Home Minister Hails BSF's Bravery, Says Nine Terror Camps Reduced to Rubble During The Operation

SRINAGAR, NOV 21: Union Home Minister Amit Shah on Friday said Pakistan was compelled to announce a unilateral ceasefire earlier this year after India launched sharp $and \, targeted \, strikes \, under \, Operation \, Sindoor \,$ in response to the April 22 Pahalgam attack.

Addressing the Border Security Force's Diamond Jubilee celebrations in Bhuj, Gujarat, Shah said the operation sent a powerful message that any attempt to challenge India's territorial integrity will invite a decisive

He said security forces destroyed nine major installations of Jaish-e-Mohammed, Hizbul Mujahideen, and Lashkar-e-Taiba. including key headquarters and training sites. According to Shah, even India's limited response was enough for Pakistan to react militarily, prompting BSF troops to deliver what he described as a "resounding reply."

Shah said the swift action by the BSF, Army and Air Force forced Pakistan to declare a ceasefire within days, demonstrating India's capability and resolve.



The Home Minister praised the BSF for its unwavering dedication, saying the force has stood as India's first line of defence since 1965, often operating in the harshest terrains and weather conditions. He said 2,013 BSF personnel have sacrificed their lives to ensure the nation's borders remain secure.

521 New Houses Sanctioned for Poonch, Rajouri, Says PM Modi's Govt Committed to Complete Rehabilitation

JAMMU, NOV 21: In a major relief initiative for families devastated by recent natural calamities and unprovoked Pakistani shelling during Operation Sindoor, Lieutenant Governor Manoj Sinha on Thursday laid the foundation stone for 521 new houses in Poonch and Rajouri, declaring that "not a single family will be deprived of their rights and fundamental needs." The project, to be imple-



mented with the support of HRDS India, will rebuild 133 damaged houses in Poonch and 388 in Rajouri, all free of cost. The LG described the effort as a testament to Prime Minister Narendra Modi's commitment to transforming the lives of border residents who have long lived under the shadow of conflict.

The LG said that the administration had earlier extended ex-gratia relief, government jobs to Next of Kin (NoKs) of the deceased, and compensation to families affected by flash floods and cross-border shelling. In Poonch, 13 NoKs were provided government jobs, 14 bereaved families received ex-gratia, and 160 kachcha as well as 425 pucca house owners were compensated. Over ₹10 crore in relief has also been provided under SRE and Central schemes. In Rajouri, one NoK of a civilian killed during Operation Sindoor

NEW DELHI, NOV 21: In a landmark overhaul of labour laws, the government on Friday notified all four Labour Codes, ushering in major reforms, including universal social security coverage for gig workers,

mandatory appointment letters for all employees, and statutory minimum wages and timely payment across sectors.

Codes To Provide Social Security To All Workers

The four Labour Codes — the Code of Wages (2019, Industrial Relations Code (2020), Code on Social Security (2020) and Occupational Safety,

Health and Working Conditions Code (2020) – effective Friday, replace 29 fragmented laws with a unified, modern framework.

The reforms include expanded rights and safety for women, including night-shift work, free annual

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Upgraded ILS to prevent winter cancellations: Director

SRINAGAR, NOV 21: Director, Srinagar International Airport, Javid Anjum, on Friday said the flight cancellations due to weather are 'unlikely this winter' as the airport has been equipped with an upgraded Instrument Landing System (ILS) Category-II.

Speaking to the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO), the Director said the upgraded system ensures safer and more reliable landings even under low-visibility conditions.

Anjuman said that Srinagar usually records around 1,000 metres of visibility during winters, which allows for comfortable landings. "Earlier, the threshold was 1,200 meters, but now the system is much improved. This year, we expect no flight cancellations," he said, adding that the upgraded ILS now allows landings with visibility as low as 400 metres.

The Director said the ILS upgrade was already functional last year and that no cancellations occurred due to weather conditions, marking a major improvement in airport reliability during foggy and snowy months.

Peak-Hour Power Surcharge Pushes Omar Abdullah Govt Further Into Controversy

Already cornered over unfulfilled electricity promises, NC-led administration faces fresh backlash as consumers question priorities and allege on-ground negligence

SRINAGAR, NOV 21: Omar Abdullah lead National Conference Government is once again under political and public fire, this time over a proposal to impose a 20 percent surcharge on electricity consumption during morning and evening peak

hours in the Kashmir Valley.

The move, initiated by the Kashmir Power Development Corporation Limited (KPDCL) and now pending before the Joint Electricity Regulatory Commission (JERC), comes at a politically vulnerable moment for the government. Abdullah is already battling widespread criticism for

failing to deliver on the flagship campaign promise of providing 200 units of free electricity. The proposed peak-hour surcharge, critics say, only deepens the trust deficit and heightens public frustration as winter sets in.

A Policy That Risks Further Alienation;

Electricity costs in winter are

a sensitive issue in Kashmir, where freezing temperatures force families to rely heavily on heating devices during mornings and late evenings. By proposing a surcharge precisely during these hours, the government risks appearing detached from ground realities at a time when economic distress is already

Political parties were quick to condemn the move. Apni Party president Syed Altaf Bukhari termed the proposal a "grave injustice," arguing that a population battered by downturns in tourism, horticulture. and trade cannot absorb

Highlighting the BSF's growing strength, Shah said the force now has 193 battalions and more than 2.76 lakh personnel guarding the borders with Pakistan and Bangladesh. He added that the government is set to fully modernize the BSF in the coming year, followed by a focused effort on welfare programmes for personnel and their families.

 $Shah\, also\, noted\, the\, BSF's\, success\, in\, tackling$ narcotics smuggling, citing the seizure of over 18,000 kilograms of drugs this year. He said the government is introducing a new "e-Border Security" system, with the BSF leading its implementation across India's land borders.

Criticizing political parties that oppose the ongoing voter list purification exercise, Shah vowed that the government will identify and remove all infiltrators from the country. He said only Indian citizens will determine the country's leadership, and infiltrators will not be allowed to influence democratic processes.

Shah concluded that India has significantly strengthened border fencing in recent years, making infiltration increasingly difficult.

was given a government job, while 465 damaged houses received rebuilding assistance. Families affected by natural calamities have also been compensated to restore their struc-

Laying out the broader plan, Sinha announced that 1,500 prefabricated Smart Houses will be built across Jammu & Kashmir in the first phase and handed over within six months of the start of construction. These three-bedroom homes will include cowsheds and will be maintained by HRDS India for five years. Solar panels will be installed in the second phase. The Poonch-Rajouri project alone will cost ₹51 crore, fully funded by HRDS India. "These homes will help families rebuild their lives with speed and dignity," he said.

The Lieutenant Governor directed district authorities to ensure inclusion of all genuine beneficiaries and clarified that there is no cap on the number of houses to be built. Calling the project a lifeline for economically weaker families, he said their welfare was the administration's highest service. He added that Poonch and Rajouri, long victims of neglect and terrorism, are now witnessing development at a pace unseen before, with significant progress in infrastructure and security. In recent years, 1,125 bunkers were completed in Poonch and proposals for 5,693 more have been submitted, while 2,923 bunkers have been constructed in Rajouri, Additionally, 19 NoKs in Rajouri and 9 in Poonch from terror-affected families have been provided government jobs. He instructed officials to trace any remaining eligible families and expedite their appointment cases.

"For the first time since independence, the people of Poonch and Rajouri are receiving the developmental benefits they were always entitled to. This new era of growth will continue uninterrupted," Sinha said at the ceremony attended by Chief Secretary Atal Dulloo, DGP Nalin Prabhat, senior officers, political leaders, HRDS India representatives and residents from both districts.

Omar Abdullah-led government has already taken a clear stand against the proposed 20% peak-hour surcharge. "In a harsh Kashmiri winter, power is a necessity, not a luxury. The Omar Abdullah-led government will not allow the people of J&K to be burdened with any such unfair and ill-timed proposal," he wrote.

The NC spokesman clarified the government's stand on the proposal submitted by KPDCL-a DISCOM-to the Joint Electricity Regulatory Commission after facing criticism from several opposition parties.

Apni Party president Syed Altaf Bukhari described the proposal as a "grave injustice" to the people of Kashmir. "KPDCL's proposal to impose a 20% surcharge on power tariffs during peak hours is a grave injustice to people who are already struggling to survive an economic crisis. Most of our population depends on tourism and horticulture—sectors that have suffered massive losses this year. Other businesses are also in decline. In such times, increasing electricity charges for mornings and evenings-when families rely on power the most in freezing cold-cannot be justified," he wrote.

Mirwaiz Umar Farooq also termed the proposal a grave injustice, saying that people are already struggling to survive an economic crisis as businesses decline.

He said that instead of easing people's problems, the government is adding to their woes. "Rather than fulfilling the commitment of providing 200 units of free electricity to the poor, new burdens are being placed on people. I urge the government to immediately withdraw this anti-people proposal," an official handout quoted him as saying.

Peoples Conference general secretary Imran Reza Ansari questioned the rationale behind the hike, demanding clarity on who within the Power Development Department authorized the "magical midnight-thought tariff ideas." "So just wondering, before we all get shocked with this proposed 20% peak-hour surcharge, can someone politely remind me who exactly is the Minister for Power Development Department approving these magical midnightthought tariffideas in Kashmir?" Ansari asked. He added that despite a promise of 200 units

of free electricity, Kashmiris are instead facing a 20% extra bill during the hours when people are freezing and desperately need electricity.

Peoples Democratic Party MLA Waheed-ur-Rehman Para termed the proposal "cruel" and "catastrophic." "J&K government must do a real ground assessment before hiking electricity charges. People in posh areas may not feel it, but for ordinary Kashmiris, winter is a battle for survival. In Kashmir, electricity is not a luxury, it is life support. At a time when families are already struggling, raising tariffs on the poor and middle class will be cruel and catastrophic. Policies that ignore human suffering have no place in a just administration," Para

The Kashmir Trade Alliance (KTA) also voiced strong opposition to the proposal.

In a statement, KTA President Aijaz Shahdhar termed the proposal "arbitrary" and "unjustified," warning that such a move would severely impact the business community and the general public.

The Kashmir Chamber of Commerce and Industry (KCCI) also opposed the proposal, calling it unjustified, punitive, and an attempt to shift the burden of systemic failures onto the people of Kashmir.

Officials said Jammu and Kashmir has

reported over two lakh dog-bite cases in recent years, triggering serious concern over public safety, particularly of children and patients, who remain most vulnerable to attacks in and around schools and health facilities.

Under the new order, the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act and the Animal Birth Control (Dog) Rules, 2023, will be implemented and monitored by a UT-level committee headed by the Administrative Secretary of the Agriculture Production Department. The panel has been tasked with identifying high-risk, high-footfall areas that need urgent interventions. These include schools, colleges, hospital and PHC complexes, sports grounds, bus terminals, railway stations and other institutions frequently used by children, women, elderly and patients.

As part of the preventive measures, heads of institutions according to news agency Kashmir Indepth News Service (KINS) have been directed to secure their premises by constructing boundary walls, installing lockable gates and undertaking other administrative steps to prevent the entry and habitation of stray dogs inside campuses. The entire exercise will be supervised by district administrations and municipal bodies.

Municipal authorities have, meanwhile, been asked to promptly capture stray dogs found within the premises of schools, hospitals and other notified institutions and shift them to designated shelters. There, as per the Animal Birth Control Rules, dogs will undergo sterilisation and vaccination before being relocated to safer areas.

"All procedures, from catching to sheltering, will be humane. We cannot compromise on that. The apex court's directions will be followed in letter and spirit," said a senior official associated with the rollout.

Significantly, the Supreme Court has barred the release of sterilised dogs back into the same institutional premises from where they are captured, especially where children and other vulnerable groups are present. The UT-level committee will conduct quarterly reviews to ensure strict adherence.

 $Officials\, said\, departments\, and\, agencies\, will$ be assigned clearly defined roles, responsibilities and timelines, and warned that stringent action, including departmental proceedings, may be taken against officers who fail to comply. (KINS)

"white-collar terror module" linked to terrorist organisations. The network involved doctors from Kashmir, Faridabad and Uttar Pradesh who stored explosives. The module was connected to a deadly blast near Delhi's Red Fort and prompted widespread inspections of hospitals across Kashmir.

An official told the news agency-Kashmir News Observer (KNO) that the drives covered the jurisdictions of Police Stations Nowhatta, Lal Bazar, Shaheeganj, Chanapora, Rajbagh, RM Bagh, Harwan, Nishat, MR Ganj, Safakadal, Zadibal, Hazratbal, Nigeen, Saddar, Khanyar, and the surrounding areas of the city.

He said the inspections of chemical and fertiliser outlets focused on verifying stock maintenance, sales records, identity checks for bulk buyers, secure storage of potentially hazardous materials, and the validity of licenses.

"Shop owners were briefed about reporting suspicious transactions and maintaining complete transparency," he said, adding that police teams emphasised the importance of following regulatory requirements and informed proprietors that inspection drives would continue regularly to prevent misuse of chemicals.

Simultaneously, car dealerships were inspected to ensure compliance with legal norms, proper record-keeping, verification of buyer identities, and adherence to security protocols.

Teams checked registration documents, sale agreements, and inventory records. Dealers were reminded to update records promptly and report any unusual transactions," the officials said.

They said these measures aim to prevent vehicles from being used for unlawful activities. "In coordination with medical institutions, Srinagar Police also inspected lockers used by doctors and hospital staffin district and private hospitals, medical colleges, PHCs, and other health facilities," they added.

The officials said that lockers were checked for unauthorised storage of hazardous or prohibited materials. Staff were instructed to maintain records and ensure lockers are used strictly for official purposes, they said.

Similar inspections were conducted in Ganderbal, with police advising hospital personnel to cooperate fully and maintain compliance with security procedures.

In Anantnag, vehicle dealerships were checked for proper documentation, adherence to the Motor Vehicles Act, and verification of stock and buyer details. "Teams ensured that no unregistered or suspicious vehicles were being stored or traded," the officials said.

Dealers were instructed to maintain records accurately and submit sale and purchase information to authorities, they said.

In other parts of the valley, similar operations were conducted by the police to ensure public safety and to prevent anti-national activities.

The police said that these inspection drives are part of ongoing efforts to maintain public safety, uphold security standards, and

ensure transparency in commercial and institutional activities.

They further said that similar operations will continue across the region and urged citizens, shopkeepers, dealers, and medical staff to cooperate and follow regulations to support these measures-(KNO)

These Codes, Prime Minister Narendra Modi said in a series of social media posts on X, "Will serve as a strong foundation for universal social security, minimum and timely payment of wages, safe workplaces and remunerative opportunities for our people, especially Nari Shakti and Yuva Shakti...

