


Indian Railways Is Backbone of Nation's Growth: LG Manoj Sinha

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Heavy snowfall hits life across J&K

SRINAGAR, JAN 27: The second heavy snowfall of the season in Jammu and Kashmir brought normal life to a halt on Tuesday, with air, rail, and road services suspended due to poor visibility and severe weather conditions.

According to the details available with the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO) snowfall began late Monday night in the Valley, with South Kashmir areas, including the Shopian plains, receiving heavy snowfall and a fresh accumulation of 14–15 inches.

Meanwhile, parts of North Kashmir, including Handwara, Gurez, Karna, and Uri, also received heavy snowfall, disrupting local interior roads in these areas.

BRO Rescues 60, Including 40 Soldiers, From Snowbound Chatergala Pass in Doda

Swift High-Altitude Operation Restores Critical Road Links in Doda and Rajouri Districts Amid Heavy Snowfall

JAMMU, JAN 27: In a major high-altitude rescue and road restoration operation, the Border Roads Organisation (BRO) on Tuesday successfully rescued 60 stranded persons, including 40 soldiers of the Rashtriya Rifles, from a snowbound stretch in Jammu and Kashmir's Doda district.

The operation was carried out under Project Sampark at the Chatergala Pass, located at an altitude

of about 10,500 feet on the Bhaderwah-Chatergala axis. A defence spokesman said the rescue was executed by the 118 Road Construction Company (RCC) of the 35 Border Roads Task Force (BRTF) after heavy snowfall, which lasted nearly 40 hours, buried the area under five to six feet of snow.

The clearance operation began on January 24, with BRO teams removing snow from nearly 38 km of road. By the evening of January 25, the route

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Nirmala Sitharaman Poised For Record Ninth Straight Union Budget

Finance Minister Set to Extend Unmatched Run Under Modi, Inch Closer to Morarji Desai's All-Time Milestone

NEW DELHI, JAN 27: Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman is set to create history on February 1 when she presents her ninth consecutive Union Budget, reinforcing her position as the longest-serving finance minister in terms of uninterrupted budget presentations in independent India.

The forthcoming Budget will bring Sitharaman closer to the over-

all record of 10 budgets presented by former Prime Minister Morarji Desai, who held the finance portfolio across multiple tenures. While Desai delivered his budgets over different periods, Sitharaman will continue to hold the distinction of presenting the highest number of budgets consecutively—nine in a row—under Prime Minister Narendra Modi.

Appointed as India's first full-time woman finance minister in

2019 following the BJP's second-term victory, Sitharaman has retained the key portfolio even after Modi returned to power for a third term in 2024. She has so far presented eight straight budgets, including an interim Budget in February last year.

Desai, who remains the finance minister with the highest number of budgets overall, presented 10 budgets between 1959 and 1969 under Prime Minister Jawaharlal

Nehru and Lal Bahadur Shastri. His tenure included both full and interim budgets, spread across two separate phases in office.

Among other former finance ministers, P Chidambaram ranks second, having presented the Union Budget on nine occasions under different governments. Pranab Mukherjee follows closely with eight budgets, while former Prime Minister Manmohan Singh

reduce accident risks, and strengthen infrastructure.

received approximately three feet of snowfall, while Sonamarg recorded around two feet.

Gagangeer and Kulan Gund recorded nearly one and a half feet of snow, and the Kangan area in Ganderbal district saw about four inches of accumulation.

A senior official said administration teams are working around the clock to clear snow and reopen national and district roads across the Valley.

WEATHER TO IMPROVE FROM WEDNESDAY
The Meteorological Department has forecast additional snowfall late Tuesday night, but conditions are expected to improve from Wednesday morning, with dry weather predicted for the next 48 hours.

Meanwhile, the India Meteorological Department (IMD) warned of fresh snowfall and possible avalanches in higher reaches of J&K over the next 48 hours. A senior IMD official said the recent snowfall across the Valley has left snow depths ranging between 1 to 2 feet along the Pir Panjal range, from Kulgam to Kupwara. Gulmarg recorded 31 cm of snow in the lower reaches, while upper areas reported between 1.5 to 2 feet of accumulation.

"The snowfall that began yesterday is expected to reduce by Tuesday evening. By Wednesday

morning, most parts of Jammu and Kashmir will see clear skies, though some residual snow may remain in isolated areas by Wednesday afternoon," the official said.

He added that a Western Disturbance is likely to bring light to moderate rain or snow in parts of Kashmir between Wednesday afternoon and Thursday, with heavy snowfall possible in areas along the Kullam-Kupwara axis.

The IMD has advised residents and visitors not to venture into higher reaches during the next 48 hours due to increased risk of snow avalanches. Locals in snow-prone areas have also been urged to exercise caution.

People travelling on national highways across the Union Territory have been asked to follow the guidance of law enforcement and local authorities to ensure safety, the official said.

ANOTHER WESTERN DISTURBANCE TO HIT J&K ON FEB 1, 2

The IMD predicted that another Western Disturbance is likely to hit J&K on February 1 and 2, bringing fresh precipitation to the region.

The Jammu and Kashmir UT Disaster Management Authority (JKUTDMA) has issued a high alert warning of a potential avalanche with a high danger level above 2,000 metres in Bandipora, Baramulla, Ganderbal, and Kupwara over the next 24 hours.

Residents and visitors have been advised to avoid avalanche-prone areas and strictly follow official safety instructions. In case of emergencies, people are urged to dial 112 for immediate assistance.

SNOWFALL MAKES TOURISTS HAPPY

Tourists in Kashmir are making the most of the second snowfall this week, especially in the higher altitude areas. Places like Gulmarg, Pahalgam, and Sonamarg have turned into stunning winter landscapes, drawing large numbers of visitors.

Many were spotted enjoying the snow, taking in the scenic views, and experiencing the region's enchanting winter atmosphere firsthand.

Furthermore, police personnel have assisted numerous people in reaching safer locations and provided help during medical emergencies amid heavy snowfall across the Valley, including in Sopore, Handwara, Bandipora, Ganderbal, and Kulgam.

underlining that the forthcoming Budget 2026-27 would be shaped by grassroots inputs, sectoral priorities and a firm commitment to transparency and inclusive development.

As part of the ongoing budget exercise, the Chief Minister first chaired an extensive interaction with representatives from industry and trade, tourism, hotel and hospitality, education, youth affairs and agriculture. Stakeholders highlighted sector-specific challenges and offered suggestions aimed at boosting economic growth, employment generation and regional development.

Addressing the participants, CM Omar Abdullah said the consultations were a meaningful exercise rather than a formality. "These interactions help bridge the gap between official assessments and ground realities. It is not possible for us, sitting in offices, to know everything, and such dialogues provide critical insights," he said.

He emphasised that the presence of senior ministers and top officials reflected the seriousness of the process. "If we were not committed to listening, we would not have brought the entire government machinery here. Wherever possible, your inputs will be reflected in the budget and our policy framework," the Chief Minister added.

