ranking of 600 is therefore more than just an academic honour and it signals that a scientist's work is being noticed and valued on a global scale, placing them among the elite whose research influences the future of knowledge and innovation.

and machinery at worksites, and the progress achieved since the last review. He called for strict adherence to deadlines and continuous monitoring to avoid delays.

The Secretary, H&ME informed the meeting that under PM-ABHIM, works are underway on two 100-bedded critical care blocks at GMC Jammu and District Hospital Budgam, along with seven 50-bedded blocks at GMC Kathua, GMC Rajouri, GMC Doda, GMC Anantnag, SKIMS Medical College Bemina, and District Hospital Kulgam. Additionally, 20 District Integrated Public Health Labs (DIPHLs) and 287 Block Public Health Units (BPHUs) are also being established across the UT.

Under ECRP-II, seven more 50-bedded critical care blocks are being developed at GMC Udhampur and the District Hospitals of Reasi, Pulwama, Kupwara, Poonch, Shopian, and Ganderbal.

The meeting also reviewed the progress on the establishment of 104 Urban Ayushman Arogya Mandirs (UAAMs), out of which 52 have been completed, while 79 are targeted for completion by March 31, 2026.

Kashmir's Floods: Nature's Final Warning

Wake Up, Before the Mountains Scream

The Himalayas remember every tree we cut and every warning we ignored.

When the Mountains Wake

They say nature doesn't forgive-because it remembers. In Kashmir, the mountains remember every felled tree, every illegal road, every warning ignored. And this monsoon, they woke

On August 14 in Chosoti, Kishtwar, the sky cracked open. Pilgrims resting along the Machail Mata route heard what seemed like thunder—but within minutes, walls of water and rock came crashing down. Camps, families, even children were buried where they $stood. At least sixty lives \, ended \, before \, anyone \, could \,$

Weeks later in Kathua, parents dug through landslide debris with bare hands, searching for their children. In Doda, families watched their homes crumble as torrents ripped through village walls. Across Jammu & Kashmir, more than 700 lives have been lost in just three months. These are not statistics. They were farmers, students, shopkeepers-ordinary lives ended by extraordinary violence.



Why This Fury?

Because we stripped the slopes bare. Trees cut illegally, hillsides carved for roads, rivers crowded with construction—we weakened the land until it could no longer hold itself together.

Because the planet is running a fever. With global temperatures now 1.1-1.3 °C hotter than preindustrial times, the monsoon veers wildly between drought and deluge. In the Himalayas, that volatility turns lethal.

And because we forgot. In 2014, floods drowned Srinagar. We fled, rebuilt, then went back to sleep. We called it an act of God instead of a warning. Eleven years later, the same mistakes returned—crueler.

A Simple Lesson from the Land

Picture a terraced hillside. Each step holds water, slowing its fall. Remove the steps—cut the slope, clear the trees—and one downpour will bring the

whole hillside crashing down. That is Kashmir today: defenses dismantled, waiting for the next blow. Who Must Answer?

Authorities cannot keep treating mountains as real estate. Forests are not obstacles; they are shields. Early-warning systems and resilient infrastructure are not luxuries; they are lifelines.

And we, the people, are not innocent. We settle floodplains, ignore warnings, and mistake negligence for destiny. Every illegal wall or hut on a riverside is a wager against the lives of our neighbors.

Wake Up. Now

The floods of 2014 were a whisper. This year was a shout. If we do not act, the next cry will be a scream—and it will sound like villages breaking, bridges collapsing, children being carried away.

The mountains have woken. The only question

An official who greets the poor with respect, listens patiently and ensures a fair process does more than fulfill a duty he restores faith in the very idea of governance.

A kind word, a transparent procedure and a refusal to accept illicit favors can transform fear into trust. The poor should never feel small because they lack wealth or influence. They should never have to pay to access what is

already their right. Public service is not merely about files and signatures; it is about safeguarding human dig-

A society where government offices welcome the weakest with fairness and empathy is one where administration rises to the level of moral commitment. Probity in governance is, therefore, not just a principle of good administration; it is the very heartbeat of justice and democracy. When the last citizen is treated with respect, governance ceases to be mere machinery, it becomes an instrument of humanity.