"It will build a future-ready ecosystem that protects the rights of workers and strengthens India's economic growth. These reforms will boost job creation, drive productivity and accelerate our journey towards a Viksit Bharat."

Modi further said that "It is one of the most comprehensive and progressive labour-oriented reforms since Independence. It greatly empowers our workers. It also significantly simplifies compliance and promotes 'Ease of Doing Business'.'

According to Labour Minister Mansukh Mandaviya, the labour Codes will formalise employment, strengthen worker protections, and make the labour ecosystem simpler, safer and globally aligned.

Additional systemic reforms include a national floor wage, gender-neutral work policies, the Inspector-cum-Facilitator model for supportive compliance, faster dispute resolution through twomember tribunals, and a National Occupational Safety, Health (OSH) Board to harmonise safety standards.

The government will now initiate consultations to frame detailed rules and schemes.

During the transition, provisions of existing labour laws will remain applicable wherever required.

The social-security coverage had expanded from 19 per cent in 2015 to over 64 per cent in 2025. The enforcement of the Labour Codes marks the next transformative step - broadening worker protections, easing business operations and promoting a pro-worker labour ecosystem.

According to a labour ministry statement, the Codes lay the foundation for Aatmanirbhar Bharat.

India's labour laws were framed in the pre-Independence and early post-Independence era (1930s-1950s), at a time when the economy and world of work were fundamentally different.

Labour Minister Mandaviya said on X, "Modi Government's Guarantee: Dignity for Every Worker! From today, the new labour codes have been made effective in the country."

The minister said the codes will guarantee minimum wages for all workers, appointment letters for the youth, equal pay and respect for women, social security for 40 crore workers, gratuity for fixed-term employees after one year of employment, free annual health checkups for workers above 40 years of age, double wages for overtime, 100 per cent health security for workers in hazardous sectors and social justice for workers as per international standards.

"These reforms are not just ordinary changes, but a major step taken by Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi for the welfare of the workforce. These new labour reforms are an important step towards a self-reliant India and will give new momentum to the goal of a developed India by 2047," he said on X.

Under the Code on Social Security, 2020, all workers, including gig & platform workers, will be covered by social security. All workers will get PF, ESIC, insurance, and other social security

Under the Code on Wages, 2019, all workers will receive a statutory minimum wage payment. Minimum wages and timely payment will ensure financial security.

The ESIC coverage and benefits are extended Pan-India – voluntary for establishments with fewer than 10 employees, and mandatory for establishments with even one employee engaged in hazardous processes.

Now, Fixed-Term Employees (FTE) will receive all benefits equal to those of permanent workers, including leave, medical, and social security.

The Codes have defined 'Gig work', 'Platform work', and 'Aggregators' for the

Aadhaar-linked Universal Account Number will make welfare benefits easy to access, fully portable, and available across states, regardless of migration.

Plantation workers will be brought under the OSHWC Code and the Social Security Code.

Digital and audiovisual workers, includingjournalists in electronic media, dubbing artists, and stunt performers, will now be entitled to full benefits. (Agencies)

Highlighting enhanced passenger facilities, he said, "We have improved the heating system, added more seating and also introduced free Wi-Fi for passengers. The airport has also seen the addition of 22 new retail shops and nine food & beverage outlets, with three more expected to open soon."

Experts argue that the government should focus on achieving long-term stability cabling, metering, upgrading transformers, and preventing pilferage rather than relying on short-term measures like surcharges that risk public resentment.

Time-of-Day (ToD) tariffs are globally recognised tools for demand management, but their success depends on robust, reliable power supply and transparent communication. In Kashmir burdened with erratic supply, harsh winters, and longstanding mistrust-implementing such a tariff without building public consensus could prove counterproductive.

A High-Risk Gamble for the Omar

Abdullah Govt; At a time when the NC government is already on the defensive over its incomplete election commitments, the peak-hour surcharge proposal has opened another front of criticism. Whether or not IERC approves it, the political damage is already unfolding.

Unless the administration shifts focus toward infrastructural fixes particularly insulated cabling, anti-theft mechanisms, and addressing public grievances it risks further alienating the very constituency

that handed it a mandate only months ago. For now, the government faces a stark choice: pursue revenue recovery through unpopular measures or rebuild credibility through systemic reforms that consumers have been demanding for years.

JKPC's Imran Ansari voices concern over 20% peak-hour surcharge

SRINAGAR, NOV 21: Jammu & Kashmir Peoples Conference, General Secretary and President of the All J&K Shia Association Molvi Imran Ansari today took strong exception to the proposed 20% peakhour electricity surcharge being floated by the Kashmir Power Development Corporation Limited (KPDCL).

He said that such proposals raise serious questions about who is actually formulating and approving critical power-sector decisions in Jammu & Kashmir.

"Just wondering before we all get shocked with this proposed 20% peak-hour surcharge, can someone politely remind me who exactly is the Minister for the Power Development Department approving these magical midnight-thought tariff ideas in Kashmir?" he tweeted.

He added that from the pattern of communication, it appears as if KPDCL is tossing tariff proposals "into the sky" without clarity, ownership, or



accountability while the public continues to be told an entirely different story.

"By the way, wasn't someone loudly promising 200 units of free electricity not too long ago? Kashmirdidn't get 200 units free... instead, we're getting 20% extra charge during the only hours when people are freezing and desperately need electricity," he remarked

Ansari noted that the proposed surcharge has been strongly opposed across the board by trade bodies, houseboat owners, industrial units, and ordinary households yet consumers are being penalised instead of structural issues being addressed.

He stressed that the government must explain who exactly is steering J&K's power policy and why such proposals are surfacing without transparency.

"Until someone explains who is actually steering the ship of J&K's power policy, we'll keep watching these proposals float around like kites with no string attached," he said.

He urged the administration to reconsider the proposal, prioritise public interest, and ensure accountability within the power sector before placing any additional burden on the people of Jammu & Kashmir.

KPDCL's proposal to charge more dues during peak hours comes in for sharp criticism

The Kashmir Power Distribution Corporation Limited (KPDCL) proposal to charge more electricity charges from the consumers in the peak hours has come in for sharp criticism from the common masses and the politicians. The people as a whole believe that the proposal would place more burden on the common masses that are already facing the heat. They have demanded immediate roll back of the proposal so that there is no burden on the customers.

The KPDCL has proposed to charge 20 percent more electricity duties on the consumers for eight hours in a day that come under the peak hours of the usage. The Corporation has submitted the proposal with the Joint Electricity Regulatory Commission (JERC) and the Commission has yet to take a decision about the same. Most of the people have castigated the Corporation over the proposal and said that charging more electricity dues in the peak hours is uncalled for and unwanted.

It would be in place to mention here that the economic condition of the people of the union territory of Jammu & Kashmir is not so good and most of the people are going through a phase of economic distress. In such a situation if the people are charged with extra electricity dues then it is bound to cause ripples among the common masses and they are bound to protest over the same. Natural reaction is quite natural and it is quite expected from the common masses.

Politicians cutting across the party lines have condemned the KPDCL proposal and said the Corporation should immediately withdraw the proposal before it is too late. The condemnation from the politicians is welcome and it shows that these people are very much concerned about the problems being confronted by the masses. A legislator belonging to the ruling National Conference has in fact said that the government is not aware about the proposal submitted by the KPDCL.

It is high time that the government headed by chief minister Omar Abdullah clears the confusion about the proposal mooted by the KPDCL. If the government is not aware about the proposal then how come the KPDCL mooted the same? THE QUIET COMMERCE REARRANGING OUR CLASSROOMS



Teachers, who once stood as the pillars of intellectual formation, face their own challenges. The idea of education as a sacred space-where young minds once blossomed without restraint is slowly losing ground to a more transactional reality. Across the country, parents, teachers and students are grappling with a systemic shift: the transformation of schooling from a public good into a priced commodity.

For generations, classrooms were imagined as gardens of growth, where a child's curiosity was encouraged to stretch beyond the limits of textbooks. Today, however, many parents describe education as a burden both financial and emotional. Fee receipts, installment plans and administrative charges now dictate the rhythm of a child's academic journey. What was once a joyful pursuit of knowledge is increasingly framed as an expensive obligation.

Parents, often exhausted by economic pressures, find themselves calculating the cost of every stage of their child's learning. Their aspirations, built on sacrifice and hope, are filtered through a system that prioritizes paperwork, fees and formalities. The laughter of discovery, which once filled school corridors, now competes with reminders of payments due and schedules to be met.

Teachers, who once stood as the pillars of intellectual formation, face their own challenges. Previously regarded as guides shaping the future, many now navigate a landscape thick with bureaucratic demands. In several institutions, the role of the teacher has shifted from mentor to manager responsible not only for teaching but for maintaining records, meeting targets and complying with administrative protocols that leave little room for creativity or personal connection.

"It sometimes feels as if teaching has been pushed aside by paperwork," says one educator who has seen classroom priorities change over the last decade. "The time we could have spent understanding students is spent fulfilling require-



ments."

The commercialization of education has also reshaped the expectations placed on children. Classrooms increasingly resemble competitive training grounds where learning is measured through test scores and performance charts. Students march through a regimented environment where the pressure to excel can overshadow the desire to understand. Curiosity, once encouraged to roam freely, is now often confined within the boundaries of exam syllabi and career calcu-

 $This \, shift \, mirrors \, a \, larger \, trend: \,$ the rise of schooling as a marketplace. Parents sometimes knowingly, sometimes reluctantly enter this marketplace in search of the "best" for their children, comparing academic results the way one compares products. Schools advertise their achievements, infrastructure and successes, crafting an image that appeals to aspirational families seeking assurance that their investment will yield returns.

Yet beneath the surface lies an uncomfortable question: What happens when knowledge is packaged and priced like a commodity? The consequences may extend far beyond individual families. A society risks undermining its own intellectual foundations if education becomes accessible primarily to

those who can afford it. Creativity and innovation, essential to national progress, cannot thrive in an environment where learning is rationed and imagination is overshadowed by commercial concerns.

As the debate around rising educational expenses intensifies, policymakers, educators and parents are increasingly called upon to rethink the direction in which the system is heading. Is the purpose of schooling to nurture informed, empathetic citizens or to produce measurable outcomes that fuel institutional revenue? Can a nation truly advance when its classrooms are shaped more by commerce than by curiosity?

The answers may not be simple, but the need to ask these questions has never been more urgent. Education remains the foundation upon which societies build their future. If that foundation is weakened by inequality or shaped by profit alone, the consequences will echo far beyond school gates.

For now, the transformation continues quietly—one fee receipt at a time, one overstretched teacher at a time, one anxious student at a time. And as learning increasingly goes on sale, the nation must decide whether it is willing to pay the price not just in money, but in imagination, opportunity and the spirit of discovery itself.

The Price of Pollution: Does India Need a Comprehensive 'Pollution Tax'?

India is among those countries in the world where air, water, and soil pollution has become a serious health crisis. Several Indian cities are included in the World Health Organization's list of most polluted cities. Water pollution causes illness to millions of people every year. Meanwhile, the government lacks sufficient financial resources for clean energy, green infrastructure, and pollution control. At this time, a "pollution tax"—that is, a financial penalty for polluting—is being seen as a suitable solution, as it can both reduce pollution and generate sustainable revenue for environmen-

India today stands at a juncture where striking a balance between rapid economic growth and a worsening environmental crisis has become a daunting challenge. The air in cities is becoming increasingly toxic, rivers are choking with industrial waste, groundwater levels are declining, mountains of solid waste are becoming the hallmark of metropolitan areas, while the impact of climate change is becoming evident on agriculture, health, and the economy. In such a situation, it's natural to ask whether India now needs to impose direct financial penalties on polluters—that is, implement a comprehensive "pollution tax"?

The idea of a pollution tax isn't new, but it's needed today more than ever. Economics recognizes that when an industry, vehicle, or activity pollutes, the consequences are borne by society as

a whole, not just the polluter. This is a serious market failure known as "external cost"—that is, society suffers losses, but the cost is neither added to the price of the product nor borne by the polluter. A "pollution tax" attempts to correct this imbalance, where the more pollution one causes, the greater the economic cost one pays.

In India, the "clean energy cess" imposed on coal was an early example of this. However, today, the country faces such a complex crisis of air, water, noise, solid waste, and industrial emissions that taxing just one sector is insufficient. What is needed is a comprehensive and scientifically designed pollution tax that helps reduce pollution and promote cleaner alternatives.

The biggest advantage of a pollution tax is that it makes pollution expensive and cleanup cheap. When an industry is required to pay a tax per unit of emissions, it will naturally be inclined to adopt technologies that pollute less. This trend is evident in regions like Europe, where carbon-based penalties have led to a significant increase in energy conservation and green technology. This change is also possible in India, provided the policy is long-

term, transparent, and goal-oriented. Another important aspect is that India will need massive investments in environmental protection and clean energy in the coming years. River cleaning, clean transportation, renewable energy, pollution control equipment, scientific management of solid waste, and the development of green buildings will require significant financial resources. In this context, pollution taxes can become a sustainable and predictable revenue source, which can be spent solely on environmental protection through an independent "green fund."

Pollution taxes are also gaining importance globally. Many developed countries are now imposing additional duties on imported goods that are produced from more polluting sources. If India implements appropriate pollution taxes domesti-

cally, Indian exporters could be relieved of these additional duties in foreign markets. Thus, pollution taxes could prove to be not only environmentally beneficial but also helpful in protecting India's export competitiveness.

But the biggest question that arises is whether pollution taxes will burden the poor? This concern is quite real. If fuel and electricity costs rise, so too will the prices of transportation, food, and essential commodities. This directly impacts lower-income groups, whose options are limited. Therefore, to make pollution taxes fair, it will be essential to provide relief to low-income families through direct cash assistance, energy subsidies, and necessities like cooking gas.

The concerns of the industry are no less. Micro, small, and medium-sized enterprises, in particular, are energy-intensive, and any additional tax impacts their costs. Therefore, pollution taxes should be implemented in a phased manner—first on large industries, then gradually expanding to smaller ones, with technical and financial support. Subsidies on green machinery, interest-free loans, and guidance on technological upgrading can facilitate this transition.

India's administrative capacity is also a key factor. Accurate pollution measurement, data reliability, and transparency of monitoring systems will be crucial. Monitoring small industries and uncertified sources remains challenging. If emission measurements themselves are not reliable, the tax system cannot be trusted. Therefore, India must strengthen modern sensor technology, artificial intelligence-based monitoring, digital emission registration, and real-time monitoring systems.

Sundertop: Khari's Rising Crown of Nature, **Culture and Kashmiri Literature**

Bumbrun Bagh emerges as Ramban's newest jewel of scenic beauty and creative revival



High in the rugged mountains of Tehsil Khari, where the Pir Panjal range opens into rolling meadows and cloud-laden ridges, lies Bumbrun Bagh – a breathtaking highland better known as Sundertop. Once a quiet pastoral stretch known only to locals, it is now drawing attention as a growing centre of natural splendour and Kashmiri literary revival.

