

ECI announces by-elections for Budgam and Nagrota

Voting on Nov 11, counting scheduled for Nov 14

SRINAGAR, OCT 06: The crucial by-election for the Budgam and Nagrota seats will take place on November 11, the Election Commission of India (ECI) announced on Monday.

Addressing a press conference, Chief Election Commissioner Gyanesh Kumar, according to news agency-Kashmir News Observer (KNO), announced that the by-election for the two seats in Jammu & Kashmir will be held on November 11, while counting will take place on November 14.

As per the schedule announced by the poll body, notifications for these two seats will be issued on October 13, and nomination forms can be filed until October 20.

Scrutiny of nominations will be conducted on October 22, the ECI stated, adding that candidates may withdraw their nominations until October 24.

SRINAGAR, OCT 6: Chief Secretary, Atal Dulloo, today chaired a high-level meeting to review the functioning of the Information Technology (IT) Department and the National Informatics Centre (NIC), J&K. The meeting was attended by Secretary, IT, Dr. Piyush Singla; CEO, JaKeGA, Mahima Madan; State Informatics Officer, NIC, J.S. Modi; and other senior officers of both IT-related establishments.

At the outset, the Chief Secretary underscored the critical importance of cyber security, calling for its strengthening right from the tehsil and block levels. He directed the IT Department to ensure the seamless expansion of the e-Office network to all tehsil and block offices across Jammu and Kashmir following its successful rollout in district-level offices. He also asked for a detailed status report identifying the offices still outside the e-Office ambit.

The Chief Secretary further instruct-

ed the Department to expedite the upgradation of the State Data Centre (SDC) and the establishment of a Mini Security Operations Centre (SoC) in J&K. Stressing the need for capacity-building initiatives, he emphasized the creation of a Centre of Excellence (CoE) in Information Technology to nurture skilled manpower aligned with future industry requirements.

Avoid cough, cold medicines for children below 2 years of age

SRINAGAR, OCT 06: Secretary, Health & Medical Education, Dr Syed Abid Rasheed Shah today advised for using rational medication in children. He said this while chairing a meeting at Civil Secretariat, here.

The meeting was attended by Commissioner, Food & Drugs Administration, J&K, Smita Sethi, along with the Heads of Departments of Paediatrics from all Government Medical Colleges of Jammu and Kashmir and officers from the Divisional and District levels of the



Drugs Control Organisation, J&K. The meeting was held in the context of a recent communication issued by the Union Ministry of Health & Family Welfare, which advises that cough and cold medications should not be prescribed or dispensed to children below two years of age.

During the meeting, Abid Rasheed emphasized the urgent need to promote rational drug use and ensure patient safety in paediatric care

FB page administrator booked for 'false info'

BUDGAM, OCT 6: Budgam Police have registered an FIR against the administrator of a Facebook page titled "Kashmir Speaks" for allegedly spreading false and misleading information on social media regarding an incident that occurred in Khansahib area of the district.

According to police, the case dates back to August 26, 2025, when Police Station Khansahib had registered FIR No. 165/2025 under Section 325 of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS) after a horse was killed in village Rakhai. During investigation, it was established that the killing had resulted from a personal dispute between the parties involved and was not linked to any commercial activity.

While Nagrota is likely to witness a direct contest between the BJP and the ruling alliance, the Budgam seat is gearing up for a triangular fight between the National Conference (NC), the People's Democratic Party (PDP), and the People's Alliance for Change

In Budgam, the National Conference is expected to field either Nasir Aslam Wani or Aga Mehmood.

The Budgam seat fell vacant after Chief Minister Omar Abdullah vacated it and retained the Ganderbal seat, having won both constituencies in last year's Assembly elec-

The Nagrota seat became vacant following the death of BJP leader Devender Singh Rana on October 31 last year, just a few weeks after the Assembly election results were declared in Jammu & Kashmir—(KNO)

separate notifications issued by Union Government, called the elected members of the Legislative Assembly of the Union Territory of Jammu & Kashmir to elect members to the Upper House of Parliament.

Three separate elections are being held for the four seats. While two individual elections will be conducted for the first and second seats, a combined election will be held for the remaining two seats.

According to the notifications issued by the Election Commission of India-copies of which are in possession of the news agency— Kashmir News Observer (KNO), October 13 is the last date for filing nominations. Scrutiny of nominations will take place on October 14.

Candidates may withdraw their nomination forms until October 16. Polling will be held on October 24, and counting will take place on the same day. The entire election process will be completed by October 28.

Following the ECI's notifications, the Returning Officer for the polls-the Secretary of the Legislative Assembly-also issued three separate notifications for the election to these

As per the notifications, nomination papers can be submitted by a candidate or any of their proposers to the Returning Officer (Secretary, Legislative Assembly) or the Assistant Returning Officer (Additional Secretary, Legislative Assembly) at their offices within the premises of the J&K Legislative Assembly Secretariat, Srinagar, between 11 AM and 3 PM on any working day (excluding public holidays) no later than October 13.

As previously reported by KNO, the National Conference-Congress alliance is expected to comfortably secure three of the four seats, while the BJP is in a strong position to win the fourth—(KNO)

Keng while talking to the news agency-Kashmir News Observer (KNO) said, "January like conditions prevailed in Kupwara and Baderwah as temperatures fell 16.0 C below normal."

The maximum temperature settled below normal across Union Territory with Srinagar recording a day temperature of 12.5 degree

Celsius (13.0 degree Celsius below normal). Kupwara recorded 10.8 degree Celsius (16.0 degree Celsius) while Qazigund, a gateway of Kashmir, recorded 13.5 degree Celsius (10.6 degree Celsius below normal). Pahalgam recorded a day temperature of 9.2 degree Celsius (13.2 degree Celsius below normal) and Kokernag recorded 12.1 degree Celsius (11.7 degree Celsius below normal). Gulmarg, famous ski-resort, recorded a maximum temperature of 4.4 degree Celsius (12.1 degree Celsius below normal).