The meeting was attended by Ministers Sakina Itoo, Javid Ahmed Dar and Satish Sharma; Chief Secretary Atal Dulloo; Additional Chief Secretary to the Chief Minister Dheeraj Gupta; senior officers from Finance, Tourism, Power Development, Industries and Commerce, Education and other departments.

Later, the Chief Minister chaired a separate pre-budget consultation with Members of the Legislative Assembly from Jammu and Samba districts to discuss sector-wise priorities and constituency-specific developmental needs. The legislators raised issues related to road infrastructure, healthcare and education upgradation, sports facilities, drinking water supply, tourism development and strengthening of basic amenities in urban and rural areas.

Addressing the MLAs, CM Omar Abdullah said the consultation process was continuous and aimed at ensuring meaningful participation of elected representatives in governance. He clarified that constituency-specific issues would be addressed during departmental grant discussions in the Assembly.

The Chief Minister also stressed strict transparency and accountability in the utilisation of 1,430 crore flood relief assistance received from the Government of India following the August floods. "The funds will not be distributed constituency-wise but allocated strictly on the basis of damage assessment and sectoral requirements," he said, assuring time-bound and transparent utilisation.

Senior officers, Deputy Commissioners of Jammu and Samba districts and heads of key departments attended the meeting, while outstation officials joined through video conferencing.

The elected representatives appreciated the initiative and expressed confidence that their inputs would be duly examined and reflected in the upcoming budget, paving the way for balanced and inclusive development across Jammu and Kashmir.

Addressing the legislators, Chief Minister Omar Abdullah said that the pre-budget consultations are part of a continuous and evolving process aimed at ensuring meaningful participation of elected representatives in shaping government priorities.

"I have reviewed the discussions held over the last few days. If we look at it from one side, this has been a continuous process. The good thing is that most of the issues raised were not repeated," the Chief Minister said.

He emphasised that the purpose of these meetings is consultation rather than formal responses. "You and I both know that the government's response to district development board meetings does not figure in these consultations. The objective here is to listen to you, understand your views and thoughts, and then translate them into policy and action," he said.

The Chief Minister explained that constituency-specific issues would be addressed during the budget discussions in the Assembly when departments present their grants. "Whether it is the establishment of a degree college, irrigation-related works or other sectoral issues, answers will come when the concerned ministers present their grants in the House," he added.

Referring to the funding received from the Government of India in the aftermath of the devastating floods that struck Jammu and Kashmir in August last year, Chief Minister Omar Abdullah stressed on ensuring complete transparency and accountability in utilisation.

"The flood relief amount of 1,430 crore received from the Government of India will not be distributed constituency-wise. Its distribution will be strictly based on the extent of damage and sectoral requirements," he said.

Reiterating the government's commitment, the Chief Minister assured the legislators that the funds would be utilised in a transparent and time-bound manner. "I assure you all that the money will be used properly, transparently, and all details will be placed before you," he added.

Earlier, the MLAs from Jammu and Samba districts highlighted a range of issues and projects requiring priority attention in the forthcoming budget. Key demands included road widening and new road projects, upgradation of health and educational institutions, enhancement of sports infrastructure, provision of potable drinking water, development of tourist destinations, strengthening healthcare facilities with adequate staffing, and establishment of new colleges and schools in their respective constituencies.

The elected representatives also stressed the need for focused interventions to improve basic amenities and accelerate socio-economic development across urban and rural areas of the twin districts.

The MLAs expressed gratitude to Chief Minister Omar Abdullah for initiating the pre-budget consultation process, appreciating the government's effort to incorporate grassroots perspectives and elected representatives' inputs into the budgetary framework. The Chief Minister assured them that all genuine concerns and constructive suggestions would be duly examined and reflected in the upcoming budget to ensure inclusive and regionally balanced development across Jammu and Kashmir.

J&K Speaker.....

On February 6, this fifth session of the Assembly will conclude on April 4.

"Preparations to ensure a smooth assembly session are underway. We have already held meetings with various departments. An all parties meeting will be convened before the session starts on February 2. The Business Advisory

Committee meeting is also scheduled before the Lieutenant Governor's address," Rather said.

The session will be held in three phases, the first before the start of Ramzan and the remaining two after Eid-ul-Fitr in March and April. Ramzan is expected to begin on February 18 or 19, depending on the sighting of the moon.

According to the provisional calendar issued by the assembly secretariat, February will have 18 days of business. Chief Minister Omar Abdullah, who also holds the finance portfolio, will witness the present the budget for the 2026-27 financial year and the Supplementary Statement of Expenditure for 2025-26 on February 6. March and April will have five and four days of business, respectively.

The speaker said the discussion on the motion of thanks to the Lieutenant Governor's address will start on February 3 and continue for three days. The Chief Minister is expected to reply to the debate on February 5. General discussion on the budget are slated for February 7, 9 and 10, followed by a reply from the chief minister.

As per the tentative calendar, seven days have been earmarked for the demand of grants between February 11 and 19, after which the Assembly will go into recess for one month and eight days. The session will resume on March 27 when the budget will be taken up for passing in the form of Appropriation bills.

As per calendar, March 28 and April 4 are reserved for government business. March 30 and April 1 are set aside for Private Member Bills, while March 31 and April 2 are for Private Member Resolutions.

Rather said that the provisional calendar will be placed before the Business Advisory Committee to be finalised. "My message to all legislators is to make proper use of the available time to raise public issues. People have high hopes and expect their concerns to be addressed. We should not waste the session on irrelevant matters; instead, we must remain focused on public issues and work sincerely towards finding solutions to their issues," the speaker added.

Fresh snowfall.....

Gulmarg to the pine valleys of Pahalgam and the beautiful waters of Dal Lake in Srinagar.

"We came all the way from Delhi hoping to see snow and the timing couldn't have been better," said Rahul Malhotra, a tourist enjoying the snowfall.

"The whole Valley looks magical, like a beautiful picture coming alive," he added.

The fresh snowfall and the heaviest so far this winter blanketed most parts of Kashmir, including Srinagar, on Tuesday much to the delight of tourists and locals alike.

Travel operators told KNO the spell has reigned winter tourism after a quiet start to January. "Tourism is clearly picking up pace now," said Rouf Tramboo, President of the Travel Agents Association of Kashmir (TAAK).

He said they are witnessing a surge in arrivals across destinations. "Most hotels and tour packages for the next few weeks are already booked. Fresh snowfall has given the much-needed boost to winter tourism," he said, urging the government to reopen closed tourist destinations.

Echoing the sentiment, Tawfeeq Ahmad, owner of Connect Kashmir Mobile and Travel Services, said inquiries and bookings have surged sharply since last week. "We have been getting non-stop calls since the snowfall began. Gulmarg and Pahalgam have heavy bookings for the coming weekend and even Srinagar houseboats are receiving a large number of inquiries," he told KNO.

Locals associated with tourism say the revival comes as a relief after weeks of unusually dry weather. "Business was down earlier this month, but this snow has changed everything," said Bilal Ahmad, who runs a cafe near Dal Lake.

"Tourists are back and so is the buzz we were missing." —(KNO)

4 killed.....

The accident took place around 11 am near the Jakhani-Chenani area on the Jammu-Srinagar National Highway.

