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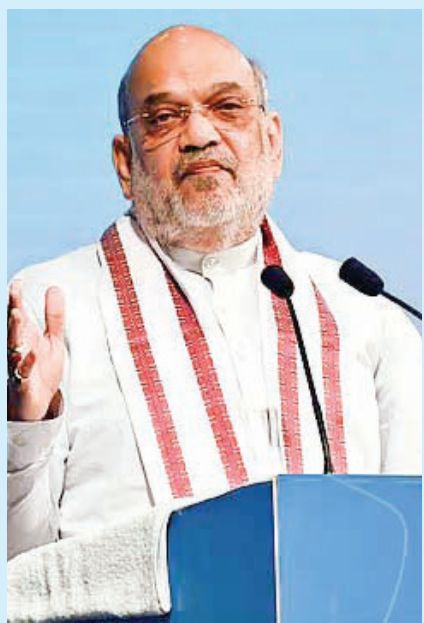
## Cyber Crime Poses Rising Threat to Nation: Amit Shah

Unveils CBI Cyber Branch, Says ₹8,189 Cr Recovered ; Cyber Security Now Equals to National Security'

**NEW DELHI, FEB 10:** Sounding a strong warning over the fast-growing menace of cybercrime, Union Home Minister Amit Shah on Tuesday said that cyber security has become an inseparable part of national security, as the government has already saved Rs. 8,189 crore from cyber frauds and arrested 20,853 accused persons till December 2025.

Addressing the National Conference on "Tackling Cyber-Enabled Frauds & Dismantling the Ecosystem" in New Delhi, Shah inaugurated the new Cyber-crime Branch of the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) and launched the State Cyber Crime Coordination Centre (S4C) dashboard of the Indian Cyber Crime Coordination Centre (I4C). He also presided over the Investiture Ceremony of



CBI officers.

Highlighting India's rapid digital transformation, Shah said the country has crossed one billion internet users, while broadband connections have increased nearly 16 times in the past 11 years. The cost of mobile data has declined by 97 percent, triggering massive growth in digital adoption across urban and rural areas.

"In 2024 alone, India recorded more than 181 billion digital transactions worth over Rs. 233 trillion. Today, every second digital transaction in the world takes place in India. This places an enormous responsibility on us to build a secure, resilient and trusted digital ecosystem," Shah said.

He said that cybercrime, which earlier operated at an individual level, has now become highly organised and

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## SKIMS Soura retains autonomy

Govt clarifies administrative changes

**SRINAGAR, FEB 10:** The Jammu and Kashmir government on Monday clarified in the Legislative Assembly that the Sher-i-Kashmir Institute of Medical Sciences (SKIMS), Soura, continues to function as an autonomous and premier healthcare institution, dispelling concerns over any dilution of its status following the 2019 reorganisation.

Replying to a question raised by MLA Gulmarg, Pirzada Farooq Ahmad Shah, the government informed the House that SKIMS was established in 1976 and its core academic and institutional autonomy remains intact. While certain administrative arrangements, particularly relating to the composition of the Governing Body, have undergone changes after the reorganisation of the erstwhile State of Jammu and Kashmir, the institute's mandate has not been altered.

The government stated that SKIMS continues to award medical degrees strictly in accordance with the SKIMS (Grant of Degrees) Act, 1983, reaffirming its independent academic standing. It was further clarified that, under the prevailing Transaction of Business Rules, the subject of SKIMS continues to be assigned to the Health and Medical Education Department, as was the position earlier.

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## Budget 2026-27 Sets Roadmap For Inclusive Growth, Welfare and Economic Revival in J&K: CM Omar Abdullah

**JAMMU, FEB 10:** Chief Minister Omar Abdullah on Tuesday reaffirmed his Government's unwavering commitment to fulfilling all promises made to the people of Jammu and Kashmir, stating that the Budget 2026-27 lays a firm foundation for inclusive growth, social justice and long-term economic

revival across the Union Territory.

Replying to the three-day-long discussion on the Budget in the Legislative Assembly, the Chief Minister said the Government has presented a people-centric financial roadmap focused on employment generation, infrastructure development, welfare delivery and balanced regional growth. He



said the Budget has been widely debated both inside and outside the House, with people largely welcoming its direction and intent.

"The purpose of this Budget is to address present challenges while building a sustainable future. It is not easy to propel Jammu and Kashmir forward

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## Rs. 3,450 Cr Booze Boost : J&K Rejects Dry UT Proposal, Flags Economic and Social Risks of Prohibition

**JAMMU, FEB 10 :** The Jammu and Kashmir government on Tuesday ruled out any move to declare the Union Territory a dry region, stating that liquor sales have generated over Rs. 3,450 crore in revenue during the last three financial years, while warning that prohibition could trigger serious economic, social and law-and-order chal-



lenges.

In a written reply to an Assembly question tabled by MLA Balwant Singh Mankotia, the government said there is no proposal under consideration to impose prohibition, as such a step could lead to a surge in smuggling from neighbouring States and UTs, illegal distillation, the strengthening of liquor mafias and heightened public health

**JAMMU, FEB 10:** Chief Secretary, Atal Dulloo, today chaired review meeting to assess the progress of the remaining works under the Jhelum Tawi Flood Recovery Project (JTFRP) and directed all concerned departments to ensure strict adherence to timelines, stating categorically that

the current extension is final and no lapses will be tolerated.