Where Every Direction Leads to Beau-

Perched like a crown above the valleys, Bumbrun Bagh is surrounded by some of the region's most enchanting landscapes:

East – Nawan: lush green pastures that bloom in spring and cradle shepherd routes. North - Kund Qazigund: forested slopes, icy streams and misty ridgelines.

South - Mahoo: a culturally rich village known for its hospitality and literary spirit. West – Gulzarabad (Kulgam): a gateway

to several emerging tourist sites. The highland also connects naturally with Nowgam, Banihal, blending heritage routes with scenic trekking paths.

Sundertop: The Celestial Balcony of

At the heart of Bumbrun Bagh rises



Sundertop — a serene peak famous for its golden sunrise and sweeping 360-degree panoramas. Locals say its name comes from "Sunder," meaning beautiful, and the view more than justifies the title.

Here, clouds drift like white boats across the valleys, alpine winds carry the scent of wild herbs, and silence settles like a soft

blanket of poetry. No wonder writers and artists describe it as a "natural retreat for the soul."

Birthplace of a Literary Movement Beyond its scenic charm, Bumbrun Bagh has earned a distinguished place in the cultural landscape of Khari. It is home to the region's first literary forum — Bumbrun

Bagh Kashur Bazm-e-Adab Mahoo.

Founded by noted writer Mr. Mohd Yousuf Bumboor, the forum has given new life to Kashmiri literature in the area. Through mushairas, literary seminars, storytelling sessions and workshops, the Bazm has nurtured young talent and built a strong cultural bridge between Khari,

Mahoo, Banihal and beyond.

At a time when regional languages face constant challenges, the forum's contribution in preserving Kashmiri literary identity has become both vital and inspiring.

Where Nature Inspires Literature

Visitors often describe Bumbrun Bagh as a place where nature itself seems to speak in metaphors. The meadows flow like green verses, the winds whistle in poetic rhythms, and streams seem to hum old Kashmiri melodies.

It is this fusion of landscape and literature that continues to attract writers, artists and students from across Jammu & Kashmir.

Army Hospital Research and Referral: History: Construction started Late 1980s

Army Hospital (Research And Referral), also known as Army Hospital (R&R), AH (R&R) and RR Hospital, is the apex flagship medical care centre for the Indian Armed Forces. Completed in the mid 1990s, the hospital, which includes a teaching hospital and nursing college, is located in Delhi Cantonment, New Delhi. It is the only Armed Forces Medical Services hospi-

tal to be commanded by a Lieutenant General rank officer and provides for 27 sub-specialties. The hospital is also meant to cater to the President of India and the chiefs of the military. The construction of the hospital was undertaken by

the Military Engineer Services and private contractors. The work started in the late 1980s and was completed in the next few years. The hospital is one of the largest military hospitals in Asia, initially constructed with over 600 beds. Notably, the hospital treats the President of India and the chiefs of the military.

The first patient simulator in India was acquired by the hospital. The first cervical disc replacement and bi-level cervical disc replacement in Asia was carried out in the hospital's neurosurgery department in 2002 and 2003 respectively. The assisted reproductive technology facility at the hospital undertook 500 test tube pregnancies in 2012 itself.

The Army Organ and Retrieval Transplantation Organisation (AORTA), formed in 2006, handles organ donations at RR Hospital. In 2018, an entire unit of the Territorial Army submitted applications pledging their

The conversion rate for organ donations at RR Hospital is among the best worldwide. Brigadier YP Bakshi was shot in Meerut; following his death, RR Hospital harvested his organs, liver, kidneys, eyes and heart valves.

Patients have included Field Marshal Sam Manekshaw, Wing Commander Abhinandan Varthaman, and Sonia

Notable people who have died at the hospital include: former President Pranab Mukherjee; Marshal Arjan Singh, the only five-star rank officer of the Indian Air Force; former Navy Chief Admiral Sushil Kumar; Lt. General Sagat Singh; and Colonel Narendra "Bull" Kumar. Lance Naik Hanumanthappa Koppad, who was found alive after being buried under snow for six days in the Siachen Glacier, was shifted to RR Hospital, where he died two days later.

Naik Raj Kishor Singh, who was injured in the 2016 Uri attack, underwent treatment at RR Hospital, but soon after died due to injuries sustained during the

Ultra-processed foods can increase the risk of multiple chronic health conditions, such as heart disease and type 2 diabetes

A new study found that a diet heavy in ultra-processed foods can harm male reproductive health and reduce sperm quality

The researchers say that ultra processed foods may contain molecules found in plastics that are known to disrupt hormonal systems in the body

Ultra-Processed Foods May Harm Male Reproductive, Metabolic Health

A new study reports that ultra-processed foods may be linked to a decline in male reproductive health, including sperm quality.

The research, published on August 28 in Cell Metabolism, states that regular consumption of ultra-processed foods has several effects on a person's health.

These include higher cholesterol levels and increased body weight. They noted that participants in their study gained more than a kilogram of weight when they ate ultra-processed foods. The amount of fat mass in their bodies also increased.

The researchers added that "sperm quality trended toward impairment" when participants were on an ultra-processed diet. The researchers pointed out that these health effects occurred even when a person on an ultra-processed diet consumed the same number of calories as a person on another type of diet.

"This study provides evidence that consumption of ultra-processed food is detrimental for cardiometabolic and reproductive outcomes, regardless of excessive caloric intake," the study authors wrote.

Philip Werthman, MD, a urologist and director of the Center for Male Reproductive Medicine and Vasectomy Reversal in Los Angeles, says the study is proof that what you eat can be more important than how much you eat.

"It's not the calories you're getting. It's the type of calories you're getting," Werthman told Healthline.

Effects of an ultra-processed diet on sperm quality

For their study, researchers recruited 43 males ages 20-35. Each participant spent three weeks on both a diet primarily of ultra-processed foods and a diet of unprocessed foods, with a 3-month "washing out" period between the two diets.

Half of the participants started on the unprocessed diet while the other half began with the ultra-processed diet. Half of the men from each group were also put on a diet that included 500 extra calories per day.

Researchers noted that subjects on the ultra-processed diet experienced an increase in the phthalate cxMINP, a sub-



stance found in plastics that can disrupt hormones.

Those on the ultra-processed diet also saw decreases in their testosterone levels and follicle-stimulating hormones, which are crucial for sperm production.

The researchers said some of the endocrine-disrupting substances may come from the plastic packaging used for ultra-processed foods.

They note that the introduction of ultra-processed foods in the 1970s seems to fall in line with a 60% decline worldwide in sperm count.

Kristin Kirkpatrick, president of KAK Consulting and a dietitian at Cleveland Clinic's Department of Wellness & Preventive Medicine, said the research sends a clear message. "The study found that endocrine disrupters and other components altered hormone levels in men, even if the men were healthy," she told Healthline. "This means, even if you're healthy based on other parameters, yet consume a diet higher in ultra-processed foods, you still are at risk for increases in

chronic conditions."

Werthman added that a man's general health can also affect their reproductive system. For example, a person who has gained weight, developed type 2 diabetes, or experienced a rise in cholesterol levels may see a decline in reproductive health measures such as sperm quality.

"The reproductive system is a function of your overall health," Werthman explained. "The reproductive system is quite sensitive."

Michael Eisenberg, MD, a professor of urology at Stanford University, had one caution about the study's conclusions.

"While none reached statistical significance, there does appear to be a decline in semen quality when examining the summative data," he told Healthline. "However, it's important to note that the intervention was for three weeks, and a cycle of sperm production typically takes between two to three months."

The Centers for Disease Control and

Prevention(CDC)reportsTrustedSource that ultra-processed foods account for an average of 55% of total calories consumed by people in the United States.

It notes that people under 19 years of age tend to eat slightly more ultra-processed foods than adults 19 years and older. The agency states there is little difference in ultra-processed food consumption between men and women.

The CDC says ultra-processed foods tend to be "hyperpalatable, energy-dense, low in dietary fiber, and contain little or no whole foods, while having high amounts of salt, sweeteners, and unhealthy fats."

It states that sandwiches (including burgers), sweet bakery products, sweetened beverages, and savory snacks are among the top sources of calories from ultra-processed foods.

A July 2025 study reported that ultraprocessed foods are a major contributing factor to obesity as well as increasing a person's for heart disease, type 2 diabetes, and sleep apnea.

An April 2025 study estimated that

ultra-processed foods were linked to 124,000 preventable deaths in the United States during a two-year period.

A May 2024 study revealed that ultraprocessed foods may also increase the risk of stroke and cognitive decline.

Kirkpatrick said there are a number of reasons for these impacts, including what a person is not eating.

"Consuming ultra-processed foods means that other foods, which are found to help in the prevention of heart disease (like fresh fruit and vegetables, healthy fats, and fiber) are not being consumed," she said. "Further, excess sugar and sodium consumption has been found in multiple studies to pose a significant risk to heart health. Sugar and sodium are common ingredients in ultra-processed foods."

Werthman said the pattern is clear. "This study is another confirmation that the food industry has been poisoning us for the past 20 to 30 years," he noted. "We see the effects of that now."

Tips to improve male reproductive health

Experts say there are lifestyle habits that can help improve and maintain male reproductive health. "In general, good diet (whole grains, fruits, vegetables), exercise, and maintaining a good body weight will help overall and reproductive health," said Eisenberg. Werthman says a healthy diet is "a big component" of that equation, but noted that men, especially those in the process of trying to have children, should exercise regularly as well as avoid alcohol and tobacco.

Kirkpatrick agreed.

"Eating a diet high in nutrient density, such as the Mediterranean diet, as well as regular exercise, adequate sleep, stress management, maintaining a healthy weight, and abstaining from tobacco and alcohol, may all play a role in better reproductive health," she said.

Werthman noted that heat sources such as saunas and hot tubs can temporarily impact sperm quality and quantity.

"All these things affect the reproductive system," he said. "The body is an integrated system."

Blood cancer symptoms on skin that you should never ignore

The skin is the largest organ in the body and can often reveal signs of underlying health conditions, including blood cancers such as leukemia and lymphoma. According to The University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center, changes in the skin, rashes, or unusual lesions may sometimes be the first indications of these cancers. While many skin changes are harmless or caused by infections or medications, certain patterns may signal blood cancer. Recognising these symptoms early can lead to timely diagnosis and treatment, making awareness critical. Understanding which skin changes to monitor can help patients and caregivers seek medical attention before complications escalate.

Common skin symptoms of blood cancer Blood cancers can produce visible skin symptoms including:

- Petechiae: Tiny red, brown, or purple spots caused by broken capillaries due to low platelet counts.
- colourations that do not fade when pressed. Rashes: Patches on the skin that may

Purpura: Larger blotchy bruises or dis-


- be itchy or scaly. Easy bruising and bleeding due to
- impaired clotting is common. These symptoms often result from blood

abnormalities caused by leukemia or lymphoma rather than dermatological conditions alone.

Leukemia and skin signs

Sometimes, leukemia cells can leave the blood and bone marrow and settle in the skin. This is called leukemia cutis. When this happens, it can cause raised bumps, patches, nodules, or sores on the skin.

Another common sign of leukemia is petechiae, which are tiny red or purple spots that usually appear on the arms, legs, or torso. These spots don't turn white when pressed, which helps distinguish them from ordinary rashes.



Other skin changes, such as larger bruises (purpura) or unusual rashes, may appear early in leukemia or indicate the disease is progressing. These happen because leukemia affects the blood, making it harder for the body to clot properly or fight infections.

Cutaneous T-cell lymphoma (CTCL) and other blood lymphomas

Blood cancers like CTCL, a type of skin lymphoma, can show up as dry, scaly, itchy patches or plaques. These often appear on parts of the body that don't get much sun.

Other changes may include:

- Red, pink, brown, or grey patches Lumps or bumps that can sometimes
- break open
- Thickened skin on the palms or soles Hair loss in affected areas and swollen lymph nodes

Widespread redness of the skin (erythroderma) in more advanced cases

These symptoms happen because lymphoma affects the immune system and the lymphatic system, which can cause the skin to react in these ways. Early recognition is important because these signs can easily be mistaken for eczema, infections, or other skin problems.

Petechiae: the "hidden" rash

- Petechiae are not a typical rash. They are tiny red or purple spots caused by small blood vessels (capillaries) breaking under the skin.
- They often appear on the feet, legs, arms, or hands
- They are caused by low platelet counts, a common effect of leukemia, which makes the blood less able to clot

Even though they may look like harmless spots, petechiae can be an early warning sign of blood cancer, so noticing them and checking with a doctor is important.

Blood cancers can present with noticeable skin symptoms such as petechiae, purpura, rashes, nodules, plaques, or itching. The type and severity vary depending on the blood cancer subtype and disease stage. Early recognition of these signs is crucial for timely diagnosis and treatment. Periodic skin examinations, awareness of unusual changes, and prompt consultation with a healthcare provider can improve outcomes. According to The University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center, understanding these symptoms and seeking medical attention without delay is an essential step in managing blood cancers effectively. Raising public awareness about these warning signs can play a vital role in saving lives through earlier detection and intervention. Ultimately, vigilance and education remain the strongest tools in reducing the burden of blood cancers worldwide.

Scrolling on toilet increases your risk of haemorrhoids, new study shows

Many of us are guilty of scrolling our smartphones on the toilet. But a new study from the United States, published today, has found this habit may increase your risk of developing haemorrhoids by up to 46 per cent. So, what's the link? How can time on your phone lead to these painful lumps in and around your anus? Here's what we know. What are haemorrhoids?

Every healthy person has haemorrhoids, sometimes called piles. They are columns of cushioned tissue and blood vessels found close to the opening of the anus.

Haemorrhoids have a really important role in maintaining bowel continence or, to put it simply, keeping your poo in.

When all is well, we don't notice them. But haemorrhoids can get swollen and this can lead to symptoms such as pain, bleeding or feeling a lump just inside your anus (internal haemorrhoids) or protruding outside (external haemorrhoids).

So when someone "has haemorrhoids", it means they have become inflamed or symptomatic. This is extremely common: more than one in two of us will experience symptomatic haemorrhoids at some point in our lives.

You are more likely to get

- haemorrhoids if you: are older (over 45)
- are pregnant
- are overweight
- have persistent constipation or
- regularly lift heavy objects spend a lot of time on the toilet. The link between toilet time and haem-
- Prolonged sitting in general has not been



linked to developing haemorrhoids.

However, a standard toilet seat - unlike a chair or couch - has a large internal opening that provides no support for the pelvic floor (the group of muscles and ligaments that support the bladder, bowel and uterus). Prolonged sitting on a toilet seat is believed to increase pressure inside the pelvic floor and lead to blood pooling in the vascular cushions of the anus. This makes haemorrhoids more likely to develop.