Marriage Market in Kashmir Goes Online

As economic pressures, societal expectations, and rising divorce rates reshape marriages in Kashmir, a new app is offering young people privacy, trust, and hope.

Saima leans by the carved wooden window of her parents' home, watching sunlight dance across Dal Lake. Memories of her wedding day return, filled with both hope and heartache.

She had dreamed of stability and companionship, but the marriage collapsed within six months. She came back home carrying betrayal and a divorce.

What lingered longer than heartbreak was the judgment of relatives and neighbours.

Seven years later, the thought of remarriage still feels distant.

Her experience reflects a wider shift in Kashmir, where young people are grappling with uncertainty, heavy wedding expenses, and shifting social expectations.

Unemployment among men stands at 17.4 percent, making many reluctant to marry until they feel financially secure. Families, meanwhile, struggle with the weight of dowries and extravagant ceremonies.

Divorce, once rare, is steadily rising, signaling changes in how people view marriage, gender roles, and companionship.

Imran, 32, a software engineer, returned from studying abroad eager to build a life in Srinagar. He wants a steady career and a family, but the unstable job market has made him cautious.

He has watched friends marry only to stumble under financial burdens and family demands. He wonders if he is ready for the same. Ayesha, 29, a postgraduate in English literature, faces another

kind of barrier. Despite her education, she finds herself sidelined by a society that often prefers younger, less-quali-

Relatives advise her to lower her expectations, a suggestion that leaves her isolated and anxious.

Data confirms these personal

Jammu and Kashmir has India's highest share of unmarried youth at 29.1 percent, according to the Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation.

Fertility rates have dropped to

1.4. far below the replacement level of 2.1, raising concerns about an aging population and shrinking work-

Doctors, too, warn of health risks. Women marrying later, says Dr. Masooda Khan, an obstetrician in Srinagar, face greater chances of hypertension, diabetes, and cesarean births.

For men, economic insecurity continues to delay marriages, making the issue even more complex.

It is in this setting that Nikahfyme was born.

Developed by Srinagar-based entrepreneur Imad Ur Rehman, better known for his brand name Imad-Clicks, the app offers a secure and culturally attuned space for match-

Within a month of its launch, more than 20,000 users signed up, clear proof that Kashmiri youth are searching for alternatives to traditional networks.

Every profile is carefully verified: government-issued IDs and, in some cases, facial recognition confirm authenticity, while encrypted data protection ensures privacy, crucial in a region where trust is

Behind the platform is a team of young Kashmiri professionals. Developers, designers, and support staff have worked together to create an interface that feels modern yet culturally rooted.

The first 30 days saw three families tying knots, a sign that digital matchmaking is possible even in conservative settings.

For users like Imran, the app offers order and privacy.

"It's not like family-arranged meetings," he says. "Here, you can see profiles, understand backgrounds, and talk without feeling judged. It feels like a private space to make serious decisions.'

Ayesha agrees. "I feel respected here," she says. "The focus is on compatibility and values, not just age or looks. For women like me, that means everything.

The design of Nikahfyme reinforces these priorities.

The minimum age is set at 21 for women and 25 for men, encouraging serious intentions. Filters allow users to search by sect, profession,

The broader impact is still unfolding. Traditionally, matchmaking depended on family networks and community reputation. That often excluded those who didn't fit

the mold: divorcees, the elderly, or highly educated women.

Apps like Nikahfyme hand over some control, letting individuals shape their own futures.

Still, technology cannot erase the financial pressures. Families remain tied to lavish weddings and dowries, while stagnant wages and unstable jobs make marriage a gamble.

Rising divorce reflects not only economic strain but also shifting expectations. Young couples want relationships based on values and mutual respect, not obligation.

For Saima, these digital platforms signal a second chance. She watches friends find partners through verified apps, rebuilding lives with more autonomy than earlier gen-

"It's a relief to know there's a system that values privacy and seriousness," she says. "It gives hope to people like me who thought our chances were over."

Nikahfyme is part of Kashmir's wider digital transformation. From education to commerce, online platforms are reshaping traditions. In marriage, the change is deeply personal, touching families, values, and futures.