Officials said a bus travelling from Doda to Jammu lost control, hit a motorcycle, and then rammed into a load carrier that was parked on the roadside for repairs. A mechanic and the load carrier driver died on the spot. Two passengers travelling in the bus were thrown out through an emergency window and later succumbed to their injuries while being taken to hospital.

The deceased have been identified as Sanjeev Kumar, a mechanic from Udhampur; Rayes Ahmad of Badgam; and Mukesh Prajapati, a CRPF jawan posted in Kishtwar, who was on his way to his home in Madhya Pradesh on leave.

Another passenger, Bimla Devi, was injured in the accident and has been admitted to Government Medical College Hospital, Udhampur. Her condition is stated to be stable.

Lieutenant Governor Manoj Sinha and Chief Minister Omar Abdullah as per news agency Kashmir Indepth News Service (KINS) expressed deep sorrow over the loss of lives. In his condolence message, the Lt Governor said he was deeply pained by the tragic accident and extended heartfelt condolences to the bereaved families, while praying for the speedy recovery of the injured. Chief Minister Omar Abdullah also conveyed his condolences and prayed for strength to the affected families during this difficult time. Meanwhile, Jammu Police have registered a case. (KINS)

The order, citing a legal opinion from the Department of Law, Justice and Parliamentary Affairs, clarifies that the tenure is governed by the Jammu and Kashmir Panchayati Raj Rules, 1996.

"Kind attention is invited towards the captioned subject. In this regard, it is to inform that as per the opinion rendered by the Department of Law, Justice and Parliamentary Affairs, citing relevant provisions of the Jammu and Kashmir Panchayati Raj Rules, 1996 (Sub-Rule (2) and (3) of Rule 108ZP), the term of the DDCs commences from the date of issuance of the notification constituting the Councils (February 25, 2021). Accordingly, the Councils shall cease to exist with effect from February 24, 2026," the order reads.

The government has directed concerned authorities to inform the respective

plex will be started soon and shall be completed within 18 months. He also said that National e-Vidhan Application (NeVA) will be partially introduced in this session to encourage paperless functioning. He added that NeVA will be fully implemented in the next assembly session.

While reviewing the arrangements for media personal, the Speaker emphasized the importance of taking necessary measures to prevent inconvenience to journalists covering the proceedings. He instructed the Assembly Secretariat officers to prepare and issue entry passes for journalists in coordination with the Information Department well in advance for their unhindered entry into the assembly complex.

It also exposes SHG members to modern branding and packaging, giving them insights into customer preferences and a rare experience of a larger marketplace.

Visitors can expect stalls representing multiple states, featuring everything from handloom and handicraft pieces to authentic regional cuisine. The mela unfolds as a meeting point of hands and habits, painted wood, slow-cooked food and customs carried from home with each stall shaped by the place it comes from and the people who stand behind it.

For the women behind the stalls, Saras Mela is a chance to step outside their villages and place their work before new eyes. What they have made over months is met with questions, interest and at times, quiet approval. At each stall, each sale is more than a transaction, as it represents a step towards independence, greater confidence and new possibilities.

The Quiet Mind That Defined a Generation of Thought

Remembering Syed Saeed Ahmad Khurshid Bukhari, a teacher-poet who kept Kashmir's classical intellect alive





Syed Saeed Ahmad Khurshid Bukhari occupies a distinctive place in Kashmir's intellectual and literary history—one shaped not by noise or notoriety, but by depth, discipline, and enduring influence. A man of learning, restraint, and moral clarity, he represented a generation of scholars for whom knowledge was a trust and culture a responsibility.

Born in 1944 into a family known for scholarship and refinement, Bukhari inherited a tradition that valued learning as the cornerstone of social and moral life. This inheritance defined his temperament and informed every sphere of his engagement—education, literature, and faith.

From an early age, he gravitated toward classical learning, developing a deep command of Arabic and Persian. These languages, central to Kashmir's intellectual heritage, shaped his literary sensibility and critical outlook. Their influence was evident in his prose and poetry, marked by linguistic elegance, conceptual clarity, and measured expression.

After completing his formal education, Bukhari joined the Education Department as a teacher. For



him, teaching was not a bureaucratic role but a calling. He believed education was as much about shaping character and conscience as it was about imparting information. His classrooms became spaces of thoughtful inquiry, ethical reflection, and cultural grounding—qualities that left a lasting

impression on generations of students.

In literary circles, Bukhari was known as a seasoned poet, a reflective writer, and a discerning critic. His poetry drew upon classical traditions while engaging deeply with human experience and spiritual contemplation. Free from excess and ornamentation, his work carried a quiet authority rooted in sincerity and intellectual discipline.

As an author, he produced several respected works that earned recognition among scholars and readers alike. His writings are distinguished by intellectual maturity, stylistic restraint, and linguistic precision. His final and most significant book, Kanerch Raat, stands as a culmination of his creative journey and intellectual evolution.

Bukhari's life was equally grounded in religious and social engagement. Closely associated with the historic Jamia Masjid in Srinagar, he regularly participated in scholarly and religious discussions. His engagement with the Qur'an and Islamic studies reflected balance and depth, marked by reflection rather than rhetoric.

Personally, he was defined by simplicity, integrity, and quiet dignity. He shunned self-promotion and remained distant from public acclaim, choosing instead a life of consistent service to knowledge and culture. In doing so, he came to embody a living intellectual tradition—one increasingly rare in an age of spectacle.

Syed Saeed Ahmad Khurshid Bukhari passed away on August 25, 1993. Though his voice fell silent, his influence did not. Through his teaching, writing, and example, he continues to shape Kashmir's cultural and intellectual memory—proof that the most enduring legacies are often built in silence.

Kashmir Valley Transforms into a Winter Wonderland

As winter finally settles across the Himalayas, the Kashmir Valley once again transforms into a sweeping winter wonderland. Fresh snowfall cloaks mountains, plains, forests and wetlands in pristine white, reshaping the region into a landscape of striking beauty and deep ecological importance. Yet this arrival carries a quieter undertone. The snow, though enchanting, has appeared later than expected, raising concerns about the environmental consequences of delayed snowfall on the Valley's fragile natural systems.

The recent snow brought by western disturbances marks the onset of Chillai Kalan, traditionally the harshest phase of Kashmir's winter. Historically, snowfall during this period followed a predictable rhythm, gradually building a protective cover that sustained ecosystems through months of cold. In recent years, however, winters have grown increasingly erratic. Delayed snowfall, extended dry spells and sudden temperature fluctuations are disrupting climatic patterns that both nature and communities have relied upon for generations.

Across Srinagar and its surrounding areas, winter reshapes familiar landscapes. Chinar trees stand draped in white, their bare branches forming intricate patterns against muted skies. The Zabarwan range appears softened by snow, while the Jhelum River flows through a subdued cityscape. Mughal gardens lie silent beneath snow, revealing geometric elegance in winter stillness. Beneath this calm, however, lies an environmental imbalance triggered by late snow accumulation.