The meeting was attended by the Additional Chief Secretary, Public Works Department; Principal Secretary, Home; Secretary, Health & Medical Education; Director General, Budget; Managing Director, JKMSCL; Chief Executive Officer, J&K Economic Reconstruction Agency

(ERA); Commissioner, Srinagar Municipal Corporation, and other senior officers.

During the meeting, the Chief Secretary undertook a project-wise review of all ongoing works, with particular emphasis on the expeditious operationalisation of the State Emergency Operations Centre (SEOC) at Humhama, completion of the addi-

tional block at Lal Ded (LD) Hospital, and the critical care infrastructure proposed to be procured by the Health Department out of savings under JTFRP.

He stressed that procurement of equipment must proceed simultaneously with infrastructure creation so that the overall deadline of

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## Gol sanctions 316 rural road projects for J&K under PMGSY-IV

**SRINAGAR, FEB 10:** As many as 316 rural road projects covering a length of 1,781.33 kilometres have been sanctioned for UT J&K under Phase-IV of the Pradhan Mantri Gram Sadak Yojana (PMGSY-IV), the Centre informed the Lok Sabha on Tuesday.

In a written reply to a starred question, the Ministry of Rural Development, according to the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO) said that Rajouri district has received the highest allocation with 41 road works spanning 256.96 km, followed closely by Poonch with 40 roads covering

institutionalised, backed by sophisticated technologies and global networks. He stressed that tackling this evolving threat requires seamless coordination among multiple agencies, including the IAC, CBI, NIA, ED, RBI, state police forces, the Department of Telecommunications, the Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology, and the judiciary.

The Home Minister said the Ministry of Home Affairs has adopted a comprehensive and multi-layered strategy to combat cybercrime, focusing on real-time reporting, robust forensic infrastructure, capacity building, research and development, cyber awareness, and cyber hygiene.

Sharing key enforcement figures, Shah said the IAC portal has been accessed more than 230 million times since January 2020, with over 8.2 million cybercrime complaints registered till November 2025. Of these, around 1.84 lakh cases were converted into FIRs. Through coordinated action on 3.61 lakh cyber fraud complaints, authorities were able to freeze or recover Rs. 8,189 crore, out of an estimated total fraud amount of nearly Rs. 20,000 crore.

He also said that the government has cancelled over 12 lakh suspicious SIM cards and blocked more than 3 lakh mobile device IMEI numbers, while 62 banks and financial institutions have been integrated with the cybercrime response system. The target, he added, is to onboard all banks, including cooperative institutions, by December 2026.

On financial inclusion, Shah noted that more than 57 crore Jan Dhan accounts have been opened, with RuPay debit cards nearing 40 crore and expected to cross 50 crore by the end of 2026. He said over Rs. 48 lakh crore has been transferred directly to beneficiaries through Direct Benefit Transfer, further expanding the scale of India's digital ecosystem.

During the event, Shah also presented Medals for Distinguished and Meritorious Service and Kendriya Grihmantri Dakshata Padak to several CBI officers in recognition of their outstanding contribution.

Calling for collective resolve, Shah urged all stakeholders to strengthen coordination, upgrade technological capabilities and enhance public awareness to ensure that India's digital growth remains secure, inclusive and resilient.

Highlighting its rapid-response mechanism, the LGSSK also addressed a representation from a serving Agniveer regarding his father's medical emergency. Through immediate inter-state coordination with health authorities, the Kendra ensured timely admission and treatment at a government health facility, resolving the entire case within just two days.

Addressing concerns related to funding, the government categorically stated that there has been no change in the funding structure of SKIMS. Budgetary allocations for the institute continue to be made under the Health Budget, ensuring uninterrupted financial support for patient care, teaching and research at Kashmir's most important tertiary care hospital.

On the issue of infrastructure and maintenance, the House was informed that prior to 2019, SKIMS had its own independent Engineering Wing. However, following the reorganisation, engineering wings of several departments and institutions were restructured as part of a broader administrative overhaul. As a result, the Engineering Wing of SKIMS was subsumed under the Public Works (R&B) Division, Soura, which is located within the SKIMS campus.

The government rejected the assertion that this change led to neglect of projects or lapse of funds. It said that all ongoing and pending works of SKIMS were duly taken over by the executing agency and have been pursued in a time-bound manner. Most of these works have already been completed both physically and financially, while the remaining projects are at an advanced stage of completion.

Reiterating its commitment to restoring and strengthening the "pristine glory" of SKIMS Soura, the government assured the House that all necessary administrative and developmental measures are being taken to ensure that the institute continues to serve as the backbone of advanced healthcare in Kashmir.

in the prevailing circumstances, but a clear roadmap has been laid out to take the region towards stability, growth and development," CM Omar Abdullah said.

In a major assurance, the Chief Minister announced that the long-pending regularisation of daily-rated and casual workers would be initiated during the current year. "God willing, we will begin the regularisation of daily wagers this year, and we will continue to support them," he said, describing the step as a significant relief for thousands of families.

Taking a swipe at the opposition, CM Omar Abdullah said they were frustrated over the pro-people nature of the Budget. "They are unable to digest the fact that we have presented a Budget that prioritises the needs and aspirations of the common people," he remarked, while recalling the SRO-based employment support scheme for militancy-hit families introduced in 1996, which benefited thousands across the region.

Expressing gratitude to legislators for their constructive participation, the Chief Minister said several valuable suggestions made during the debate would be considered for implementation. He said the wide public engagement with the Budget reflects people's expectations and trust in the Government's intentions.