Technology cannot lift every burden, but it provides tools to steer them with more transparency and choice. The growing popularity of Nikahfyme points to a cultural shift.

Young Kashmiris, once entirely dependent on family networks, are carving out space for autonomy in choosing life partners.

For many, marriage is a partner-ship built on shared aspirations, personal values, and trust in a system that protects privacy.

On afternoons when the sun lights up Dal Lake, Saima allows herself to imagine a new beginning, guided by both tradition and technology. Imran and Ayesha scroll through profiles, measuring compatibility, values, and ambition.

Nikahfyme may not solve every challenge Kashmiri youth face, but it offers something rare in the marriage market: a sense of control, dignity, and hope.

Kashmir's Poet-Physician Redefining Relief Globally

Dr. Akhtar Purvez brings the spirit of Kashmir to American medicine, blending science and poetry to transform healthcare.

n a bitter winter morning in the early 1960s, in Tangmarg, just 23 miles from the capital city, a young Akhtar Purvez watched a neighbour mount a horse and ride ten miles to summon a doctor.

Hours later, the physician returned the same way.

By then, the patient had died. "That memory stayed with me," Purvez recalls. "It wasn't just the loss of life. It was the intense feeling of unmitigated suffering, helplessness, and the relief that was out of our reach."

He grew up in a place where hospitals were distant, doctors rare, and families often relied on prayer, herbal remedies, or

Those early experiences left a lasting impression on the boy who would go on to practice pain medicine in the United States, still a new field of medicine, and lead medical research to discover new therapies that would benefit the humanity beyond one country.

Today, Purvez is a leading physician in America, shaping how chronic pain, and its related field of addiction medicine, is understood and treated around the world.

His upbringing was modest but rich in culture. His father, the renowned Kashmiri-American intellectual and poet, Muzaffar Aazim, instilled in him the virtues of service to the humankind without discrimination and a love of language and culture.

"Our home was full of books and conversations," he says. "We didn't have much wealth,

but we had values: honesty, hard work, and respect for others.

Healthcare in the valley remained a struggle. The nearest hospital was more than fifty miles away, and traditional remedies often failed.

"I saw pain treated as destiny," Purvez continues. "That was difficult for me to accept. I wanted to understand pain and confront it." Medicine carried great re-

spect in Kashmir. Doctors were guardians of life, and humility was expected.

That cultural gap hit him hard during his first residency interview in the United States.

"They asked why they should hire me," he laughs. "I thought my résumé spoke for itself. In Kashmir, speaking of your achievements feels like boasting. In America, it's a way of life to highlight who you are, and what you have done."

After earning a Master of Surgery in India, Purvez moved to the United States. His first year as a surgical resident in New York was relentless: twentyhour shifts, sleepless nights, and long stretches without food.

"I asked about another young Kashmiri who had started before me. They said, 'He lasted only two months.' That scared me," he recalls. "But I decided I would not give up."

Perseverance carried him to Boston University Medical Center, where he trained in anesthesiology, opening a path to pain medicine, a field that demands both precision and em-

Later, at the University of Virginia, he studied under Dr.



John Rowlingson, a pioneer, a thought leader in the specialty, and a mentor that would shape his professional career for years

to come. Today, Purvez is President of Momentum Medical Research in Virginia. Over four decades, he has served as a head and neck surgeon, anesthesiologist, interventional pain specialist, and principal

investigator in major clinical trials. His studies range from osteoarthritis treatments to metabolic disorders, vaccine safety and beyond.

Certified by both the American Board of Pain Medicine and the American Board of Anesthesiology, he has helped shape standards that ripple through the medical systems worldwide. "I've always believed mediis President of **Momentum Medical** Research in Virginia. Over four

cine is not only about science," he says. "It is also about listening to people, understanding their suffering, and helping them reclaim their lives."

He also teaches as an Adjunct Clinical Professor at Lincoln Memorial University. He has mentored students from Boston University, the University of Virginia, and elsewhere.

"Technical skill matters," he tells them. "But it should be the caring and compassion that should guide you."

