

NEW DELHI/BHUJ, OCT 2: In a clear message to Pakistan, Defence Minister Rajnath Singh on Thursday warned the neighbouring country against any aggression towards the Sir Creek region and said that any such move would be met with a "resounding response" that could change "history and geography".

The defence minister made the remarks at a military base near the border city of Bhuj in Gujarat as he celebrated Dussehra with soldiers and performed 'shastra puja' (worship of weapons) on the occasion.

Singh also said that the Indian military successfully achieved all the objectives of Operation Sindoor and starting a war with Pakistan by escalating the situation was

### **'Operation Sindoor....**

Pertinently, the 'Operation Sindoor' was launched against terrorist infrastructure in Pakistan on May 7 this year. It was a response to the April 22 Pahalgam terror attack, which left 26 civilians, mostly tourists, dead. The Indian armed forces destroyed nine terror headquarters deep inside Pakistan and PoK which led to the clashes between the two countries.

The skirmishes continued for 4-days and the hostilities ended after the Pakistan **Director General of Military Operations** (DGMO) reached out to his Indian counterpart and requested for a ceasefire.

The President said the Dusheera festival has always symbolised the triumph of good over evil, humility over arrogance and love over hatred.

demonstrated the capability to reach Lahore. Today in 2025, Pakistan should remember that one route to Karachi passes through the creek," he said.

Sir Creek is a 96-km-long tidal estuary between Gujarat's Rann of Kutch and Pakistan. It is considered a disputed region due to varying interpretations of maritime boundary lines by the two sides.

'Despite 78 years of independence, the border dispute continues in the Sir Creek area. India has repeatedly attempted to resolve this issue through dialogue, but Pakistan's intentions are flawed and unclear," Singh said.

'The recent expansion of its (Pakistan's) military infrastructure in the areas adjacent to Sir Creek reveals its intentions," he said.

The defence minister said the Indian Army and the Border Security Force are

vigilantly guarding India's borders. On Operation Sindoor, Singh said India's fight against cross-border terrorism will

He said Pakistan made an unsuccessful attempt to penetrate India's defence system during the operation, but the Indian military "exposed" the Pakistani air defence apparatus and sent a message to the world that it can inflict heavy losses on the adversary.

"During Operation Sindoor, Pakistan made an unsuccessful attempt to penetrate India's defence system from Leh to Sir Creek,"

"However, in retaliatory action, Indian forces completely exposed the Pakistani air defence system and sent a message to the world that Indian forces can inflict heavy losses on Pakistan whenever and wherever they wish," he said.

Singh said India displayed restraint because its military action was against terrorism.

"Escalating it and starting a war was not the objective of Operation Sindoor. I am happy that Indian forces have successfully achieved all the military objectives of Operation Sindoor. But our fight against terrorism continues," he said.

In response to the Pahalgam terror attack, India launched Operation Sindoor on May 7, targeting terrorist infrastructure in territories controlled by Pakistan. The strikes triggered four days of intense clashes that ended on May 10 with an understanding on stopping military actions.

The defence minister reaffirmed the government's commitment to ensuring greater jointness among the three services.

"It was the jointness of our armed forces that executed Operation Sindoor in record time. On this occasion today, I also want to extend special congratulations to our brave soldiers and officers for the success of Operation Sindoor," Singh said.

'Your strategy, your courage and your capability have proven that India is capable of defeating the enemy in every situation. I am fully confident that the courage of all of you, the valour of all of you, will continue to protect India's sovereignty and integrity," he added.

The defence minister described the Army, the Air Force and the Navy as "three pillars" of India's strength.

"When these three services work together, only then can we effectively face every challenge," he said.

Singh has been performing 'shastra puja' on Dussehra for the last several years, including during his tenure as the Union home minister in the previous NDA govern-

ment. "For us, weapons are not just tools. Weapons are not merely for displaying power. Rather, we believe that weapons are a means to establish righteousness," he said. (Agencies)

forged from lightweight materials. Flanking it were 50-foot figures of Meghnad and Kumbhakarna, their forms crackling with dry grass and hay for the dramatic burn.

In a heartwarming testament to communal harmony, these effigies were sculpted by Muslim artisans like Ghiyasuddin Khan and his family, who have upheld this craft for over 40 years across more than 50 Dussehra events in Jammu and Kashmir.

Khan, speaking to reporters amid the final touches, emphasized, "This is our shared heritage – a bridge of brotherhood that burns away division, just as the flames consume

With a ceremonial arrow shot by a young volunteer portraying Lord Rama, the effigies ignited in a symphony of roaring flames and fireworks, painting the twilight in hues of gold and crimson. The blaze, lasting over 20 minutes, was accompanied by a cascade of sky lanterns and synchronized light shows, turning the evening into a celestial homage to dharma's eternal victory.

Dussehra is also celebrated by Shri Lakshmi Narayan Mandir Management Trust, Gandhi Nagar, Jammu at in Dussehra Ground Gandhi Nagar, Jammu. A beautiful well decorated Rath boarding Lord Rama Lakshman and Maa Sita in similar attire was prepared which passed through various parts of Gandhi Nagar before reaching Dussehra Ground for burning of Effigies of Ravana, Kumbh Karan and Meghnath.

may experience light snowfall, while the plains of Kashmir are expected to receive moderate to heavy rain.

In the Jammu division, isolated locations are likely to experience heavy to very heavy rainfall, accompanied by thunderstorms, lightning, hailstorms, and strong winds reaching speeds of 40 to 50 kilometres per hour, with gusts of up to 70 kilometres per

The IMD has warned that adverse weather conditions could lead to significant disruptions in surface transport, particularly along key routes such as the Jammu-Srinagar and Srinagar-Leh National Highways, as well as other roads in the middle and higher reaches.

There is also a possibility of moderate to severe thunderstorms and lightning, which may be accompanied by strong gusty winds at multiple locations.

The probable impacts also include the possibility of landslides, mudslides and shooting stones in vulnerable areas.

The advisory has urged farmers across the region to suspend all farming operations between October 5 and 7 to prevent potential damage to crops and equipment.

With heavy rainfall expected over a short duration, authorities anticipate a rise in water levels in rivers, local streams and nallas, which could lead to waterlogging in low-lying areas.

mosquito-borne infection in the absence of any vaccine," the official cautioned.

Doctors said that dengue, caused by viruses transmitted by infected Aedes aegypti mosquitoes, remains a persistent health concern in the region. They said the best way to prevent dengue fever is to eliminate pockets of stagnant water that serve as mosquito breeding sites-in homes, schools, workplaces, and surrounding areas.

Mosquito repellents and full-sleeved clothing are essential protective measures, they added.

According to doctors, dengue-spreading mosquitoes are most active during the day, particularly at dusk and dawn. They advised covering as much of the body as possible, using mosquito nets if sleeping during the day, and spraying nets with repellents.

The common symptoms include fever, severe headache, eye pain (behind the eyes), muscle or joint pain, rash, nausea, and vomiting.