Emphasising social justice as the cornerstone of governance, CM Omar Abdullah said the Government's foremost responsibility is towards the weakest and poorest sections of society. He announced that free LPG cylinders would be provided entirely from the Union Territory's own resources, without depending on any central scheme. He also announced a monthly assistance of Rs 4,000 for orphans and vulnerable families not covered under any existing welfare programme, along with new scholarships for tribal children and economically weaker students. The free bus travel facility for women introduced last year, he said, has been extended to persons with disabilities.

Stressing that Jammu and Kashmir lives in its villages, the Chief Minister said rural development forms the backbone of the Government's growth strategy. He said the Budget gives major thrust to agriculture, horticulture, animal husbandry, fisheries and dairy development to strengthen the rural economy and ensure sustainable livelihoods. A new dairy development scheme aims to increase milk production by one lakh litres, while weather-based crop insurance for horticulture has been introduced for the first time to safeguard farmers against climate risks.

CM Omar Abdullah also voiced concern over provisions of the Indo-US trade deal, warning that duty-free imports of walnuts, almonds and other dry fruits could severely impact Jammu and Kashmir's horticulture sector. He said such measures threaten the livelihoods of local farmers and urged that adequate safeguards be ensured, including protection for apple growers.

Highlighting the importance of fiscal prudence, the Chief Minister said the Special Assistance for States for Capital Investment (SASCI) scheme would provide Jammu and Kashmir with interest-free financial support for the next 50 years, calling it a responsible step to strengthen capital investment and reduce long-term financial burden.

The Chief Minister underlined his Government's focus on youth empowerment through Mission YUVA, a flagship initiative aimed at promoting entrepreneurship, skill development and self-employment. He said the programme is designed to harness the potential of young people and enable them to become active partners in the region's economic transformation.

Rejecting allegations that the Budget is Kashmir-centric, CM Omar Abdullah said his Government remains equally committed to the aspirations of Jammu, citing the restoration of the Darbar Move as evidence of balanced regional development. He said the Government is determined to correct past imbalances and ensure equitable attention to all regions.

He further emphasised that industries receiving incentives and support from the Government must prioritise the recruitment of local youth, stating that industrial growth should directly translate into employment opportunities for the people of Jammu and Kashmir.

Concluding his address, CM Omar Abdullah said the Budget 2026-27 represents a comprehensive roadmap for inclusive development, economic resilience and social equity, reiterating his Government's commitment to deliver tangible results on the ground and fulfil the aspirations of the people of Jammu and Kashmir.

risks. It cautioned that a ban would also adversely affect tourism, hospitality, transport and manufacturing sectors, besides resulting in the loss of livelihoods for thousands of people associated with the liquor trade.

The government's disclosure of district-wise figures showed that Jammu district topped revenue generation, earning Rs. 51,262.41 lakh in 2022-23, Rs. 50,826.31 lakh in 2023-24 and Rs. 52,292.83 lakh in

2024-25, supported by a steady rise in the number of wine shops and bars. Kathua, Samba and Udhampur also recorded consistent growth, with Kathua generating Rs. 12,694.98 lakh, Samba Rs. 10,299.42 lakh and Udhampur Rs. 12,987.50 lakh in 2024-25.

A significant spike was reported in Rajouri, where revenue surged to Rs. 15,232.04 lakh in 2024-25 from Rs. 5,268.78 lakh in the previous year, reflecting a sharp rise in sales. Reasi, Doda, Kishtwar and Ramban posted moderate but stable figures, while Poonch recorded comparatively lower revenues over the three-year period.

In the Kashmir division, the presence of liquor outlets remained limited, though revenues showed a rising trend. Srinagar's earnings more than doubled from Rs. 3,086.77 lakh in 2022-23 to Rs. 7,632.90 lakh in 2024-25, despite having only seven wine shops and four bars. Anantnag, Baramulla, Ganderbal and Kupwara also registered gradual increases, whereas Pulwama, Shopian, Bandipora, Budgam and Kulgam had no bars or wine shops during the last three financial years.

The government maintained that regulated liquor sales are a key source of revenue and employment, and any decision on prohibition must carefully balance public health concerns with economic stability, social impact and law-and-order considerations.

### Fresh snowfall.....

Parts of the Kashmir plains witnessed intermittent rainfall during the afternoon, officials told the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO).

The Meteorological Department said light rain or snow is likely at most places on Wednesday. From February 11 to 20, the weather is expected to remain largely dry, with brief spells of light snowfall over a few higher reaches on February 14 and 17.

Temperatures improved noticeably across the Union Territory on Tuesday. Srinagar recorded a minimum temperature of 3.3 degrees Celsius, while Jammu city registered 12.3 degrees Celsius.

Among other places, Gulmarg recorded a low of minus 3.4 degrees Celsius and Pahalgam minus 0.4 degrees Celsius.

In the Jammu region, Katra town recorded a minimum temperature of 11.2 degrees Celsius, Batote 6.1 degrees Celsius, Banihal 3.2 degrees Celsius and Bhaderwah 2.4 degrees Celsius, the department said.

Day temperatures also showed an upward trend, with Srinagar recording a maximum of 10.6 degrees Celsius, while Jammu touched 22.4 degrees Celsius.

The weather office has forecast generally cloudy conditions across Jammu and Kashmir, with the possibility of light rain, snow and gusty winds at many places.

A partly cloudy day with chances of light rain or snow at isolated locations is expected on Wednesday, followed by generally dry weather on Wednesday and Thursday.