Purvez has written extensively. His books, "Managing Chronic Pain in an Age of Addiction," and "The Brain Behind Pain," have influenced public debate during the opioid crisis. These are available in most libraries in the United States.

He emphasizes addressing pain responsibly without dismissing patients' suffering.

"Pain doesn't care about your income or passport," he says. "It is democratic. The challenge is how we respond, with compassion and science, or with indifference.'

At local, national, and international conferences, he frames pain care as a matter of human

His research on atrial fibrillation, dietary additives, and chronic pain syndromes appears in leading journals. He also serves on editorial boards shaping the work of future physicians

Yet for all his medical accomplishments, Purvez is also a poet.

Fluent in Kashmiri, Urdu, Hindi, Farsi, and English, his verses echo his father's traditions, often weaving medicine with humanity, and science with spirit.

"I see poetry as a form of healing," he says. "Where medicine reaches the body, poetry reaches the soul. Both are necessary."

His poetry carries Kashmir with it: rivers, mountains, resilience. Abroad, he recites his father's verses, introducing audiences to the cultural fabric of his homeland.

"In many ways," he reflects, "I am an ambassador of Kashmir through both medicine and

The valley, often associated with turmoil in headlines, remains central to his identity.

"The inspiration for what I do, my drive to relieve suffering, was born there," he says.

But even today, Kashmir's healthcare system struggles. A 2023 survey by the Ministry of Health found that nearly 40 percent of patients needing advanced care travel outside the region, often facing crippling financial burdens. Specialists remain scarce, particularly in rural areas.

Reflecting on these challenges, Purvez adds, "Every child in Kashmir who dreams of becoming a doctor should have the chance to learn, serve, and lead. That is the hope I carry for our

In Virginia, that very much resembles like, and reminds him of Kashmir, he continues to treat patients, guide research, and write. His vision blends the wisdom of tradition with modern science.

"Every patient I see reminds me of where I came from, physically and emotionally," he concludes. "That boy in Kashmir who watched a doctor ride on horseback to save a life is still with me. He pushes me for-



Javed Rana meets Union Forest Minister

Highlights strategic priorities for Forest and Environmental Sector, Seeks greater Centre-JK cooperation

NEW DELHI, SEP 24: Minister for Forest, Ecology and Environment, Javed Ahmed Rana, called on the Union Minister for Environment, Forest and Climate Change, Bhupender Yadav in New Delhi to deliberate on a comprehensive set of issues critical to the forest and environmental landscape of Jammu & Kashmir.

The discussion focused on the need for deeper coordination between the Central Government and the Jammu & Kashmir Government to enhance institutional capacity, accelerate ecological restoration and ensure the effective and timely implementation of key forestry

and environmental programs. Given the increasing frequen-

cv of extreme weather events like torrential rains and floods, Rana emphasized the urgency of strengthening J&K's resilience through targeted interventions in forest fire management, catchment area treatment, biodiversity conservation and wetland ecosystem protection.

The Minister also sought release offunds under the Centrally Sponsored Forest Fire Prevention and Management (FFPM) Scheme, for which detailedworkplanamountingto 3.5 crore for the financial year 2024–25 has already been submitted.

Underscoring the importance of sustained funding, Rana urged

the Union Minister to advise the National CAMPA Authority to expedite the appraisal and approval of two major proposals submit-

ted by J&K Government. The first proposal, "Soil & Water Conservation in the Kandi Belt of Jammu & Kashmir," seeks an investment of 143.72 crore and is designed to address land degradation and water scarcity in the semi-arid belt.

The second project, "Forest Resource Management for Livelihood Improvement of Forest-Dependent Communities including Nomadic Tribes," envisions an outlay of 103.35 crore, focusing on promoting sustainable livelihoods, ecological restoration, and inclusive development among communities living in and around forest areas.

Rana also reiterated the longstanding demand for the release $of funds\, earmarked\, for\, Catchment$ Area Treatment (CAT) Plans and **Biodiversity Conservation Plans** associated with the Kiru and Kwar hydroelectric power projects.

Showcasing JK's strides in digital governance, Rana informed the Union Minister that Jammu & Kashmir has been at the forefront of leveraging technology in forest management.