Snowfall plays a critical role in insulating soil and regulating ground temperatures. When snow arrives late, prolonged exposure to cold air causes deeper soil freezing, damaging plant roots and reducing the soil's capacity to retain moisture. Orchards, particularly apple plantations that anchor Kashmir's rural economy, are vulnerable to such stress. Delayed snow limits gradual moisture recharge essential for spring flowering, affecting yields and long term soil health.

The consequences of delayed snowfall become even more pronounced in the Valley's wetlands. Dal Lake and marshlands



such as Hokarsar, Haigam, Mirgund and Shalbugh serve as winter lifelines for migratory birds arriving from Central Asia, Siberia and northern Europe. These birds time their journeys to coincide with historical winter conditions in Kashmir, where wetlands remained partially ice free and rich in food resources.

When snowfall is delayed, wetlands experience extended dry or semi frozen conditions without the insulating benefit of snow. Water temperatures fluctuate, aquatic vegetation suffers and insect populations decline. Birds arriving on schedule often encounter degraded feeding conditions, forcing them to expend additional energy searching for sustenance. Once snow finally arrives, freezing can be abrupt, compressing feeding opportunities into a shorter window.

Large congregations of birds are then pushed into shrinking open water patches, intensifying competition and increasing vulnerability to stress and disease. Wetlands that once functioned as stable winter refuges face heightened ecological pressure as seasonal cycles compress. Human disturbance during this sensitive period can further weaken the ability of migratory species to survive winter in the Valley.

Forested ecosystems across Kashmir

are similarly affected. Delayed snowfall allows wildlife to remain at higher altitudes longer than usual, altering migration and foraging patterns. When heavy snow eventually falls, animals descend rapidly toward lower elevations, often into human dominated landscapes. This sudden movement increases the likelihood of human-wildlife conflict and places added pressure on already fragmented forest corridors.

Snow also governs the Valley's hydrological cycle. Gradual accumulation followed by slow melt replenishes springs, streams and aquifers. Delayed snowfall followed by sudden warming causes rapid runoff rather than absorption, reducing groundwater recharge. This threatens water availability during early summer and weakens the ecological link between winter precipitation and agricultural sustainability.

Winter tourism, while visually enhanced by fresh snowfall, is not immune to these shifts. Destinations such as Gulmarg, Pahalgam and Sonamarg depend on consistent snow cover for seasonal livelihoods. Delayed snowfall shortens the tourism window, creating economic uncertainty. Discussions around artificial snowmaking raise additional environmental concerns, including water extraction and energy use in sensitive alpine zones.

Despite these concerns, snowfall still brings renewal. Snow binds landscapes, ecosystems and communities in a shared seasonal experience. It restores visual harmony and replenishes moisture-starved land, even when late. Yet timing now matters as much as presence.

Conservationists warn that protecting Kashmir's winter environment now requires a more integrated approach that recognises snow as an ecological resource rather than a seasonal inconvenience. Wetland restoration, protection of inflow channels, regulation of construction near lakes and stricter control of winter disturbance are increasingly viewed as essential safeguards. Forest conservation, particularly maintaining continuous corridors, is equally vital as wildlife movement patterns shift in response to erratic snowfall.

Public awareness has also emerged as a critical component of winter resilience. Understanding how delayed snowfall affects water security, food systems and biodiversity can encourage more responsible behaviour during peak winter months. Reduced pollution, mindful tourism practices and respect for sensitive habitats can collectively ease pressure on ecosystems already strained by climate variability.

The future of Kashmir's winters will likely depend on how effectively environmental planning adapts to changing patterns. Scientific monitoring of snowfall trends, groundwater recharge and migratory bird populations is becoming indispensable. Integrating traditional ecological knowledge with modern climate research may offer pathways to sustain the Valley's delicate balance.

In this evolving landscape, winter remains both a warning and a promise. Snow continues to define Kashmir's identity, but its shifting rhythm signals the need for deeper understanding and protection. Preserving the Valley's winter wonderland now means safeguarding the timing, quality and ecological role of snowfall itself, ensuring that beauty and balance endure together for generations to come.

Only by recognising winter as a living system, rather than a static season, can Kashmir hope to navigate the uncertainties ahead. The snow that arrives, early or late, carries lessons about limits, resilience and responsibility, reminding all who witness it that nature's timing remains central to survival in the Himalayan heartland. That truth now defines the Valley's future more than ever before collectively.



Pain is a universal human experience that extends beyond the physical body to include emotional and psychological dimensions. Across cultures and philosophical traditions, pain has often been interpreted as the outcome of one's deeds or actions. This belief can be metaphorically described as an emotion cord—an invisible linkage connecting experiences, emotions, behaviour and suffering. While ancient interpretations viewed this connection in moral or spiritual terms, contemporary science provides a framework to understand how emotions and actions shape pain in tangible biological ways.


Modern medical science recognises that pain is not merely a sensory phenomenon arising from tissue damage, but a complex biopsychosocial process. Physical injury may initiate pain, yet emotional states, past experiences and cognitive interpretations significantly influence its intensity, duration and recurrence. The traditional notion that pain is the result of deeds can be scientifically understood as the cumulative impact of behavioural choices, emotional conditioning and stress-induced neurophysiological changes over time. The concept of the emotion cord symbolically represents this enduring connection between emotional experiences and pain responses.

The emotion cord is not an anatomical structure but a psychological and neurobiological construct. It refers to the persistent neural and emotional pathways formed by repeated emotional experiences such as fear, guilt, anger or unresolved trauma. From a neuroscientific perspective,

emotional experiences are encoded in interconnected brain regions, particularly the amygdala, hippocampus, prefrontal cortex and insular cortex. Recurrent emotional stress strengthens synaptic connections within these networks, creating durable neural circuits that influence perception, decision-making and physiological responses. Over time, these reinforced pathways form what can metaphorically be described as an emotion cord, linking emotional history with present pain. This explains why emotional pain and physical pain share overlapping neural mechanisms, allowing emotional distress to manifest as bodily discomfort.

The philosophical assertion that pain arises from deeds closely aligns with principles of behavioural and psychosomatic medicine. Deeds, in this context, can be understood as lifestyle choices, habitual emotional reactions, coping strategies and recurring thought patterns. Chronic stress, for example, often develops from prolonged maladaptive responses to life events. This sustained stress activates the hypothalamic-pituitary-adrenal axis, leading to continuous cortisol release, immune dysregulation, systemic inflammation and increased pain sensitivity. Poor emotional regulation, unhealthy habits and negative cognitive appraisals gradually translate into biological changes that predispose individuals to chronic pain conditions. Pain, therefore, emerges not as a form of punishment, but as a physiological consequence of cumulative emotional and behavioural processes.

Psychological research has firmly established that pain perception is subjective and strongly modulated by cognitive and emotional factors. Attention plays a crucial role, as excessive focus on pain intensifies its perception, while distraction can significantly reduce its severity. Interpretation is equally important; catastrophic thinking amplifies pain signals through cortical feedback mechanisms, reinforcing suffering. Emotional states such as anxiety and depression lower pain thresholds by alter-



ing neurotransmitter systems, particularly serotonin, dopamine and norepinephrine. Memory and conditioning further contribute to pain persistence, as past painful experiences train the nervous system to anticipate pain even in the absence of ongoing tissue damage, thereby strengthening the emotion cord. Social and cultural influences also shape pain experiences, as social support has been shown to mitigate pain, whereas isolation and loneliness exacerbate it, highlighting the interpersonal dimension of pain psychology.