Cloudy weather with the possibility of light snowfall over isolated higher reaches has been predicted for Friday.

Partly cloudy to generally cloudy conditions are likely on February 15 and 16, while February 17 may see generally cloudy weather with light rain or snow at scattered places. From February 18 to 20, partly cloudy weather is expected.

The Meteorological Department has issued an advisory asking travellers and transporters to check the status of highways with the concerned authorities and strictly follow official advisories.

Residents of snow-bound areas have been advised to avoid venturing into avalanche-prone higher reaches.

Officials said that, based on current trends, February may end with an overall deficit in rainfall across the region—(KNO)

### JTRP savings.....

August 2026 is met without compromise. To ensure close supervision, the Chief Secretary directed that each work be assigned to a designated Executive Engineer, with daily monitoring at the field level and weekly progress reports to be submitted directly to him.

Reiterating the importance of departmental ownership, the Chief Secretary impressed upon the Public Works Department and Health & Medical Education Department to intensify monitoring at their respective levels and ensure that both construction and procurement activities progress at a satisfactory pace.

Providing details, Secretary, Health & Medical Education, Dr. Syed Abid Rashid Shah, informed the meeting that the department plans to significantly augment critical care infrastructure using savings under JTRFP. He stated that, in addition to around 100 Advanced Life Support (ALS) ambulances, the department will procure 100 ventilators, 250 multipurpose monitors, 100 portable ultrasound machines, 50 handheld X-ray units, along with other essential medical equipment.

Briefing the meeting on project execution, CEO, J&K ERA, Ms. Shreya Singhal, informed that construction of the additional block at LD Hospital is currently underway and is expected to be completed within the stipulated timeline. She added that to fast-track progress, pre-engineered structural components are being fabricated in Haryana and will be installed at the site.

On the State Emergency Operations Centre (SEOC), the meeting was informed that the project has achieved around 80 per cent progress in civil works and 35 per cent in electromechanical works, with remaining components being expedited to ensure timely completion.

The meeting was further apprised that JKMSCL is going to accelerate procurement of additional equipment for the Bone & Joint Hospital, along with other critical care equipment and ambulances, to ensure full readiness within the stipulated timeframe.

Regarding bridge projects in Baramulla district, it was informed that construction of five bridges at Shrakawara, Wahdina, Waza Mohallah (Kreeri), Wagoora, and Trikolbal Pattan has reached an advanced stage and is targeted for completion by March this year.

It was also informed that consultancy services for preparation of the feasibility study and Detailed Project Report (DPR) for flood mitigation and comprehensive river management of the Jhelum and Tawi river basins are progressing satisfactorily and are expected to be completed as per schedule.

Reiterating the significance of JTRFP

in strengthening disaster resilience, the Chief Secretary underscored the need for continuous monitoring, seamless inter-departmental coordination, and proactive resolution of bottlenecks for timely completion of all these projects.

As per the district-wise data, Reasi has been sanctioned 21 roads (181.88 km), Ramban 24 roads (155.62 km), Udhampur 20 roads (133.93 km) and Kathua 15 roads (129.56 km). Border and hilly districts including Kupwara (46.81 km), Baramulla (41.94 km), Bandipora (47.93 km) and Kishtwar (93.21 km) have also been covered under the scheme.

In south Kashmir, Pulwama has been allotted 14 road works (54.22 km), Kulgam 13 roads (30.90 km), Anantnag 7 roads (19.50 km) and Shopian three road projects (9.10 km), while in central Kashmir, Budgam has received 14 road works (47.89 km) and Ganderbal 8 projects (22.55 km).

The Ministry said that the UT of Jammu and Kashmir has begun awarding works under PMGSY-IV, while tendering processes in other States and UTs are at various stages. The physical and financial progress will start getting reported after the finalisation of tenders.

## Centre provides Rs 10,155 crore to J&K under PMGSY to strengthen rural road connectivity

SRINAGAR, FEB 10: The

Government of India on Tuesday informed the Parliament that Jammu and Kashmir received Rs 10,155 crore in central assistance under the Pradhan Mantri Gram Sadak Yojana (PMGSY) over the past ten years and the current financial year.

Replying to an unstarred question in the Lok Sabha, the Ministry of Rural Development, according to the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO) said that Jammu and Kashmir has received one of the highest financial allocations in recent years to

strengthen rural road connectivity.

"J&K received Rs. 488 crore in 2015-16, Rs. 755.61 crore in 2016-17, Rs. 1,400 crore in 2017-18, Rs. 590.77 crore in 2018-19, Rs. 695.50 crore in 2019-20, Rs. 1,727.30 crore in 2020-21, Rs. 1,328.34 crore in 2021-22, Rs. 717 crore in 2022-23, Rs. 1,304.17 crore in 2023-24, Rs. 1,028.25 crore in 2024-25, and Rs. 121.17 crore so far in 2025-26," the reply stated.

The Ministry said that under various PMGSY interventions, thousands of kilometres of rural roads and bridges have been constructed across the country to improve last-mile connectivity, particularly in

hilly, border and remote areas such as Jammu and Kashmir.

It said that under PMGSY-IV, the government is prioritising habitations with population thresholds of 250+ in hilly States and UTs, including J&K, with special focus on tribal, SC-dominated and aspirational areas to ensure inclusive access to all-weather roads.