What the new study looked at

The new US study recruited 125 adults, aged 45 and older, who were undergoing a colonoscopy at Beth Israel Deaconess Medi-

Researchers surveyed them about their smartphone habits while using the toilet, including how often they checked their phone and for how long. Participants also reported on other behaviours such as straining, their fibre intake, and how much physical activity they did.

The researchers recorded whether they had haemorrhoids. Since the participants were all having a colonoscopy, the presence of internal haemorrhoids could be directly confirmed visually.

Docs advise people to stay active, exercise regularly even in harsh winter

SRINAGAR, NOV 21: As

temperatures plunge across Kashmir, doctors have advised people not to abandon physical activity during the winter months, warning that a sedentary lifestyle can aggravate a range of health problems including heart disease, diabetes, obesity and joint ailments.

Health experts in the Valley said that while cold weather and frequent fog or snow discourage people from going outdoors, residents must adopt indoor exercise routines to maintain their physical and mental wellbe-

"Winters in Kashmir are long and harsh, but that should not be an excuse to stop exercising," Dr Mohammad Shafi, a physician, told news agency Kashmir Indepth News Service (KINS).

'We see a rise in cases of high blood pressure, heart issues, weight gain and even depression during the cold season, largely because people become inactive

and stay confined indoors for weeks," he said.

Doctors said even light and moderate activities done regularly can significantly help. They recommend brisk indoor walking, stretching, cycling on static bikes, and simple strength exercises that can be done at home without equipment.

A cardiologist at SKIMS Soura said that the risk of heart attacks is known to increase in winter due to blood vessel constriction and changes in blood pressure. "Those who already have hypertension, diabetes or heart disease should be extra cautious. Regular exercise, even for 20-30 minutes a day, helps improve blood circulation, keeps weight under control and stabilises blood pressure," he said.

Orthopaedic specialists also cautioned that lack of physical activity in winter can worsen joint stiffness and back pain, especially among the elderly. "We advise senior citizens and arthritis patients to perform mild, supervised exercises at home.

Remaining inactive for long hours under heavy blankets may give warmth but it is not good for bones and joints," an orthopaedic doctor at Bone and Joint Hospital Barzulla said.

Doctors further underlined that winter exercise has mental health benefits as well. "Due to fewer sunlight hours, many people feel low, anxious or irritable during 'Chillai Kalan'. Physical activity releases feel-good hormones and can combat stress and seasonal depression," said a psychiatrist at **Government Psychiatric Diseases** Hospital, Srinagar.

Appealing to the public, doctors said that along with a balanced diet and adequate sleep, regular physical activity should be treated as a "winter necessity" rather than an option.

"Even if it is snowing outside, you can walk inside your room, climb stairs, stretch or do simple yoga," said Dr Shafi. "What matters is consistency. Taking care of your health in winter will prevent serious complications later." (KINS)

Director Panchayati Raj reviews progress of PGs, People's Plan Campaign, MWFGP

Assesses readiness for Constitution Day celebrations

JAMMU, NOV 21: Director of Panchayati Raj, Sham Lalon Friday chaired a review meeting to assess the progress of Panchayat infrastructure works taken up across Jammu and Kashmir in the financial year 2025-26.

The meeting focused on the physical progress of Panchayat Ghars (PGs), land identification for new constructions, fund disbursement through the SNA SPARSH portal via BEAMS and the operational status of Panchayat Learning Centres (PLCs).

Progress under the People's Plan Campaign (PPC), Model Women Friendly Gram Panchayats, DARPG Awards and preparations for Constitution Day (Samvidhan Diwas) (November 26) was also reviewed.

It was informed that the department has set a target of constructing 640 Panchayat Ghars across the Union Territory. "Of these, land has been identified for 549 and 530 estimates have been submitted". Sham Lal directed the departmental functionaries to resolve all pending issues related to Panchayat Ghars on priority. He asked the stakeholders to immediately formulate estimation reports for the Panchayats where land identification has already been completed.

While appreciating the overall performance of districts, he urged officials to accelerate efforts to achieve all assigned targets within the stipulated time frame.



The Director further clarified that all billing will now be processed through the BEAMS system, while fund disbursement will be carried out via the SNA SPARSH platform.

Regarding the People's Plan Campaign, Sham Lal instructed Assistant Commissioners Panchayat to intensify efforts and ensure that the data is uploaded only after proper verification. He also emphasized the installation of Public Information Boards for developmental works and the organization of Gram Sabhas on designated days as part of the campaign.

Speaking about Model Women-Friendly Panchayats, he called for timely uploading of relevant data along with DCF forms. He also stressed the need to identify and nominate Panchayats with exemplary developmental performance for the DARPG Awards.

The meeting also discussed preparations for the observance of Constitution Day on November 26. Listing Constitution day activities, he asked for organizing wall painting events, Constitution marathon and filming of preamble recitation videos. He added that while these activities are to be conducted across all Panchayats, these must be organized as live programs in the PLCs.

The meeting was attended by Assistant Commissioners Panchayat, Executive Engineers of the Rural Engineering Wing, Block Development Officers and SPRC/ DPRC team.

DC Budgam reviews Status of **Power Transmission Towers Affected by Land Acquisition for Semi Ring Road in District**

BUDGAM, NOV 21: Deputy Commissioner (DC) Budgam, Dr. Bilal Mohi-Ud-Din Bhat, today convened a meeting to review the status of power transmission towers coming in the alignment of the upcoming Semi Ring Road project in district budgam and requiring acquisition of land across different parts of the district.

Besides Executive Engineer KPDCL, officials from Revenue Department, JKPTCL, PGCIL and other concerned agencies attended the meeting and presented a detailed overview of the towers affected, land requirement, associated compensation and the progress on indent placements.

During the meeting, it was informed that a total of 28 towers along with one tower leg from five major transmission lines fall

within the Semi Ring Road alignment and require land acquisition under the provisions of the Central Act 2013.

The collective land requirement for these locations amounts to 302.58 marlas.

The concerned Officials provided a line-wise status of the affected areas, covering tehsils including Budgam, B, K. Pora and Chadoora, with villages such as Rakhearth, Narbal, Gudsathoo, Ichgam, Rakshalina, Chattergam, Zooharipora, Wathoora and Chadoora being directly impact-

In most cases, the executing agencies have already placed indents with the concerned authorities, while a few locations, especially under PGCIL, are still in the process of indent submission.

The DC directed all departments to accelerate the land acquisition process and avoid any delays that could hinder the

timely execution of the Semi Ring Road project.

He stressed the need for close coordination between Revenue teams, JKPTCL and PGCIL to ensure accurate field verification, transparent communication with affected landowners, and timely processing of compensation as

per the norms of the Central Act. The DC further instructed the executing agencies to immediately submit any pending indents and asked for weekly progress reports to monitor the advancement of all related activities.

The DC emphasised that its timely completion depends on swift action and cooperation among all stakeholders.

He said the district administration is committed towards facilitating the process and ensuring that all statutory requirements are fulfilled efficiently and transparently.

RAJOURI, NOV 21: In a significant step towards strengthening dairy sector and improving rural livelihood, the Animal Husbandry Department Rajouri, under the guidance of the Deputy Commissioner Abhishek Sharma has successfully mobilized and sponsored the establishment of a Milk Value Addition Unit in the District. As part of this initiative, farmers of Village Kalali, Manjakote

were sensitized and made fully aware of the vast scope and economic opportunities available in the domain of milk value addition. Through continuous counselling and fieldlevel motivation by departmental officers, the farmers have successfully formed and registered a cooperative society titled "The Hill Fresh Dairy Cooperative Ltd."

The cooperative society has formally submitted its proposal under the Holistic Agriculture Development

Programme (HADP) for the activity "Assistance to Milk Value Addition Startups". Under HADP, the applicant cooperative is eligible for financial assistance up to ₹25.00 lakh, enabling them to establish and operationalize a modern milk value addition unit that benefits the farming community of Manjakote and nearby areas.

Additionally, the Hill Fresh Dairy Cooperative has been encouraged and guided to apply for the Animal Husbandry Infrastructure Develop-

ment Fund (AHIDF). Under AHIDF, beneficiaries can avail 3% interest subvention on bank loans for establishing milk processing and value addition units.

The initiative is an important intervention aimed at ensuring the availability of quality milk and milk products in the district; providing a structured and remunerative market to dairy farmers; enhancing income and promoting rural entrepreneurship; reducing wastage and improving the value chain efficiency in the dairy sector Speaking on the development, the Deputy Commissioner appreciated the proactive efforts of the Animal Husbandry Department and emphasized that the initiative would serve as a model for farmer-led enterprises in the district. He further stated that strengthening the dairy sector is central to ensuring food security and enhancing economic resilience of rural households.

India's flash PMI falls to 59.9 in November, weakest since May


NEW DELHI, NOV 21: The combined performance of India's manufacturing and services sectors reported a slower rate of expansion as the HSBC Flash India Composite Purchasing Managers' Index fell to 59.9 in November from 60.4 in October.

According to data released by S&P Global, the index, which tracks month-on-month changes in the combined output of the two sectors, indicated a slower rate of expansion.

The growth slowed in Novembermainly because factory production grew more slowly, the weakest since May.

Some manufacturers got fewer new orders, while service sector activity grew faster than in the previous month, S&P Global said.

Speaking on the development, Chief India Economist at HSBC, Pranjul Bhandari said, "The HSBC

"However, overall new orders came in soft, indicating that the GST-led boost may have considerably, and so did prices charged."

The report added that the export orders for goods stayed steady, but services saw a slight slowdown. International demand rose, but at the weakest rate since March due to tough global competition and cheaper alternatives abroad.

The report noted that a combination of slower sales growth and falling backlogs reportedly stymied job creation across India's private sector midway through the third financial quarter.



'This legacy is now open, searchable, and free for all," Rahul Gandhi said in a post on X, highlighting the significance of Nehru's writings as a record of India's evolving conscience. Mallikarjun Kharge emphasized the importance of digitizing Nehru's works amid deliberate distortion and misinformation, saying, "Facts are facts and will not disappear on account of your likes."

The archive includes correspondence, speeches, interviews, administrative notes, and even doodles, providing valuable insights into India's freedom struggle and early years of independence. The Jawaharlal Nehru Memorial Fund plans to expand the archive, $incorporating \, photographs, audio \, and \, video \, recordings.$

ED conducts raids linked to former Kerala MLA P V Anvar over alleged money laundering

NEW DELHI. NOV 21: The Enforcement Directorate (ED) on Friday launched extensive searches at multiple locations connected to former Independent MLA P.V. Anvar and his associates. The operation began early in the morning. "The raids are part of a money laundering probe stemming from alleged fraudulent loans sanctioned by the Kerala Financial



Corporation (KFC) back in 2015," said the ED official. The probe is examining the generation of proceeds of crime, which are estimated to have caused

a loss of 22.31 crore to the financial institution, the officials said. The investigation focuses on allegations of disproportionate assets, suspected benami holdings, and the diversion of funds into real estate projects as the agency traces the money trail. Anvar, who served as the Nilambur MLA from 2016 to 2021 with LDF/CPM support, was reportedly present during the searches, which officials described as proceeding peacefully.UNI

Real time dust control surveillance in Delhi, Rs 2.36 cr fines imposed so far: Sirsa

NEW DELHI, NOV 21: Delhi Environment Minister Manjinder Sirsa today said that with the real time surveillance of dust control in city, fines of over Rs 2 crore, 200 show cause notices and 48 closure reports have been filed, with the inspection of 1,262 construction sites.

According to Sirsa, with the strict actions underway regarding pollution control, Rs 2.36 crore 'Environmental Compensation' has been imposed on the projects that were found to be not complying with the prescribed

norms. He shared that since October 15, over 1,262 construction projects of with area of more than 500 square meters have been inspected for dust pollution, and 747 construction sites are registered with real-time video fencing, along with air quality monitoring on the Delhi Pollution

Control Committee's portal. Amid the bad air scenario. the minister said that continuous inspections and remote monitoring is underway, across 4,881 localities in the national capital, while 467 of them have



been surveyed, with detection of 32 new violations.

Diesel generator sets & highemission industries are under strict compliance checks, and shift to PNG has also been initiated.

Sirsa also inspected key spots in South West Delhi's Palam, Dwarka and Mahipalpur to review dust mitigation measures.

He said that Delhi is deploying science-backed enforcement to tackle pollution relentlessly, with every project under live scrutiny, every source addressed at its root,

and every violation resulting in real consequences.

He claimed that unlike previous policies of more promises and less action, the present government under CM Rekha Gupta is determined to deliver

measurable results on the ground. "We are working relentlessly to bring some systemic change in the system to effectively keep a check on harmful emissions that pollute the air of Delhi throughout the year, especially during winter season. Every project is being remotely

monitored round-the-clock for compliance," he said.

Remote monitoring infrastructure-including 360-degree video fencing and live-linked PM2.5 and PM10 sensors-ensure ongoing enforcement and transparency, the minister said, adding that public display boards with the DPCC Portal registration ID has been made mandatory at construction sites to keep every project's compliance status visible to citizens and stakeholders.

Beyond construction sites, he

said that DPCC's teams are inspecting diesel generator (DG) sets and those industries that contribute to air-pollution, mandating the installation of retrofitted emission control devices or conversion to clean fuel modes, and pushing all industries to transition to cleaner piped natural gas (PNG) as per CAQM directives.

Sirsa informed that Delhi's winter action plan, dust-control construction protocols, compliance norms, road sprinkling schedules, mechanical sweeping deployment and wastemanagement systems have been active for several months.

DPCC has informed that over 1,800 enforcement personnel, alongside 35 specialised DPCC teams, are active across Delhi, representing agencies such as the MCD, DDA, PWD, NDMC, Revenue, agriculture department and the Traffic Police.

 $During the \, review, the \, Minister$ also noted that DPCC and MCD have intensified their efforts at more than 62 identified trafficprone hotspots, where dust suppression, sweeping and wastelifting operations have been expanded.UNI

Nuclear arms race intensifies amid global conflicts and rising tensions

NEW DELHI, NOV 21: As conflicts deepen and global power centers shift, the international system is entering one of its most volatile periods in decades. The war in Ukraine is grinding into its third year with no end in sight, while Israel's conflict with Hamas has thrown the Middle East into renewed turmoil. Across Europe, governments are scrambling to fortify their defenses, and Russia is signaling a return to Cold Warera military competition with tests of new strategic weapons.

Against this backdrop, the United States is revisiting debates that once seemed relegated to history. President Donald Trump has directed the Department of War to prepare for the possibility of resuming U.S. nuclear testing—a step that would overturn a threedecade moratorium and

reintroduce a level of nuclear brinkmanship not seen since the late 20th century.