Doctors warned that stomach pain, persistent vomiting, bleeding from gums or nose, vomiting blood, blood in stools, extreme fatigue, or restlessness could indicate severe dengue requiring immediate medical attention.

J&K has seen fluctuating dengue patterns in recent years.

In 2024, J&K recorded approximately 7,000 dengue cases. The year 2023 saw 6,403 cases, and 2022 recorded the highest ever-8,269 cases with 18 deaths. In comparison, earlier years saw lower figures, including just two cases in 2009, zero in 2010, and gradual increases in subsequent

investigations established the offenses. The fraudster, a resident of Ramgarh in Samba district, is accused of running an organized racket in connivance with her associates by promising unemployed youth lucrative government jobs in exchange for hefty sums of money. The accused have been identified as Dalip Singh, son of Dayal Singh, resident of Gurha Brahmana Bantalab, Jammu, and Subhash Chander, resident of Ramgarh, who allegedly conspired with the woman in luring and cheating multiple victims

The case was originally registered in 2024 after a written complaint by Bubal Kumar of Kot Bhalwal, Jammu, who alleged that he had been duped of Rs 50 lakh. According to the complaint, the accused assured him that both his unemployed, educated sons would be appointed to government service. The fraudsters even handed over fake appointment orders, which were later discovered to be forged.

During the course of the investigation, Crime Branch sleuths gathered evidence of fraud, forgery, and conspiracy. Based on facts, the accused trio was charge-sheeted under Sections 420, 465, 468, and 120-B of the Indian Penal Code in case FIR No. 56/2024, registered at Police Station Crime Branch EOW lammu.

Confirming the development, Senior Superintendent of Police Crime Jammu, Benam Tosh, said: "The charge-sheet in this highprofile job scam has been filed before the competent court for judicial determination. The accused are habitual offenders who have cheated people of their hard-earned money under the false promise of securing government jobs."

Significantly, police disclosed that this is not the only case against the Samba-based fraudster. In 2025, another case under FIR No. 54 was registered and is under investigation against the same woman and her associates, involving an even larger amount of Rs 1.27 crore. This case is based on a joint complaint lodged by nine victims, all of whom alleged that they were duped in a similar manner with false promises of government employment.

Investigators said the modus operandi of the fraudster and her network was to target desperate job seekers and their families, demanding large sums of money while issuing fabricated appointment letters to maintain credibility until victims discovered the fraud.

Police officials warned the public against falling prey to such scams. "People must remain vigilant. No genuine government recruitment ever involves payment of money. Anyone promising jobs in exchange for cash is a fraudster, and such cases should be reported immediately," an official said. (KNT)

#### CM's Office.....

Wani has in fact already been appointed through a formal Government Order. The only matter pending is the finalization of the terms and conditions of his appointment, which has been delayed by procedural bottlenecks. The CM office, however, underlined that the absence of these formalities has not prevented Wani from contributing positively to the functioning of the Chief Minister's office and the governance of Jammu and Kashmir.

Notably, multiple reports had suggested that Wani's file was yet to receive clearance from the Lieutenant Governor's office and that he was neither drawing a salary nor entitled to official accommodation or staff. These claims created confusion in political circles and fueled opposition criticism that Omar Abdullah had prematurely announced a political appointment to reward a close confidant who lost his seat in the assembly elections.

Nasir Aslam Wani, popularly known as Nasir Sogami, is no stranger to political power. A former legislator from Amirakadal constituency, he first entered the Assembly in 2008 and subsequently served as Minister of State in Omar Abdullah's cabinet, handling crucial portfolios including Tourism, Housing and Urban Development, Revenue and Relief, and even the sensitive Home Department. He lost the 2014 Assembly elections from Amirakadal to Syed Mohammad Altaf Bukhari of the then PDP and faced another setback in 2024 when he contested from Kupwara and was defeated by PDP's Fayaz Ahmad Mir by a margin of nearly 10,000 votes.

Despite these electoral defeats, Wani has remained a key figure within the National Conference. His proximity to Omar Abdullah and his role in managing the party's organizational structure in the Valley have only strengthened his standing within the NC's top brass. For this reason, many observers believe his appointment as Advisor to the Chief Minister is less about administrative

procedure and more about consolidating political loyalty at a time when the NC is seeking to balance governance responsibilities with party-building in a competitive political landscape. (KNT)

Addressing swayamsevaks at the annual Vijayadashmi event in Nagpur, which also marked the centenary of the Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh (RSS), Bhagwat said his speech aimed to share conclusions drawn from the organisation's century-long experience.

Social change can be effected through living examples of integrity, selflessness and social leadership, said the RSS chief. This is why RSS was founded and why its 'shakhas' (branches) continue to nurture character and unity despite all odds, he said.

Over the past 100 years, the RSS was offered allurements and was even invited to join politics, but it continued doing only one work, which is running 'shakhas', he said.

Social transformation through vyakti nirman is the correct path for bringing about change in the world, and this has been the collective experience of swayamsevaks, he said.

India's diversity of languages, faiths, lifestyles and traditions must be seen as a strength. All communities, including those who adopted foreign religions, are part of the larger Indian identity, Bhagwat said, urging harmony, mutual respect and rejection of violence.

Deriding hooliganism and attempts to create communal rifts, Bhagwat said law enforcement must act without bias. "However, the good people of society and the younger generation also need to be vigilant and organised, and they will also have to intervene if necessary," he added. (Agencies)

### Marriage ceremonies need to be reformed in Kashmir

A marriage is an occasion to celebrate and not to give trouble to the people living in the adjacent houses. However, in Kashmir a disturbing trend has emerged especially in the Srinagar city and other districts as well as towns. This is in the form of bursting fire-crackers during marriages and that too during the dead of the night when the people are sleeping.

There was a time when bursting of firecrackers during marriages was considered to be unethical and whosoever did the same was looked upon with discredit in the society. Times have changed and so has the outlook of people. As on date a marriage in Srinagar or any other district or town in Kashmir is considered incomplete in case there is no arrangement for bursting of fire-crackers. Given this fact the people as a whole make arrangements for the same.

As and when a groom leaves from his home to the bride's home the same is marked by bursting of fire-crackers. Fire-crackers also burst at the bride's home as and when the groom arrives. In both the cases the people who are very remotely associated with the marriage ceremony have to face the music. If the departure of the groom or arrival of the bride would have taken place during normal time then the problems would not have been there, but that is not the case.

In the present day context a groom leaves from his home to the bride's home only after mid-night and whosoever leaves early is not looked upon with respect and dignity. A marriage ceremony is no less than a torture for the people who have nothing to do with the same. The loud bang of the fire-crackers makes the life of people virtually and that too during the dead of the night. The people who burst the fire-crackers tend to forget that they are causing trouble to the people living in the vicinity.