The Rural Development Ministry maintained that PMGSY continues to be implemented as an area development programme, with habitations as the unit of planning, to ensure equitable rural connectivity in geographically challenging regions like Jammu and Kashmir—(KNO)

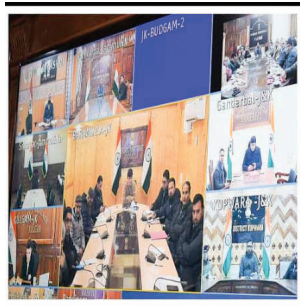
Addressing the meeting, the Divisional Commissioner stressed the need for coordinated and comprehensive measures to

Chief Engineer, KPDCL, was instructed to ensure uninterrupted electricity supply across the division during peak hours of Sehri and Iftari.

To ensure the availability of safe and quality food items in the market, the Divisional Commissioner directed the Food Safety Department to carry out intensive and regular market inspection drives across all districts. He also emphasized strict action against traders involved in illegal profiteering.

Srinagar Municipal Corporation was asked to undertake regular sanitation drives at mosques and shrines. Meanwhile, the General Manager, SRTC, was directed to augment public trans-



port services, especially around the Hazratbal area during evening and Taraweeh prayer hours. Deputy Commissioners were also urged to ensure adequate availability of public transport during evening hours.

FCS&CA Department was directed to ensure timely and adequate distribution of ration to meet increased demand during the holy month.

CE, R&B was instructed to repair the damaged roads leading to mosques and shrines while CE PHE was asked to supply tap water during the peak hours especially at Sehri. He was also urged to mobilize water tankers to provide drinking water to the areas facing shortages.

The Divisional Commissioner reiterated that all departments must work in close coordination to ensure hassle-free observance of Ramadhan by the public.

## Secretary RDD reviews SBM-G, RGSA implementation in J&K

**JAMMU, FEB 10:** Secretary, Rural Development Department and Panchayati Raj, Mohammad Aijaz Asad, today chaired a high level review meeting to assess the implementation, progress and on-ground impact of Rashtriya Gram Swaraj Abhiyan (RGSA) and Swachh Bharat Mission—Gramin (SBM-G) across Jammu and Kashmir.

The meeting was attended by Director General Rural Sanitation Anoo Malhotra; Director RDD Kashmir Shabir Hussain Bhat; Director Panchayati Raj Sham Lal; Director RDD Jammu Shahnaz Akhter; Additional District Development Commissioners; Deputy Secretary RD&PR Tahir Ahmad Magray;



Superintending Engineers REW; Assistant Commissioners Panchayat; Executive Engineers and other concerned officers.

The Secretary reviewed the component wise and district-wise status of tendering under SBM-G, including major sanitation infrastructure such as Faecal Sludge Treatment Plants (FSTPs), GOBARdhan plants, DEWATS, Community Sanitary Complexes, Plastic Waste Management Units, Segregation Sheds and other sanitation assets. He directed the officers to expedite tendering process, remove procurement bottlenecks and ensure transparency, quality and adherence to timelines so that assets are made operational without delay.

Reviewing the progress of Individual Household Latrines (IHHLs), the Secretary assessed coverage, pendency and district-wise performance. He stressed that no eligible household should be left out and directed the district authorities to fast-track verification and approval of pending applications alongside enhanced community mobilisation to achieve universal sanitation coverage.

The meeting also reviewed Operation and Maintenance (O&M) mechanisms and Faecal Sludge Management (FSM) policies.

Emphasising sustainability, the Secretary directed for early finalisation and operationalisation of O&M and FSM frameworks. He stressed that functionality and maintenance of sanitation assets must receive top priority.

The Secretary reviewed the Annual Implementation Plan (AIP) 2026-27 under SBM-G, stressing it be realistic, outcome-oriented and aligned with ground-level needs. He emphasized quality infrastructure, behavioural change, sustainability, convergence and data-driven planning, directing for timely submission to ensure smooth implementation. Asking the Additional District Development Commissioners to fast-track land identification for remaining Panchayats, the Secretary called for early resolution of bottlenecks and advised exploring relocation options where suitable land is unavailable. He also stressed according top administrative priority to completion of construction of Panchayat Ghars.

Reviewing the status of Gram Panchayat Development Plans (GPDPs), the Secretary underscored the need for participatory, need-based and outcome-oriented planning, with strong community participation and effective convergence with departmental schemes.

The meeting also reviewed the progress of co-location of Common Service Centres (CSCs) in Panchayat Ghars.

The Secretary directed for expediting the process to ensure CSCs are operational, thereby strengthening digital governance and citizen-centric service delivery.

Reviewing the functioning of Panchayat Learning Centres (PLCs), the Secretary directed all Assistant Commissioners Panchayat to make PLCs fully functional and asked both Directors RDD to operationalise 40 newly established PLCs.

Highlighting the Panchayat Advancement Index (PAI) 2.0 as a key tool for performance assessment, the Secretary directed the officers to create widespread awareness among Panchayats and stakeholders and ensure active participation for effective implementation of the index.

# Culture and Traditions of the Tribal Communities of J&K

It is the need of the hour that the tribal communities of Jammu and Kashmir work collectively for the promotion and preservation of their culture, traditions, and language so that their identity remains alive for future generations. At the same time, it is the responsibility of the government to provide proper platforms to poets, writers, and artists associated with the Gojri language, so that tribal literature, culture, and heritage may flourish and be safeguarded.