The move followed Russian President Vladimir Putin's announcement of a successful test of the Poseidon nuclearpowered underwater drone, designed to inundate coastal regions with radioactive tsunamis, along with continued progress on Russia's Burevestnik nuclear-powered cruise missile.

If the US re-starts nuclear testing, this would end the threedecade-long American moratorium on nuclear test explosions, bringing with it an increasingly unstable nuclear era. The Kremlin has reacted by saying it would "act accordingly" if the Cold War-era moratorium on nuclear weapons testing were broken. Trump's move is also provoked by China's growing array of nuclear warheads.

China's arsenal, according to Pentagon projections, is expected to reach 700 deliverable warheads by 2027 and 1,000 by 2030. Meanwhile, the United States remains bound by the New $Strategic\,Arms\,Reduction\,Treaty,$ or New START, which caps US and Russian deployed warheads at 1,550. Russia suspended its participation last year, yet Putin has signaled a willingness to observe the treaty's limits for another year—an overture Trump has cautiously welcomed. But with the treaty set to expire in February 2026, and Russia showcasing new weapons programs even as the war in Ukraine grinds on, the future of arms control is highly uncertain.

In 2023, a 12-member bipartisan Congressional Commission on the Strategic Posture of the United States reported on a "looming two-



nuclear-peer threat environment" and recommended that the U.S. urgently prepare for this new reality.

The Strategic Posture Commission (SPC) outlines the evolving nuclear postures of Russia and China during 2027– 2035 and proposes over 80 recommendations for U.S. defense policy, nuclear and conventional weapon capabilities, the U.S. nuclear weapons complex, and

nuclear arms control.

Ahead of Trump's recent summit with Putin in Alaska, the National Security Council met with nuclear experts to assessthe U.S. deterrent and explore whether Washington should seek a new agreement that includes China alongside Russia. Trump has said future negotiations may need to wait until the conflict in Ukraine is resolved. Putin, for his part, has echoed interest in

what he described as "long-term conditions for peace," including potential follow-on agreements on offensive strategic armsthough he offered few specifics.

The Alaska meeting concluded without a breakthrough, but both sides indicated they are open to continuing discussions based on provisional understandings reached during talks involving senior advisers


The shifting nuclear landscape is not limited to the great powers. Former Indian ambassador Anil Trigunayat points to increasingly volatile rhetoric from Pakistan. including nuclear threats issued during the 2019 crisis following the Pulwama attack.


India maintains a No First Use policy, but Trigunayat argues that New Delhi may eventually need to reassess its doctrine as it faces growing pressure from both Pakistan and China. "Every country is tweaking its nuclear posture," he said, adding, "The threshold for nuclear use is becoming lower by the day."

Across Europe, governments are responding with their checkbooks. Defense spending among EU member states is expected to rise to €381 billion in 2025, up from €343 billion in 2024—a nearly 20 percent jump driven largely by concerns over Russia and the erosion of traditional security arrangements.

With nuclear-armed states modernizing their arsenals, armscontrol agreements expiring, and global crises multiplying, the prospect of renewed nuclear testing threatens to accelerate an emerging arms race. The world is edging toward a more dangerous era-one defined less by restraint than by rivalry, mistrust and the unsettling return of Cold War logic.UNI













Gill Out Of Guwahati Test; Pant To Captain

India's Test captain advised rest to prevent neck spasms

KOLKATA: Shubman Gill is set to miss India's second Test against South Africa starting on Saturday after failing to recover sufficiently from the neck injury he suffered last week. Vice captain Rishabh Pant will stand in as captain in Guwahati.

 $It is \, understood \, that, according \, to \, medical \,$ advice, Gill is at risk of further neck spasms if he plays so soon. He has been advised more rest. The development could also impact his selection in the ODI squad for the three matches against South Africa starting on November 30. The squad for that series is expected to be picked on November 23.

With Gill set to miss out, India may have to choose one of B Sai Sudharsan, Devdutt Padikkal and Nitish Kumar Reddy as his re-

Gill was admitted to hospital after the second day of the Kolkata Test, following the decision to retire hurt after facing only three balls in India's first innings. On the morning of the third day, the BCCI said he would take no further part in the Test. India went on to lose the match by 30 runs, after getting dismissed for 93 in a chase of 124 on a pitch with uneven bounce. Gill had missed a Test against New Zealand in October 2024 due to a neck

On Thursday, before ESPNcricinfo learned that Gill is set to miss the match, India batting coach Sitanshu Kotak had said in a press conference that the team would not risk playing him if there was any chance of the spasm

"He is definitely recovering really well,"

Kotak said. "Now, the decision [whether to play him or not] will be taken tomorrow evening. The physios, doctors, they will have to take a call that, [even] if he is fully recovered, [during the] game, he should not get that spasm again.

"[...] If we have a, guarantee that, very likely, he won't have this issue again, then he will play. If there is a doubt, then I am sure, he will take rest [for] one more game, because it won't be helpful to the team [if he plays]."

One of the concerns for India as they figure out Gill's replacement is the surfeit of left-hand batters in their squad. They had six in their XI in Kolkata - five in their top eight - and Sai Sudharsan and Padikkal, the two specialist batters vying to come into the line-up, also bat left-handed. The left-hander-heavy nature of India's line-up had advantaged offspinner Simon Harmer, the Player of the Match in Kolkata, significantly.

Kotak suggested there had been undue focus on the offspinner-vs-left-hander matchup, and pointed out that South Africa also played Keshav Maharaj, a left-arm spinner, at Eden Gardens, which should have advantaged India's line-up.

"You tell me one thing, they had a left-arm spinner also. If we had seven right-handed batsmen, then? They had a left-arm spinner also, and an offspinner also. I believe that you have to play well. Offspinner bowling to left-hander does not mean left-hander has to get out. We had two left-arm spinners [in the first Test], they had nine right-handers; did they get out? So maybe that thing is a little overrated.'

Overrated or not, India will still likely mull over the match-ups even as they prepare for a Guwahati track that is set to be more forgiving to the batters than Kolkata was.

India's mandatory practice session two days out from the match gave some indication of who might come in for Gill. The first four batters who came out to bat in the nets were Yashasvi Jaiswal, KL Rahul, Washington Sundar and Dhruv Jurel. The first three had been India's top three in Kolkata, and Jurel had batted at No. 4 in the second innings, in Gill's absence. Sai Sudharsan was next into the nets.

Padikkal, meanwhile, did not bat in the early part of the practice session, but was seen bowling part-time offspin in the spinners' net.

Seam-bowling allrounder Reddy, who was released from the squad in Kolkata so he could play in India A's limited-overs series against South Africa A, was back in training, and bowled alongside Jasprit Bumrah, Mohammed Siraj and Akash Deep in the fast bowlers' net.


Axar did not bowl initially, and only joined his team-mates some 45 minutes or so into

None of this necessarily points to India's possible selection. Players have their own individual preferences for what kind of training they do, and how much, leading into games.

But with a more balanced pitch than Kolkata expected on Saturday, India may not feel the need for a fourth spin bowler and a second leftarm orthodox spinner. If Sai Sudharsan replaces Gill, Reddy coming in for Axar would help India maintain the same balance of left- and right-hand batters they had in Kolkata. With a decent amount of grass on the pitch two days out from the Test, there is a chance Reddy could be a useful option with the ball too.

A senior CRPF officer shared that the tournament will feature 16 teams from different districts. This includes six teams from Srinagar, three



SWEET HOME

Be it politics, technology, or human values, everything from innovations to experiments to attitudes has mostly reached my home from the developed world.

We in the Eastern bloc do accept them blindfolded, though always blaming the West for its onslaught on our value system or robbing us of our cultural traditions.

I never bought this story. They, my family, call me rebel. It was after the Second World War, the family system in the West underwent tremendous change where every human, irrespective of gender, colour, or status began to be treated as equal, with the same choices and opportunities.

This was especially the woman who made her place in every forbidden territory including Church and Parliament. And, it took ages to reach my home. Living in the West for many years made me realize that capitalism has cost the West its comfort zone of life, "the home" to some extent.

Society and the governments have found their way of dealing with the issues, springing out of liberal movements and the digital revolution. This has made life a little easier not only for the vulnerable generations of society but sounded more pragmatic and dignified, keeping in view the pressures and responsibilities of the modern lifestyle in a competitive world.

I can curse the West for its openness, promiscuity, or breakdown of the family, but I admire it also for the solutions it provided to safeguard every section of society.

Old, women or kids, etc...even now animals.

Bad or good system, it is working and it is a big relief too. Maybe my mother, my aunt, or my sisters will ridicule this good or bad system, I don't care. What I care to see a smile on eighty-year-old Martha, the handholding of dying Peter, or the homely atmosphere created for Stacy. I know ultra-liberalism has serious repercussions for society and the basic institution of the home has reached over the edge.

Are we, in the East, not also having the crude form of social evils now, or is the 'concept of relationship' still intact despite our mad race to reach beyond the boundary the West has stopped now to take look back at it?

Admit it; we tend to put every evil under the carpet until it becomes the volcano to break families, mar-

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riages, and relations. Look around, my joint family system has died ages ago.

Looking after old parents has become a burden for many, do we care for them the way they cared for us? I often ask those who lecture me on eastern values and home comforts. I cannot tolerate this hypocrisy...

Many in my hometown do often accuse me of bringing in discourse the new concepts of family relations as if I am forcing them to get out of the rotten relations.

"Bear it until you kill each other. Keep up the appearance of caring old parents until you find them dead in their solitary confinement situations". I told my students in one of the classes when parents the next day prevented their daughters from seeing me.

I lost additional income from extra classes but did try my luck at some other places. Nobody seemed ready to realize the reality of our society.

The miseries of old parents who had to live a life of destitution were again a forbidden subject in my community. Is it because society's harshness and crudeness demand them to keep their mouth shut or they have become brutalized by the growing demands of modern life?

A recent visit to a few "old people's homes" in the suburban of London opened my eyes and thought to share this experience back home with my elder sister. She didn't listen to me and hung the phone in the middle of the conversation.

The old home had elderly people who prefer to stay there despite having children or another family they have raised earlier. In one of the old homes, there were thirty elders, mostly women in the age group of sixty to ninety. They were all gathered in a big hall, decorat-

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ed and furnished with small coffee tables around, coffee machines, and trays of biscuits nicely kept in one corner for them.

My earlier perception was quite different. I was expecting old, bitter, and haggard women in a very pitiable condition and thinking how I will give them hope or make them laugh for some time. Because I had the experience of meeting my old people back home in a very horrible situation. They only wait for death.

Well, while seeing oldies in London home laughing and conversing with each other in ease and a calm atmosphere, it was, in fact, me who needed some comfort and encouragement. They needed to push me to laugh with them.

I learned that every person in this home has paid twenty to thirty thousand pounds for the living and care costs which have been paid either by their savings or earnings after giving a share of inheritance to their children who are enjoying their own life and responsibilities away from them.

In Britain only, there are thousands of such homes and more coming every day due to the increasing population of older people. This has become a lucrative business but the homes have to follow strict rules and regulations on hygiene, health, and care of every individual professionally.

Old people were having a story session, sharing the best moments of their life and boasting about the achievements in their careers or upbringing of children or prefer to live in an old home away from relations and friends.

The stories were different from those I have heard in the Women's Commission of Jammu and Kashmir where as old as eighty-year women came for help to get back their confidence, self-esteem, and dignity.

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Most of the women own nothing, not a share in the property, and had no control over their earnings. Every single penny was spent on the education of children, house building, and marriages and even, the transferred title of the property to them.

We might have this impression that we live in a value-based society, look after our old parents and relations but the story is half glass empty. Many oldies are suffering silently due to societal pressures, stigma, or the fear of losing the shelter at the last stage of their life.

After the story session in this English old home was over, I spoke to a few women who have been living there for quite a long time. One could feel the dignity and confidence in them despite age, tremor, and poor health. Something seemed different. I felt so contented by their attire, attitude, and etiquette. I wished I could have found these attributes in Fazi of Kupwara whose property was taken by her brother-in-law after her husband's death even though her husband had transferred all land and house in her name. Her fault was that she was a woman, old and widowed, and couldn't find one human to help her.

Watching their elegance was like watching Jane Austen's Ball in "Pride and Prejudice" which gives you a feel of English aristocracy, grandeur, and aesthetics. They spoke about their families and relations in this retirement home; there was no mention of deceit, loot, exploitation, or abuse by children. It was their choice to stay in an old home and feel dignified. "We don't want to live on the pity of relations who have their own life to take care of". Barlow told me.

Though, Barlow, eldest in this group, spoke to me with a little pain in her voice, "Having families and relations is not enough, having someone around with care and love is different. That is not possible when your children have their own families to look after and you don't want to become one of the packages in the family. If we can afford the cost of our living in a retirement home what is the harm in enjoying it too. One must not compromise with self-esteem".

I was thinking, "Why is Barlow different from Safia who lives in the remote village of Sepdan in Kashmir who has five sons with dozens of grandchildren? She had a huge property that got divided among five sons leaving the mother only choice to stay with any son she likes. She made this asset with unpaid labour for seventy years, even now she is rearing livestock or caring for grandkids but nothing is left in her name. At times, when there is an argument with any son, she has to take refuge in a neighbour's house that then comes and begs sons to take her back in this old age.

I have met many families where the mother, wife, or daughter has

Rereading Mujtaba Farooq's " The Last Cigarette "

ujtaba Farooq's short story "The Last Cigarette" a fantastic short story was featured in the 13th issue of LitStream, the literary weekly supplement of The Daily Headlines Today, published from Srinagar, J&K. Lit-Stream has earned a global readership for its consistent publication of fiction, short stories, and poetry of exceptional intellectual depth and emotional resonance.

I have been following this distinguished literary supplement regularly through its LitStream Facebook page, e-paper, and LitStream

The story "The Last Cigarette " is a haunting vignette that dramatizes the act of smoking not as a casual indulgence but as a metaphor for grief, alienation, and existential decay. The story unfolds in a public setting where a man, scarred and broken, smokes under the gaze of a judgmental crowd. The narratorrevealed at the end to be a dog observes the scene with piercing detail, transforming a mundane act into a meditation on human suffering, social hypocrisy, and identity. Farooq's narrative is not linear but impressionistic, layering sensory images, social commentary, and psychological insight. The story's power lies in its ability to turn a cigarette into a symbol of mortality, memory, and rebirth. Yet, it also raises questions about narrative excess, ambiguity, and the balance between metaphor and realism. The central figure is not merely a smoker but a man ostracized by society. The crowd around him-mothers shielding children, businessmen flaunting Rolexes, college girls recoiling, teenagers calculating status-embodies collective judgment. Each group projects its anxieties and prejudices onto him, reducing him to a symbol of immorality. The mother's whispering frames him as a cautionary tale. The businessmen's pity is tinged with smugness, reinforcing class superiority. The girls' disgust equates him with rot, while the boys commodify his cigarette brand as a marker of class.