For the past four years, J&K has successfully implemented a digital portal for the preparation and realtime monitoring of Annual Plans of Operation (APOs) under CAMPA.

With the National CAMPA Authority now transitioning to a centralised digital APO platform, the Minister requested the provision of an Application Programming Interface(API) to facilitate seamless data integration between the J&K CAMPA Portal and the national system. This, he noted, would enhance transparency, efficiency, and accuracy in field-level reporting.

In line with capacity-building efforts, Rana reiterated his earlier request for Jammu & Kashmir to be included in the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA)-assisted project titled "Capacity Enhancement for Effective Forest Management".

ED Conducts FEMA Raids on Jindal Group **Over Suspected Fund Siphoning**

NEW DELHI. SEP 24: The Enforcement Directorate (ED) said today that it recently conducted search operations under the Foreign Exchange Management Act (FEMA) at thirteen premises connected to the group companies of BC Jindal and Shyam Sunder Jindal, its directors, and other officers. The premises searched were located in Delhi NCR and Hyder-


The searches were conducted over suspected FEMA violations by the BC Jindal group entities, especially Jindal India Thermal Power Ltd. (JITPL), lindal India Powertech Ltd., and Jindal Polyfilms Ltd., concerning their overseas investments, the alleged parking of funds in their own overseas entities, and the Ltd., which were further investround tripping of funds.

The ED initiated the investigation based on specific input that BC Jindal Group entities, beneficially owned by Shyam Sundar Jindal, his wife Mrs. Shubhdra Jindal, and son Mr. Bhavesh Jindal, remitted Rs. 505.14 crore outside India to their own overseas entity, Topaz Enterprise DMCC, Dubai. This was done to acquire the shareholding of another overseas entity, Garnet Enterprise DMCC (GED), under the guise of an Overseas Direct Investment

It was gathered that between the financial years 2013-2014 and 2016-17, Jindal Poly Films Ltd (JPFL) made substantial investments totalling Rs. 703.79 crore in Jindal India Powertech

ed in JITPL to set up a coal based thermal power plant in Odisha. In the financial year 2018-19, instead of recovering the Rs. 703.79 crore investment from JIPL, JPFL chose to write it off and sold it at a significant loss to its own promoters and group companies. This is seen as a typical method of siphoning off public investors' money, as JPFL is a listed entity.

Subsequently, on May 2024, JIPL received Rs. 853.72 crore from JITPL by redeeming preferential shares. Instead of repaying this amount to the listed entity JPFL, JIPL allegedly siphoned off Rs. 505.14 crore to Shyam Sundar Jindal's personal entity in Dubai, Topaz Enterprise DMCC, to acquire a 100% stake in Garnet Enterprise



DMCC.

It was gathered that Garnet Enterprise DMCC, Dubai, is a wholly owned subsidiary of Topaz Enterprise DMCC. Garnet Enterprise DMCC, in turn, holds a 48% stake in Jindal Polyfilm Netherlands B.V., which owns

100% stakes in other step down subsidiaries, namely JPF Dutch B.V., JPF USA Holding LLC, USA, and other foreign entities. All these overseas entities are beneficially owned by Shyam Sundar Jindal and his family.

Jindal group is routing its own funds out of the country under the guise of ODI and parking them abroad. During the search action, certain documents related to overseas entities and their acquisition were recovered. According to these documents, Shyam Sundar Jindal is the beneficial owner and 100% shareholder of Topaz Enterprise DMCC and is the key person controlling its finances and those of other overseas entities.

Documents recovered during the search indicate that the Rs. 505.14 crore was transferred outside India through a sham transaction as an ODI, based on a fraudulent valuation of the foreign entity's shares. Two different valuation reports were It is suspected that the BC obtained from two related valuers, showing that the valuation was artificially enhanced to enable a larger remittance out of the country.