Trouble is more for those people who are having some illness or disease. It is important that a reformation takes place in the Kashmiri society and the elders should take a call about the same. The marriage ceremonies should be held in such a manner that no trouble whatsoever is caused to the people. It is imperative that all the functions connected with a marriage are finished before midnight so that no trouble is caused to the organisers and others.

# The RSS at 100: A Century of Nation-Building

The Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh (RSS) is commemorating its 100th anniversary, a moment to reflect on a century of profound impact. What began as a small gathering in Nagpur on September 27, 1925, under the leadership of Dr.  $Ke shav\,Baliram\,Hedgewar, has\,grown$ into what is widely regarded as the world's largest voluntary organization. At the heart of the RSS lies a powerful and elegant philosophy: Vyakti Nirman Se Rashtra Nirman– "building the nation by building the character of its people." This guiding principle has fueled a hundred-year commitment to cultural awareness, personal development, and selfless service, creating a massive network of individuals dedicated to societal improvement. The centenary is more than just a historical milestone; it's a moment to honor the deep influence this movement has had on India's national fabric.

This isn't just a historical milestone; it's a profound moment for India. The government's decision to issue a special postage stamp and a commemorative ₹100 coin to honor the centenary is a significant sign of national recognition. The coin's design, which features Bharat Mata (Mother India) being saluted by swayamsevaks, is particularly symbolic. This marks the first time Bharat Mata has appeared on Indian currency, a powerful statement that weaves the


organization's foundational identity into the national narrative.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi's acknowledgment of the RSS's journey as a "golden chapter" in modern Indian history further emphasizes its national importance. He has praised the organization for its tireless efforts to unify the country, transcending divisions of caste and creed. The Prime Minister has highlighted the remarkable coherence across the Sangh Parivar—the family of organizations under the RSS umbrellawhich, despite their diverse functions, all operate with a single core principle: 'Nation First'. This unity in diversity is a testament to the organization's enduring societal impact.

A Society's Backbone in Times of Crisis

The RSS's role as an indispensable backbone during national crises is well-established. Its tradition of disciplined service (Seva) has been on display for decades. Whether it was the coordinated relief work after the 1956 Anjar earthquake, providing support to the armed forces during the 1962 conflict, or assisting millions of refugees in 1971, the organization has consistently stepped up.

This was never more evident than during the COVID-19 pandemic. Under the banner of Rashtriya Seva Bharati, over half a million volunteers served in nearly 93,000 locations nationwide. The scale of their humanitarian aid was immense. Volunteers distributed 45 million food packets and provided supplies to more than 7 million families. They also provided crucial assistance to marginalized groups, including migrant workers and nomadic people. The swift and systematic establishment of isolation centers and medical support validated the RSS's ability to act as a highly dependable parallel structure,



providing essential services when official systems were stretched to their limits.

Beyond visible crisis management, the Sangh Parivar's continuous, quiet efforts in less-publicized areas form a vital engine for national cohesion. For instance, the Deendayal Research Institute, founded by Nanaji Deshmukh, focuses on sustainable rural development, self-employment, and organic farming. This work is a practical manifestation of the philosophy of Antyodaya, which means serving the last person in line.

Shaping the Future of Education As a part of the academic community, I've seen firsthand how the RSS's long-held beliefs have influenced national policy. The organization's conviction that instruction should be delivered in the mother tongue found a voice in the National Education Policy 2020 (NEP), which

now mandates instruction in the

home language up to at least Class 5, and preferably Class 8. This is a praiseworthy move toward linguistic democratization of knowledge, which has been a core tenet of the Sangh's educational philosophy for decades.

The organization focuses on shaping the individual first, believing that a society of disciplined and selfless people will automatically build a strong and unified nation. The provided article highlights several ways this philosophy is put into practice, although it doesn't offer a specific list of methods. The key is the emphasis on selfless service (Seva) and discipline. By participating in the RSS's structured activities, members are conditioned to prioritize the collective good over personal gain.

The first century of the RSS has established a durable model of Vyakti Nirman, creating a vast pool of human capital dedicated to selfless service. This model has proven its ability to catalyze a national renaissance. As we stand at the threshold of the next century, the legacy of service built by this organization should not just be a model to admire, but a universal societal commitment. The vision of a truly developed India (Vikshit Bharat) requires a renewed covenant from every citizen. This centenary is a moment for all of us to make a solemn pledge: to consistently prioritize the national interest (Rashtra Pratham) over narrow individual gains and partisan benefits. It is only by mirroring the spirit of Vyakti Nirman-through collective, selfless contribution to nation-building—that Bharat will fully realize its potential on the global stage.

# Gandhi's Efforts for Peace in J&K, 1947



Mahatma Gandhi tried his best to prevent the state of Jammu and Kashmir from becoming a potential menace to peace between the two newly carved dominions of India and Pakistan.

He was not in favour of Nehru's proposal to refer the Kashmir dispute to the UNO and advised settlement by direct negotiations.

Gandhi ji paid only one visit to Jammu & Kashmir and that too in 1947 when the dark clouds were looming large over the state on account of Maharaja Hari Singh's indecision to accede to one of the newly created dominions.

As his secretary, Pyare Lal, records: "Gandhiji had always had uneasy forebidings about Kashmir and tried his best to prevent it from becoming a potential menace to peace between the two dominions".

Even at such a crucial moment Maharaja Hari singh would not allow the Father of the Nation to visit his state. The Maharaja wrote to Lord Mountbatten that he considered Mahatamaji's visit to his state as "inadvisable from all points of view", and requested Lord Mountbatten that "He (mahatamaji) or any other political leader should not visit the state until the conditions in India take a happier turn".

Pandit Jawahar Lal Nehru was distressed to hear the views of the Maharaja and on July 28, 1947, wrote to Gandhiji "......I shall go ahead with my plans. As between visiting Kashmir when my people need me  $there \, and \, being \, the \, Prime \, Minister, I \, prefer \, the \, former ".$ 

Gandhi informed Lord Mountbatten about the firm stand taken by Nehru to defy the Maharaja's orders. Mountbatten had hurried consultations with  $Hari\,Singh.\,Faced\,with\,the\,possibility\,of\,an\,imminent$ visit of Nehru, the Maharaja gave his reluctant acceptance to Gandhiji's visit.

Lord Mountbatten wrote to Mahatamaji about his talks with the Maharaja and said: ".....May I, therefore,  $urge\,that you\,should\,suggest\,to\,Pandit\,Nehru\,that\,your$ visit at this moment would be better than a visit from him, for I really do not know how the future Prime Minister of India can be spared from Delhi when only 18 days are left for him to take over".

In his prayer meeting at Delhi on 29th July 1947, Gandhiji said that he was going to Kashmir "to fulfill the promise made to Pandit Jawahar Lal Nehru".

Gandhiji left Delhi on 31st July and reached Srinagar on 1st August 1947. His visit to Srinagar was regarded as an event of great political importance as just 14 days were left for the British to quit India and the popular leader-Sheikh Mohammad Abdullah-with whose help and cooperation alone Kashmir could accede to India, was still languishing in the jail.