Farooq critiques how society dehumanizes individuals, turning personal grief into public spectacle. The smoker becomes a scapegoat for collective fears. The man's smoking is described as "grief finding its way

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through the nostrils." His coughs, scars, and red eyes suggest a war within—a life devastated by trauma. The cigarette is not pleasure but ritualized mourning. Each puff is both a cry and a wound.

Farooq portrays him as a living corpse, inhaling smoke in exchange for memories. This paradox—alive yet dead, present yet absent-captures existential collapse. The act of smoking becomes a metaphor for consuming oneself, for burning identity into ashes. The climax centers on the "last cigarette." It is not merely tobacco but a symbol of rebirth. The man smiles at the thought of finishing his grief, of killing an identity judged by others. By saving the last puff, he postpones transformation. This gesture suggests agency: he refuses to let society dictate his end. The last cigarette becomes a threshold between death and renewal, between being "a bad man" and becoming "someone else—unjudged, unknown." The crowd's reactions expose hypocrisy. Those who judge him-businessmen, mothers, students—are themselves complicit in other forms of decay: materialism, classism, moral policing. Farooq suggests that society condemns visible vices (smoking) while ignoring invisible ones (greed, vanity, cruelty). The Rolexes tick "silently, but still could be heard"—a metaphor for time wasted in superficial pursuits. The girls' scarves symbolize purity, yet their disgust masks fear of contamination. The boys' obsession with brands reflects consumerist indoctrination. Farooq's story is saturated with symbols, sometimes overwhelming but undeniably pow-

Cigarette symbolises grief, memory, mortality, identity. Each puff is a wound, each ash a memory. Ashtray (steel bowl) refers to containment of grief, ritual burial of memories. Boots with loose laces symbolise instability, repeated falls, scars of life. The umbrella without rain suggests misplaced protection; the sunflower in black paper suggests beauty suffocated by grief.

Biscuits left on the floor can be seen as a gesture of kindness or futility, perhaps a dog's reward, linking to the narrator's identity. The dog narrator sees without judgment. embodying innocence and lovalty. Its perspective critiques human hypocrisy.

The revelation that the narrator is a dog reframes the entire story. Until the final line, the voice seems human, empathetic yet detached. The twist destabilizes the reader: the dog's gaze is purer, untainted by human prejudice.

This choice is both brilliant and problematic. Brilliant, because it exposes human cruelty through non-human eyes. Problematic, because it risks undermining the narrative's gravitas—some readers may find the twist gimmicky. Yet, the dog's perspective emphasizes that true compassion often lies outside human society.

Farooq's prose is rich in sensory detail: the smell of smoke, the sight

of scars, the sound of Rolex ticks. His metaphors are visceral—"corpse still beating," "war inside his eyes," 'grave full of dead bodies.'

This intensity creates atmosphere but sometimes veers into melodrama. The repetition of death imagery risks desensitizing the reader. Yet, the cumulative effect is haunting.

The story relies on repetition-of odour, grief, judgment. This reinforces monotony, mirroring the smoker's ritual. However, it occasionally feels excessive, diluting

Farooq avoids clear exposition. We never know the man's backstory, the setting, or the narrator's identity until the end. This ambiguity invites interpretation but may frustrate readers seeking clarity.

The lack of narrative resolution—what happens after the last cigarette?—is deliberate. The story is about the moment, not the plot. The tone oscillates between empathy and condemnation. The narrator sympathizes with the smoker yet critiques society. The dog's neutrality adds irony: humans judge, animals observe . Symbolic richness of the story is mention - worthy The cigarette as grief is a powerful metaphor.

The story exposes hypocrisy of class, morality, and consumerism.

Narrative twist is interesting The dog narrator reframes the story. adding depth. Vivid imagery creates a haunting mood.

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Overuse of death imagery risks

he book entitled "India Unravelled: The Representation of Women in Literature and Society" emerges as a remarkable compendium that intertwines the literary, historical, and cultural trajectories of Indian womanhood. Published as a special issue commemorating Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav, this volume, edited by Dr. P.V. Laxmiprasad, is both a scholarly tribute and a critical reflection on seventy-five years of women's representation in Indian life and letters.

The book's Preface, penned by Dr. Laxmiprasad himself, sets the tone for the collection. It moves from the Vedic to the contemporary, presenting a sweeping survey of women's evolution in Indian society. The editor's deeply personal engage-ment—shaped by his reverence for his mother and inspired by iconic figures such as M.S. Subbulakshmi, Indira Gandhi, and Kalpana Chawla—frames the collection as both intellectual inquiry and emotional homage. His reflections combine historical insight with personal conviction, making the preface a mini-treatise on the resilience and creativity of Indian women.


Comprising thirty-seven essays by eminent academics, the volume explores a rich diversity of themes—from mythic heroines like Sita, Draupadi, and Akkamahadevi to modern exemplars such as Sudha Murthy, Kamala Das, and Justice R. Banumathi. The essays collectively illuminate how women's roles, voices, and images have been shaped, silenced, or celebrated in Indian literature and culture.


Among the standout contributions are Basavaraj Naikar'sessays, which blend literary criticism with social commentary. His readings of historical and religious figures—Rani of Jhansi and Akkamahadevi-revive the intersection between gender and patriotism. Tamali Neogi's comparative study of Mahasweta Devi and Mahesh Dattani unearths the politics of the body, while P.C.K. Prem's mythological essays explore divine femininity through figures like Parvati and Devahuti. The essays on contemporary figures such as Sudha Murthy and Githa Hariharan link feminist expression to social reform, bridging academic discourse with lived experience.

What makes India Unravelled compelling is its interdisciplinary breadth. The book does not confine itself to literary studies alone but expands into music, law, politics, and social activism. Essays on figures like M.S. Subbulakshmi, Kiran Bedi, and Mallu Swarajyam celebrate women as creators, adminis-

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trators, and reformers, underscoring the idea that literature mirrors the evolving social landscape of India.

Critically, the book balances celebration with interrogation. While it honours the achievements of women across eras, it also exposes the enduring patriarchal structures that constrain them. The essays vary in style—some academic, others biographical—but together they create a mosaic of female representation in India's moral and cultural imagination.

However, the volume's expan-

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siveness is also its limitation. The essays, though individually strong, occasionally lack thematic cohesion. A tighter editorial framework and a more rigorous critical lens might have sharpened its analytical depth. Yet, its strength lies in inclusivity—embracing both classical and contemporary voices, urban intellectuals and rural reformers, historical figures and literary creations.

Ultimately, India Unravelled stands as a sincere and substantial contribution to feminist literary studies in India. It invites readers to revisit the Indian woman not as

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a passive symbol of tradition but as a dynamic force of continuity and change. As the nation celebrates its seventy-fifth year of independence, this volume reminds us that the story of India's freedom and progress is incomplete without acknowledging the women who shaped its soul

Man, the crown of creation and the appointed steward of the earth, is expected to act with reason, responsibility, and restraint so as to preserve order and ensure the general well-being of the planet. Endowed with the inherent capacities for both construction and destruction, he stands in constant need of moral discipline. To temper his destructive inclinations, God has sent religion as an ethical guide and a moral force.

Religions and prophets serve as divine channels meant to cultivate God-centric humane values—faithfulness, honesty, truthfulness, justice, equality, empathy, brotherhood, and meritocracy. It must be noted that these God-rooted values are distinct from the often ambiguous and secular buzzword of "humanism"



Whether it is the ethical principles of Hinduism-Ahimsa (non-violence as the supreme dharma), Satya (truthfulness), D na (generosity), compassion, empathy, respect for elders, forgiveness, self-control, and contentment; or the Christian core values of divine and human love, compassion, forgiveness, humility, integrity, faithfulness, and justice; or the Judaic ideals of human dignity, justice, compassion, repairing the world, and imitating divine attributes; or the Islamic emphasis on honouring the children of Adam and delivering justice impartially to friend and foe alike-each faith tradition accords the highest value

to human life, dignity, and honour.

Yet man has often taken these very religions and their sacred texts and used them against humanity. By misquoting, distorting, and wrenching divine commandments out of context, he has weaponised religion to promote fear, hatred, extremism, violence, intolerance, inequality, deceit, and bloodshed.

Rabindranath Tagore lamented this tragic inversion with timeless clarity:

The bigot insults his own religion When he slays a man of another faith.

Conduct he judges not in the light of reason.

In the temple he raises the bloodstained banner

And worships the devil in the name of God.

That which should make man free.

They turn into fetters.

That which should unite,

They turn into a sword.

That which should bring love

From the fountain of the Eternal,

They turn into a prison.

The principal cause of such misuse lies in the fact that religion, for many, is an emotional inheritance—an attachment, a sense of belonging—rather than a consciously examined discipline. As a result, teachings attributed to religion are seldom verified, questioned, or cross-checked, allowing destructive interpretations to take root and harm both humanity and its moral foundations.

What is urgently required today is the courage to pause, reflect, question, and critically examine any teaching claimed in the name of religion that promotes fatalism, hatred, or harm. Only then can religion reclaim its true role as a force for harmony and the elevation of the human spirit.

melodrama. Ambiguity overloads Lack of context may alienate readers. The story is more tableau than plot, relying on description rather than action. As to Dog twist, some may find it contrived, reducing seriousness.

Farooq's story resonates with existential literature—Camus' The Stranger, Kafka's "The Tria" where alienation and judgment dominate. Yet, unlike Camus' detached prose, Farooq's style is lyrical, almost poetic. His imagery recalls Bengali and Urdu literary traditions of metaphorical intensity. The cigarette motif echoes works like Julio Ramón

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Ribeyro's Only for Smokers, where smoking symbolizes identity and rebellion. Farooq, however, infuses it with grief and social critique, making it uniquely his. At its core, "The Cigarette Puff" asks: what defines identity? Is it society's judgment or personal grief? The man's refusal to smoke the last cigarette suggests resistance to finality. He chooses to delay transformation. asserting agency amid collapse. The dog's perspective implies that human identity is fragile, easily destroyed by judgment. True understanding requires innocenceseeing without prejudice.

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Mujtaba Farooq's "The Last Cigarette" is a powerful, if imperfect, meditation on grief, alienation, and identity. Through vivid imagery and symbolic layering, he transforms a cigarette into a metaphor for mortality and rebirth. The story critiques social hypocrisy, exposing how society condemns visible vices while ignoring deeper decay.

Its strengths lie in atmosphere, symbolism, and philosophical depth. Its weaknesses lie in excess and ambiguity. Yet, these flaws are part of its raw power. The final twist—that the narrator is a dog—forces readers to confront their own judg-

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ments, reminding us that compassion often lies outside human.

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Habba Khatoon: Through a Poetic Lens

his essay will attempt to analyse the poems which are attributed to Zoon, aka Habba Khatoon, and see if they, in any way, tell us about who she really was. Scholars have used this poetry as an indicator of her marital failures and as a proof that she was either Zoon from Chandahar or Habba Khatoon of Srinagar. Was Zoon a peasant girl married to an illiterate and ill-tempered Aziz Lone, or was she Habba Khatoon from a noble family and married to her cousin in Srinagar? These questions will be the focal point of our discussion. We will use her poetry as a lens for minutely detailing whether her poems help us solve the riddle of her being the Chandahar Zoon or the Srinagarite Habba Khatoon. Later on, we will analyze the poems stylistically and see whether the language used is really that of a 16th-century poet or a modern poet of the last century.

Zoon or Habba Khatoon's Poetry?

As said earlier, there are three personas that have emerged out of our discussion of the historical accounts: Zoon from Chandahar, Habeeba, a pious court singer, and Habba Khatoon of Srinagar, belonging to a noble family. Since Habeeba's name occurs only in one Persian chronicle and is described only as a singer with a melodious voice, we have no reason to believe that she was the Habba Khatoon whose songs Kashmiris have been admiring and singing for centuries. I have also pointed out earlier that THE Zoon from Gurez is only a figment of imagination. We are left with THE Zoon from Chandahar and THE Habba Khatoon of Srinagar. Even if the former had been there, there is no proof, except the folklore, about her being from Chandahar and in a farmer's family. Assuming that she was a poet too, according to Wakhlu. she destroyed all her work before she died at Pandrethan where her supposed grave is. So, we are left with one Habba Khatoon from Shehr-e-Khas (Downtown) Srinagar. We will be looking at these poems critically to identify who this person was.

What kind of poems are they?

Habba's poems are basically lyrics, deeply personal, reflecting pain and the highest emotional stress. In common parlance, they are called vaakh, three-line stanzas with a refrain as the fourth line. To my mind, Vaakh in Kashmiri is vedaakh or baakh (wailing), the former meaning 'wailing' and the latter denoting 'wailing and crying in pain.' Both these expressions are still used in Kashmiri dialects. In South Kashmir, 'baakh tshataen' (to wail) is used when a female weeps

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bitterly over the loss of her dear ones or if she is facing any great problems (like poverty) that she cannot solve. Veddakh din' means to mourn the death by crying and relating one's association with the deceased. Lal Ded wrote vaakhs, four-line lyrics, while Habba Khatoon used three-line stanzas whose rhyme scheme is ABA with a refrain, which is normally the second line of the beginning couplet. For illustrations, I am using Kamil's Habba Khatoon: Select Poems (1959; there are 12 poems in the anthology) and Kulivat-e-Habba Khatoon (1995), both published by J&K Academv of Art. Culture and Languages, and Kulivat-e-Habba Khatoon (224). published by M/S Sheikh Mohammad Usman (hereafter Usman only). The former has used the traditional three-stanza with a refrain format, whereas the latter calls all poems 'ghazals,' which they are NOT. The ghazal consists of syntactically and grammatically complete couplets following an intricate rhyme scheme. Each couplet ends on the same radeef (word or phrase) and is preceded by the qafia (a rhyming word), appearing twice in the first couplet. This is called matla' in Urdu; the last couplet, where the poet uses his/her nom de plume (takhalus), is known as magta'. Therefore, the pattern given in the Kamil collection is appropriate and in keeping with the poetic tradition in Kashmir. Also, in the Usman collection, there are 16 poems without takhalus, whereas in Kamil, there are 13. Some poems are very short (one or two stanzas). Kamil's anthology contains 50 poems, and the Usman collection consists of 53.

Vedaakh

Habba Khatoon's poems are vedaakh/vaakh (wailing) in nature, as they manifest her agony and suffering through carefully chosen words, as in:

chon firaaq chum lalavunye

son kun te lagihi naav

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vanta kath kyuth myon aasunye

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madun kor kunye gov refrain

Your absence burns through me with a restless ache.

If only the drifting boat would turn once more toward our shore.