The tribal communities of Jammu and Kashmir, particularly the Gujjar and Bakerwal tribes, form an integral part of the region's social, cultural, and historical fabric. For centuries, these communities have lived close to nature, and their culture is deeply rooted in simplicity, hard work, self-respect, and collective values. Even today, the tribal society retains a distinct identity through its traditions, language, and way of life, although changes have gradually emerged over time.

These changes have become a source of serious concern for poor and ordinary tribal families, as economic pressure is forcing them away from their traditional values of simplicity.

The lives of the Gujjar and Bakerwal communities are closely linked to grazing lands and livestock. Animal husbandry has traditionally been their primary occupation and the backbone of their economic system. These communities migrate seasonally, moving from high-altitude pastures to plains according to weather conditions. This nomadic or semi-nomadic lifestyle reflects a deep and enduring relationship with nature, which remains a defining feature of their culture.

Traditional attire also plays a vital role in shaping tribal cultural identity. Men generally wear

traditional kurta, shalwar, waistcoats, and distinctive headgear, while women wear simple yet dignified clothing, often adorned with traditional embroidery and vibrant colors. These garments are not only suited to the climate but also serve as symbols of tribal identity.

Today, the Gujjar and Bakerwal communities continue to face numerous social, economic, and educational challenges. Although a dedicated department has been formally established to address the issues of tribal communities, it has yet to become fully functional and effective. There is an urgent need to activate this department so that tribal people can benefit at the grassroots level and their long-standing problems can be resolved in a meaningful manner.

In conclusion, the culture and traditions of the tribal communities of Jammu and Kashmir are deeply rooted in simplicity, perseverance, and rich heritage. Preserving and promoting this cultural legacy requires collective efforts so that language, literature, and traditions continue to thrive, enabling the tribal society to move toward a dignified, self-reliant, and progressive future.

# Discussion on Budget 2026-27 concludes in Legislative Assembly

He underscored that with the increasing use of digital platforms and AI-based tools, citizens must be equipped with the right knowledge to protect themselves from cyber frauds, misinformation, and data breaches.

The DC emphasised that responsible

and ethical use of AI is essential for ensuring inclusive and people-centric development. He also stressed the role of AI in key sectors such as healthcare, agriculture, education, and governance, while cautioning against its misuse for scams, deepfakes, and misinformation.

During the programme, detailed presentations were made on key aspects including safe internet usage, cyber hygiene practices, common cyber threats such as phishing, OTP and UPI frauds, fake customer care scams, malware, deepfake and AI voice scams, online shopping frauds, and digital arrest scams. Participants were sensitised on mechanisms for reporting cybercrimes through the National Cyber Crime Reporting Portal and the helpline number 1930.

The participants were also educated on best practices such as use of strong passwords, enabling two-factor authentication, avoiding suspicious links, securing UPI and card transactions, and protecting personal identifiable information. Awareness resources including [www.staysafeonline.in](#) and [www.infosecawareness.in](#) were also highlighted.

An online pledge for safe and responsible use of AI was administered, and participants were encouraged to enrol in ISEA e-learning courses and download the ISEA Cyber Hygiene mobile application to further strengthen their understanding of cyber safety.

Besides, DIO Informatics, the programme witnessed active participation from officials, students, teachers, Representatives from Revenue, RDD and other stakeholders.

## DC Srinagar, SSP hold District NCORD meeting; 73 driving licences disqualified, 56 vehicles blacklisted under NDPS Cases in district

**SRINAGAR, FEBRUARY 10:** A meeting of District Level Committee on Narco Coordination Centre (NCORD) was Tuesday held under the chairmanship of Deputy Commissioner (DC) Srinagar, Akshay Labroo here at the Meeting Hall of the DC Office to review the ongoing anti-drug measures and efforts to curb drug abuse and drug trafficking in the district.

Senior Superintendent of Police (SSP), Sandeep Chakravarthy was also present in the meeting. At the outset, the meeting conducted a comprehensive review of inter-agency coordination to combat drug abuse, including identification of drug hotspots, confiscation of vehicles under NDPS and ongoing anti-drug IEC activities, particularly in educational institutions to sensitize youth about the illicit effects of narcotics.

The meeting was informed that, as per the directions of the NCORD Committee, the District Administration in coordination with the Police and other stakeholder departments, has launched a massive crackdown on drug peddlers and drug trafficking. Acting firmly against offenders, the driving licences of 73 accused involved in narcotics cases have been disqualified. In addition, 56 vehicles have been blacklisted by the Regional Transport Office, Kashmir under the NDPS Act. Addressing the meeting, the DC appreciated the Transport Department and other stakeholders for strengthening administrative controls by suspending licences and blacklisting vehicles involved in NDPS cases, thereby disrupting the

logistical support of drug peddlers. He reiterated that driving licences and vehicle registrations are privileges not rights and that anyone found misusing them for drug-related offences will face strict action without any leniency. The DC emphasized that such measures will continue across to curb the drug menace in the district and break the supply chain of narcotics trade. He underlined the administration's firm resolve to protect society, especially the youth, from the devastating impact of drugs.

SSP Srinagar, in his remarks, stated that the action against drugs shall continue and the message of zero tolerance against drug crimes is loud and clear. He stated that drug peddlers will face criminal prosecution, disqualification of licences, blacklisting of vehicles and other punishments as warranted under law. On the occasion, the meeting decided to further strengthen coordination among stakeholder departments and continue focused enforcement, preventive awareness, and rehabilitation measures to effectively combat the drug menace in Srinagar district.