Gandhi ji stayed at the residence of late Shri kishori Lal, a Congress worker, at Haft-Chinar. He did not address any public meeting but after intervals he gave "darshan" to the large crowds of people assembled in the spacious courtyard shouting "Gan-

By a strange coincidence, the 1st of August was being celebrated by the state government as "the day of restoration of Gilgit". The British, it will be recalled, had assumed the civil and military administration of Gilgit from Maharaja Hari Singh on 26th March 1935 for a period of 60 years. With the impending lapse of British paramountcy Gilgit was restored to the Maharaja. Among the programme of jubilations ordered was illumination of the cities and forts. In the evening, Gandhi ji's host Kishori Lal took him in his car for a round of the city. Gandhi ji saw the Shergarhi Palace and the streets profusely illuminated. "What are these illuminations for?", he asked. On being told the reason, he made a prophetic remark: "A great mistake. They should have taken this opportunity to proclaim Gilgit's autonomy within Kashmir".

On the 2nd and 3rd August 1947, Gandhi ji held prayer meetings in srinagar but made no reference to his meetings with the Maharaja or his Prime Minister Pandit Ram Chandra Kak. On the 3rd of August he called upon Begum Abdullah (wife of Sheikh Abdullah).

Gandhi ji left Srinagar for Jammu by car on the 4th August where he stayed at the residence of Shri JN Sharma, the then superintendent of the Ranbir Government Press. Incidentally, Sharma's was the only private house in Jammu which had spacious lawn and a large verandah and was considered by the local Congress workers as most suitable for Gandhi ji's stay.

Gandhi ji gave "darshan" to anxious crowds of people. To a deputation which met him to enquire about the future of the state, Gandhi ji said: "the future will depend on the people of Kashmir".

Gandhi ji made his mission known and broke his silence on the most burning issue of the state's future only when he had left the Maharaja's territories. He left Jammu for Rawalpindi on the 5th August stepping at the Wah refugee camp on the way.

In a statement issued by him on the 6th August, Gandhiji said: "The will of the Kashmiris is the supreme law in Kashmir. The Maharaja and the Maharani shared this view, the sooner the will of the Kashmiris decides

the fate of Kashmir, the better". He hoped the question would be decided between the dominions, the Maharaja of Kashmir and the Kashmiris. After they could come to a joint decision much trouble would be saved. Kashmir is a big state and has a great strategic value", he concluded.

In his letter to Pandit Jawahar Lal Nehru dated 6th August 1947, Mahatma Gandhi gave some details of his talks with Maharaja Hari Singh, Maharani Tara Devi and Pandit Ram Chandra Kak, Prime Minister. He said: "During my interviews with the Prime Minister, Ram Chandra Kak, I told him about his unpopularity among the people. He wrote to the Maharaja that a sign from him he would gladly resign. The Maharaja had sent me a message that he and the Maharani were anxious to see me. I met them. Both admitted that with the lapse of British Paramountcy, the true paramountcy of the people of Kashmir would commence. However much they might wish to join the Union, they would have to make the choice in accordance with the wishes of the people. How that could be determined was not discussed at the interview....."

Events that followed Gandhi ji's visit were very significant. On 11th August the Prime Minister, Ram Chandra Kak, resigned. This was followed by the release of Sheikh Mohammad Abdullah and other leaders.

Gandhi ji was much distressed to hear the reports of some killings in certain parts of Jammu. His Secretary, Pyre Lal, has recorded the following conversation between Gandhi ji and Sheikh Abdullah during the latter's visit to Delhi in December, 1947. "Is it true what they say about conduct of Kashmir state troops during the post-partition troubles? Gandhi ji asked Sheikh Abdullah. The latter admitted that unfortunately it was true. Gandhi ji blazed forth: "How dare you weaken then on the issue of the curtailment of the Maharaja's powers without betraying your trust?".

Immediately on his return from Delhi, Sheikh Abdullah started a tirade against the Maharaja which culminated in the ending of the hereditary rulership in Jammu and Kashmir.

Gandhi ji had all praise for the spirit of communal harmony prevailing in Kashmir. In his prayer meeting at Delhi on 29th December 1947, he said: "It is on the Kashmir soil that Islam and Hinduism are being weighed. If both pull their weight correctly in the same direction, the chief actors will cover themselves with glory and nothing can move them from their joint credit. My sole hope and prayer is that Kashmir should become a beacon of light to this benighted sub-continent".

# The Stone Memorial With The Kohima Epitaph

Yaad na jaye beetein dinon ki: Din jo pakheru hote pinjare Me mai rakh deta, Paalataa unako jatan se, Moti ke daane deta, Sine se rahataa lagaae!

The famous epitaph "When you go home, tell them of us and say, For your tomorrow, we gave our today" was written by John Maxwell Edmonds. While it is famously associated with the Kohima Memorial, Edmonds was a classical scholar who wrote many epitaphs during the First World War.

He was an English classicist, poet, and dramatist. He authored several well-known epitaphs, and the "When you go home" phrase is one of his most famous.

The words are found on the Kohima Memorial in India, a tribute to the Allied forces who defended against the Japanese invasion in 1944.

The epitaph honors the soldiers who died during that battle. Edmonds drew inspiration from ancient Greek epitaphs, such as those written by Simonides of Ceos for the fallen Greeks at the Battle of Thermopylae.

Battle of Thermopylae.

Battle of Thermopylae was fought in 480 BC at Thermopylae between the Achaemenid Persian Empire under Xerxes I and an alliance of Greek city-states led by Sparta under Leonidas I. Lasting over the course of three days, it was one of the most prominent battles of both the second Persian invasion of Greece and the wider Greco-Persian Wars.

The engagement occurred simultaneously with the naval Battle of Artemisium: between July and September during 480 BC. The second Persian invasion under Xerxes I was a delayed response to the failure of the first Persian invasion, which had been initiated by Darius I and ended in 490 BC by an Athenian-led Greek victory at the Battle of Marathon.

By 480 BC, a decade after the Persian defeat at Marathon, Xerxes had amassed a massive land and naval force, and subsequently set out to conquer all of Greece. In response, the Athenian politician and general Themistocles proposed that the allied Greeks block the advance of the Persian army at the pass of Thermopylae while simultaneously blocking the Persian navy at the Straits of Artemisium.

Around the start of the invasion, a Greek force of approximately 7,000 men led by Leonidas marched north to block the pass of Thermopylae. Ancient authors vastly inflated the size of the Persian army, with estimates in the millions, but modern scholars estimate it at between 120,000 and 300,000 soldiers.

They arrived at Thermopylae by late August or early September; the outnumbered Greeks held them off for seven days (including three of direct battle) before their rear-guard was annihilated in one of history's most famous last stands. During two full days of battle, the Greeks blocked the only road by which the massive Persian army could traverse the narrow pass.