Neurobiological studies using functional imaging techniques reveal that emotional pain activates the same brain regions involved in physical pain, espe-

cially the anterior cingulate cortex and the insula. This neural overlap explains why emotional wounds such as grief, loss or social rejection often produce real physical sensations, including chest tightness, headaches or gastrointestinal discomfort. Chronic emotional stress can sensitise nociceptive pathways through a process known as central sensitisation, in which the nervous system remains in a prolonged state of heightened reactivity, amplifying even minor stimuli into significant pain experiences.

Effective pain management therefore requires addressing both physical and emotional components, essentially weakening or "cutting" the emotion cord. Cognitive Behavioural Therapy plays a key role

by restructuring maladaptive beliefs, reducing pain catastrophising and diminishing the emotional reinforcement of pain pathways. Mindfulness and meditation practices help downregulate amygdala activity and strengthen prefrontal cortical control, thereby reducing emotional reactivity and perceived pain intensity. Emotional processing and acceptance are equally important, as acknowledging emotions without suppression prevents their conversion into somatic symptoms and allows the nervous system to recalibrate. Lifestyle modifications, including regular physical activity, adequate sleep and balanced nutrition, improve neurochemical balance and enhance resilience against pain. Social connection, a sense of purpose and compassion activate reward and bonding circuits in the brain, counteracting pain-related neural networks and promoting healing.

Emerging research in medical science suggests that emotional retraining can rewire pain pathways through neural plasticity. Integrative approaches that combine medical treatment, psychological intervention and contemplative practices are increasingly redefining pain management, shifting the focus toward prevention, emotional literacy and long-term well-being.

The concept of the emotion cord provides a powerful metaphor for understanding the enduring link between emotions, behaviour and pain. Scientifically, pain can be viewed as a learned and modifiable experience shaped by neural plasticity and psychological processes. When pain is understood not as an isolated symptom but as a meaningful signal of emotional and behavioural imbalance, new pathways for holistic healing emerge. Interpreting pain as a consequence of deeds—through lifestyle choices, emotional regulation and cognition—empowers individuals to actively participate in their recovery and cultivate sustained physical and mental health.

36TH UTLCC

CS favours tech-driven measures, real time coordination to curb cyber frauds

JAMMU, JAN 27: Chief Secretary, Atal Dulloo today emphasised the need for robust technology-driven solutions, strengthened enforcement mechanisms and real-time coordination among regulators and law enforcement agencies to effectively curb cyber frauds and online financial scams.

Chairing the 36th Union Territory Level Coordination Committee (UTLCC) meeting, convened by the Reserve Bank of India (RBI), Jammu, the Chief Secretary asserted that comprehensive technological interventions, coupled with stringent legal action, are imperative to safeguard the public from the menace of cyber-enabled financial frauds.

The UTLCC is a statutory coordination forum constituted by the Ministry of Finance to ensure close cooperation among regulators and enforcement agencies, curb unauthorised deposit-taking and other unregulated financial activities, and facilitate sharing of market intelligence.

The meeting was attended by the Regional Director, RBI, Jammu; Principal Secretary, Home Department; IGP Crime; Commissioner Secretary, Law; Director, Information; Director, Industries, Jammu, and other senior officers.

Senior officials including GM, RBI; Registrar of Cooperatives; Market Intelligence Unit, RBI, along with representatives of SEBI and ICAI, also participated.

Taking serious note of instances of cyber fraud and online cheating reported in the UT, the Chief Secretary directed that the strictest possible action be taken against offenders under the relevant provisions of the Banning of Unregulated Deposit Schemes (BUDS) Act, which has now been operationalised in Jammu and Kashmir.

He called upon the RBI and law enforcement agencies to

clearly define and streamline cyber regulatory protocols for swift and effective enforcement. Stressing on public awareness, the Chief Secretary directed the Department of Information and Public Relations (DIPR), J&K, to publish awareness campaigns in local newspapers and across official social media platforms, in coordination with RBI Jammu, particularly highlighting the importance of investing only in RBI-authorised and white listed entities.

The Chief Secretary further urged regulatory authorities, including the Registrar of Companies (RoC), to proactively share details of unregistered and suspicious entities with law enforcement agencies to enable timely action against repeat offenders.

He also underscored the need for capacity building and sensitisation of police and defence personnel to effectively deal with financial frauds and cyber crimes.

Highlighting financial safety initiatives, Atal Dulloo stressed the importance of the Unified Lending Interface (ULI) introduced by RBI to make lending and investment processes safer and more transparent.

He also called for onboarding J&K Bank on enhanced RBI safety and cyber security parameters to further strengthen the digital payments ecosystem in the UT.

The Chief Secretary reiterated the need for firm action against fraudulent mobile applications, websites, Nidhi companies and other unregistered or unregulated entities involved in duping the people of Jammu and Kashmir.

Earlier, Chandrashekhar Azad, Regional Director, RBI, Jammu & Kashmir and Ladakh, apprised the meeting of various initiatives undertaken by the Reserve Bank of India to curb cyber frauds and financial crimes. He stressed the importance of a collaborative and coordinated approach

among regulators, enforcement agencies and other stakeholders.

He highlighted the launch of exclusive internet domains 'bank.in' for banks and 'fin.in' for NBFCs to prevent the creation of deceptive websites impersonating financial institutions. He also informed that, as per RBI guidelines, regulated entities are using verified customer care numbers published on the Sanchar Saathi portal, with '1600xx' series for service calls and '140xx' series for promotional calls, to curb fraudulent communication.

The meeting was further apprised about the Digital Payments Intelligence Platform (DPIP) being developed by RBI as a national-level, real-time fraud intelligence-sharing system connecting banks, payment service providers, regulators and law enforcement agencies. Moreover it was divulged that a Mule Hunter AI, a system-wide platform to identify and flag mule accounts used for illegal fund transfers, has already been implemented in 23 banks.

Addressing the growing menace of fake digital lending applications, it was given out that RBI has operationalised a Digital Lending Apps (DLA) directory on its website, listing only those apps deployed by RBI-regulated entities. The revised Digital Lending Directions issued in May 2025, which lay down strict norms on recovery practices, data privacy and grievance redressal was also highlighted during this meeting.

It was further revealed that RBI has significantly enhanced its financial awareness initiatives, including conducting 67 awareness programmes across districts in 2025, intensified outreach under the "RBI Kehta Hai" campaign, and dissemination of fraud alerts and safe financial practices through various government departments.

Omar govt exposed of its double face: BJP

BJP flays Omar Abdullah govt for gross failure in snowfall management, accuse it of regional bias

JAMMU, JAN 27: Bharatiya Janata Party spokespersons Dr. Abhijeet Singh Jasrotia and Dr. Hari Dutt Shishu, along with Dr. Pardeep Mahotra, Media Incharge BJP, strongly criticized the Omar Abdullah-led government for its utter failure to provide relief to the public and stranded tourists amid heavy snowfall across Jammu & Kashmir.