IN Jammu division, Banihal recorded a maximum temperature of 11.2 degree Celsius (15.3 degree Celsius below normal) while Jammu recorded 21.3 degree Celsius (11.1 degree Celsius below normal). In Bhaderwah, the temperature settled at 10.0 degree Celsius (16.1 degree Celsius below normal). Batote recorded 12.6 degree Celsius (12.5 degree Celsius below normal) & Katra recorded 18.0 degree Celsius (11.1 degree Celsius below normal).

According to details available with the KNO, the fresh snowfall was recorded in Pir ki Gali, Razdan Top, Sadhna Pass, Sinthan Top, Daksum, Kongdori Gulmarg, Minimarg and other parts of the region.

Meanwhile, the weatherman said that there is a forecast of light to moderate rain (light snow over higher reaches) till Tuesday forenoon or afternoon and improvement

"On October 8, a brief spell of light rain is expected at a few places while generally dry weather is expected from October 9 to October 16," the MeT said.

The MeT has advised the farmers to suspend all activities between October 6 and 7. "There is a possibility of landslides, shooting stones at vulnerable places with a possibil-

ity of light to moderate snow over higher reaches of Kashmir, Chenab valley and Pir Panjal range and possibility of moderate to heavy snow over few higher reaches of South Kashmir and Chenab Valley," it said—(KNO)

Wali Mohammad said, "The change in weather has renewed our hopes. The tourist footfall hasn't increased yet, but snowfall in the upper reaches will definitely encourage visitors to return to the Valley. We are hopeful about our industry getting a boost in

Manzoor Pakhtoon, President of the Houseboat Association, said it is too early to predict the overall impact but remained positive about the coming months. "As the news of snowfall spreads, tourists will start planning their trips. It will take around a month to see how the season shapes up," he said.

Houseboat owners along the Dal and Nigeen lakes too are hopeful. "We have started receiving inquiries from domestic tourists, especially families and newly-wed couples, who want to experience Kashmir's winter beauty," said Ghulam Rasool, a houseboat owner in Dal Lake.

He added once the snowfall intensifies, bookings are expected to rise.

Tour and travel operators said that a there is a little uptick in demand, with many expecting an increase in bookings once the weather stabilizes. "We have seen little increase in inquiries from states like Gujarat, Maharashtra and West Bengal in the last few days. Many tourists are waiting for updates on snowfall before finalizing their plans," said Altaf Ahmad, a Srinagar-based travel agent.

He shared if conditions remain favourable, this winter could turn out to be the good seasons again.

Hoteliers too are hopeful about a busy season ahead. "Winter is a special time for Kashmir tourism and early snowfall is always a good sign. Our bookings for December and January are empty as-off now but expect occupancy to rise steadily once snow reaches lower areas," said another hotelier from

FROM APRIL TO SEPTEMBER 5,64039 TOURISTS VISIT PAHALGAM

Meanwhile, an official told KNO that from April to September this year as many as 5,64039 tourists visited Pahalgam. "The numbers declined after the April 22 terror attack but increased gradually," he said.

While giving the breakup the official said, 2,08122 domestic, 2864 foreign and 3,53053 tourists visited Pahalgam in the past six

Officials said, "August and September months saw a positive trend as more than 3000 foreign tourists arrived in the Valley."

They said that Jammu and Kashmir recorded 19,570 foreign tourist visits between January-June 2025 and over 95 lakh domestic visits in the same period. "The fresh inflow of foreign tourists comes months after the April 22 Pahalgam terror attack, which had dealt a severe blow to Kashmir's tourism industry. The attack led to widespread cancellations, emergency return flights, and a short-term collapse in bookings for outdoor sites closely associated with the incident," the officials added.

SNOWFALL IN GULMARG PLEASANT SUR-PRISE FOR TOURISTS

The early snowfall came as a delightful surprise for tourists from across the country, many of whom were first-time visitors to Gulmarg. They expressed joy at seeing the famous ski resort blanketed in snow, transforming it into a breathtaking white wonderland. "We weren't expecting snowfall in October. It feels magical — I'm so lucky to witness it", said an elated tourist while enjoying the snow-covered slopes.

A couple from Kolkata, visiting Kashmir for the first time, while sharing their excitement told KNO that they had visited Pahalgam and Sonamarg earlier during their trip but found Gulmarg to be unmatched in its charm and beauty. "The scenic beauty is breathtaking. People here are warm and cooperative. It's our fourth day in Kashmir, and we haven't felt any security concerns. Everything is well-organized", said Yashfi.

Praising the world-famous Gondola services, the duo said the experience was beyond words. "The view from Phase II is absolutely mesmerizing. There are no words to describe it. We wish everyone to visit and experience this beauty", they added.

Similarly, a tourist, Arun Kumar from Haryana, said the experience lived up to Kashmir's reputation.

"We always heard people call Kashmir 'Paradise on Earth'. Today, we truly witnessed it. The unexpected snowfall made our trip unforgettable", he said.

Tourists at Gulmarg widely hailed the hospitality, administration and security arrangements, describing their stay as "safe, smooth and heartwarming".

Besides hundreds of tourists enjoying the Gondola rides, an official of the Jammu and Kashmir Cable Car Corporation (JKCCC) said, the chairlift joyride added to the attraction with over 400 visitors availing the service on Sunday alone, following successful safety

"We are witnessing an encouraging response from tourists. All safety protocols are in place, and our staff is working round the clock to ensure a comfortable experience for visitors. establishment of a futuristic IT Park in the UT aimed at generating high-end employment opportunities for youth trained in advanced IT domains.

During the meeting, Secretary, IT, Dr. Piyush Singla gave a detailed overview of the Department's functioning and achievements. He informed that the number of active websites audited by Third-Party Auditors (TPA) had risen from 110 to 206 in the past three months, with over 210 government websites and applications currently accessible to the public.

He also revealed that the State Data Centre (SDC) is in the process of obtaining ISO 27001 and ISO 20001 certifications, underscoring the government's commitment to international standards of information security and service management

On this occasion the CEO, JaKeGA, Mahima Madan, presented a detailed account of the projects being implemented by the agency. She informed that a CERT-IN empanelled TPA had successfully conducted audits of departmental websites hosted in J&K, and these would soon be migrated to IPv6 for enhanced security, performance, and scalability.