After the second day, a local resident named Ephialtes revealed to the Persians the existence of a path leading behind the Greek lines. Subsequently, Leonidas, aware that his force was being outflanked by the Persians, dismissed the bulk of the Greek army and remained to guard their retreat along with 300 Spartans and 700 Thespi-

It has been reported that others also remained, including up to 900 helots and 400 Thebans. With the exception of the Thebans, most of whom reportedly surrendered, the Greeks fought the Persians to the death.

Themistocles was in command of the Greek naval force at Artemisium when he received news that the Persians had taken the pass at Thermopylae. Since the Greek defensive strategy had required both Thermopylae and Artemisium to be held, the decision was made to withdraw to the island of Salamis.

The Persians overran Boeotia and then captured the evacuated city of Athens. The Greek fleet—seeking a decisive victory over the Persian armada—attacked and defeated the invading force at the Battle of Salamis in late 480 BC.

Wary of being trapped in Europe, Xerxes withdrew with much of his army to Asia, reportedly losing many of his troops to starvation and disease while also leaving behind the Persian military commander Mardonius to continue the Achaemenid Empire's Greek campaign.

However, the following year saw a Greek army decisively defeat Mardonius and his troops at the Battle of Plataea, ending the second Persian invasion.

Both ancient and modern writers have used the Battle of Thermopylae as a flagship example of the power of an army defending its native soil. The performance of the Greek defenders is also used as an example of the advantages of training, equipment, and use of terrain as force multipliers.

And thus came the famous quote:

Hear your fate, O dwellers in Sparta of the wide spaces; Either your famed, great town must be sacked by Perseus' sons, Or, if that be not, the whole land of Lacedaemon, Shall mourn the death of a king of the house of Heracles, For not the strength of lions or of bulls shall hold him, Strength against strength, for he has the power of Zeus, And will not be checked till one of these two he has consumed, O stranger, tell the Lacedaemonians that we lie here, obedient to their words ......(The Oracle at Delphi, in The Histories by Herodotus, translated by Aubrey de Selincourt)!

There is another ones too: Go tell the Spartans, thou who passest by, That here, obedient to their laws, we

Stranger, tell the Spartans that we behaved as they would wish us to, and are buried here.

Stranger! To Sparta say, her faithful band Here lie in death, remembering her

Kohima War Cemetery:

Kohima War Cemetery is a memorial dedicated to soldiers of the 2nd British Division of the Allied Forces who died in the Second World War at Kohima, the capital of the Indian state of Nagaland in April 1944. The soldiers died on the battleground of Garrison Hill in the tennis court area of the Deputy Commissioner's resi-

According to the Commonwealth War Graves Commission, which maintains this cemetery among many others in the world, there are 1,420 Commonwealth burials of the Second World War at this cemetery, and a memorial to an additional 917 Hindu and Sikh soldiers who were cremated in accordance with their faith. The memorial was inaugurated by Field Marshal Sir William Slim, then Commander of the 14th Army in Burma.

Entrance to the cemetery:

The Kohima War Cemetery is located in the heart of Kohima, the capital city of the Indian state of Nagaland, at the location where a decisive battle was won by the Allied Forces during the Second World War, forcing the Japanese army to retreat. This location is on the ridge below and above the tennis court. History

In March 1944, the Japanese 15th Army attacked the British troops stationed in Kohima and Imphal in northeast India with intent to prevent an attack on Burma. In the first week of April, the Japanese attacked at Kohima and Imphal via Mizoram from the Indo-Burma border, to destroy the supply bases of the British. They laid siege on the Allied forces stationed at Kohima and also at Imphal.

Reaching Kohima during April 1944, the Japanese 15th Army occupied a strategic location on Garrison Hill and continually attacked a small contingent of the Commonwealth forces, which successfully held their ground until reinforcements were brought in. In the battle at the tennis ground (now marked by white concrete lines) of the Deputy Commissioner's bungalow (which was destroyed during the war), which also involved hand-to-hand fighting between the opposing forces, the Commonwealth forces prevailed over the Japanese forces and forced them to retreat in defeat. There were heavy casualties on both sides. This battle was the turning point for the Allied forces.

In 2013, the British National Army Museum voted the Battle of Imphal and Kohima as "Britain's Greatest Battle.

Description: The stone memorial with the Kohima Epitaph

The cemetery is set in peaceful surroundings with well-manicured grassland in which roses bloom in season. The cemetery is sited at the exact location where the battle was fought, and provides a panoramic view of the city of Kohima. It is marked at its two ends by tall, concrete structures engraved with the cross. Between the two structures, along the sloping ground, a series of terraces of 3–5 metres (9.8–16.4 ft) in height have been created; these contain stone markers embedded with bronze plaques carrying the name of each Commonwealth soldier who died on the Kohima battlefield. These markers are made distinctly visible by a

There are two memorial crosses, one at the upper end and the other at the low-



er end of the cemetery.[citation needed] The upper-end memorial is located at the highest end of the cemetery. It commemorates the names of the Indian and Sikh soldiers (917 Hindu and Sikh soldiers who had been cremated as per their religious rites) who were part of the British Indian Army and died on the battlefield. The epitaph inscribed on this memorial reads:

Here, around the tennis court of the deputy commissioner, lie men who fought in the battle of Kohima in which they and their comrades finally halted the invasion of India by the forces of Japan in April 1944.

The lower-end memorial is dedicated to the 2nd Division. It is a 15 feet (4.6 m) tall, massive stone (similar to the stone used by the Naga tribes to mark the graves of their dead) fixed over a dressed stone platform. This stone was originally located on a spur at Maram, to the south of Kohima, which was then shifted with the help of Naga people to be erected at the 2nd British Division's war cemetery.

While the top part of the memorial is marked with a cross, at the lower part lies a bronze plate that carries an epitaph. The epitaph, titled Kohima Epitaph, reads:[citation needed]

When you go home tell them of us and say for your tomorrow we gave our today'

Another notable feature at the site is a cherry tree near the tennis court where the battle was fought, where a small brass plaque reads: For Your Tomorrow, We Gave

The original tree, from which a branch has been used to create the present tree where the plaque is fixed, had been used for target practice by the Japanese forces. It was destroyed during the battle. Hence, Kohima Battle is also known as the "Battle Under the Cherry Tree".

Close to the Garrison Hill, memorials for the 2nd Battalion, the Dorsetshire Regiment, and several other regiments have been established. There is a memorial to the dead of the 2nd Battalion, The Durham Light Infantry, inside the grounds of the Chief Secretary's Official Residence, just behind the Governor's House.