Addressing a joint press conference at party headquarters, Trikuta Nagar, Jammu, the BJP leaders accused the government of adopting a biased, selective, and apathetic approach in addressing public grievances.



Launching a scathing attack on the Chief Minister, Dr. Abhijeet Singh Jasrotia said it is a matter of deep concern and shock that while Omar Abdullah is being seen enjoying snow scooter rides in the snow-clad tourist resort of Gulmarg, he appears completely indifferent to the misery and suffering of people living in the higher reaches of the Jammu province. He pointed out that vast areas including upper reaches of Poonch, Kishtwar, Ramban, Baflia, Bani, Lohar Malhar and several other regions remain totally cut off from the rest of the Union Territory.

Dr. Jasrotia highlighted that these areas are facing a complete breakdown of essential services, with no transportation facilities, no mobile connectivity, and no access to basic healthcare, forcing residents to endure extreme hardship in harsh weather conditions. He alleged that the entire administrative machinery has been diverted to select areas only, exposing the government's regional apathy and discriminatory mindset. "Does the Omar Abdullah government represent only one region?" Dr. Jasrotia questioned, asserting that such governance reflects a complete failure of leadership and responsibility.

He asserted that it is unbecoming of a Chief Minister to act based on regional, religious, or any other ulterior considerations, especially during times of natural calamity, and demanded immediate, equitable, and effective intervention across all affected regions.

India on path to develop two nanometer chips: Vaishnaw

NEW DELHI, JAN 27: Minister of Electronics and Information Technology Ashwini Vaishnaw on Tuesday expressed confidence that as the country moves towards 2029, and the Semicon 2.0 (second phase of country's semiconductor mission to expand chip making) matures, India will become a major player in the semiconductor industry.

The minister shared that the country has mapped out the path from going to 28 nanometer to 7 nanometer, 7 to 3 nanometer, adding that the country has studied as to how Taiwan, Japan, South Korea and other nations have taken

forward this journey regarding chip building, and after studying all of this, also based on the talent India has, the nation has chalked out a path towards 2 nano meters.

Vaishnaw exuded confidence, claiming that the world now believes that by 2035 India will be amongst most important semiconductor nations in the world.

Speaking on the sidelines of an event in New Delhi on Tuesday, Vaishnaw stated that the country is going to create its own Intellectual Property in six systems including Radio Frequency, networking, power, sensor and memory under its semiconductor mission.

Vaishnaw said that upon completion of four years of the



country's semiconductor mission, around ten projects are under development, while production on four is going to begin in this year.

He also shared that so far 24 project startups that have come forward in the domain have designed semiconductor chips, while in over 300 institutions, the students have been imparted skills and training for designing semiconductor chips.

Vaishnaw, who was addressed a gathering of chip designs startups here, said that the conversion is taking place, and the country is becoming not just a service provider, but also a product nation.

US President Donald Trump hails return of final Israeli hostage's remains

WASHINGTON, JAN 27: US President Donald Trump, celebrating the return of the final deceased Israeli hostage from Gaza, hailed the recovery effort, expressing his disbelief at a task he thought impossible.

"Just recovered the last Hostage body in GAZA. Thus, got back ALL 20 of the living Hostages, and ALL of the Dead! AMAZING JOB! Most thought of it as an impossible thing to do. Congratulations to my great team of Champions!!!"

he wrote on Truth Social.

Trump's top aide and son-in-law Jared Kushner explaining the retrieval, hailed the coordination between the US, Israel, Egypt, Turkey, Qatar and "many cooperative Gazans" who helped locate and facilitate the return of all the deceased hostages from Gaza. "Coordination and trust were built between individuals and organisations where none previously existed. This produced tangible results," Kushner wrote in an X post.

Process On To Impeach Justice Varma, Govt Awaiting Probe Panel Report:

NEW DELHI, JAN 27: The process to impeach Allahabad High Court judge Yashwant Varma is underway and the government is awaiting the report of a three-member committee set up by Lok Sabha Speaker Om Birla to probe charges against him, Parliamentary Affairs Minister Kiren Rijiju said on



Tuesday.

Birla set up the committee on August 12 last year to probe corruption charges against Justice Varma after admitting a multi-party notice for his removal.

Justice Varma was repatriated from the Delhi High Court to the Allahabad High Court after burnt wads of currency notes were found at his official residence here on March 14. Asked whether the matter will be taken up before the upcoming Budget session of Parliament beginning Wednesday, Rijiju refused to comment further on the issue.

"As per the procedure, the matter has been referred to the committee constituted by the Speaker with the consent of the House and the process is on," he told reporters.

"While the committee is discharging its duty, we are waiting for the report to come. Before that, I cannot pass any comment," Rijiju said.

The inquiry committee comprises Supreme Court judge Justice Aravind Kumar, Madras High Court Chief Justice Manindra Mohan Shrivastava and senior Karnataka High Court advocate B V Acharya.

After referring to relevant laws and judgements of the Supreme Court, the Delhi High Court chief justice found that the charges against Justice Varma were of serious nature and followed it up with the "in-house procedure".

Officials aware of the procedure to appoint and remove Supreme Court and high court judges pointed out that while defending his case before lawmakers in any House of Parliament, Justice Varma can announce that he is quitting and his verbal statement will be considered as his resignation.

If Justice Varma decides to resign, he will be entitled for pension and other benefits entitled to a retired high court judge. But if he is removed by Parliament, he will be deprived of pension and other benefits, the officials noted.

Campaigning kick off for Japan's snap general election

TOKYO, JAN 27: Campaigning for Japan's Feb. 8 snap general election officially kicked off across the country on Tuesday with all 465 seats in the House of Representatives up for contest.

The primary focus of the election is whether the ruling coalition of the Liberal Democratic Party (LDP) and the Japan Innovation Party (JIP) will secure a majority and allow the administration of Prime Minister Sanae Takaichi to continue, or whether the opposition will expand its strength and block that outcome. Of the 465 lower house seats, 289 will be elected from single-member districts and 176 through proportional representation in 11 regional blocs. National broadcaster NHK said more

than 1,200 candidates are expected to run. The NHK predicts that parties will wage heated debates during the campaign over the Takaichi government's response to inflation, as well as foreign and security policies.

The LDP previously held 199 seats in the lower house, and its coalition ally, JIP, held 34. Takaichi, also president of the LDP, said during a party leaders' debate on Monday that she would step down immediately if the ruling bloc fails to secure a majority in the upcoming election. The new opposition party Centrist Reform Alliance, formally launched earlier this month, has become Japan's main opposition party with 165 lower house lawmakers. The new alliance between the Constitutional Democratic Party of Japan and Komeito, a former

ally of the LDP, aims to defeat the conservative ruling bloc in the upcoming contest.

On Jan. 23, Takaichi dissolved the House of Representatives for a snap election, marking the first dissolution at the start of a regular parliamentary session in 60 years. The decision has drawn criticism for giving voters little time to assess competing policy proposals, with the campaign period lasting just 12 days -- the shortest in Japan's postwar history.