Tell me, what worth has this life of mine now?

In which direction has my beloved gone?

Lal Ded would say:

leka ta thokka peth sheri hetsam nyanda sapanim path bronth

lalla ches kal zanh no tshenim ada yali sapanim vepihe kyah

I bore the weight of taunts and bitter tongues.

Rumours rose like storms from every corner of my past and present.

Yet I remained Lalla, faithful to the ache within my heart.

And when I finally reached the goal I longed for,

No whisper, no wound, no darkness could touch me.

Vatsun is also a lyrical composition with a deep emotional outburst, as we find in the poems attributed to Habba Khatoon. In a way, both vaakh and vatsun mean the same—lyrical poems that manifest deep anguish and emotional distress. Both Lal Ded and Habba Khatoon express their personal grief, as both are believed to have suffered at the hands of their respective in-laws. However, Lala went into mysticism, while Habba Khatoon used the lyrical form, vedaakh/vaakh, as a painful cry for the sufferings that she had to undergo.


I have maintained earlier that the Habba songs are as confusing as her historical accounts. I would try to demonstrate how folk songs have been mixed up with some lyrics to show that they belong to Habba Khatoon, the one present through her poems. While going through these songs, I felt that unless Wakhlu's (1994) claim is rebutted, there is no scope for any doubt that Zoon of Chandahar, even if she had existed, had burnt her work before she died.

Let us start with Habba Khatoon,

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who our own historian, Dr Abdul Ahad, and Professor Shad Ramzan claim belonged to a noble family. I would like to make it clear that all the poems cited below are, to me, autobiographical. Here is the poem in which Habba Khatoon talks about her lineage (PHOTO 1). In the three marked lines, Habba Khatoon tells us the names of her father, mother, and her familial background. She says (I am providing photos of original texts with English transliteration and translation):

maelis naav chum sayidul bahar maaji naav chum badval jamal sayid kur ches pur kamalo

My father bears the noble name Sayyidul-Bahar.

My mother's name is Badwal-Jamal.

And I — a daughter of the Sayyids —am grace refined.

Habba Khatoon was a 'Sayyid,' a prefix that was used by a large number of missionaries who came to Kashmir with Mir Sayyid Ali Hamadani, popularly known as Amir-e-Kabeer, in whose name there are khangahs (shrines) in almost all parts of Kashmir; the most revered one is in Downtown Srinagar at Kalashpora, Savvids/Sveds claim a direct lineage with Prophet Mohammad (SAW). They claim to be on top of the social hierarchy, or "caste" system, among Muslims. It was later also adopted by many locals who claim to be descendants of the Persian Sayyids. Habba's parents' names also sound quite alien to local names.


As we can see, in the encircled lines, the first two lines do not match the rest of the poem in rhyme. They have "r" and "l" sounds at the end, and the last line has the usual rhyme "lo"—"kamalo." Have they been interpolated? Kamil (1995) doesn't contain these three lines. However, in Footnote 4 (pp. 17-18), Kamil says that this stanza was sung on Radio Kashmir by Mohammad Akbar and his chorus on 5 April

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1976, and by a street singer, Abdul Ahad Bakhshi. He also writes that both these singers used "baabas" instead of "maelis" in "baabas naav chum Sayyidul Baharo"— "baaba" (same as in Hindi) and "mo:l" are homophones, meaning 'father'. Also, note the addition of "o" in "Baharo," which rhymes with the rest of the lines. If we look at the theme of the poem, these lines seem to me a complete misfit. There is a sudden shift from a wake-up call—vathu laalo nindre (Awake from your slumber, my love)—to giving a personal account. Kamil doesn't say why he left this stanza out of the main text.

Notwithstanding this unusual rhyme and its exclusion in Kamil (1995), the lines do tell us that Habba Khatoon belonged to a Sayyid dynasty and was not, as is claimed, a peasant girl. Her parental home (called maalyun in Kashmiri) was no ordinary place but the home of



landlords about whom she talks in a poem (PHOTO 2):

maalin' myaen arbaab aesi tavai draam habba khotoon naav kam kam gandar aaye tsasith doh dari yaamat loosith gom

My family came from the landlords.

That's how I got the name

Habba Khatoon.
So many handsome boys

So many handsome boys thronged around.

Ah—the day has long since waned.


Habba's family belonged to the elite class—landlords, rulers, nobles, and so on. We have clear information here that she wasn't any Zoon or a farmer's daughter, but the one who got her name, Habba Khatoon, from her parents. Also, she had earned fame far and wide as a beautiful damsel who had attracted young men of the town— "So many handsome boys thronged around.' Readers may also notice that, like the above 'interpolated' stanza, we find the last word in the first line of this stanza, 'aesi,' also not rhyming with earlier endings as if it had been interpolated later. However,

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this stanza busts the popular myth that Zoon was rechristened as Habba Khatoon either by Yousuf Shah Chak or a Sufi saint. Therefore, no Zoon existed.

Habba Khatoon wasn't any ordinary girl but a much-pampered child who was living a luxurious life in her parental home. In a poem, she says, "My parents raised me in honey and sugar. I would be bathed in milk." Not only that, but she also had maids who attended on her all the time—she says that there were "thousands" of them, which, though an exaggeration, to my mind, is a way of emphasizing her extraordi-



narily high-quality upbringing. She says (PHOTO 3; encircled stanza):


mael maaji raechnas lola ke voore saasa baza tsonza aasam sulanavaan

meno zanyov laga yiyime khure kaensi maa raevin shure paan

My parents raised me with such cherished love. Thousands of maids cared for me. I never imagined that I would face such dark days. Let no one's childhood ever be lost this way.

Here, Habba Khatoon reflects nostalgically on a privileged childhood characterized by abundance, affection, and protection. The opening lines-My parents raised me with such cherished love. Thousands of maids cared for me— establish a life of extraordinary comfort and an environment of near-royal luxury. The presence of "thousands of maids" symbolizes both material wealth and emotional insulation. She no longer enjoys that world. The third line in the stanza talks about some plight that befell her. What was that? It doesn't sav.

Habba Khatoon was educated.



In one of her poems, she mentions (PHOTO 3A):

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mael'maaji traevnas sabqas doore okhnan wolnam moore paan a'ara ros' tul' nam naro tamboore kaensa ma raevin shoore paan My parents sent me far away

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to learn.

The Mulla spared no effort to thrash me.


The merciless set my body aflame.

Let no one's childhood ever be lost this way.

This sounds so bizarre that a Sayyid girl is sent for education to an Okhoon (Quran teacher) when the whole of Kashmir is indebted to the Sa'adaat for learning the Quran.

Failed Love and Marriage

That Habba Khatoon was very beautiful and attracted the attention of smart young guys who would flock around her speaks volumes about how famous she had been as a young girl. This fame must have naturally attracted many suitors because of her family's status as well. It would be naïve to think that ordinary folks would be interested and/or send the matchmakers. However, from the flock that thronged her home, she



seems to have fallen in love with the one who would loiter around her day and night. Read the poem (PHOTO 4), and you will notice that there was somebody who followed her, and she, too, was interested in him: vuchtai vesiye kaendi ba zaayas

baagaen' aayas kaenhde taam doh aki kaem' taam doori vuchayas

vata gat laegith pata pata aam gara yam tsayas hita beyi draaras baagaen' aayas kaenhde taam doh aki raesa raesa maji nish tsayas

zon gom kath nai bani cham paam tas nish kath vanani mandchayas baagaen' aayas kaenhdi taam

Look, my friend, where I was born,

Where destiny wedded me away.

One day, somebody caught sight of me from afar.

Followed me to my home. When I entered home, I slipped

out again on some small pretext. Where I was wedded away. One day, quietly, I went to my

mother.

I thought if the thing failed,

slander would follow.
Standing before her, I felt ashamed to tell her.

Where destiny wedded me

away.

As can be seen, Habba Khatoon


As can be seen, Habba Khatoon wanted to confide in her mother

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about her love affair but "felt ashamed to tell her," out of fear of dishonour, which is naturally tied to our societal expectations around purity, obedience, and marriage.

The love seemed to have failed, and Habba speaks about her mar-



riage in a village. She wails thus (PHOTO 5; encircled stanza):

doh aki mael' maaji nagri harshayas

sheraech aesas vaetsis gaam kyah kara pooshina lanin nyayas baagaen' ayas kaenhde taam

One day, my parents married me off in a distant town.

A city-born girl, I found myself in a village.

What could I do? I could not wrestle with fate.
Where destiny wedded me

away.
Which town was she married in? What village did she reach as a result of this marriage, and why? She belonged to a kind of royal family that showered its intense affection on her. Why would she be married in a village and not the city



she hailed from?

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In another poem (PHOTO 6), she speaks about being married off in a distant place. She says (encircled stanza):

mael' maaji harshayas yeli doore pata pata drayam vesa vanavaan hola gom aendri lola taloore

kaensa ma raevin shore paan
My parents married me off to
some far-off land.

My friends gathered round, singing the bridal songs.

But I, struck by love, mourned in silence.


Let no one's childhood ever be lost this way.

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After this stanza, there is a



description of the way the bride's formal farewell (rukhsati) took place. She was taken in a palanquin whose poles had a silver coating. Her parents called her deka baej koori (Oh, lucky daughter), whose in-laws were waiting for her. This is how, in our culture, daughters are bade farewell at their marriages, except that Habba went in a palanquin; today we use decorated cars. However, imme-



diately after this, she wails (PHOTO 7: encircled part):

ba chesai yeti tay tsa chuham doore

doshvai drayeyi jaeni jaan me no zynyov lodmut loore kaensa ma raevin shore paan

I stand here, and you are far from me.

We were devoted to each other

beyond measure. I'd never thought a carefully built home would collapse.

Let no one's childhood be lost

this way. The stanza articulates a reflec-


tive stance on emotional distance. relational devotion, and the fragility of constructed stability. It employs spatial separation—"I stand here, and you are far from me"-as a metaphor for the psychological and interpersonal divide that has emerged between Habba and her husband. The second line underscores the intensity of the prior bond: "We were devoted to each other beyond measure." The third line used "home" metaphorically for the relationship that existed between the couple—a structure built through care, emotions, and shared expectations. Its collapse highlights the inherent vulnerability of even the most carefully crafted bonds.

What part of Kashmir was she married in? The earlier stanza indicates that she was married off in a town, and here she mentions an unknown distant place. She belonged to the city and reached a villageshahraech aesis vaetsis gaam (I was from the city but reached a village), which, let us assume, was far away. What place was this? None of the poems available in the anthologies that I have with me tells us anything. Moreover, was this her first or second marriage? If she was married off in a village, who was the Kamal of Jamalata, Srinagar, then who she has mentioned in one of her poems (PHOTO 8; encircled part):

yaar myon chu jamalati kamal tas chum naav

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Literature

su chu tati ba kas matti aki latti yiham na

My beloved dwells in Jamala-

Kamal is his name.

He is there, and I am here. If only he would return for once?

The above stanzas raise many queries that need answers:

- Who was Kamal that she mentions in this stanza, a husband or lover?
- Did her parents eventually come to know about their daughter's love affair?
- Did the village marriage happen because of Kamal or the unknown lover who would follow her everywhere?
- Did this marriage take place as a punishment for making a friend out of the clan so that the family was saved from any dishonour or slander? Please note that "vaar" is used in different senses in Kashmiri culture. With a male, it means a friend, and 'friendship' means 'yaaraz. However, if a female says that someone is my 'yaar', it is taken in a pejorative sense, meaning a boyfriend. When a mother uses it for her son, it means 'a darling.' However, using 'yaar' for husband isn't unknown as it shows a wife's love for her husband.
- Why, despite being a Sayyid girl, Habba Khatoon was married off in a distant place where her in-laws ill-treated her?
- Does the village marriage point to the fact that Habba Khatoon was abandoned by her parents?
- Habba says that her 'yaar' is from Jamalata. We know that Jamalata is in Downtown, a few kilometres from the city centre, Srinagar. When did her marriage to Kamal take place, and when did the village marriage happen?
- Was Kamal, as is the popular belief, her first husband, who also belonged to the Sayyid dynasty? The Sayvids (also 'sa'daat) who arrived here in Kashmir with Mir Syed Ali Hamadani in 774 AH (1372 CE), all of them settled around the famous khanqah at Kalashpora, Srinagar, called khanqah-emoa'la. It was much later that


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they dispersed across the valley. Here, Habba is talking about her separation from Kamal, but 'separation' does not necessarily mean 'divorce.' Maybe the couple had differences, and she had gone to her parental home till the dust settled down. Why would she say, "If only he would return once"? A divorcee never waits for her previous husband. In the following stanza, she says, 'When a friend does not maintain friendship, love does not remain intact," and that "she was dying for her friend." So, she still had a hope of reunion with her friend/lover/husband.

There is a story behind her relationship with Kamal. It is said that he was her maternal cousin (mother's brother's son), but their marriage fell apart for some unknown reasons. If that was true, why was she still hankering for him? Was Kamal only a lover? Was she desperate to get him back (we will discuss this later)?

In one of the most popular poems, whose refrain is chaara kara myon malino (O, my parents, come to my aid!), she portrays a very grim picture of her married life. She is wailing over the troubles she is facing



and asking her parents to come to her rescue. The poem (PHOTO 9; from the Usman collection) depicts one of the saddest aspects of our culture in which the institution of, especially, the mother-in-law, has proved to be the worst in its treatment of daughters-in-law, even though we aren't alone in this crime. In the subcontinent, this is prevalent in all societies-Muslims, Hindus, and so on. Although a lot of change has taken place, we continue to hear about cases where the daughters-inlaw complain about their mothersin-law and vice versa. Let us read the poem in transliteration and translation:

vaeriven' saet' varah chesno chara kar myon malino gari ba drayas aaba natis nott me phutmo malino va ti divtom natti notta nata hara nattche malino shur' paanas sinder gayimo vudaer khasun kudur pyom katri tsharaan katri sanimo vetri noon pyom malino hashi laeynam topsaey thap suy me gov mota khota sakh yindra pachi peth ninder paymo

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tsakhaer paethmo malino yara daade tara gaeyso baara bukh chum aamutuy habba khotooni von ishaara dil hushara malino

Note: Some singers have used the vocative 'ho' after malino, which is similar to 'ay' in Urdu or 'ya' in Arabic.

I am not comfortable with my in-laws.

Find a remedy for me. Oh, my parents!

I went out to draw a simple pitcher of water,

But the pitcher slipped and shattered.

Bring me another in its place, Or pay the price of what is lost. My young bloom, once rising, has begun to fade.

Climbing the highland was a hard toil.

Seeking pebbles, blisters have opened on my feet.

Alas-someone now scatters salt upon my wounds.

Spinning the wheel of yarn, I dozed for a breath.

And the thread snapped in my hand.