In the list of the dead marked by stones at the cemetery, there are 64 names of Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders soldiers; the memorial, however, lists 96 names, out of which the graves of 32 per-

sonals were located. Tucked beside the iconic Kohima War Cemetery, the Garrison Hill Café is more than just a coffee stop — it's a quiet tribute to the fierce Battle of Kohima (1944), often called the Stalingrad of the East. From tables etched with battle maps to walls adorned with replica helmets and battlefield art, every corner echoes stories of courage, sacrifice, and grit. Even the lamps - fashioned from 81mm mortar shells and steel helmets – remind us of the price paid for freedom (More about this later in

Battle of Kohima:

The Battle of Kohima was the turning point of the Japanese U-Go offensive into British India in 1944 during the Second World War. The battle took place in three stages from 4 April to 22 June 1944 around the town of Kohima, now the capital city of the state of Nagaland in Northeast India. From 3 to 16 April, the Japanese attempted to capture Kohima ridge, a feature which dominated the road by which the besieged British and Indian troops of IV Corps at Imphal were supplied. By mid-April, the small British and British Indian force at Kohima was relieved.

From 18 April to 13 May British and British Indian reinforcements counterattacked to drive the Japanese from the  $positions\,they\,had\,captured.\,The\,Japanese$ abandoned the ridge at this point but continued to block the Kohima-Imphal road. From 16 May to 22 June the British and British Indian troops pursued the retreating Japanese and reopened the road. The battle ended on 22 June when British and British Indian troops from Kohima and Imphal met at Milestone 109, ending the

In 2013, a poll conducted by the British National Army Museum voted the Battles of Kohima and Imphal as "Britain's Greatest Battle". The Battles of Kohima and Imphal have been referred to by authors such as Martin Dougherty and Jonathan Ritter as the "Stalingrad of the East".

The Japanese plan to invade India, codenamed U-Go, was originally intended as a spoiling attack against the British IV Corps at Imphal in Manipur, to disrupt the Allied offensive plans for that year. The commander of the Japanese Fifteenth Army, Lieutenant General Renya Mutaguchi, enlarged the plan to invade India itself and perhaps even overthrow the British Raj.

If the Japanese were able to gain a strong  $foothold in India\, they\, would\, demonstrate$ the weakness of the British Empire and provide encouragement to Indian nationalists in their decolonization efforts. Moreover, occupation of the area around Imphal would severely impact American efforts to supply Chiang Kai-shek's army in China.

The objections of the staffs of various headquarters were eventually overcome, and the offensive was approved by Imperial General Headquarters on 7 January

Part of the plan involved sending the Japanese 31st Division (which was composed of the 58th, 124th and 138th Infantry Regiments and the 31st Mountain Artillery Regiment) to capture Kohima and thus cut off Imphal.

Mutaguchi wished to exploit the capture of Kohima by pushing the 31st Division on to Dimapur, the vital railhead and logistic base in the Brahmaputra River valley.

The 31st Division's commander, Lieutenant General Kotoku Sato, was unhappy with his role. He had not been involved in the planning of the offensive, and had grave misgivings about its chances. He had already told his staff that they might all starve to death.

In common with many senior Japanese officers, Sato considered Mutaguchi a "blockhead".He and Mutaguchi had also been on opposite sides during the split between the Toseiha and Kodoha factions within the Japanese Army during the early 1930s, and Sato believed he had reason to distrust Mutaguchi's motives.

Prelude: Imphal and Kohima campaign Starting on 15 March 1944, the Japanese 31st Division crossed the Chindwin River near Homalin and moved north-west along jungle trails on a front almost 60 miles (97 km) wide. Because of a shortage of transport, half the artillery regiment's mountain guns and the infantry regiments' heavy weapons were left behind. Only three week's supply of food and ammunition was carried.

Although the march was arduous, good progress was made. The left wing of the division, consisting of the bulk of the 58th Regiment and commanded by the division's Infantry Group commander, Major General Shigesabur Miyazaki, was ahead of the neighbouring formation (the Japanese 15th Infantry Division) when they clashed with Indian troops covering the northern approaches to Imphal on 20 March.

The Indian troops were the 50th Indian Parachute Brigade under Brigadier Maxwell Hope-Thomson, at Sangshak. Although they were not Miyazaki's objective, he decided to clear them from his line of advance. The Battle of Sangshak continued for six days. The parachute brigade's troops were desperately short of drinking water, but Miyazaki was handicapped by lack of artillery until near the end of the battle.

Eventually, as some of the Japanese 15th Division's troops joined the battle, Hope-Thomson withdrew. The 50th Parachute Brigade lost 600 men, while the Japanese had suffered over 400 casualties. Miyazaki had also captured some of the food and munitions that had been dropped by the Royal Air Force (RAF) to the defenders of Sangshak. However, his troops, who had the shortest and easiest route to Kohima, were delayed by a week.

Meanwhile, the commander of the British Fourteenth Army, Lieutenant General William Slim, belatedly realised (partly from Japanese documents that had been captured at Sangshak) that a whole Japanese division was moving towards Kohima. He and his staff had originally believed that, because of the forbidding terrain in the area, the Japanese would only be able to send a regiment to take

Slim knew that there were few fighting troops, as opposed to soldiers in line-ofcommunication units and supporting services, in Kohima and none at all at the vital base of Dimapur 30 miles (48 km) to the north. Dimapur contained an area of supply dumps 11 miles (18 km) long and 1 mile (1.6 km) wide.] As the fall of Dimapur would have been disastrous for the Allies, Slim asked his superior, General George Giffard (commanding Eleventh Army Group), for more troops to protect Dimapur and to prepare to relieve Imphal.

The Allies were already hastily reinforcing the Imphal Front. As part of this move, the infantry and artillery of the 5th Indian Infantry Division were flown from the Arakan, where they had just participated in the defeat of a subsidiary Japanese offensive at the Battle of the Admin Box.

While the main body of the division went to Imphal (where some units had been isolated and almost all of IV Corps' reserves had already been committed), the 161st Indian Infantry Brigade, commanded by Brigadier Dermot Warren and with 24th Mountain Artillery Regiment, Indian Artillery attached, were flown to

Early in March, the 23rd Long Range Penetration Brigade was removed from Major General Orde Wingate's Chindit force, and was dispatched by rail from around Lalaghat to Jorhat, 50 miles (80 km) north of Dimapur, where they could threaten the flank of any Japanese attack on the

Giffard and General Claude Auchinleck, the Commander-in-Chief of the British Indian Army, also prepared to send the British 2nd Division and Indian XXXIII Corps HQ under Lieutenant General Montagu Stopford from reserve in southern and central India to Dimapur, by road and

 $Until\,XXXIII\,Corps\,head quarters\,could$ arrive at Dimapur, the HQ of 202 Line of Communication Area under Major General R.P.L. Ranking took command of the

The end of the operations was now in

Role of the Indian Army:

The Indian Army played a crucial role at Kohima by initially defending the area with units like the 161st Indian Brigade and the Assam Regiment, delaying the Japanese advance and enduring a 13-day siege. Indian troops also provided a crucial counter-attack, and the entire campaign saw significant Indian involvement, including the actions of the Royal Indian Army Service Corps and Gurkha units, which helped secure a decisive Allied victory and marked a turning point in the Burma Cam-

Key Contributions of the Indian Army: Initial Defense: Outnumbered Indian units, including the 1st Assam Regiment and parts of the Assam Rifles, held the Japanese advance, buying time for Allied reinforcements to arrive.