## DC Srinagar inspects developmental works in Harwan Block; takes onsite review of ongoing works

While inspecting the construction of the bridge at Syedpora Bala over Maloori Nallah along with the link road to Mavas Canal, the DC assessed the progress and quality of work and directed the concerned executing agencies to ensure completion of the project within the stipulated timelines while maintaining quality standards as per approved specifications.

The DC was informed that over



65 percent of the work on the project has been completed. The project is being executed by the R&B

Department under NABARD. It was further apprised that the bridge structure is almost complete, while

work on the approach road is in progress and the link road is scheduled to be taken up shortly.

Similarly, at Sarabagh area of Syedpora, the DC took stock of the construction of the bridge over Maloori Nallah being executed which is expected to significantly improve connectivity for the adjoining areas.

Later, the DC inspected the ongoing works on the construction of the bridge over Maloori Nallah at Gandtal-Ganimohar Road, being executed by the R&B Department under NABARD. The DC reviewed the progress of the works and issued necessary directions to the concerned officers to ensure timely completion of the project to benefit people in local habitation.

The DC was informed that about 35 percent of the work has been completed on the project, which will improve connectivity in Gandtal, Ganimohar, Dardkhovar, Moshpajan, Dar, Fakir Gujri and other adjoining areas.

During the visit, the Deputy Commissioner interacted with local residents and stated that the completion of bridges over Maloori Nallah along with approach and link roads will significantly enhance connectivity and benefit several habitations in the area.

He emphasized the importance of quality infrastructure for improving public convenience and directed officers to maintain close monitoring of all developmental projects in the block.

He instructed officers to maintain strict adherence to the approved deadlines and ensure that all ongoing projects are executed with high standards of quality and transparency. He also directed the executing agencies to ensure proper financial management and utilization of funds.

DC also reviewed the progress of UT Capex works pertaining to the Revenue Department and works under the Tribal Plan. He directed the executing agencies to ensure timely completion of all works under the UT Capex sector and to utilize the released funds timely.

The DC also reviewed the advancement of telemedicine services across the district, designed to enhance specialist healthcare accessibility, particularly in remote and border regions.

Dr. Zaffar Akbar, Chief Medical Officer, Kupwara briefed block-wise progress under E-Sanjeevani OPD and E-Sanjeevani AB-HWC. It was informed that the E-Sanjeevani is being operated through 11 functional hubs, 5 functional hubs cum spokes and 130 functional spokes, enabling doctor-to-patient and doctor-to-doctor consultations to reinforce healthcare delivery.



Taking serious note of low coverage in some medical blocks, he directed BMOs to ensure substantial progress is achieved in next one month. He also directed the CMO to take action against non-performing officers/officials at HWCs and PHCs where progress is unsatisfactory.

The Deputy Commissioner also reviewed the rollout of Human Papillomavirus (HPV) vaccination programme. He stressed the importance of inter-departmental coordination between Health, school education and social welfare department and called for intensified IEC campaign.

The meetings were attended by Chief Medical Officer Kupwara, Chief Planning Officer, District Immunization Officer, BMOs and officials from Health, Education, ICDS and others.

# CS pushes for robust tracking for lifelong rehabilitation of victims

Calls institutional support key to realise ‘Nasha Mukht J&K’

**JAMMU, FEB 10:** Chief Secretary, Atal Dulloo, today chaired a high-level meeting of senior officers to deliberate upon and give shape to a robust mechanism for rehabilitation and reintegration of drug abuse victims across the districts of Jammu and Kashmir.

The meeting was attended by Principal Secretary, Home; Commissioner Secretary, General Administration Department (GAD); Commissioner Secretary, Social Welfare Department; Commissioner Secretary, School Education Department; Secretary, Health & Medical Education (H&ME); Secretary, Skill Development Department (SDD) and Labour & Employment (L&E); Secretary, Rural Development Department (RDD); Director General, Budget; Director, Information; Managing Director, JKRLM; Director Colleges and other concerned officers.

While reviewing the framework, the Chief Secretary stressed the need for systematic tracking of every registered drug abuse victim who comes forward for treatment to ensure sustained handholding, rehabilitation and social reintegration. He emphasized that such individuals should



be monitored for several years post-treatment and provided opportunities in livelihood generation, skill development, self-employment or education based on individual rehabilitation needs.

Highlighting the importance of institutional support, the Chief Secretary called for dovetailing resources and manpower of multiple departments to ensure comprehensive support to individuals at every stage of recovery. He observed that while family and societal support remains crucial, long-term reintegration into mainstream society largely depends on strong institutional mechanisms.

The Chief Secretary noted that motivating victims to undergo treatment is only the first step and must be complemented by

regular follow-up, counselling and livelihood support to prevent relapse. He underscored the need for an end-to-end mechanism covering awareness generation through IEC campaigns, treatment, counselling, rehabilitation and post-rehabilitation engagement of affected youth.

To ensure accountability and effectiveness, he directed the creation of a district-level monitoring framework under senior officers, supported by dedicated teams to identify gaps and ensure lifetime rehabilitation outcomes. He further instructed development of an integrated online platform with clearly defined departmental roles and unique identification for each beneficiary to enable real-time tracking and case management.

During the meeting, Commis-

sioner Secretary, Social Welfare Department, Sarmad Hafeez, made a detailed presentation outlining the proposed inter-departmental coordination mechanism and post-rehabilitation framework. He informed that under the ongoing Nasha Mukht Bharat Abhiyan, a dedicated Task Force has been constituted under the chairmanship of Principal Secretary, Home Department, with the mandate to plan, coordinate and monitor rehabilitation and reintegration interventions across departments.