Providing details of the e-Office 2.0 rollout, she stated that 4,056 offices and 21,774 users have been onboarded under the second phase, extending operations to tehsil and block levels. The State Wide Area Network (SWAN) has been expanded to all districts and 167 blocks, ensuring robust connectivity for smooth e-office operations.

She further informed that 127 citizen services, including 15 newly added ones, have been integrated with Digi Locker, making over 8.06 crore records available online. The platform currently has 30.4 lakh registered users in J&K.

Highlighting JaKeGA's ongoing and upcoming initiatives, she mentioned projects such as digitization of government records, software development for multiple departments, Digital Village Centres in 44 panchayats equipped with video-conferencing facilities, Aadhaarenabled biometric attendance systems, and plans for disaster recovery setups, digital signage solutions, and capacitybuilding programmes.

Speaking in the meeting State Informatics Officer, NIC J.S. Modi, informed that the Centre continues to serve as the $technological\, partner\, of\, the\, Government$ of J&K, providing technical consultancy, support in system design, and guidance in emerging technologies. NIC's infrastructure extends across J&K offering services such as video conferencing, NIC/ NKN connectivity, Network Operations Centre management, cyber security initiatives, website and application hosting, and email services for government departments and the J&K Police.

He further divulged that the NIC also supports various public-facing digital platforms including the Shri Amarnathji Yatra online services, Pension Suvidha Portal, BoPEE services, and Service Plus (JanSugam). Upcoming initiatives include the implementation of NeVA (National e-Vidhan Application), Next Gene Hospital, and online sanctioning of social welfare applications, among others.

Earlier during the meeting, the Chief Secretary launched the E-SAM (Electronic System of Asset Management) Portal, a comprehensive lifecycle management platform designed to optimize asset performance and minimize costs

The system streamlines operations through workflow management, vendor integration, inventory control, disposal tracking, compliance monitoring, and efficiency enhancement, thereby improving governance and accountability.

He said the ESTIC platform will provide young innovators the opportunity to connect with mentors, showcase their ideas and discover next-generation human talent in contributing to India's rise as a global knowledge power.

The programme of the conclave on the ESTIC website states that the prime minister is scheduled to inaugurate the

The theme of the inaugural edition of the ESTIC will be "Imagine, Innovate, Inspire for Viksit Bharat 2047".

Singh said the ESTIC will be held every year and at different locations across the country.

"What makes the ESTIC unique is the whole-of-government approach. With ministries spanning health, education, agriculture, energy, space, electronics and IT, environment and more, innovation is no longer confined to laboratories but embedded across every sector of national development," Professor Abhay Karandikar, Secretary, Department of Science and Technology, said.

Principal Scientific Advisor Ajay Sood said the conclave would serve as a dynamic platform for dialogue, knowledge exchange and actionable roadmaps, with participation from global experts, Nobel laureates and young researchers, among others.

The three-day conclave will have 11 thematic sessions, including on space technologies, advanced materials and manufacturing, digital communications, emerging agricultural technologies, electronics and semiconductor manufacturing.

Each day of the conclave will feature two plenary addresses by Nobel laureates or persons of global eminence.

The thematic sessions will also include quantum science and technology, bio-manufacturing, energy, environment and climate, artificial intelligence, blue economy and health and medical technologies.

manufacturers, and regulatory authorities to strictly comply with national guidelines and best practices.

Secretary Health stressed upon the strict adherence to the advisory and during the discussion, the HODs of the Paediatrics department stated that such medications are generally not recommended for children below five years, and that for older children, their use should be based on careful clinical evaluation, close supervision, and strict adherence to dosage guidelines, while avoiding multiple drug combinations.

The advisory issued by the Director General of Health Services (DGHS) has also underscored the importance of judicious prescribing and dispensing of cough syrups for children, emphasizing that most acute cough illnesses in children are self-limiting and resolve without pharmacological intervention.

At the outset, Pharmaceutical manufacturers in J&K were instructed to $adhere\,strictly\,to\,WHO\text{-}GMP\,standards,\\$ carry out complete impurity profiling as per the latest pharmacopeial stan-

Drugs Control Officers were asked to sensitize chemists and pharmacists against the over-the-counter (OTC) sale of cough and cold syrups without proper prescription and to conduct regular sampling and testing of such products under Section 23 of the Drugs & Cosmetics Act, 1940, to ensure their safety and quality. They were cautioned that any violation of these provisions will invite strict penal action, including suspension or cancellation of licenses under Rule 66

of the Drugs & Cosmetics Rules. The general public is strongly advised to refrain from self-medicating children and to always consult Doctors/Paediatricians, before administering any cough

or cold syrup to them. Secretary further directed all field officers and medical institutions to ensure strict enforcement of these guidelines across the Union Territory to protect child health, prevent misuse of medications, and promote rational and evidence-based paediatric care.

NCDC Holds Meeting: Urges Action Against Drug Abuse Among Youth

SRINAGAR, OCT 06: In a passionate meeting, the National Child Development Council (NCDC) expressed serious concerns about the rising drug abuse among students and young people in India. They called for national action and interventions at various levels. The council stressed the need for strict legal measures, digital monitoring, institutional responsibility, and, most importantly, awareness among families and communities.

The session began with a powerful statement from the chairperson: "Today, let's resolve to confront the drug mafias. This crisis worsens each day, and our children—especially those in higher education—are the main

It was noted that students

often become victims of drug networks, whether unknowingly or under peer pressure. These drugs are frequently accessed through new mobile apps, social circles, or shops close

Member Mohammad Rizwan highlighted a concerning trend: "New apps trap students with fake opportunities. Drug mafias exploit these apps to track and lure young people.'

He stressed the need for government oversight of digital platforms to shut down these dangerous gateways.

NCDC committee member Bindu pointed out that substance use, like tobacco and alcohol, is rising among kids as young as 12 vears old. She drew parallels to notorious cases like the Nirbhaya incident, noting how legal loopholes often protect juvenile addicts.

offenders involved in serious crimes linked to addiction.

"Even when children commit serious acts under the influence, the law protects them. We must address this gap," she said.

She recommended that schools incorporate awareness classes and that parents regularly supervise their children, including checking school bags.