My mother-in-law seized me by my hair
This is a torment worse than

death. I writhe with longing for my

beloved. Life has become an affliction.


Understand Habba Khatoon's allusion,

O, my wakeful-hearted parental home.

Here, we get an altogether different picture of Habba Khatoon. A Savvid girl brought up by her parents with great affection and luxury, all of a sudden, she cries out at the harsh treatment that she receives from her mother-in-law. Would a person of such stature expect to fetch water in a pitcher, sit on the spinning wheel, and face the wrath of her mother-in-law? To me, this is a different woman and not Habba Khatoon, the "Sayyid Koor," describing her pathetic life. Or it may be a simple folk song that is related to the mother-in-law institution that is still prevalent in our society. We do hear such folk songs in weddings even today.

In our culture, a daughter visiting her parental home after marriage isn't liked by her sister/sin-law, which is also described by Habba Khatoon in a stanza like this (PHOTO 10):

doh aki sreh saan malyun gayayas diko bani kakaeni ditsnam paam



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deka raetsi zev nuv kona movaves baagaeni ayas kaenhde taam

Here is a poetic English rendering:

One day, with a heart full of longing, I returned to my paren-

My fortunate sister-in-law slandered me.
Why didn't I die the very

moment I was born-

Where have I been wedded away?

Study the earlier stanza (9) where Habba is longing for her beloved. She was with her in-laws. Who is she referring to as "my beloved"? Wasn't her husband, her beloved, with her? Do we find here a reference to the one she had fallen in love with before marriage? She asks her parents to understand what she was alluding to. It seems that folk songs have been attributed to Habba Khatoon, an enigmatic personality, who history presents as a Sayyid girl of a royal family, married, and then as a woman married off in a village where she faced her mother-in-law's ire on petty things. Doesn't it sound bizarre?

In one of her poems, Habba Khatoon speaks about the passing away of her parents:

deka rostuy koor vadaan myon hyu kas bani tai

gom juda ded ta babai beyi milw nai

aes' vadaan naala divan grehna math zooni log tai

nyai lanyun vantai kus aenzraevith zanitai

I am the hapless daughter, weeping alone -

Who else could face sorrow like mine?

My parents are gone; never

shall we meet again. We, left behind, wail; the moon's got eclipsed.

Tell me, who can change what fate has penned?

In the original text, the stanza begins with "deka rostuy," which I have translated as hapless. However, in Kashmiri, we also use the term for a widow. In the last stanza of this poem, she prays to God:

Habba Khotoon sahibas kun aerzoya wani tai

Baar sahibo karta saar'nai jantas manz iai

Habba Khatoon will plead before her Lord:

"O my God, grant a place in Heaven to all."

Habba Khatoon's suffering hasn't been just for one reasonlost love or divorce-but also because of the passing away of

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her parents. However, the lost love seems to have made her very desperate. Some people have used "Zoon" in aes' vadaan naala divan grehna math zooni log tai to mean Zoon of Chandahar which, to my mind, is bizarre. The "eclipsed moon" is used to refer to an unlucky one.

Desperate Habba Khatoon

From the poems/stanzas that we have read so far, it seems that two people are moving side by side with their respective problems. The Sayyid girl found a suitor, but it seems that she failed to confide in her mother her love, and that she was married off to Kamal. All of a sudden Kamal goes missing, and we hear about a marriage in a far-off town or village. However, the longing for the lover hasn't died down. It seems that Habba Khatoon was desperate to get back to that unknown lover whom she had loved more than anybody else. This love doesn't seem to be a common affair but a deep one, very close and intimate. There is a poem that I find very sensuous, inviting the lover to cherish the beloved as much as he wishes. The poem's refrain is chaay mein daenai posh (Chrish my pomegranate blossom). In the Usman collection, instead of 'daenai posh', 'daanai posh' (literally a grain of blossom) is written. 'Dana' (a grain) is used almost in the same sense in Urdu-chaaval ka ek dana (a grain of rice). However, I believe the Kamil version is correct. According to the legend, Habba Khatoon was well-versed in the Persian language. It is not, therefore, surprising that she knew what she was talking about while using the pomegranate blossom metaphorically. The poem (PHOTO 11) is one of the most popular songs sung by many female singers on the radio and TV. Here are its transliteration and translation:

me kaer' they kit' posha dasvanai chaav myaen' daenai posh

ba chesai zameen tsa chukh asmanai

seeras tsa chukj sarposh ba chesai ne'mat tsa chukh

mezmanai chaav myaen' daenai posh laeley gatti manz tsong zaajanai

baelev roodus na hosh tsa chuham sham aba chas par-

vanai chaav myaen' daenai posh ratshi ratshi retakol chum soranai bara ma gatshan ashaposh kuni hita bulbul yita aki aanai chaav myaen daenai posh

brega teer aesis peth dareechi

roodum tin aa zar josh

....

ada yikha yeli baal soor paana hanai chaav myaen' daenai posh

bam tai zila chis soz vayanai vilanay thovtham na hosh kam kyah govyo yemi myani vanai chaav myaen' daenai posh

I am your earth, and you are my sky.

Come, cherish my pomegranate blossom.

Laila had lit a lamp in the dark.

She lost her senses in love.

You are my flame, and I am vour moth.

Come, cherish my pomegranate blossom.

Slowly, spring is slipping away;

I fear the blossoms may fade. O my nightingale, find any

to visit me for just a moment. Come, cherish my pomegranate blossom.

Once I was a light perched at the window.

But that lustre has faded now. Will you only come when I am a complete wreck

Come, cherish my pomegranate blossom.

I play my instrument with such yearning,

yet you have never heard the sorrow in my notes.

Tell me, what have you ever found lacking in me?

Come, cherish my pomegranate blossom.

The potter shaped vessels of many kinds,

Each is carved with a different design

Some turned out flawless, some uneven.

Come, cherish my pomegranate blossom.

Carefully chose I tufts of soft cotton.

My love, don't be angry with me.

Habbah Khatoon has lost all hope.

Come, cherish my pomegranate blossom.

This song is a lament of longing and unreturned love. The speaker offers devotion again and againflowers, affection, constancyasking her beloved to enjoy her love ("cherish my pomegranate blossom"). She sees herself as earth to his sky, flame to his moth, a fading light waiting to be noticed.

She fears time slipping away, beauty fading, and hope diminishing while her beloved remains dis-

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tant. Through metaphors of spring. music, pottery, and flowers, she expresses yearning, vulnerability, and the pain of being overlooked.

In the end, she admits her despair: despite all her tenderness, her beloved has never truly come to her.

What is the significance of the pomegranate flower here? The poet has used it metaphorically. When I Googled it, I got this explanation: "In Persian poetry, the pomegranate flower, or 'Golnar' (), is primar-), is primarily used as a powerful metaphor for beauty, love, and passion." As a

motif, the flower denotes beauty, sensuality, fertility, vitality, blushing, and even a female private part. Pomegranate seeds have been used as a symbol for fertility in ancient Persian poetry. Some Persian poet has said:

anar-e shirin-e tu, ay yar, dilam ra bord,

ba yek negah-e tu, jan-e man be shadmani mord.

Your sweet pomegranate, O beloved, has stolen my heart,

With one glance of yours, my soul dies in joy.

Another poet says:

anar dane konad har ke del-ash gerefteh shavad

ze lab-e shegofteh-ye yaram che daneh-ha bechinad

Whoever's heart is seized with longing scatters pomegranate

From the blossoming lips of my beloved, what seeds are gathered!

Saadi Shirazi has also used it:

chehre-ye tu cho nar-e shirin, por az dane-ye 'eshq,

delam ra be shadi bi-khord, ze boo-ye lab-e tu. Your face is like a sweet pome-

granate, full of love's seeds. My heart has feasted joyfully

on the scent of your lips.

Jalaluddin Rumi says:

anar-e bagh-e tu khandid, por az noor-e jan.

ze dane-ha-ye tu del-e man shod por az 'eshq-e ziba.

The pomegranate of your garden laughs, full of soul's light, From your seeds, my heart

overflows with beautiful love. The seeds symbolize the outpour-


ing of passion, merging physical desire with spiritual ecstasy, a hallmark of Rumi's Sufi poetry.

No wonder, if Habba Khatoon knew Persian, she would have read these poets also. She, too, is using the "pomegranate blossom" as a motif for attracting the attention of her lover. It seems that she was a daring woman who could use such sensuous words in those days in a conservative patriarchal society like Kashmir. Or else, some male poet wrote it as a female version of Andrew Marvell's 'To His Coy Mistress' and attributed it to Habba Khatoon.

In the last stanza of the poem Habba Khatoon implores her lover not to be cross with her -"My love. don't be cross with me./ Habbah Khatoon has lost all hope."

In another poem, she also speaks of her lover having left her in the lurch. The refrain of the poem is tse

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


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kiho gayi myaen' diy (Why are you cross with me?). She says:

osh ches traavan ba tsaale tsaale meha baali gotshaham tsaev tsa kovo vata myani aakh mae-

shravaan tse kiho gavi mvaen' div

I am shedding tears as thick as hailstones.

All this wretched heart desires is you.

Why do you keep forgetting the path that leads to me?

Why are you cross with me?

In another poem (PHOTO 12A) consisting of only six lines, the beginning couplet and a three-line stanza with a refrain. There is no magta:

In this song, she is complaining about her lover having drifted away from her. Her parental home being far away ("door malyun chu"), it seems she is living alone and longing for her companion.

Earlier, we saw that Kamal of Jamalata was implored to come once and make Habba's life comfortable again. This imploring recurs in many poems, but we don't know who was angry with her —Kamal or someone else. As we know, Kamal was from Srinagar, but Habba was wedded away in some distant village-when, where, and how, that is not known. But the point is that Habba Khatoon did have a lover other than her husband, who seems to have come into the picture later. Whether it was Kamal from Srinagar or somebody else from the village where Habba Khatoon (of the poems)

Why this hatred towards me?

Literature

The poet has used 'sonn' (co-wife), translated here as 'rival', and her deluding the man, which has caused hatred in him towards his 'first wife'. 'Sonn' doesn't necessarily mean that the man had a fellow-wife. However, the lines do indicate that there was something wrong in the relationship between the couple.

In a poem (PHOTO 13) with a refrain, myon hyu banith beyiy kas aav (Who else has calamity fallen so fierce as on me?), the narrator is complaining to her lover that she



was dying in his love. She laments: daadi chyani moyas kas zana vanith

myon hyu banith beyiy kas aav ashi vani gaemo daer'yaav shanith

door gom panthan kas kara graav yada taenhdi moyas maaz pyom daezith

myon hyu banith beyiy kas aav

I am dying in your love, but whom can I tell?

Who else has calamity fallen so fierce as on me?

My tears have filled up the river

He has gone away from me; who to complain?

Dying in his longing, I've grown frail

Who else has calamity fallen so fierce as on me?

Habba Khatoon's Songs—A Case of **Disputed Authorship and Poetic Merit**

The above discussion ultimately underscores the textual and historical instability surrounding the songs attributed to Habba Khatoon. Their heterogeneous character—the absence of a maqta in many songs and the sudden, often contradictory autobiographical interpolationscollectively makes us believe that these songs do not have a single authorial voice. The scattered references to lineage, social status, and romantic cobwebs raise more contradictions than coherence. Especially when we look at a suffering wife (God knows whether that of Kamal or the village guy) and/or the passionate beloved longing for her lover, we feel that there is a lot of confusion in what is being said and how history has treated this figure. The way divergent narratives are given in some songs, it is difficult to get a convincing biographical sketch of this much-hyped 'classical' poet. Their inconsistencies cast doubt on long-standing assumptions about Habba Khatoon's life and identity—such as the names of her parents (Savvid al Bahar and Badwal Jamal) and her beloved (Kamal)that are internally inconsistent with the persona presented in the majority of the verses. For instance, the figure of 'Sayyid koor' (a highcaste daughter) doesn't align with the more prevalent persona of a mistreated daughter-in-law in a distant village, pining for her lost love. The three most significant stanzas, where the narrator is talking about her lineage, social status, love affair, and Kamal, appear, to me, as later interpolations due to their divergent rhyme schemes. The poems raise compelling questions about the poet's life:

- Why was she married far away in a town or village?
- What happened to her suitor who loitered around her and whom she couldn't confide in her mother about?
- What happened to Kamal, her 'yaar,' for whom she continues to wait—aki latti yiyi ham na (If only you came once)?
- How come a "Sayyid Koor" worked on a spinning wheel and fetched water in a pitch-

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Are we right in our assumption that the Sayyid woman and the village lady are two different personas?

To these and many more questions, no answers are provided, resulting in a collection of unresolved emotional vignettes. This leads to the conclusion that the songs function more as simple, commonplace folk songs (rof or vanvun) than as well-crafted poems.

Just as important is the question of the literary merit of these songs. As mentioned above, most of them sound more like folk songs that we have been hearing for generations in weddings and/or Eid celebrations by womenfolk. They are formulaic and lack any philosophical depth.

We will look at the stylistic merit of the poems later. The simplicity of diction, repetitive phrases, and the absence of any serious themes give us the idea that the writer wasn't an accomplished poet but an insipid versifier.

However, a minority of songs display structural refinement and thematic gravity, pointing to the possibility that multiple hands were involved in composing songs and attributing them to Habba Khatoon, for some unknown reasons, For instance, a song whose refrain is chumai baali tamana (I have a longing) is attributed to a saint, Mirza Kamal-ud-din Badakhshi (whose shrine is at Hawal, Srinagar), even though Mirza Kamal wasn't a Kashmiri and couldn't write Kashmiri (see Abdul Ahad Azad, History of Kashmiri Poetry and Literature, vol 2, p. 220; Kamil 1995, Endnote 2, p. 95). Also, I couldn't find the poem whose one stanza Mr Taing had recited to my friend in support of Biswak being the last resting place of Habba Khatoon. The stanza goes like this: (Photo 14)

In short, Habba Khatoon, under investigation, who has been popularized for centuries as the most sung poet, is less a historical figure and more an enigmatic character produced by oral tradition and later insertions. A close study of the poems would enable us to figure out if the popular belief that Habba Khatoon really belonged to the 16th century is true, and whether her poetry is really that of a seasoned artist. We will therefore look at her diction linguistically and try to find out whether or not her songs are that old and stylistically elegant.

undergoes immense sufferings, none of the poems tells us that. In a very popular poem with a refrain, tse kihyo gayiy myaen' daey (Why this hatred towards me?), Habba tells her lover/husband:

tsae kamyu soni myani brm dit nyunakho

tsekihiyo gayiy myaen' daey tsak trav daey malala vonda chuy no yivan

tsekihiyo gayiy myaen' daey Which rival of mine deluded you and took you away?

Why this hatred towards me? Does vour heart take pleasure in holding on to anger and disdain?