The meeting was informed that the Task Force will focus on multi-departmental coordination, standardized screening and referral mechanisms, availability of trained psychiatrists in hospitals, strengthening law enforcement for supply reduction and

enhancement of rehabilitation processes.

It was further highlighted that the rehabilitation framework envisages standardized rehabilitation protocols and counselling units across J&K. The importance of integrating skill development programmes, livelihood support, start-up credit linkages, self-employment assistance and private sector partnerships was also emphasized to ensure sustainable recovery of rehabilitated individuals.

The meeting also underscored the need for school-based preventive programmes, community engagement initiatives, post-care monitoring systems and strengthening of infrastructure and capacity building. The roles and responsibilities of departments including School Education, Higher Education, Rural Development, Skill Development, Labour & Employment, Health, Home and Social Welfare were clearly delineated to achieve the long-term objective of a drug-free Jammu and Kashmir.

Reaffirming the government's commitment, the Chief Secretary stressed that addressing drug abuse requires a whole-of-government and whole-of-society approach to safeguard the future of youth and build a healthier society.

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## J&K observes Safer Internet Day 2026; launches UT wide outreach campaign

**JAMMU, FEB 10:** The Information Technology Department, today observed Safer Internet Day 2026, reaffirming its commitment towards promoting safe, secure and responsible use of internet among the citizens, particularly youth and vulnerable sections of society.

As part of outreach activities, Common Services Centres (CSCs) dedicated awareness canopies across various locations from 9th to 10th February, 2026, providing information and guidance to citizens on safe internet usage and cyber fraud prevention.

Further strengthening the grassroots outreach, various awareness campaigns were organized at district, block and Gram Panchayat level, in close coordination with the district administration and CSCs, with massive participation in schools, degree colleges and ITIs.

## Govt considering 5 marla land allotment to Bagra flood victims: Deputy CM

**JAMMU, FEB 10:** Deputy Chief Minister Surinder Choudhary today said that the government is considering allotment of 5 marla land plots to the eligible families hit by flash floods at village Bagra in Kathua district on the intervening night of 16th and 17th August 2025.

The Deputy Chief Minister was replying on behalf of Chief Minister Omar Abdullah to a question raised by Legislator Dr. Bharat Bushan in the Legislative Assembly today.

He said that as per SDRF norms, a compensation of Rs. 4 lakh each was released in favour of the Next of Kin (NOK) of the deceased and additional Rs. 2 lakh each was also released through the Chief Minister's Relief Fund. He added that Chairman, Red Cross Society Kathua (Deputy Commissioner Kathua) also released Rs. 50,000 compensation

each to the NOKs of the deceased.

The Deputy Chief Minister said that heavy flash floods triggered by flash rains and landslides occurred in several areas of Village Bagra, which resulted in unfortunate loss of two persons and damages to various private and public properties.

He informed the House that seven houses fully damaged during the flash floods were duly compensated as per SDRF guidelines. He added that temporary restoration measures have been taken by the district administration while the line departments are taking further necessary action for permanent restoration. He said that during this period, the affected families were shifted to safe lodgement centres, where all basic amenities like food, water, medicines and blankets were provided to them.

The Deputy CM added that the link

road in Bagra has been damaged to a length of 1.20 km and some temporarily restored stretches will be fully reinstated by August 2026.

He said that during the recent spell of heavy rainfall/flash floods, certain low-lying areas of Kathua Town were affected, resulting in damage to residential houses and property, particularly in areas located near natural drainage channels and Kathua Khad. He said that due to sudden heavy discharge of rainwater, Kathua Khad experienced overflow at several vulnerable locations, causing erosion of embankments.

He added that the proposal of channelization and protection work in Sahar Khad has been duly incorporated in the DPRs titled "Construction of flood protection works on Sahar Khad/Maggar Khad/Sukhal Khad and other tributaries of river Ravi" under NABARD, with a total estimated cost of Rs. 1500.71 lakh.

# Writers, Poets Call for Preserving J&K's Multilingual Heritage, Seek Classical Status for Kashmiri Language

**JAMMU, FEB 10:** A Powerful Call to preserve Jammu and Kashmir's rich multilingual heritage and a resounding demand for granting classical language status to Kashmiri marked the opening day of the 46th three-day Annual Literary Conference of Adbi Markaz Jammu & Kashmir (AMK), which began here on Tuesday under the theme "Mother Tongue Day."

The conference opened on an inspiring and inclusive note with a multilingual mushaira, presided over by eminent literary figures Manshoor Banihali, Syed Sad-ud-Din Saidi, K.D. Maini and others, setting a vibrant cultural tone for the deliberations. Poets and writers representing Kashmiri, Dogri, Gojri, Pahari, Punjabi and other regional languages

showcased the Valley's linguistic diversity and shared literary legacy.

Inaugurating the conference, Speaker of the Jammu & Kashmir Legislative Assembly, Abdul Rahim Rather, urged poets, writers and intellectuals to take the lead in preserving and promoting the region's multilingual ethos, describing it as the cornerstone of Jammu and Kashmir's cultural identity.

"Jammu and Kashmir is a land of many languages, and this diversity is our collective strength. Poets and writers have a historic responsibility to nurture and protect this priceless heritage," Rather said, lauding Adbi Markaz Kamraz for providing a common platform to different linguistic communities and fostering unity through literature.

He said that honouring genuine and quality writers not only enriches litera-