NCDC Master Trainer Baba Alexander noted: "These drugs are often mixed in sweets and chocolates; primary school students consume them—often without realizing it."

He highlighted the need for special investigation teams to uncover drug networks and suggested including real-life case studies in school curriculums, such as visits to rehab centers and interactions with former

NCDC's Radha emphasized the importance of spotting behavioral changes early: "If a child suddenly loses focus or withdraws, that's a warning sign. Teachers and parents must intervene before addiction escalates," she said.

She also raised concerns about "drug-laced chocolates" being sold near schools.

Another member, Anandhi, pointed out that exposure to substance use at home—like alcohol or smoking-sets a bad example. "Children mimic what they see. If parents casually use substances, it normalizes that behavior," she said, adding that prevention should begin at home.

In a heartfelt message, Shakila Wahab of NCDC shared real stories of students affected by neglect, lack of parental involvement, and emotional rejection.

"Many children I counsel come from homes lacking proper care. Parents are often absent, overly strict, or emotionally distant,"

She mentioned that legal restrictions hinder actions against underage users, reinforcing the need for rehabilitation and emotional support instead of punish-

The NCDC members agreed that changes in legislation alone won't suffice. They unanimously supported several points: stricter digital monitoring and app regulation, mandatory drug awareness programs in schools, parental workshops and counseling, community vigilance near schools and colleges, early access to rehabilitation for victims, curriculum inclusion of drug impact stories, and targeted actions against mafia networks.

JMC Reviews Sanitation, Waste Management and Cleanliness Measures Across Jammu City

JAMMU, OCTOBER 6: To further strengthen sanitation services and ensure a clean, healthy, and sustainable urban environment, the Joint Commissioner (Health & Sanitation), Jammu Municipal Corporation (JMC), Abdul Star, today convened a comprehensive review meeting with Health and Sanitation officials of the Corporation. The meeting aimed to assess the existing cleanliness operations, waste management practices, and public hygiene status across all wards of Jam-

During the meeting, a wide range of critical issues concerning the upkeep and beautification of the city were discussed in detail. The Joint Commissioner reviewed the monitoring of doorto-door garbage collection vehicles through GPS tracking to ensure timely coverage of households and effective waste transportation. He also took stock of the collection and disposal of construction and demolition



(C&D) waste, emphasizing strict action against unauthorized dumping along roadsides, drains, and vacant plots.

The progress on enforcing the ban on Single Use Plastic (SUP) was also reviewed. Abdul Star directed the field staff to inten-

sify enforcement drives and impose penalties on violators as per Solid Waste Management Rules. He also reviewed the status and functionality of public toilets across the city and instructed for their regular cleaning, availability of water, and

maintenance of sanitation facilities round the clock.

Reviewing the grievance redressal mechanism on the Swachh City Portal, the Joint Commissioner directed officers $to \, resolve \, complaints \, within \, the \,$ stipulated timeframe to uphold

public confidence in the sanitation system. He also emphasized beat-wise deployment of sanitation workers, ensuring real-time attendance monitoring and proper manpower utilization for comprehensive coverage of all

Further, the mapping and deployment of 407 and 709 tippers used for garbage transportation were examined to enhance route coordination and fuel efficiency. The functioning and scheduling of the Nallah Gang responsible for cleaning drains and nallahs were discussed in detail, with instructions to ensure routine de-silting and clearing of blockages to prevent waterlogging during the monsoon season.

While reviewing revenue generation from sanitation services, the Joint Commissioner directed officials to strengthen collection and accounting mechanisms to ensure transparency. The functioning of transfer stations and enforcement of penalties for violations related to littering, open waste burning, and plastic usage were also assessed.

Abdul Star also reviewed the progress of composting activities at Narwal, emphasizing the importance of converting organic waste into compost to reduce the burden on dumping sites. He instructed officers to adopt sustainable and environmentfriendly disposal methods for garden and horticulture waste while encouraging initiatives promoting recycling and reuse.

In his concluding remarks, the Joint Commissioner called for enhanced field supervision, inter-departmental coordination, and active public participation to ensure lasting cleanliness outcomes. He stressed that citizen cooperation is crucial in maintaining a cleaner and greener Jammu and urged sanitation teams to engage regularly with local residents, RWAs, and market associations for awareness and behavioural change.

The meeting was attended by Health Officer Dr. Vinod Sharma, Sanitation Officers, and Sanitation Inspectors from all wards, who assured full commitment to implementing the directions on the ground. Set up CA stores for better returns of fruits produced in Kashmir

Horticulture is considered to be the mainstay of Kashmir economy and the sector contributes a lot towards the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) of this place. Given the importance of horticulture it is imperative that all the necessary things are in place and all the facilities are provided to the people involved with this sector. As on date there are many things that are missing on ground even though these are pivotal for the proper development of this sector.

Controlled Atmosphere (CA) storage is very important to preserve the fruits and such facilities should be made available to the horticulturists across the valley. In the present day context just a few CA stores are available to the people and the same does not suffice to the needs of horticulturists of Kashmir. It was due to this lack of facility that the horticulturists were forced to sell their produce in the recent past and that too at throw away prices.

Since the shelf life of fruits like apples, pears, cherry and strawberry is very less, it is important that these are preserved for posterity. In this regard the CA store would be an ideal place for storage and it would serve a lot of purposes. For the reasons best known to the people at helm the development of CA stores has not taken place on expected lines due to which the horticulturists are suffering. Private entrepreneurs have also not devoted their attention to this aspect and this seems to be a least priority for them.

As lots of money is required to set up a CA store only big businessmen can perform this task. The other option of setting up a CA store can be in the form of a group of small businessmen joining and pooling their resources in this regard. It is important that immediate measures are taken in this regard so that in future the fruit sellers of Kashmir are not forced to sell their say that distress sales need to be avoided in the horticulture sector.

The government should also lay focus on this important topic and they too should chip in with efforts in this regard. Providing soft loans to the self help groups in this respect would go a long way in settling the nerves of the people involved with the horticulture sector. Once CA stores in adequate numbers come up across the valley then only we can say that the government is serious in developing the horticulture sector.