Battle of Attrition: The Indian forces turned the battle into a costly fight for the Japanese, who faced heavy casualties and eventual starvation.

Reinforcements and Counter-Attack: The 5th and 7th Indian Infantry Divisions were moved into the region to join the fight, and Indian brigades were key to relieving the besieged garrison at Kohima.

Logistical Support: The Royal Indian Army Service Corps provided essential supplies of food, water, and ammunition to the front-line troops, ensuring they could sustain their efforts.

Fierce Hand-to-Hand Combat: Indian and British forces, including those from the 161st Indian Brigade, engaged in brutal, close-quarters fighting, particularly around the Deputy Commissioner's bungalow and tennis court.

Significance of the Battle: Turning Point: The Battle of Kohima is often considered the turning point of the Burma Campaign, halting the Japanese advance and leading to their ultimate defeat in the region.

High Sacrifices: The battle involved incredible acts of bravery and sacrifice from Indian soldiers, who faced immense hardship and loss.

# Higher Doses of Semaglutide More Effective for Weight Loss, Study Finds

A significantly higher dose of weight-loss drugs containing the active ingredient semaglutide can be more effective in helping people lose weight.

That's according to two new studies published on September 14 in The Lancet Diabetes & Endocrinology journal.

In both clinical trials, participants who received a triple dose of semaglutide medication achieved slightly more weight loss than people taking a standard dose.

The weight loss was more significant when compared to study participants who were given a placebo.

In both trials, participants were advised on lifestyle factors such as diet and exercise. Novo Nordisk, the manufacturer of semaglutide medications like Ozempic and Wegovy, funded both trials.

#### Higher doses of Ozempic, Wegovy led to greater weight loss

The first studyTrusted Source involved 1,407 people with obesity who did not have type 2 diabetes. About 73% of the participants were female. They had a mean age of 47 and a mean body mass index (BMI) of

The participants were followed between January 2023 and November 2024 at 95 medical facilities in 11 countries.

The majority of the participants were prescribed to a regimen involving 7.2 mg weekly doses of semaglutide medication, triple the standard dose. The other subjects were given either 2.4 mg doses or a pla-

In that study, researchers reported that people taking the 7.2 mg dose achieved an average weight loss of 19% compared to an average 16% weight loss for those taking the 2.4 mg dose and nearly 4% for those given the placebo.

The researchers added that about half of the participants on the 7.2 mg dose lost at least 20% of their body weight while a third lost at least 25% of their body weight.

They also reported that the higher dose group showed more benefits in:

waist circumference blood pressure blood sugar levels cholesterol readings

#### Higher semaglutide doses improved blood sugar, waist size

 $The \, second \, study Trusted \, Source \, involved$ 512 people diagnosed with obesity and type 2 diabetes. About 52% of these participants were female.

The participants had an average age of 56, a mean BMI measurement of 38, and a mean HbA1c blood sugar level of slightly more than 8. They were studied at 68 medical facilities between January 2023 and

In that study, researchers reported participants on semaglutide doses of 7.2 mg achieved an average weight loss of 13% compared to 10% for participants given 2.4 mg doses and close to 4% for those getting



The majority of the participants were prescribed to a regimen involving 7.2 mg weekly doses of semaglutide medication, triple the standard dose. The other subjects were given either 2.4 mg doses or a placebo.

In that study, researchers reported that people taking the 7.2 mg dose achieved an average weight loss of 19% compared to an average 16% weight loss for those taking the 2.4 mg dose and nearly 4% for those given the placebo.

Researchers also reported that people on the 7.2 mg doses experienced more significant reductions in waist size and blood sugar levels.

In both studies, researchers said participants on the higher 7.2 mg doses reported some gastrointestinal side effects but that those health issues were manage-

The scientists said further studies are warranted to determine long-term risks as well as benefits.

#### Higher doses of GLP-1s are not ideal for long-term use

Experts not involved in the new studies say GLP-1 weight loss drugs and bariatric surgery can be highly effective in helping people manage their weight.

These drugs are the most effective medication available at this time for weight loss. However, if someone meets the criteria for surgery, that is even more effective than the medications," said Mir Ali, MD, a general surgeon, bariatric surgeon, and medical director of Memorial Care Surgical Weight Loss Center at Orange Coast Medical Center in California.

"They result in significant weight loss and improvement in many health conditions related to obesity," Ali told Healthline. "They do require long-term use as studies show a high incidence of weight regain if discon-

Dan Azagury, MD, an associate professor of surgery and chief of the Section of Minimally Invasive and Bariatric Surgery at Stanford University in California, said the new studies are encouraging news.

"This new dosing of semaglutide offers a new more effective option for weight loss, compared to the current maximal dose," he told Healthline. "Essentially more effective while maintaining a side effect profile that isn't significantly worse for the typical [gastrointestinal] side effects that most patients experience."

However, Azagury said there was one troubling side effect he saw in the research.

"The concern here at this new dose is the significant increase is dyseasthesia (which includes things like skin sensitivity, skin 'pain' or 'burning sensation')," he said. "This was significantly more frequent than the lower dose (22.9% vs. 6%).

"The upside of most side effects for these drugs is that they disappear when you discontinue," Azagury added. "In this study, 18.7% (nearly 1 in 5) patients who had these issues still had not recovered by the end of the study (it is unclear how many of those had stopped the medication or not), so that is something that will require further studies to be better characterized."

Ali noted that the recommended dose-Trusted Source by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) for a semaglutide drug is 2.4 mg taken weekly, so a higher dose would be outside those boundaries.

These medications, like all medications do have side effects, some of which can be serious. If a patient is on a much higher dose, they have an increased risk for more significant side effects with long term use," he said.

"Furthermore, this [higher dose] would be considered 'off-label' use of these medications, and they are already difficult to get coverage for through insurance, so there could be a significant out-of-pocket cost for the patient," he added.

### What to know about GLP-1 drugs

Glucagon-like peptide-1 receptor agonists (GLP-1s) medications work by mimicking a hormone in the body that helps regulate blood sugar levels and reduces hunger pangs.

One class of the GLP-1 medications uses the active ingredient semaglutide. They are sold under different brand names.

Ozempic and Rybelsus have been approved to treat type 2 diabetes. Wegovy is approved for use in weight management.

Semaglutide drugs are available as both oral tablets and injections.

Another commonly used weight loss medication uses the active ingredient tirzepatide. Mounjaro is approved to treat type 2 diabetes. Zepbound is approved for use in weight management. These medications are available only as injections.

Previous studies have highlighted the effectiveness of these drugs in helping people lose weight.

Past research has also indicated that these weight loss drugs can help lower a person's risk of cancer as well as provide benefits to heart health and brain health.