Data suggests that Shyam Sundar Jindal and his group entities hold multiple overseas entities in the Netherlands B.V., USA, Belgium, Italy, Kerkrade B.V., Luxembourg, Singapore, China, United Arab Emirates, Germany, etc. It is suspected that funds from India have been placed in these overseas entities in contravention of FEMA pro-

Shyam Sundar Jindal was not available in India during the search, as he had travelled to Hong Kong citing official work and has not yet returned. He has yet to join the investigation. Further investigation into the matter is ongoing. UNI

Skilling of the homeless to re introduce them into the mainstream

NEW DELHI, SEP 24: Asian Paints has tied up with Non-Governmental Organisation (NGO) Aashray Adhikar Abhiyan (AAA) in the national capital for skilling homeless and rag pickers so that they can be gainfully employed and lead a life of dignity.

Aashray Adhikar Abhiyan (AAA) has been working for the homeless people since 25 years. The NGO has been training the homeless in house painting work since 2018, after the 10-15 day course modules, the NGO finds them work in construction sites.

Speaking to UNI, Dev Kumar, Programme coordinator, said: "We teach them painting work on



walls, wood and metal. After the training, we help them find work."

Kumar himself was homeless for a while before joining AAA.

"I came to Delhi in 2004. After losing my job, I fell on hard times and was homeless. I began to live in an AAA night shelter. Later on, I became an employee of the NGO. The homeless often sever ties with their home and relatives due to embarrassment. I myself, for about four years, cut off all ties with my family when I was homeless.

"Not having an ID is a big problem. Hence one of the earliest things that we at AAA did was get ID's of such people made. The homeless and the rag picker community are often targeted and harassed by the police, Hence we motivate them to learn a trade and join the mainstream, that way they can earn more, live with dignity and not be unnecessarily targeted by the police."

Fellow Program coordinator Rajni Singh says that initially, the homeless people have some inhibitions about coming to the night shelters and learning some craft and hence their counselling is very important. UNI

Centre files curative petition in SC over states' exclusive power to levy mineral taxes

NEW DELHI, SEP 24: The union government has filed a curative petition in the Supreme Court challenging last year's landmark judgment that vested the power to levy taxes on mineral rights exclusively with the states. The move signals the Centre's renewed attempt to reclaim legislative competence over mineral taxation, which it says is crucial for ensuring uniformity in the country's fiscal and economic framework.

Solicitor General Tushar Mehta informed a Bench of Justice Vikram Nath and Justice Sandeep Mehta today that the petition had been filed "with all seriousness," stressing that the issue is of national importance.

On July 25, 2024, a nine-judge Constitution Bench led by former Chief Justice D.Y. Chandrachud had, by an 8:1 majority, ruled that Parliament lacks legislative competence to impose taxes on mineral rights under Entry 54 of List I of the Seventh Schedule.

The provision empowers Parliament only to regulate mines and



mineral development in the public interest, leaving taxation powers solely with State legislatures.

The verdict significantly curtailed the Centre's authority, reinforcing that taxation on mineral rights lies within the States' exclusive domain. Several mineral-rich States had welcomed the ruling as a victory for cooperative federalism and financial

Following the July 2024 decision, the Centre had filed review petitions, but the Supreme Court dismissed them, upholding its constitutional interpretation.

The filing of the present curative petition, the final judicial remedy after review petitions are exhausted, reflects the Centre's determination to reopen the debate on mineral taxation powers. UNI

Diwali bonanza for railway staff: Cabinet approves 78-day PLB

NEW DELHI, SEP 24: In a major festive season gesture, the union Cabinet today approved Productivity Linked Bonus (PLB) equivalent to 78 days' wages for eligible non-gazetted railway employees.

The bonus, amounting to Rs. 1,865.68 crore, will benefit over 10.91 lakh employees ahead of the upcoming Durga Puja, Diwali, and Chhath festivals, said an official statement here.

According to the Ministry of Railways, the bonus is a recognition of the commendable performance by railway staff in the financial year 2024–25. During the year, Indian Railways achieved record freight loading of 1,614.90 million tonnes and transported nearly 7.3 billion passengers, reflecting improved operational efficiency and service delivery.