British Primatologist Dr. Jane Goodall Brilliant Bonding

With Wildlife

Dr. Jane Goodall is no more. But her legacy is vast. The Jane Goodall Institute continues its work in over 75 countries — supporting chimp sanctuaries, helping $local \, communities, protecting \, habitats, fostering \, youth$ leadership in environmental stewardship. Her Roots & Shoots programme has reached millions of young people worldwide, encouraging them to understand that small actions can make a difference. Through her books, speeches, interviews, she altered global conscious ness. She altered how we think about the animalkingdom and our place in it. From her early days $crouching \, by \, termite \, mounds \, in \, Gombe \, to \, late \, nights \,$ editing documents virtually until the end, she lived with a sense of mission — to make the world more just, more aware, more kind.

It is rare to meet a person whose life so fully embodies their ideals: in Goodall there was no separation between study and love, between discovery and care, between science and soul. She showed that knowledge gained with respect can lead to understanding; that standing with the vulnerable — whether chimpanzees or forests or neglected humans – is not only an ethical obligation but a path to a richer understanding of what it meansto be human. What made Dr Goodall unique was not merely the discoveries she made, but the intimate relationships she formed with her subjects in Gombe - the individual chimpanzees, each with name, personality, story. Chimps like Flo, the matriarch she watched with affection; David Greybeard, brave and curious; Fifi, and many others whose lives she chronicled. She observed their tenderness, their grief, their kinship, their war, their joy. In doing so she blurred the boundary between human and animal, invited us to see ourselves in them. She called them individuals, not specimens. And she learned from them: about love, loyalty, mourning, about how complex social bonds can be. Chimps in her study used tools, made war, showed jealousy, joy, fear. They had culture. Her work helped the world appreciate sentience, to ask deeper ethical questions about our treatment of all living beings.

Dr Goodall's path was not without obstacles. Early fieldwork was physically exhausting, lonely, sometimes dangerous. Supplies were limited. Funding often uncertain. In later years, mounting threats to chimpanzee habitat, poaching, disease, human encroachment placed her beloved chimps in increasing peril. She spoke often of the moral urgency: that all species depend on healthy ecosystems, that we cannot separate animal welfare from human welfare. Some scientists questioned her naming of animals, or anthropomorphizing emotions. Some criticisms were valid — balancing objectivity with empathy is difficult. But many came to see that her empathetic approach was itself revolutionary, not a liability. Her presence, waiting, listening, bonding, opened a new way of doing field science. She inspired generations, especially women, to pursue science and conservation in ways that embrace compassion. The world lost one of its most luminous champions of nature on 1 October 2025, when Dr Jane Goodall, pioneer primatologist, conservationist, and voice for the voiceless, passed away at the age of 91. Her death by natural causes was confirmed by the Jane Goodall Institute. She was in Los Angeles at the time, engaged in a speaking tour — still active, still urging humanity toward greater compassion for the natural world. Born in London in 1934, Goodall grew up with a deep curiosity for animals and a yearning for Africa. Her childhood was marked by a family that encouraged her to imagine and to explore; she was drawn to the natural world long before academic titles or formal training would define her path. Lacking a university degree initially, she held jobs — secretary, waitress — to fund a trip to Africa, where she planned simply to see wild animals. Her life took a defining turn when she met the anthropologist Louis Leakey in Kenya in the late 1950s. Leakey, impressed by her passion and keen observation skills, gave her an opportunity that would change both science and her life.

In 1960, at about age 26, Goodall began her field research at Gombe Stream Game Reserve in what is now Tanzania. She set up a camp and observed chimpanzees in their natural habitat. Her methods were unorthodox: she named individuals, noted person $a lities \, and \, relationships, and \, waited \, -sometimes \, for \,$ very long periods — to see behaviours that others might have missed. Her patience led to discoveries

that would ripple through science. One of the earliest and most famous was the observation of a chimpanzee she called David Greybeard using a blade of grass to fish termites from a mound — a tool-use behavior. At that time, it was widely believed that tool-making and tool-use were exclusive to humans. This finding forced scientists to rethink what separated human beings from other primates. She also recorded chimpanzees hunting, eating meat, engaging in complex social interactions, expressing emotions, showing compassion and cruelty. She noted the formation of political alliances, hierarchies, conflicts, and love. Her work revealed the sensitivity, intelligence, and emotional depth of these creatures – something many had long denied or ignored. Despite her groundbreaking findings, she faced skepticism from parts of the scientific establishment: her methods labeled sentimental; naming animals considered anthropomorphism; lacking formal credentials at first. But over time, the depth of her observations and the consistency of her findings won respect and legitimacy.

In 1965, Goodall earned her PhD from Cambridge University – a remarkable achievement given that she did not have an undergraduate degree. Her doctoral work formalized her empirical findings and helped pave the way for ethology and primatology to accept long-term field observation and more human-animal relational approaches. She was not only a scientist but also a communicator. Goodall wrote numerous books, many for general audiences and for children, bringing the lives of Gombe's chimpanzees into homes around the world. Her works – for example In the Shadow of Man – moved readers not just intellectually, but emotionally, urging them to care. In 1977 she founded the Jane Goodall Institute, dedicated to wildlife research, conservation, and education. In 1991 she launched Roots & Shoots, a youth program to empower young people around the world to make a positive difference for people, animals, and the environment.

Dr Jane Goodall's passing leaves an immense emptiness – among chimps who no longer wander the shrinking forests, among conservationists who have lost a mentor, among ordinary people who found in her life a truthful beacon. Yet she also left something more enduring than grief: a template for how to live in compassion, curiosity, and courage; a world slightly more kind, slightly more aware, than the one she was born into. May we honour her by carrying forward her curiosity, her care, her insistence that to know another being is to love them; that to protect the vulnerable is to safeguard our own humanity. Rest in peace, Dr Jane Goodall. The forest will remember you, and so will we.

Her voice, once soft in the forest and then ringing loud in halls of power, never lost its humility. She believed in hope: not blind optimism, but hopeful action. She believed in individuals making a difference. She believed, as she often said, that every single one of us has a role to play.