Opposition parties have also slammed Takaichi's plan, saying she is putting political considerations ahead of parliament's enactment of an initial budget for fiscal 2026 starting in April, despite her pledge to prioritize policy implementation.

SC pulls up BCI over denial of honorarium, travel facilities for retired judges overseeing bar council elections

NEW DELHI, JAN 27: The Supreme Court on Tuesday questioned the Bar Council of India (BCI) over its failure to provide adequate honorarium and travel allowances to retired High Court judges appointed to monitor State Bar Council elections.

A Bench comprising Chief Justice of India Surya Kant, Justice R. Mahadevan, and Justice Joymalya Bagchi took up the issue following an oral mentioning by senior advocate V. Giri, a member of the High-Powered Election Supervisory Committee constituted by the Court.

Giri submitted that the honorarium payable to members of the High-Powered Election Committees must be commensurate with their stature, as many of them are former Chief Justices or judges of High Courts.

He informed the Bench that when this concern was raised before the BCI, it responded that such payments would be "too much" and not feasible.

Seeking the Court's intervention, Giri requested that either appropriate directions be issued or that Justice (retd.) Sudhanshu Dhulia is authorised to take necessary steps.

He also placed before the Bench the BCI's response addressed to Justice Dhulia.

In addition, Giri flagged that the BCI had constituted a separate committee for conducting Rajasthan Bar Council elections on the grounds that Rajasthan was not mentioned in the Supreme Court's order dated November 18, 2024, by which High-Powered Election Committees were constituted.

He submitted that the move was contrary to both the letter and spirit of the Court's directions and pointed out that the committee had already notified the elections.

Questioning the BCI's stance, the Bench asked its counsel why Rajasthan was excluded and why a separate committee was constituted without informing the Court.

The Supreme Court directed the BCI to explain by the next day why it had taken such a step.

The Bench also expressed strong displeasure over the denial of travel allowances to committee members. "You fixed the election fee on the ground that it would generate sufficient funds for conducting elections. Now you are telling retired judges that you cannot pay them honorarium or travel allowances. What will they do? Do they have their own aircraft?" the Chief Justice remarked.

Giri further informed the Court that committee members were required to make travel bookings at their own expense and that the facilities provided were not befitting former High Court judges, let alone former Chief Justices.

He submitted that the BCI's proposal was only for reimbursement, which would take considerable time.

While the BCI's counsel stated that an affidavit proposing payments had been filed, the Bench asked the Council to file a detailed response on both issues by the next day, cautioning it against inviting coercive orders.

The Supreme Court had earlier, on September 24 last year, directed the conduct of elections in Bar Councils where polls were due.

Subsequently, on November 18, it constituted High-Powered Election Committees headed by former High Court Chief Justices and comprising former High Court judges to oversee each State Bar Council election.

SC moots auction of offenders' assets to ensure compensation for acid attack victims

NEW DELHI, JAN 27: The Supreme Court today suggested the adoption of stricter and more deterrent measures to address acid attack cases, observing that offenders' properties could be auctioned if they are unable to compensate victims.

A Bench, comprising Chief Justice of India (CJI) Surya Kant and Justice Joymalya Bagchi, was hearing a public interest litigation seeking comprehensive directions on the handling of acid attack cases.

Emphasising the gravity of such offences, the Bench underscored that punishments must be severe enough to act as an effective deterrent.

The Court observed that compensation to victims is non-negotiable and must be ensured even if it requires the sale of the offender's assets. "If the accused cannot pay

compensation, why not attach all assets and then auction them to pay off the victim?" the CJI remarked during the hearing.

Stating that acid attacks demand a response beyond routine legal consequences, the Bench noted that conventional reformatory theories may not be adequate in such cases.

"Some extraordinary punitive measures are needed beyond the letter of the law. Unless the action is so painful for the accused, it will not work," the CJI observed.

The Court directed all States and union Territories to place on record comprehensive data on acid attack cases across the country. It asked the governments to submit year-wise details of reported incidents, the status of charge-sheets, the number of cases decided, and those pending.

Further, the Bench sought victim-specific information, including

academic qualifications, employment status, marital status, medical treatment undergone, expenses incurred or likely to be incurred, and details of rehabilitation schemes, if any, extended to acid attack survivors.

The Court granted four weeks' time for compliance.

During the proceedings, the Bench reiterated that acid attacks are offences of extreme seriousness, comparable to other grave crimes against women, and warrant stringent legal responses.

The CJI also asked the union government to examine whether legislative intervention or legal reforms were necessary to address acid attacks more effectively.

Addressing Additional Solicitor General Archana Pathak Dave, the CJI observed, "Think of some legislative intervention... this is not less serious than dowry death also."

India-EU FTA underscores major shift in regional power dynamics besides boosting economic ties

NEW DELHI, JAN 27: The historic Free Trade Agreement (FTA) between India and the 27-nation European Union (EU) is not just a deal that will immensely benefit both sides; it also underscores a major shift in regional power dynamics by going beyond traditional commerce to create a strategic "Third Pole" in the US-China-dominated global economy.

In international relations, the strategic "Third Pole" is used to describe an emerging global power, particularly India, acting as a balancer in a multipolar world. In other words, India is emerging as a third, independent pole to avoid over-reliance on a US-China (G2) binary framework.

For India, the deal, described as "mother of all deals," provides a huge alternative market to offset the impact of US tariffs and the economic and diplomatic onslaught by the Trump administration. For the EU, it is a cornerstone of its China strategy, aimed at reducing industrial and technological dependence on Beijing.

According to a Joint Statement issued after the 16th India-EU Summit here, the "historic deal is a milestone in the India-EU Strategic Partnership" that will significantly enhance bilateral trade and investment ties, drive shared prosperity, strengthen

resilient and diversified supply chains, and support sustainable and inclusive growth.

The Joint Statement described the signing of the Security and Defence Partnership as the first such overarching Defence and security framework between the two sides that will deepen ties in the domains of maritime security, defence industry and technology, cyber and hybrid threats, space, and counter terrorism, among others.

The two sides also launched negotiations on a Security of Information Agreement that will facilitate the exchange of classified information and pave the way for stronger cooperation in areas related to security and defence.

Even though both India and the EU described the FTA as a "landmark" Agreement and "mother of all deals," major economic powers, the United States and China, see it as a threat to their economic dominance. The US has reacted with anger and indignation.

US Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent said that by opening trade with India, Europe is indirectly

financing the Russia-Ukraine war. The US argues that Europe continues to buy refined fuel from India made from Russian crude oil.

The US is clearly miffed that both India and the EU finalised the FTA even as India-US trade negotiations remain stalled. Some US officials view it as a "declaration of independence" by two major partners in a world of trade fragmentation.

China sees the FTA as a challenge to its economic dominance and said Beijing is monitoring it closely. China is concerned because the India-EU FTA could cause a significant shift of European investment, production, and R&D away from China to India. This means a huge financial loss to China worth hundreds of billions of Euros annually. Beijing also sees the FTA as a dent in the EU's dependence on Chinese critical technologies.