Ali stressed that weight loss medications and surgery are simply tools to help some-

one in their weight loss journey. He said if they don't adopt a healthier lifestyle that includes a balanced diet, daily exercise, and adequate sleep, then they won't be able to meet their weight loss goals.

"The goal of any weight loss intervention, whether it's medications, surgery, or just counseling, is to provide tools to change to a healthier lifestyle and diet," Ali explained. "If patients do not make these significant, long-term changes, then no intervention will remain effective for an extended pe-

Azagury said it's important for patients to discuss weight loss strategies with their physician.

"Weight loss drugs are most effective as part of a comprehensive management," he said. "In our center, for example, patients prescribed these medications will also see our dietitians and be given access to resources and recommendations for diet change, exercise, etc. It is also important to have [a] follow-up to adapt treatment along the way."

Expressing concern over the prevailing moral decline and social disorder, Agha Hassan said these are direct consequences of drifting away from the Qur'an and the Seerah of the Prophet المناقبة. He emphasized that as a community and an Ummah, it is our foremost responsibility to return to the Qur'an and Sunnah and launch collective efforts for soci-

 $On the \, occasion, Agha\, Hassan$ also termed the recent rotten meat scandal in Kashmir as a "tragic and shameful catastrophe." He said it was not just corruption but a heinous crime amounting to mass murder and blatant endangerment of human lives. He demanded the harshest possible punishment for those involved so that no anti-social element dares to commit such cruelty in the future.

# Samba launches Leprosy awareness campaign on Gandhi Jayanti, culminates Sewa Parv

**SAMBA, OCT 2:** In a significant public health initiative coinciding with Gandhi Jayanti and marking the culmination of Sewa Pakhwada, the District Administration Samba today launched an extensive Leprosy Awareness Campaign with the flagging off of a specially-equipped Awareness Van. The event was led by Additional Deputy Commissioner Samba, Jagdish Singh, alongside Chief Medical Officer Dr. Vidhi Bhatial, District Health Officer Samba, Block Medical Officers and senior officials from the Health Department.

The launch of this awareness van represents a crucial step forward in the district's commitment to eliminating leprosy through early detection, comprehensive treatment and sustained public education. The mobile awareness unit has been equipped with carefully crafted audio messages and jingles designed to disseminate vital information about leprosy – its causes, symptoms, treatment options and prevention measures – directly to communities across the district. This door-to-door approach aims to break down barriers of misinformation and reach populations who may not have easy

access to healthcare facilities. Speaking at the occasion, ADC Samba, Jagdish Singh highlighted the multifaceted objectives of this campaign, emphasizing that leprosy elimination requires not just medical intervention but a comprehensive societal response. He commended the Health Department for their tireless efforts in preparing this initiative and stressed that early detection and complete treatment remain the cornerstones of success. The Additional Deputy Commissioner underscored that one of the campaign's most critical missions is to address and dismantle the social stigma that has historically surrounded leprosy, which often prevents affected individuals from seeking timely medical care.

Chief Medical Officer Dr. Vidhi Bhatial elaborated on the program's holistic approach, explaining that the



campaign extends far beyond awareness generation. The initiative encompasses early case detection through active surveillance, ensuring complete treatment adherence and conducting thorough household contact surveys to identify potential cases at the earliest stage.

Dr. Bhatial emphasized that the program places significant focus on disability prevention and medical rehabilitation services, recognizing that comprehensive care must address both the disease and its potential complications. The Health Department is providing essential support including dressing materials, supportive medicines and specially designed micro-cellular rubber footwear to patients, ensuring they receive complete medical and rehabilitative care. Furthermore, nutrition kits were distributed to leprosy patients during the event, acknowledging the crucial role of nutrition in recovery and overall health management.

The timing of this launch carries profound symbolic significance. Gandhi Jayanti, observed on October 2nd, honors Mahatma Gandhi's unwavering commitment to the upliftment of marginalized communities and his compassionate approach to those suffering from leprosy. Bapu's philosophy of inclusive healthcare and dignity for all resonates deeply with this campaign's objectives. Additionally, the event marks the conclusion of Sewa Pakhwada (Sewa Parv), a fortnight-long celebration of service and public welfare initiatives. This convergence of dates amplifies the message that public health is not merely a technical challenge but a moral imperative rooted in service and compassion.

The Leprosy Awareness Campaign represents a comprehensive strategy combining medical intervention, community engagement, and social transformation. By taking healthcare information directly to the people through the awareness van, conducting systematic household surveys, ensuring treatment completion and providing holistic rehabilitation support, the Health Department is creating a robust framework for leprosy elimination. The district administration's commitment to this cause reflects a broader vision of accessible, stigma-free healthcare that leaves no one behind. As the awareness van begins its journey through the villages and communities of Samba, it carries not just information but hope - hope for early detection, effective treatment and a future where leprosy no longer casts a shadow over lives and communities.

Furthermore, to cater to the demand and potential of poultry husbandry, a hightech hatchery is being constructed and is scheduled to be functional by the end of the current financial



# R Ashwin To Play **Entire Season of BBL** with Sydney Thunder

## The development comes a day after he went unsold at the ILT20 auction

CHENNAI: Ashwin, who announced his IPL retirement in August, became the first capped Indian player to play in the BBL, agreeing to play at least three matches in the latter half of the season for Thunder. That arrangement was based on Ashwin committing to play in ILT20, where he had listed the highest base price of USD 120,000. However, Ashwin went unsold when his name, listed in Set 5 for allrounders, came up for bidding with none of the six franchises showing interest. It is understood that Ashwin had requested ILT20 to remove his name from the accelerated second round of bidding, meant for unsold players.

Ashwin said he had "verbally" agreed with ILT20 to feature in the 2025-26 edition, which will be played between December 2 and January  $4. \, With the \, window \, for \, direct \, signings \, closed \, in \,$ July, Ashwin decided to put himself at the maximum base price and was the only player to list a six-figure reserve price. Ashwin also mentioned to ILT20 that he was expecting a certain bid for

him to play in ILT20. When it became clear he was not getting that at the auction, he pulled out.

"I had agreed verbally with ILT20 but then the franchise offers were pretty low because the direct signings had been closed by all teams," Ashwin told ESPNcricinfo. "Meanwhile, Thunder came with a good deal, but since I had verbally agreed with ILT20, I entered the auction saying this is the minimum price I want to play for, else I am happy going to the BBL."

Ashwin, who ended his IPL career as the fifthhighest wicket-taker in the league with 187 strikes at an economy rate of 7.2, was a soughtafter name in BBL with Hobart Hurricanes, Sydney Sixers, Adelaide Strikers and Thunder showing interest to sign him up. He became the first capped India cricketer to earn a BBL deal. Cricket Australia CEO Todd Greenberg, who was the first to have consultations with Ashwin, spoke on Thursday about the importance of having Ashwin in the BBL. "It's a big moment for the BBL to welcome Ravi here, I have been talking to him personally on a number of occasions.