As her readers and followers multiplied, Goodall's work moved beyond observation to urgent advocacy. She spoke out on issues such as habitat loss, species extinction, climate change, animal welfare, and the ethical treatment of wildlife. She insisted that humans are not separate from nature – that we are deeply entwined, and our future depends on how we treat other beings and the earth itself. Even into her 80s and 90s, Goodall maintained an astonishing energy. She travelled widely, spoke to young people, engaged in public discourse, and continued to write. Her last book, The Book of Hope: A Survival Guide for Trying Times (2021), was a reflection of her optimism: hope not as naive belief, but as resolve to act and care. Recognition followed. She was made a Dame of the British Empire, appointed a United Nations Messenger of Peace. Among her many honours were the Templeton Prize, the Presidential Medal of Freedom (awarded in 2025), and numerous others around the globe.

For the younger generation, the novel serves as a source of intellectual awakening. It reminds readers that literature is not just for entertainment but for self-reflection and awareness.



Takes strict note of pendencies on account of disbursal of cases; issues slew of directions for timely clearing pendencies

GANDERBAL, OCTOBER 06: To review the quarterly performance of the banks and other line departments in the district for the first quarter ending June-2025 for the year 2025-2026, District Development Commissioner (DDC) Ganderbal, Jatin Kishore Monday chaired District level Review Committee/ District Consultative Committee (DLRC/ DCC) meeting, here.

At the outset, DDC took a thorough review of the performance of banks achieved under various key schemes of the government including, PMJJBY, PMSBY, KCC, Mission Yuva, and other social security schemes to assess the progress under the Annual Credit Plan (ACP).

Lead District Manager, Ganderbal, presented a comprehensive report detailing the bankwise performance in various key areas, including deposits, advances, and Credit Deposit Ratio (CDR). Credit Deposit Ratio of the banks stood at 94%

DDC expressed concern regarding the low credit dispensation in the agriculture sector. He emphasized the need for banks to increase credit flow to the agriculture sector to meet the requirements of farmers. He directed banks to improve their credit dispensation strategies and ensure that the agricultural sector receives adequate financial support.

Additionally, district officers of Agriculture and allied departments were advised to sponsor more credit-linked cases under prominent schemes like the Holistic Agriculture Development Programme to the banks. Further, Agriculture & allied departments along with banks were directed to ensure 100% saturation of PM Kisan beneficiaries under the Kisan Credit Card (KCC) scheme.



DDC took a compressive review of the Mission YUVA cases and directed all the concerned branches to dispose-off all the pending cases within a period of one week and report compliance. The concerned department, (Employment Department) was also directed to take up the matter with the banks for early resolution of issued faced by beneficiaries.

In the Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises (MSME) sector, banks reported significant progress, having exceeded the targets set for the sector under the Annual Credit Plan.

The performance under various Social Security Schemes (SSS), including Pradhan Mantri Suraksha Bima Yojana (PMS-BY), Pradhan Mantri Jeevan Jyoti Bima Yojana (PMJJBY), Pradhan Mantri Jhan Dhan Yojna (PMJDY) and Atal Pension Yojana (APY), was also reviewed. In this regard, banks and line departments were directed to work together to ensure 100% enrollment of eligible beneficiaries under these welfare

District Road Safety Committee Meeting Held at Kathua

DC Pushes for Effective Implementation of Corrective Measures

KATHUA, OCTOBER 6: The 22nd meeting of the District Road Safety Committee (DRSC) was today convened under the chairmanship of Deputy Commissioner (DC) Kathua, Rajesh Sharma, to review and strengthen ongoing initiatives aimed at ensuring safer roads and reducing accidents across the district.

The meeting was attended by Additional Deputy Commissioner Vishavjeet Singh, Additional Superintendent of Police Rahul Charak, Superintending Engineer PWD(Kathua-Samba Circle), Principal GMC Kathua, Executive Engineers of PWD (R&B) Kathua, Basohli, Billawar and Hiranagar, and representatives from Degree Colleges, Border Roads Organisation (BRO), Police Department, National Highways Authority of India(NHAI) and other concerned departments.

During the meeting, threadbare discussions were held on identifying vulnerable road stretches, rectification of black spots, and enforcement of road safety measures at critical locations. The Committee also reviewed the status of road connectivity affected by recent rains, damage to culverts and bridges, and related issues impacting traffic movement and com-Speaking on the occasion,

DC Rajesh Sharma emphasized the need for a coordinated interdepartmental approach to effectively minimize road accidents and enhance commuter safety. He reiterated that the District Administration has adopted a comprehensive and data-driven plan to strengthen road infrastructure, improve signage, and ensure the scientific design of junctions and pedestrian cross-



The DC directed the Executive Engineers of BRO, PWD (R&B) and PMGSY to ensure regular upkeep and maintenance of accident-prone roads, especially in hilly and rural areas. He

of crash barriers, reflective signage, and rumble strips at critical points to alert drivers and prevent mishaps.

Highlighting the importance of public awareness, the DC urged the Education Department and Transport Authorities to jointly organize road safety awareness camps, helmet and seatbelt drives, and traffic rule sensitization sessions in schools, colleges, and market areas. He also directed for intensified enforcement to curb over-speeding, rash driving, over-

loading, and drunken driving. The DC further instructed

also called for the installation the concerned authorities to decongest city roads, especially around GMC Kathua, Bus Stand, Shaheedi Chowk, and other busy intersections, to ensure smooth vehicular movement. He called upon the Motor Vehicle and Traffic Police to ensure strict compliance with road safety norms and to take stern action against habitual violators

The Superintending Engineer PWD was directed to identify two critical roads in each division for immediate repair and maintenance to enhance commuter safety and prevent accidents. The DC also asked NHAI and BRO

to expedite repair of damaged road portions and improve drainage systems along highways to avoid waterlogging during heavy

Concluding the meeting, the DC stressed that road safety is a shared responsibility requiring continuous coordination between departments and active cooperation from the public. He directed all line departments to submit a status report on action taken against identified black spots and progress achieved in implementing safety measures before the next review meeting.

including Goa President Amit Palekar and MLAs Venzy Viegas and Cruz Silva, later submitted the letters to the Secretariat. Palekar said that the party would follow up with the government to ensure actual repairs are conducted, noting that past government assurances on this issue have not yielded results.