Pakistan views the FTA as India's growing economic might. A stronger economy, coupled with the Strategic Defence Partnership, is viewed by Islamabad as a major boost to India's Defence capabilities. Also, Pakistan sees it as a challenge to its trade status with the EU.

Pakistan, which has duty-free access to the EU under the GSP scheme, fears that the FTA will diminish its comparative advantage over India in key sectors like textiles, leather, and apparel.

(The EU has given Pakistan GSP (Generalised Scheme of Preferences Plus) status, granting duty-free or preferential tariffs on over 66 per cent of its tariff lines, primarily benefiting textiles and garments.

In the present global uncertainties, closer economic ties between India and the EU are more important than ever to drive growth, job creation, green transition, industrial development, and more resilient, sustainable and trustworthy supply chains.

According to the Joint Statement, leaders of both sides expressed commitment to ensuring full implementation of the FTA and tasked their respective teams to complete negotiations, at the earliest opportunity, on an Investment Protection Agreement (IPA) and on an Agreement on Geographical Indications (GIs). India Eye Clean Sweep as Dominance Marks T20I Series vs NZ

VISAKHAPATNAM, JAN 27: There is a certain swagger about this Indian side at the moment, and as the fourth T20 International against New Zealand approaches, that confidence has become the dominant, and viral, storyline of the series.

India have already sealed the five-match contest by winning the first three games, but more than the results, it is the manner of their cricket that has caught the eye.

Under head coach Gautam Gambhir and captain Suryakumar Yadav, this team has played with the sort of fearless intent that makes opponents second-guess their plans even before a ball is

bowled. It is cricket played with clarity of thought, sharp execution, and, importantly, the belief that no target is too big and no situation too difficult.

At the heart of this narrative is Abhishek Sharma. The young opener has batted as if he has been given a simple instruction: see ball, hit ball, and hit it hard. His 84 off 35 balls in Nagpur and the breathtaking 68 off just 20 deliveries in Guwahati were not reckless assaults but calculated aggression—the kind that puts the bowling side on the back foot inside the first three overs.

In old-fashioned terms, he has taken the game away early, and that has been priceless for India.

Captain Suryakumar Yadav's return to

form has added another layer to the story. After a lean period earlier in 2025, he has looked every bit the batter who can change a match in the space of two overs.

His ability to find gaps where none seem to exist has once again reminded everyone why he remains such a vital cog in India's T20 plans. Ishan Kishan's comeback innings in Raipur, played with freedom and confidence, has further highlighted the depth in India's batting reserves.

What has perhaps pleased the Indian think-tank the most is the balance of the side. The middle order, with Shivam Dube, Rinku Singh, and Hardik Pandya, has done just enough without being flashy, while the bowlers have operated

like a well-drilled unit.

Jasprit Bumrah has led with control and intelligence, Arshdeep Singh has provided left-arm variety, and the spinners have used Indian conditions with maturity rather than mystery.

For New Zealand, the story has been very different. After a fine showing in the ODI series, they have struggled to match India's intensity in the T20 format.

Glenn Phillips has fought hard, and skipper Mitchell Santner has shown leadership, but T20 cricket does not allow passengers, and too many of their key players have been quiet at crucial moments. In this format, hesitation is often punished, and India have done exactly that.

As the series moves to the Dr Y.S. Rajasekhara Reddy ACA-VDCA Cricket Stadium for the fourth T20I, the match carries significance beyond another win or loss.

For India, it is about reinforcing a template ahead of a home World Cup, showing that this aggressive approach is not situational but structural. For New Zealand, it is about finding answers, and quickly. Cricket, as always, remains a great leveller, but at this moment, India look a side in tune with the demands of modern T20 cricket. If confidence counts for anything, and it usually does, then the viral storyline of this series is simple: India are not just winning, they are making a statement.

Sabalenka steamrolls into Australia Open semis

MELBOURNE, JAN 27: World No. 1 Aryna Sabalenka defied sweltering heat in Melbourne on Tuesday to overwhelm teenager Ivajovic in the quarterfinals of the Australian Open.

Sabalenka took another step toward reclaiming the title she won at Melbourne Park in 2023 and 2024.

There were moments in the tournament's first week when Sabalenka's form was patchy, but she was sharp and composed in an 89-minute 6-3, 6-0 victory over 18-year-old Jovic.

"It was a tough match. Don't look at the score, it wasn't easy at all," Sabalenka said modestly. "I'm



super happy with the win."

Temperatures were forecast to reach 45 degrees Celsius on Tuesday and had already hit 35 degrees by the start of the match.

With the roof not yet closed at Rod Laver Arena, Sabalenka's heavy ball striking kept Jovic under constant pressure. The Belarusian finished with 31 winners and seven aces.

Sabalenka is on a semifinal collision course with American rival Coco Gauff, who plays 12th seed Elina Svitolina in Tuesday night's session.

Nat Sciver-Brunt's historic WPL century powers MI-W

VADODARA, JAN 26: Nat Sciver-Brunt capped a landmark evening with a historic century and an all-round impact as Mumbai Indians Women defeated Royal Challengers Bengaluru Women by 15 runs in a must-win match of the Women's Premier League 2026 at the BCA Stadium, Kotambi, on Monday.

Sciver-Brunt became the first batswoman to score a hundred in WPL history, reaching the milestone in the penultimate over and acknowledging the applause with her helmet raised. Her innings was the centrepiece of Mumbai's commanding 199 for 4 after RCB-W opted to bowl.

Mumbai built steadily through the powerplay before Sciver-Brunt took control in the middle overs, repeatedly finding the boundary with sweeps, lofted drives and inventive placement.

Hayley Matthews provided ideal support with a fluent 56, the pair accelerating decisively to put the Bengaluru bowlers under sustained pressure. Late contributions, including a brisk cameo from Harmanpreet Kaur, ensured a daunting target.

The chase began disastrously for RCB-W. Shabnim Ismail struck early to remove Grace Harris, while Hayley Matthews ran through the top order, dismissing Smriti Mandhana, Georgia Voll and Radha Yadav. RCB-W slumped to 35 for 5 inside the powerplay, staring at a heavy defeat.

Wicketkeeper-batswoman Richa Ghosh then produced one of the finest counter-attacking knocks of the season. Batting with remarkable freedom, she smashed 90 off 50 balls, peppering the boundary with clean strikes down the ground and through the off side. Nadine de Klerk supported her with a lively



28, and the pair briefly revived RCB-W's hopes with an aggressive stand.

Mumbai, however, kept their composure. Amelia Kerr broke the key partnership by having de Klerk caught by Sciver-Brunt at deep mid-wicket, before returning at the death to dismiss Ghosh for a valiant 90, sealing the contest. RCB-W finished on 184 for 9 despite a late flourish that yielded 27 runs in the 19th over.

For Mumbai, Matthews was outstanding with the ball, claiming 3 for 10, while Kerr and Ismail picked up two wickets each. Sciver-Brunt also contributed with a crucial catch and tidy overs to maintain pressure during the chase.

The victory underlined Mumbai Indians Women's strong position in WPL 2026, with Sciver-Brunt's trailblazing century standing as the defining moment of a high-quality contest.

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