The maximum PLB amount per eligible employee has been fixed at Rs. 17,951. The bonus will be paid to various categories of Group 'C' employees,



including track maintainers, loco pilots, train managers (guards), station masters, supervisors, technicians, technicians' helpers, pointsmen, and ministe-

The annual PLB payment is a longstanding tradition, typically made ahead of Durga Puja and Dussehra, and is aimed at motivating employees towards sustained improvement in the Railways' performance. The officials said the continued payout of PLB underlines the Government's commitment to reward productivity and morale among frontline railway staff.

This year's decision is also likely to provide a consumption boost during the festive season, especially in small towns and rural areas where a large section of railway employees reside, said the officials. UNI

POTUS affirms full support to Israel; French President Macron says Trump can win Nobel only after ending Gaza war

NEW YORK, SEP 24: Meeting at the UN with French President Emmanuel Macron, US President Donald Trump affirmed his full support to Israel, telling reporters "I'm on the side of Israel. I've been on the side of Israel, really, my whole life, and we're going to get a solution, and it's going to be a solution that's good for everybody."

Macron, whose nation led the current wave of Palestinian recognition, told the POTUS that if he wanted to truly win the Nobel Peace Prize, he could do so only upon ending the IDF campaign in Gaza, as per Times of Israel.

He made his comments at the onset of his meeting with leaders of the Muslim world, stating that all the parties will "see if we can do something about" ending the war in Gaza.

Trump linked the effort to free the hostages seized during Hamas' 7 October 2023 assault, saying "We want to stop that. We want to get our hostages back, or their hostages back."

Commenting on Paris' move to recognise Palestinian sovereignty, he echoed his statement from the UNGA, aligning with the Israeli position and said "I think it honours Hamas and you can't do that because of October 7. You just can't do that."



Macron replied that "nobody forgets the 7th of October," but asked, "after almost two years of war, what is the result?"

While he gave his support to Israel's targeting of Hamas leadership, and argued that Jerusalem's move for their elimination was indeed a "great achievement," there has been little reduction in the number of terrorists in the war-torn enclave.

He added "you have as many Hamas fighters as you had the first day. So, it doesn't work to dismantle Hamas. This is not the

Ashwin Enters ILT20 Auction with Highest Base Price

NEW DELHI: R Ashwin has listed a base price of USD 120,000, the highest for any player, at the inaugural ILT20 auction. The auction will be held in Dubai on Oc-

Ashwin, who retired from international cricket as well as the IPL recently, is the only player in the ILT20 auction longlist with a base price in six figures. If he is picked, the ILT20 will be his first overseas T20 league.

Ashwin, 39, is among the 24 Indians on the auction longlist, which has almost 800 players as of now. A final list will be prepared this week once the ILT20 receives the wishlist from each franchise.

The fourth edition of ILT20, comprising six teams, will be played between December 2 and January 4. Ashwin has listed full availability for the tournament, after which he is likely to head to the BBL where four teams are understood to have expressed interest in hiring him for the latter half of the season.

The ILT20 franchises had carried out their retentions and direct signings in July. Each team could spend up to USD 1.2 million on retentions and direct signings, with the balance amount to be added to the auction purse of USD 800,000. While a franchise can exhaust its entire USD 2 million purse, it will need to spend a minimum of USD 1.5 million. The ILT20 rules also permit franchises to spend an additional USD 250,000 to buy up to two wildcard players outside the

As per the squad composition rules, each franchise needs a minimum of 19 players and a maximum of 21, excluding the wildcards. There must be a minimum of 11 players from the Full Member countries, four from UAE, one from Kuwait, one from Saudi Arabia and two from other Associate countries.

The franchises will also have

one right-to-match (RTM) card but they can use it only to buy back a UAE player. That player must have been part of the franchise's development squad or the 2025 squad.

R Ashwin is set to become the first capped male India player to play in the BBL with four clubs vying for his services to play in the latter stages of the upcoming season. It is understood that Sydney Thunder, Hobart Hurricanes, Sydney Sixers and Adelaide Strikers are the four teams chasing Ashwin's signature in what is set to be a major coup for the BBL. Thunder and Hurricanes appear to be the frontrunners for the India great with a deal likely to be finalised later this week.

No internationally capped India male player has played in the BBL previously, but Ashwin's retirement from the IPL earlier this year has opened the door for him to play franchise cricket overseas for the first time.