MLA Venzy Viegas claimed that several fatalities and injuries have occurred due to the poor road conditions, citing a recent incident where an ambulance reportedly overturned in Porvorim. MLA Cruz Silva added that public trust in the government's promises has diminished. UNI

SC issues notice to Centre on plea challenging Constitutional validity of STT

NEW DELHI, OCT 6: The Supreme Court today issued notice to the Central government on a writ petition challenging the constitutional validity of the Securities Transaction Tax (STT), which is levied on the buying and selling of stocks and other securities on Indian stock exchanges under the Finance Act, 2004.

A Bench comprising Justice J.B. Pardiwala and Justice K.V. Viswanathan issued the notice, returnable in four

"The principal argument canvassed before us is that the Securities Transaction Tax is the only tax levied in the country on the mere act of carrying out a profession and is sought to be levied irrespective of whether a



profit is derived or not.

This, according to the petitioner, renders the levy almost punitive or deterrent in nature.

Otherwise, all other taxes in India are levied on profits at the year-end, but the STT is imposed even if the

stock market trader operates at a loss. Issue notice, returnable in four weeks," the Court

The writ petition, filed by stock market trader Aseem Juneja, seeks a declaration that STT is unconstitutional as it violates Articles 14, 19(1)(g), and 21 of the Constitu-

In the alternative, Juneja has sought a direction to allow adjustment of STT paid during a financial year against short-term or long-term capital gains tax liability, similar to how Tax Deducted at Source (TDS) is adjusted for salaried individuals.

The petitioner has argued that STT amounts to double taxation, since traders pay capital gains tax on profits while also being charged STT on every transaction.

He pointed out that while short-term or long-term capital gains taxes are levied on profits, STT currently 0.1 percent on both buy and sell sides for delivery trades, is imposed regardless of whether profit or loss is made. Juneja further contended that STT is unique because

it applies even when a trader incurs losses, making it punitive in nature. "STT is applicable to the rupee value of shares bought

or sold, not on actual profits. There is no other tax in India where a professional is taxed despite making a loss. Such a levy on transactions rather than profits is arbitrary and violates Articles 14, 21, and 19(1)(g)," the plea states.

Drawing an analogy, the petitioner compared STT to taxing a doctor on every consultation fee received even if the practice ultimately incurs a loss.

The petition notes that while STT was introduced in 2004 to curb tax evasion and function like TDS, it lacks any mechanism for adjustment or refund against final tax liability, effectively forcing traders to pay both STT and capital gains tax.

The plea also highlights that major global financial markets such as the United States, Germany, Singapore, and Japan do not impose such a tax.

The petitioner has urged the Supreme Court to either strike down the STT as unconstitutional or direct that it be adjusted against capital gains tax liability. UNI

NIA chargesheets Rahul Sarkar in Lawrence **Bishnoi-BKI terror** conspiracy case

NEW DELHI OCT 6: The National Investigation Agency (NIA) today chargesheeted another accused in the 2022 case involving the Lawrence Bishnoi gang and its nexus with the banned Babbar Khalsa International (BKI) terrorist organization.

The case pertains to a terror conspiracy hatched by the dreaded Lawrence Bishnoi gang in association with BKI to spread terrorism in India.

In its fifth chargesheet filed before the NIA Special Court at Patiala House, Delhi, the NIA has charged Rahul Sarkar for facilitating gang members commit terror activities. Besides assisting them in fleeing



the country, he was involved in preparing and arranging forged identity documents like Aadhaar Cards, Voter IDs and Bank Passbooks.

Investigations revealed that Sarkar used these fake documents to aid gang members, including co-accused Sachin Bishnoi, in fraudulently procuring passports to escape India and continue their terror activities. Rahul Sarkar is the 22nd accused to be chargesheeted so far. Of these, 18, including Sarkar, have been arrested, while four are absconding.

The case was originally registered by the Delhi Police Special Cell on August 4, 2022. The NIA, which took over the investigation on August 26 the same year, is continuing to probe the terror-gangster nexus. UNI

Trump has not abandoned spirit of Anchorage summit, says former US National Intelligence official

WASHINGTON, OCT 6: US President Donald Trump has not abandoned the spirit of the Aug 15, Anchorage summit where he met his Russian counterpart President Vladimir Putin, amid Washington's continued delivery of weapon systems to Ukraine, said former National Intelligence Council official Graham Fuller.

The Anchorage summit – though failing in its ability to reach an agreement on reaching a settlement – was marked success nonetheless, reopening communications between Moscow and Washington after years of deadlock, and significantly improving bilateral relations.

Speaking to TASS, Fuller remarked that sending weapons to Kyiv is not a betrayal or rejection of that spirit.

Further commenting on the weapons deliveries to Ukraine under Trump and the openness to deliver Tomahawk cruise missiles to Kyiv, and reports about Washington providing Kyiv with information for strikes on Russia's energy infrastructure, Fuller said, "I would not say that he has abandoned the Anchorage, the spirit of Anchorage, if you will.

"I think that, probably is, something that is fairly deep in his mind, even in his heart, as the kind of legacy he would like to leave behind as a great statesman who was able to, Trump's policy on Ukraine, saying you know, accomplish rapprochement and settlement with Russia."

"I'm not ready to say, Oh, my God, it's all finished, Anchorage has been lost. I think Trump is quite capable of suddenly changing his mind, acting impulsively, and I could even imagine him picking up the phone to talk to Vladimir Putin at some point," he noted. "I'm far from being in the position of saying that it's all finished and it's heading irrevocably towards (world)



He opined that the situation, and its contextual complexities must be taken into account when considering that it is important to consider the current developments around Kyiv "in broader context of the character and nature of Donald Trump."

"We all know that he's very volatile, changes his mind all the time, is not well informed on details, has no strategic vision," the former intelligence official said.

"But I think he has some sort of <...> fingertip feel for situations and people, which helps him manoeuvre through some of these issues."

"At the same time, I'm sure you've $heard\,the\,expression\,that\,people\,say$ that Donald Trump's views reflect the last person who spoke to him, last person he talked to. I think there's probably some truth to that," Fuller continued. The former US official also said with surety that Trump "doesn't want to be the president who is accused of 'losing Ukraine'." In his opinion, "there are a lot of other forces at work within his own party."

Commenting on the political difficulties of the matter, he added "They hate anything he wants to do, and that makes difficulties in creating policy." UNI

CPI(M), lawyers' bodies condemn shoe-throwing incident targeting CJI B.R. Gavai inside Supreme Court

NEW DELHI, OCT 6: After a lawyer allegedly hurled a shoe at Chief Justice of India B.R. Gavai inside the Supreme Court, the Communist Party of India (Marxist) and the All India Lawyers union (AILU) today issued strong statements condemning the act, describing it as a "blatant attack" on judicial indepen-

dence and secular values. According to reports, the incident occurred inside the Chief Justice's courtroom just

as proceedings had begun. Eyewitnesses said an elderly advocate raised slogans invoking "Sanatan Dharma" before throwing a shoe

towards the Bench. The object, however, did not reach the Chief Justice.

The accused, identified as Kishore Rakesh, reportedly possessed a proximity card issued to lawyers and clerks in the Supreme Court.

Maintaining composure, CJI Gavai reportedly told those present, "I am the last person to be affected by such things. Please continue," and resumed proceedings without interruption. In its official statement, the

CPI(M) Polit Bureau termed the act "shocking and deplorable," attributing it to "Manuvadi and communal venom" allegedly spread by Hindutva

The party accused certain political leaders of fostering an atmosphere of intolerance and called upon the union government to ensure adequate protection for the Chief Justice and the judiciary.

The AILU, led by President Bikas Ranjan Bhattacharya and General Secretary P.V. Surendranath, described the incident as "a blatant attack



on the Supreme Court and the Constitution itself."

The lawyers' body said it should not be viewed as an isolated act but as part of a "vicious vilification campaign" against judicial independence.

It urged the legal fraternity to register a democratic protest and demanded a thorough investigation into the

The Supreme Court Bar Association(SCBA) also issued

a strongly worded statement, condemning the act as "reprehensible," "unbecoming of an officer of the Court," and "a direct assault on judicial

independence." The SCBA linked the out-

rage to online backlash over Justice Gavai's remarks in the Khajuraho Vishnu Idol Restoration case, where he had emphasised respect for all religions, a statement later distorted on social media.

Similarly, the Supreme Court Advocates-on-Record Association (SCOARA) denounced the incident as "cowardly" and "unbecoming of a member of the Bar."

It said such conduct "strikes at the core of mutual respect between the Bench and the Bar" and erodes public faith in the justice system.

SCOARA reaffirmed its solidarity with the Chief Justice of India and the Supreme Court, urging all members of the legal fraternity to uphold professional decorum and the

dignity of the institution. SCOARA further suggested that the Supreme Court may take suo motu cognisance of the act and initiate contempt proceedings, emphasising that freedom of speech carries an inherent duty of restraint, especially for officers of the

Earlier in the day, the courtroom briefly descended into chaos when the advocate, dressed in formal attire and carrying a bag and papers, attempted to confront the CJI. He was swiftly restrained

and escorted out by security personnel. As he was taken out, he reportedly shouted, "Sanatan ka apmaan nahi sahega Hindustan."

Later, the lawyer apologised before Justice K. Vinod Chandran, stating that his actions were directed only toward Justice Gavai.

The CJI had said, "I respect all religions," while responding to misinterpretations of his remarks made during the Khajuraho Vishnu Idol matter. UNI

NEW DELHI: Virat Kohli and Rohit Sharma have been picked in India's ODI squad for the series in Australia starting on October 19, marking their international comebacks after last playing in the 2025 Champions Trophy final in March. The squad will be led by Shubman Gill, who has replaced Rohit as the ODI captain, with Shreyas Iyer the vice-captain.

The selection panel, headed by former India fast bowler Ajit Agarkar, met on Saturday in Ahmedabad, where India won the first Test of the series against West Indies by an innings and 140 runs.

There are five changes to the ODI squad from the 15 that won the Champions Trophy in the UAE in March: Ravindra Jadeja and Varun Chakravarthy are missing, Hardik Pandya is recovering from a quadriceps injury, Rishabh Pant has not yet fully recovered from the broken foot he suffered in England, and Jasprit Bumrah has been rested. They have been replaced by allrounder Nitish Kumar Reddy, who was injured for the Champions Trophy, Mohammed Siraj, Arshdeep Singh, Prasidh Krishna, Dhruv Jurel and Yashasvi Jaiswal. Agarkar indicated that Gill and Rohit were likely to open in the ODIs, which means Jaiswal could miss out on a place in the starting XI. He also said Jurel was picked ahead of Sanju Samson in the ODI squad due to batting position, while KL Rahul is likely to remain the first-choice wicketkeeper.

"With regards to Jaddu [Jadeja], I mean look, at the moment to take two left-arm spinners to Australia is not possible. He is clearly in the scheme of things with how good he is, but there will be some competition for places,"

Agarkar said. "Of course he was there in the Champions Trophy squad, because we took those extra spinners with the conditions there [in UAE]. At the moment we could only carry one and get some balance in the team with Washi [Washington Sundar] and Kuldeep there as well. I don't think we are going to need more than that in Australia. It's a short series, you can't accommodate everyone and unfortunately at the moment he is missing out, but it's nothing more than that."

Bumrah is part of the T20I squad for the five matches in Australia after the ODI series. The only change to the T20I squad that won the Asia Cup last month is Hardik being replaced by Reddy, while Washington has been added, making it a squad of 16.

"We have already rested him for the one-day games. When we can manage his workload, we will do that," Agarkar said about Bumrah. "Wherever you can give him a break, you will, because we all know how important he is, but we have also got to see what is in the interest of the team. And when we need him to play, he is always available, but we will look after [him]. Not just him, Siraj bowls a lot of overs as well. There are other guys who do play Test cricket, who will end up having a lot of bowling to do, so we will try and manage all the seamers, so that we minimise the risk of injuries.'


